Rockefeller Opens Bank With China

HONG KONG (UPI) -Banker David Rockefeller ended a trip to China today and and Bill Keehn, Amarillo; two said the Chase Manhattan Bank has been designated the first American bank in 24 years to do official business with the Bank of China

We have been asked to be the first correspondent with the Bank of China in the United States since the time of the (1949) revolution." Rockefeller. chairman of the board of Chase Manhattan, told a news conference shortly after his arrival in

Naturally, we were very pleased we were chosen.

Rockefeller said that after final negotiations are completed it is possible that most of the trade between China and the United States, whichtotaled more than \$300 million last year, would be handled through Chase Manhattan. Those transactions are now handled through third-nation banks

Question Must be Resolved Rockefeller said, however. that banking transactions would not begin until the question of blocked accounts is resolved, but he said the issue is now under government-to-government negotiations and he understood it would be resolved

in a matter of weeks. He said the negotiations cover Chinese funds frozen by the U.S. government in 1949, which total about \$75 million. Also under negotiation are claims Americans have on funds now in China and frozen by the government there. Those

claims total about \$250 million. 'On both sides, there is the expectation that these matters will be resolved in a matter of weeks," he said.

Agency Head Welcomes Probe Into Sterilizations

- The director of a federally funded agency accused of having at least 11 minor girls sterilized without their informed consent said today he welcomes a Justice Department investigation.

Kavanaugh's Wife Suing Government

DENVER (UPI) - The decision to drop charges against seven former prisoners of war accused of collaborating with the enemy shows the government realizes "it murdered my husband," says Mrs.

Mrs. Kavanaugh is the wife of Sgt. Abel L. Kavanaugh, the eighth former POW charged with the same offense. Last week, about a month after the charges were filed, Kavanaugh shot himself. A preliminary coroner's investigation indicated his death was a suicide

Defense Department sources in Washington said the charges were dropped Tuesday because the evidence was based on would be virtually impossible to

"The dismissal of these charges makes it clear that the government realized it is responsible for Larry's death,' Kavanaugh's 22-year-old widow said. "Had these charges never been brought, my husband would be alive today. In bringing these charges, the government murdered my husband and caused indescribable hardships on the lives of other POWs.

"I am really happy that these charges have been dropped against the other seven POWs despite the fact that it is too late his wife and six children, his for my husband and family."

Col. Theodore Guy, who was in a North Vietnamese prison camp with the eight men, said in Chicago Tuesday he filed the charges because he felt he owed it to the other prisoners captured in Vietnam.

'I made a promise to my men that I would see this thing through and I have completed as much of my obligation to these men as I can now," Guy said. "In my opinion there was sufficient evidence to warrant myself pressing charges.

"I personally don't think the charges had anything to do with Kavanaugh's death," he said. "It (his death) certainly upset me very much. I hate to see him.



Skylab's Sun Pics Released HOUSTON (UPI) - Scien-

tists now have their first good a information on the form of the sun's magnetic field, represented by butterfly-shaped white streaks on an electronically reproduced photograph beamed back from Skylab.

That photograph and another showing streams of charged particles flowing rainbowlike across the face of the sun were released by NASA Tuesday

Scientists believed the sunlike the Earth-had a magnetic field, but had no information to its form. The ultraviolet radiation telescope on Skylab pictured the electrically charged magnesium particles flowing in the field. The particles are 60,000 miles above the sun's surface and are heated to 2.7 million degrees Fahrenheit by the intense energy released by

Earthbound telescopes cannot view the unltraviolet radiation because of the dense atmosphere and unmanned satellites have never carried as powerful an instrument as the ultraviolet spectroheliometer on Skylab.

The photo showing the iron particles flowing 25,000 miles into space and back into the surface should help scientists unravel more of the mysteries of how the sun's energy is released. Researchers said the iron particles are 3.6 million degrees Fahrenheit.

Reds Close Highway 4 In Cambodia

Military sources today said Communist troops Tuesday night seized the crossroads town of Thnal Totung, once again closing vital Highway 4. the only supply road to Phnom Penh from the sea.

The Cambodian command reported fighting today within a 20-mile radius on all sides of Phnom Penh, but gave no details. U.S. warplanes, including B52s and F111 jet fighterbombers, struck repeatedly around the capital's outer defense perimeter overnight

and early today. Field reports said F111s bombed 12 miles south of Phnom Penh in the marshlands between the Bassac and the Mekong Rivers. The reports said the big B52s hit 21 miles to the northeast around Rokarkong on the west bank of the Mekong and to the northwest in the Bassett Hill area, 12 miles from the capital.

