### 5 Lawmakers Are Loaded With Talent

WASHINGTON—UP—Harmony often may be lacking on the floor of Congress. But after business, it sometimes bursts out all over.

After a close vote on a hot issue you'll find party lines short-circuited and four-part melodies such as "Down by the Old Mill Stream" and "I Dream of Jeanie With the Light Brown Hair" bouncing off the walls of the cloak rooms. Congress could put together an orchestra of its own, too. The American Music Conference (AMC) made a survey and learned that about one out of every three members of Congress plays a musical instrument. A lot of the lawmakers play for their own amusement—and, more important, relaxation.

Vice President Richard M. Nixon accompanies on the piano while he and his pretty wife and kids cut loose with vocals. Former President Truman needed little coaxing to spread his coat-tails about the piano stool and run across the black and white keys with his very best on "The Missouri Waltz." In all, 136 senators and representatives answered the questionnaire. Forty of these said they played some musical instrument. Ninety-two said they did not, but wished they could. Four replies didn't say yes or no. But almost all of them indicated a love for music. AMC claims that one out of every six persons in the country plays some sort of musical gadget. Therefore, Congress is well ahead of the national average. Instruments played by congressmen include violins, banjos, mandolins, pianos, trombones, clarinets, trumpets, saxophones, piccolos, organs and the harmonica. Many congressmen said that other members of their families also play musical instruments. One even mentioned bagpipes.

# Hollywood Quits Fooling The Public

HOLLYWOOD—UP—The movie life story of Buster Keaton will tell bluntly of his alcohol problem and

his fall from the pinnacle of screen greatness. Hollywood has stopped fooling the public with such fictionalized biographies as "The Tolson Story." Now a celebrity's life tale is told with the unhappy side, and thus the exciting drama, left in.

"The Buster Keaton story," that begins shooting at Paramount next month, will be in the manner of "Love Me or Leave Me" and "I'll Cry Tomorrow."

When Donald O'Connor combs his hair sideways and claps that famous Keaton flat straw skimmer on his head, he'll portray what producer Robert Smith calls "The Rise and Fall of Buster Keaton."

"The story will be true to his life, about the drinking, and his adjustment," O'Connor said Wednesday. "He never really

found himself until after his great success."

O'Connor is screening all the great silent Keaton comedies so he can study that great comedy artist. The younger entertainer also is practicing Keaton's tricks of trade, from back flips to "ear-slides," that make this role most difficult of O'Connor's career. Keaton joins O'Connor in producer Smith's office at Paramount and they hash over comedy "bits" that will be repeated in the picture.

Although he is 60, Keaton can do falls that pale the younger O'Connor. One day during the script conference Buster leaped to his feet and did a back somersault, while holding a cup of coffee in his hand. O'Connor is spilling a few cups to learn this trick.

O'Connor will wear a duplicate of Keaton's original wardrobe when he goes into such famous Keaton routines as the stuck-to-

gether card dealing bit from "The Navigator." O'Connor also will repeat the wonderful gag in which Keaton stood in the prow of his little boat as it was launched. The boat grandly sailed down the skids, and just as grandly sank to the bottom. Only his famous pancake-thin hat was left floating on the water.

O'Connor fits neatly into the role because he always has been a lover of the silent screen and its pantomime comedy. He has done such sketches for his television series. And it was his idea to put such veterans as Francis X. Bushman, Minta Durfee, Conrad Nagel and Blanche Sweet into "The Buster Keaton Story."

"I would like to have been a part of that silent era," O'Connor reflected. "I'm a great believer of pantomime. Most pictures now are overburdened with dialogue."

# Snow In North, Rain In South

The weather dealt wintry snows to the north and pounding rains to the south Thursday.

A full-blown snow storm raged over Montana. Lewiston had four inches of new snow and more snow spread eastward into the Dakotas. It was 24 degrees at Cut Bank, Mont., and well below freezing elsewhere in the area.

