## 104 Degrees Is Forecast; **Crop Damage In Millions**

LOS ANGELES .-- UP--- The death toll in California's killer heat wave soared to 73 and damage to crops and poultry ran still higher into the millions of dollars Wednesday

A high temperature of 104 degrees was forecast for the Los Angeles area in this eighth day of the heat wave and no relief was in sight from the scorching siege which the weather bureau has blamed mostly on a lack of normal sea breezes.

## Future Of Invention

J. L. B. Blizard, writing in Technology Review has brought to public gaze a rather unknown trend which has been developing of late. It is in the field of invention and patenting.

Back in 1900 there was a total of approximately 40,000 engineers in the United States. At present colleges and universities graduate approximately this same number every year. Research expenditures have multiplied astronomically. Our entire way of life is now far more closely geared to science than it was 55 years ago.

Yet statistics from the United States Patent Office indicate that the patent rate is not rising in keeping with a curve that should be developing. It has not even remained constant! It is dropping in a steady curve and has been since the advent of the New Deal in the early 30's.

Following World War II, scientific minds generally concurred that scientists in the United States, who had provided so much in the field of technology, should place more emphasis on basic research. It was felt that without further progress in scientific discovery, technology would soon reach a dead end. Despite this general concurrence, the trend since the war has been in the opposite direction. Nine-tenths of all the research money spent in the U.S. in 1947 (excluding atomic energy) went for applied science.

In this connection it is interesting to note the distribution of Nobel prizes in the scientific categories. For despite the high level of "education" in the United States, and despite the vast size of our population compared to that of Germany, England and other countries, the United States has rarely risen above third place in awards for work done in basic science, particularly since the 30's.

In seeking to find out why a larger number of scientific discoveries come from Germany and England than here, psychologist Anne Roe conducted a study of a group of American scientific "traits" they held in common with their European cousins. She found that some of the reasons for less productive original effort in America could be traced to the differences in our educational system.

American high schools, geared to mass education meet fewer hours per week, assign less homework, and provide about two years' less material than European secondary schools. As if that were not enough, there is great pressure here to eliminate all homework, on the grounds that it interferes with the student's extracurricular activities.

She went on to summarize the effect: "The result was that many a brilliant mind developed habits of laziness, carelessness, and superficiality , . . . Seldom was any student 'set on fire' intellectually, eager to explore on his own, ready to conquer difficulties and go through whatever drudgery might be necessary to achieve his purpose. The individual and society are both losers It is clearly apparent that the freedom and individuality which carved us into a civilization from the raw materials of a wilderness are being destroyed by our governmentally-dominated school system. To quote the review: "Subtle changes have come about in the United States. As one manifestation, traditional rugged individualism is being shelved in favor of a new virtue, 'integration within the group.' It is now stressed that the individual's interactions with the group are of greater importance than his intrinsic talents or abilities. Indoctrination on this score has been going on for some time under the banner of progressive education. America has been great in the past because of the large number of rugged individualists who flocked to these shores. Greatness is always an individual matter. There is no greatness in group or mob activity. The truth is that we are turning out fewer basic discoveries and inventions now than we were in 1900, and the curve is opparently to continue downward. How long are we going to continue to support our government schools which, instead of training young minds to their full potential development, confine young people in an artificial atmosphere of unreality during the school years and ultimately prevent these future leaders from actually acquiring an education?

> Arguments Against The Status Of Forces Treaty In the last issue I quoted Senalor Jenner's arguments opposing the Status of Forces Treaty as presented in Facts Forum. Here are Senator Sparksman's argu-

ments trying to defend the treaty that permits our soldiers to be tried in foreign courts: "Does the Status of Forces Treaty violate the rights of Americans? First, let's make clear exactly what the Status of Forces Treaty is all about. Specifically, the Treaty prescribes the civil and

criminal status of members of the Armed Forces of North Atlantic Treaty Organization countries while they're 'stationed in a member country. Prior to its enactment there was strong resentment towards American soldiers who committed crimes against citizens of the country in which they were stationed but over which such country had no jurisdiction. By and large the great majority of American soldiers stationed in other lands are law-abiding. As is true, however, in any situtation that involves large numbers of people, there are always a few who commit acts of lawlessness against citizens. These abuses can do and in some cases have done harm to the mutual self-defense and goodwill worked out between us

and other nations of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization "It was to solve such problems that member nations of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization worked out the Status of Forces Treaty. This Treaty was drawnup by the State Department during President Truman's Administration, working closely with General Eisenhower when he was supreme commander of NATO. The Treaty was ratified under the Eisenhower Administration in 1953. The provision of the Status of Forces Treaty that has

brought about the most critical comments from some of our people is the provision which grants a NATO nation jurisdiction over soldiers of a member nation who commit crimes while off duty. Under the Treaty, if an American soldier commits a crime against the citizen of the country in which, he is serving, and that crime is committed while a soldier is off. duty, he can be arrested and tried under the laws of the nation in which he commits the crime. If the American soldier commits a crime while on duty, Armed

Forces authorities and the government of the foreign country have equal jurisdiction, depending upon who arrests him first and on the circumstances of each individual CASP "Let me emphasize that in the Status of Forces Treaty we do

not grant any nation any privilege or any right that is not in turn granted to us.. We acquire the same jurisdiction over any of their troops that may be stationed here as they have over our troops stationed there. One can see from this brief background that the Status of Forces Treaty simply typifies the fact that in cooperating with other countries for the mutual defense of all, it is necessary for such countries to take



**Judge Dies** At Age 68 WICHITA FALLS, Tex. -- UP-Funeral services will be held at

10 a.m. Wednesday in First Presbyterian Church for District Judge John Davenport, who died Monday night at the age of 68. Davenport suffered a cerebral