Military sources said High way 4 was severed when rebel troops occupied Thnal Totung. 17 miles southwest of Phnom Penh, early Tuesday night. The town was nearly destroyed in

heavy fighting in mid-June. Communist troops forced closure of the highway June 6-19. causing one foreign embassy in Phnom Penh-the Japanese-to warn its employes to evacuate the capital for fear the city's airport would be attacked.

In the two weeks Highway 4 was closed, U.S. planes flew some of the most intense air strikes of the war near Phnom



Television In Review

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) -There will be only one new weekly, prime time variety series on the commercial television networks when the upcoming season begins.

And even that show, "NBC Follies," will have no regular star-host, another indication that network video is still having trouble getting and holding top headliners who can carry a series from week to week.

The number of regular variety series has shrunk considerably in recent times. The oldtime big-name stars like Jack Benny and Bob Hope are getting older. The sought-after audience is younger than before. And the government cutback on network prime time seems to have brought about more emphasis on shows believed to have a more certain bread-and-butter appeal to viewers-action programs and straight comedies.

It's Ironic In short, the networks have drifted toward shows they apparently think will give maximum ratings protection to

their reduced amount of prime time. And how ironic it is to think that the weekly variety show-once a programming staple that helped build audiences for the young video medium-now is represented in a relatively minor way in the prime viewing hours.

Well, Carol Burnett will be back this fall with her CBS-TV variety series, and thus far she has shown a staying power that few stars in television can match. No one can doubt that she is one of the great headliners in the history of the medium. And, at least going into the new season, her series has a more definite sense of permanence and security than can be found in any other

weekly network variety show. NBC-TV, of course, has the Flip Wilson series, which has also been a popular success, but this coming season will-by the comedian's own choice-be his last on a weekly basis with this particular show, for he has opted for periodic specials instead after that.

Something Less than Smashing CBS-TV also has the Sonny & Cher series, but it has been something less than a smashing ratings hit. And NBC-TV has the Dean Martin Show, which was a solid entry for a long time, but has been running out of gas and is being brought back with an altered format and the new title 'The Dean Martin Comedy Hour." It is also being given one of the worst program slots a program. network show can get-the tail end of the Friday prime time schedule.

For the present, that just about wraps up network prime time programming of variety series in terms of shows currently on the air and those planned for the immediate future. "NBC Follies." by the way, says Mickey Rooney and Sammy Davis will be "virtually resident guest stars in the series' early weeks."

As for viewers, those who have been burning with the dream of getting rich by writing scripts would probably get much richer if they could come up with variety series formats that excite the networks and catch on with the public.

Home Loans For GI's To Gain Volume

The number of G.I. home loans guaranteed by the Veterans Administration in the current fiscal year will likely register the heaviest volume of activity in 16 years. Jack Coker. Veterans Administration regional office director. reported.

Coker noted that 303,000 loans with a face value of \$7 billion were granted in the first 10 months of this fiscal year, up four per cent over the 291,500 loans approved in a comparable period of Fiscal Year 1972.

A total of 359,000 loans guaranteed in all of F.Y. 1972, in turn, marked the most active year since F.Y. 1957.

In the Waco regional office area, 13,872 loans valued at \$289,384,828 were made for the same period.

Veteran loans for mobile homes increased 40 per cent in the first 10 months of this fiscal year, jumping to 4,900 from 3.500 in a comparable period last year.

Coker said the upward trend in VA loan volume began in 1971. He attributed much of the gain to the general availability of mortgage money for home building and buying, and a law signed by the President on Oct. 23. 1970, which restored eligibility for loans to veterans of World War II and the Korean Conflict, eliminated the one half per cent loan funding fee previously required of post Korean veterans, and made other changes providing greater flexibility on the loan

Nearly 70 per cent of the VA home loans are now being made for veterans 35 years of age or less. The median age of veteran borrowers is now 31.



All the true greatness our form of government possesses comes from this view of man and his relation to his neighbor and to accept it lightly is to accept the encroachments of tyrannical government with the

the sages, when they become unfaithful to the ideals upon which they were founded. Being nothing more than the people. who have gone before us, we must endeavor to renew a consciousness of the great ideals of our heritage or perish. In the midst of our material abundance, it is difficult to understand this dictum for, as the saying goes, there is nothing quite like a spacious view of success to lead to moral lethargy.

This applies not only to those in the water but those near it as well, "because 60 per cent of the people who drown each year fall into the water accidentally," according to Charles Russell, acting national director of Red Cross

Safety Programs. Most of those individuals could have saved themselves. Russell says, "if they had been able to swim, because almost invariably safety - in the form of a dock, a boat or the shore -

was nearby." Some 7,300 persons drown in this country each year. The drowning rate is 3.6 persons drowned per 100,000 population. Nearly 60 years ago, when the Red Cross began its program of instruction, the number of persons drowned per 100,000

was 10.2. So the drowning rate has dropped to nearly one -third of its former level while the total population of the country has more than doubled and participants in water sports have multiplied more than 10

times. It's a pretty good record, but it isn't good enough and with normal cautions, according to the Red Cross, the number of drownings could be reduced

WASHINGTON (NEA) - One great lesson we are supposed to draw from President Johnson's conduct of the Vietnam war and the Nixon administration's Watergate affair is that presidential power today is too great and is almost certain to be

But there is about this. judgment an air of inevitability which I think we should distrust. Doctrines founded in rigid certitude seldom apply so precisely to human behavior in politics or anything else.