In the south, skies cleared over Texas in the wake of four days of flooding rains which killed at least six persons. The Lone Star State felt the last lash of the storm Wednesday in 100 mile per hour winds which hit the Houston-Galveston area, ripping away a warehouse roof and rolling a freight car several hundred feet down a siding.

Although flash floods fell back, the weather bureau warned that the Sabine River in East Texas may hit flood stage Friday. It said livestock should be moved out of the river's towlands.

The big storm system still had plenty of vigor when it hit Louisiana Wednesday. It took the form of a sudden squall on Lake Pontchartrain which smashed six small boats against bridges and dumped at least 12 persons into the water.

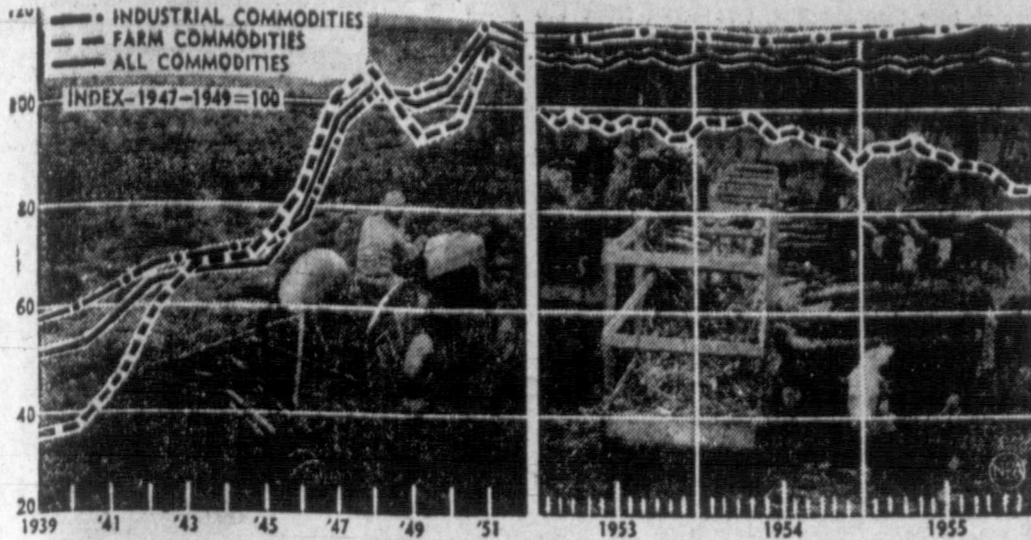

## What's New Around Nation's Capitol

WASHINGTON —UP— What's new in Washington:

Some congressmen in the old House office building are becoming long hairs, literally. Reason: The price of hair cuts has gone up from 50 to 75 cents. In the new House office building, you still can get trimmed for 35 cents.

Sure, it's complicated. The new and the old House buildings happen to be under different jurisdictions. The price increase in the old building was okayed by the House administration committee.

Old house comes under the doorkeepers. The new building is under the jurisdiction of the Capitol architect.

Of course, there is nothing to keep the help in the old House, where haircuts cost 75 cents a clip, from running across the street, and getting clipped for 35 cents.

The April Air Force magazine was devoted mostly to Strategic Air Command, to which "airman" TV star Arthur Godfrey is devoted. He plugged the book on his

own show, saying: "You folks ought to get one of these things." Seems that 100,000 folks answered the request. It caused all kinds of trouble for the Air Force. Letters came in. Magazine officials had to run out and buy a bunch of new letter openers. The post office apologized because it couldn't sort out the important mail from the fan stuff on account of it was all first class.

## Jacoby On Bridge

The art of avoiding an end-play is a rare exercise in defensive skill, partly because it is needed only against the sort of declarer who is good enough to execute the end-play. Perhaps today's hand will elucidate.

West opened the ten of hearts. East played the discouraging deuce, and South won with the ace. It seemed clear that West would shift to clubs if given the chance, and South had good reasons for not wanting such a shift.

