

### Greatest Danger

A Hoover Commission report deals with the problem of government owned and operated commercial businesses. One section of it is devoted to the shipbuilding and repair yards run by the Navy, and to the law which makes it mandatory for the government to build the first and each succeeding alternate vessel of the type it authorizes. This can be waived only in rare cases, when the President decides that the stipulation is not consistent with the public interest.

In the Commission's view this "represents a destructive intrusion into the private shipbuilding industry of this country." It points out that, in case of war, the Navy could not produce sufficient shipping to meet our needs, and we would have to depend primarily on private yards. Yet, it continues, these yards "lack the construction and repair activity needed to maintain their capacity, skills and mobilization utility," and are in a "distressed condition."

It has been argued that the Navy should and must do its experimenting and developing. The Commission refutes this, and offers the opinion that the work can be done as well and possibly better in private yards. Its solution to the problem is to allow private shipbuilders the right to bid on all vessels the government buys, not just some of them.

Finally, the report states that the unnecessary intrusion of government into business injures "the very system upon which our future security and prosperity is based." Of that view, the Wall Street Journal said: "This is the greatest danger of all; for if there were no strong private enterprise system to provide the taxes, the Government could not be in the shipbuilding business nor the bread baking business, and perhaps not even in the business of

- one is from a young man studying to be a minister and the other is from a retired minister. I want to pass on to the readers the letter from the young man entering the ministry. He is the son of Dr. Harvey Spears. Dr. Spears should be happy to have a son en-

tering the ministry with such a clear insight to the true meaning of the love of God. The young man is Richard H. Spears now of St. Andrews, Scotland. He writes: "Dear Mr. Holles:

"I have for a long time wished to talk with you about the problems of freedom. But it seems like every time I went out to the country club to see you, I would just miss you. Now that I have lived in the British welfare state for almost a year, I want to outline and discuss the outcome of my thinking on freedom in democracy that has become more clear to me after many debates with my professors that profess the welfare state.

"I am studying in St. Mary's College, the University of St. Andrews. It is a Church of Scotland theological college. Before coming here for study I was at the University of Southern California School of Philosophy.

"From my discussions with my ethics professor I have drawn up this little problem to get the vital issues out in the open. Given four men in a democracy. One is dying and is unconscious. One is of an evil mind. Two are of the character of Christ. The two good men have done all that is within their power and ability to save the dying man but all their efforts have been in vain. They are unable to help the dying man. The only person that has the ability to help the dying man is the man of an evil mind. He refuses to help out of his own free will. There are only these two alternatives open to the two good men. They can force the evil man to help the dying man by passing a law that will make it mandatory for him to help or they can preach the love of God to the evil man and try to persuade him to help out of his own desire. The situation seems simple enough at this stage and all but the most unreflecting persons choose to take the love of God in preference to the force of law. However, this is as far as most will go with the love of God. When they face the same issues in society around them they go back and take the side of the law even at the level of the problem. I believe this to be just what has happened in the U.S.A.

"But let me go back and follow the two solutions to the problem: out a little bit further. If we decide to take the love of God as the way to attempt to solve the problem of when to use force. Those who take the law say that you become a pacifist. This is not the case. The difference is that Love knows when and how to use force. and it is always against evil and not for good. Love uses force only when evil interferes with the relation of people to their God. The purpose of law then becomes to help people live freely under God. Criminal law and not civil law then becomes most important. Law is then not preventative or regulative but curative. This would mean then that there would be no place in society for state education or any of the other evils of a tax system supported by law (force). Rather. all government should be supported and maintained out of the Love of God (freedom). Admittedly this would lead to almost no government and anarchy, but would not Love and the Golden Rule be seen in their proper light?

"If, in the problem the side of law is taken to help the dying man, freedom must be given up for some reason which is not justifiable except by the surrender of freedom. Even though the ends of law and freedom look and are the same in most cases, to me it is a matter of life and death which one provides the end.

"I believe that a planned and sustained war for freedom is the only chance we have to swing the pendulum the other way: The worst offender of freedom seems to me to be the state education programs

"It may be that I am extremely naive, but it seems that the American people should about be ready for the cry of freedom from the

political platforms. "Aggressive fighting for the right is the noblest sport the world affords.' This little saying of T. Roosevelt seems to be a good battle cry for Freedom.

"If these ideas are in sympathy with the Freedom Press, I would be most appreciative of the affirma-

#### THE NATION'S PRESS

THE WHEAT VOTE (The Wall Street Journal)

It is quite easy to see what made those expectations of a close vote go wrong. The farmers resented the Government interference truly enough. But their fear of what would happen to them once a Government guarantee of price was removed overbalanced their resentment. It is sad but true that a group of people who were once the most "rugged individualists" valued security more than they valued their freedom.

It is interesting to review how all this happened from small beginnings.

Not the New Deal but the previous Hoover Administration started the experiment of bolstering wheat prices. The erstwhile Federal Farm Board thought that if it bought wheat it could support prices at a fixed level. Quite quickly its funds were exhausted and wheat prices went their way. When this first support venture

failed there were proposals that the wheat crop be limited. These proposals brought forth a storm of opposition. Yet by the time the next Ad-

ninistration took office, the opposition had been overcome and the Department of Agriculture under the guidance of Mr. Henry Wallace did plow up crops and kill the little pigs. But that did not work very well either and so the Government then went back to the

previous scheme of guaranteeing the price, but this time the funds were unlimited and the price guarantee held because the Government would buy the entire wheat crop, if necessary. On Saturday something more

than 77 per cent of the wheat growers voted to impose marketing quotas on the 1956 wheat crop. This means that each farmer will be able to claim Government price support for a certain maximum of the wheat which he grows. If he markets more than that, not only will he not receive the Government guaranteed price; if he tries to sell the excess above his quota in the open market he will be subject to heavy penalties. To enforce that legal arrangement requires of course a vast Government machine and a vast amount of work by farmers to

make sure that they live up to

the Government regulations. The wheat farmer resents this Government interference. In fact his resentment has reached the point where many well informed persons thought that saiurtay's referendum might reject the qua tas; or at least they expected the vote to be very close to the twothirds majority required to make the quotas effective. As it turned out the vote in favor of quotas was over-whelming and the percentage of approval topped the last previous vote.