George Reedy, once press secretary to Lyndon Johnson, voices the judgment of presidential power in his newest book. "The Presidency in

Flux." a key quotation: Power breeds isolation. Isolation leads to the capricious use of power. In turn, the capricious use of power breaks down the normal channels of communication between the leader and the people whom he

Obviously, Reedy believes there is a great concentration of

power is accepted. Since presidential power has in fact been growing, at least since Franklin Roosevelt's

time, that part comes easy. It may be more questionable whether isolation follows inevitably. Mr. Nixon is of course famed for his isolation. But he appears to have lived

that way most of his adult life. Mr. Johnson, for all his midnight calls to favored advisers and his personal cajoling of lawmakers and bureaucrats, seems also to have been seriously isolated from the people at large.

Yet FDR, who really started the latest upward bound in presidential power, did not live and work in similar isolation, though his physical crippling

perhaps gave him more excuse. He did indeed sometimes use his great power capriciously, as biographers like James MacGregor Burns point out convincingly. Yet it would be difficult to demonstrate that this capriciousness seriously affected the channels of communication he had developed with the people. In fact. FDR has for years been cast up as a model of the

presidential communicator. Presidential power surely did not diminish under Presidents Truman, Eisenhower and Kennedy. All three at times used that power arbitrarily, if not capriciously. Gen. Soviet Space Failures Peril Big 2 Sky Hookup

By ROBERT S. ALLEN

technologically incapable, as of now, of meeting the July 1975 deadline of a joint docking mission of a U.S. Apollo and a Soviet Soyuz spacecraft.

That is the unannounced judgment of U.S. space experts and astronauts.

Whether the Russians can, in the next two years, overcome the grave technological deficiencies and difficulties plaguing their space program only time will tell.

Their striking failure to do so thus far is dramatically underscored by

(1) The brilliant feat of the U.S. Skylab I and the three astronauts who overcame a number of problems and complications while in flight to establish a historic record of 28 days aboard the country's first space station.

(2) In glaring contrast, the loss of two Salyut space stations in April and May in which the cosmonauts miraculously escaped death. In both instances they were saved solely because the space stations disintegrated before the cosmonauts could man

The April failure, involving a \$500 million Salyut, began whirling out of control shortly after being put into orbit. ripping off the solar panels vital for providing electric power. In May, in a direct effort to compete with the impending Skylab I project, the Soviet hurriedly lofted another Salyut - only to have it end in disaster when it inexplicably failed to respond to radio directions from

ground control. In each of these immensely costly calamities, the designated cosmonauts owed their lives to not being put into orbit to man the fatally

defective Salyuts. The first, in 1967, killed cosmonaut Vladimir Komarov when Soyuz 1 went into an uncontrollable spin and crashed to earth more than 800 miles off course. The re-entry parachutes opened, but wrapped themselves around the whirling spacecraft that smashed into the Ural Mountains at 400 miles an hour killing the helpicss

Komarov The second tragedy, in 1971, cost the lives of the three monauts who manned Soyuz 11 and remained in orbit for an up - to - then record - breaking 24 days. Much of that time their spacecraft was in a spin. battering and greatly weakening them. The space station succeeded in making a soft landing in Soviet Asia, but the cosmonauts were found dead in their seats.

While their deaths were announced, no explanation has ever been forthcoming as to the

on ground control. For their space flights, the Soviets use a rocket booster with one million-pounds of thrust. Design of that engine is 10 years old. They are working on a rocket engine with 10 million pounds of thrust, but it's


Julius Boros, one of golf's great bunker players, says that the key to successful sand play is simplicity.

"You make it simple by

Crampton Is First

NEW YORK (UPI) - Bruce the tour here 16 years ago Crampton, the intense, sometimes intractable Australian, seldom says much, but he's the first foreigner ever to win a million bucks here in the United States—and that says plenty right there.

It says something for the PGA's Tournament Players Division.

It says something for this

And above everything else, it also says something for Bruce Crampton, a golfer some find difficult to understand.

In a way it was somewhat typical that Crampton, the 37year-old son of a Sydney police official, should become only the fifth golfer in all history ever to crack the million-dollar barrier in a tournament he blew. The tournament was the Western Open which wound up Sunday in

Crampton led after the first and third rounds and after nine holes of the final one, only to finish in a tie for fourth place behind the winner, Billy Cas-

Crampton wasn't upset over the fact he didn't win. "I achieved my most important goal," he said.

He Wasn't Upset

He meant moving into that elite million-dollar category along with Arnold Palmer, Jack Nicklaus, Lee Trevino and

Casper. What made the occasion typical was that it came out somewhat bitter-sweet, and. that usually is how things have been turning out for Bruce Crampton ever since he joined

He has played well, generally, and has made his ample share of money, but he never gained anywhere near the recognition or following of a Palmer or Nicklaus or even a Trevino or Chi Chi Rodriguez.

That might be because of his personality.

Actually, Bruce Crampton has a good one-if anybody takes the trouble to get to know it. That's the rub. A lot of people don't. Crampton isn't entirely blameless either. He doesn't extend himself that much, and there you have the perfect tipoff

on his personality. "I simply don't believe in pushing myself on others,' Crampton said to me during the U.S. Open at Oakmont, Pa. "I was brought up to mind my manners, and I suppose it's unfortunate, but when I try to do that, some people interpret that as indifference.

Got the Cold Shoulder

Human nature being what it is, some of the touring golfers gave the introspective, newly arrived Aussie the cold shoulder when he first came to this country. Crampton felt that his being a foreigner might be the reason.

But foreigner or not, no newcomer gets the red carpet treatment from the other golfers when he joins the tour. After all, it's a bit difficult bringing someone a piece of cake when this same fellow is trying to take the bread out of

your mouth at the same time. Regardless, Crampton still managed to make his mark in

following of a Palmer or Nicklaus-how many golfers do?-but you ought to see how many people kept surrounding

him for his autograph at the

Bob Charles, the New Zealand lefty, says he's leaving the U.S. tour because, well, frankly, he doesn't get the recogni-tion over here that he does in places like Britain and Australia, but Crampton has no

kick in that regard. "I'like America," he says. "It has been very good to me, and I've made many good friends here. I feel I was given every opportunity. If, on occasion, someone did rub me the wrong way, then all I can say is that it might have happened anywhere else in the world also.

None has Done as Well Gary Player. Tony Jacklin and Bruce Devlin, and Bobby Locke and Peter Thomson before them, are some of the foreign golfers who have done well in this country. But none ever made as much money here as Crampton. That goes for

Player and Jacklin, both of whom have won the U.S. Open. Six years ago, when Jacklin announced in Britain that he was joining the U.S. tour, some of his friends wondered why he was leaving his home turf to try

his hand in an alien land Because I'm not satisfied being second best," Jacklin answered. "You never really can consider yourself first best until you play in the United States.

It's the time of the year when people spend a lot of their time in automobiles. As a result, traffic accidents are more

On an annual average, someone dies in a traffic accident every ten minutes -150 every day — and thousands

more are injured. Many of these accidents are avoidable, say traffic safety officials at the Texas State Department of Health, and many serious accidents could be reduced to minor collisions if drivers learned and practiced 'defensive driving.'

Here are a few tips taken from the National Safety Council's Defensive Driving Course

In order to improve your driving ability you must first evaluate your driving skills, using "perfect" driving as a standard

Perfect driving simply means that you complete every trip without accidents, without traffic violations, without vehicle abuse, and without discourtesy.

Perfect driving means always avoiding "preventable" accidents. Most accidents are preventable by one or both of the drivers involved, even though this sometimes involves letting the driver in the wrong have the right - of - way.

To do this you must learn to give a little, to drive defensively and not as if you were on the offense. You must tailor your driving behavior to the unexpected actions of others and to other unpredictable factors such as light, weather and road conditions.

To do this, you'll need to know and apply the standard accident prevention formula, which involves three interrelated

(1) See the Hazard: Think about what is going to happen as far ahead of encountering the situation as possible. Never assume everything will be "all right.

(2) Understand the Defense! Learn the appropriate defensive reaction so you can apply it when the need arises. (3) Act in time: Never take a

'wait and see' attitude. Included in these steps are other ways of preventing an accident

Stay Alert: Watch for signs from other drivers as to what they intend to do. Is his turn signal on? Are his brake lights lit? Has he been gradually drifting to the right or the left as if to prepare for a turn?

Stay ahead of the situation: Look beyond the driver ahead to see situations that may force him to act quickly and thereby

become a threat to you. Stay back: Allow one car length for every ten miles of speed - even more in adverse road conditions. Apply the "two. second" rule to insure a safe distance. As the car ahead of you passes a highway sign or some other marker, count off two full seconds before your car passes the same marker. This applies for in - town driving

Start stopping sooner: Apply your brakes the instant you see a hazard developing, but apply them gradually so you don't throw your car in a spin or come