Declarer drew three rounds of trumps, ending in the dummy, and then led the jack of diamonds. East stepped up immediately with the ace of diamonds and returned his low heart, allowing West to win the eight. This wasn't as desperate a play as it seemed, since West had discarded the nine of hearts on the third trump to make it

clear that he held the eight and could win the second round of hearts.

West returned the eight of clubs, dummy played low, and East won with the jack. East could still get out with his low diamond, after which he could sit back and wait for a second club trick to defeat the contract.

Perhaps you noticed that East had to give the lead to his partner with a low heart as part of the campaign to avoid an end-play. East also had to win the first diamond trick in order to get out with a low diamond later on. If East hadn't taken these two precautions, he'd have been obliged eventually to lead clubs up to dummy's ace-queen; or he'd have led a heart, allowing dummy to ruff while South discarded a club.

East's precautions wouldn't have been needed against an ordinary declarer. The average South player would try a club finesse on his own, and East would be in no danger.

## 'Magic' Is The Something Missing In American Homes

**HOLLYWOOD**—UP—Something important is missing from even the most modern homes today. That something is what I call "magic"—unexpected touches, a house enchanting.

"Magic" doesn't have to be expensive. All it takes is a little effort, a little imagination.

Fabric instead of wallpaper is one of my favorite ways of making an ordinary room exciting. I've used everything from venetian brocade to burlap—in different rooms, of course! You might try gluing natural-colored burlap on a wall.

There should be drama in the home as well as in the theatre. Rooms with height have drama, and without raising the roof you can create a feeling of height by running your draperies clear to the ceiling. In a really high ceilinged room like the coral drawing room I did for Agnes Moorehead, the result is spectacular.

The accessories on your tables and shelves should never be just things bought in a department store to fill space. They should be objects which have a special meaning for you.

Travel souvenirs are wonderful, but I don't mean souvenirs in the usual sense. A handful of seashells you found on an English beach, a Paris florist's wicker basket are beautiful in themselves and more

evocative than a pillow with "Brighton, 1954" embroidered on it or an iron replica of the Eiffel Tower.

Old family furniture is a wonderful possession, but these heavy, dark pieces look out of place in modern homes. A favorite device of mine is to strip off all the old satin and varnish. The exposed wood is light and has a lovely patina.

The unexpected is fun, particularly when guests are due. A remnant of unusual fabric makes a wonderful tablecloth. My friend, the late Elsie Mendl, used to write dinner place cards in white ink on camellia leaves.

A home can still have elegance even in these servantless days. The automatic dishwasher in the kitchen is a servant of sorts, but it doesn't do much for the morale of your guests. A single flower in a vase can—if you take the trouble to create this simple magic.

## B-47 Crashes In Flames, 4 Killed

LINCOLN, Neb.—UP—A six-jet B-47 crashed in flames and exploded on a farm Wednesday night, killing all four men aboard.

The plane went down without warning at 10:38 p. m. est. The Lincoln Air Force Base, a Strategic Air Command installation only three and a half miles southeast of the crash site, was in radio contact with the plane at the time.

Air Force officials said the pi-

lot gave no hint that anything was wrong.

The big jet was carrying live ammunition, which exploded and sprayed hunks of flaming metal over a wide area.

Only the tail section remained intact. An Air Force investigating crew went immediately to the scene and the area was blocked off to outsiders over a two-square mile area.

The plane was based at Lincoln AFB and had taken off on a routine training mission at 8:15 p. m. est. It was to have landed at Lincoln at 1:45 a. m. Thursday.

The exploding ammunition drove back rescue workers. The Air Force ordered all spectators kept

away from the scene to prevent injuries and also to guard against souvenir hunters.

## Franco Policies Firm In Spain

Generalissimo Francisco Franco of Spain has laid down a firm policy for his Nationalist regime in an attempt to quiet mounting unrest.

Franco himself says the country faces serious internal problems. These include public dissatisfaction with the Falange party, which provides the basis for his political support, and the dissatisfaction of workers with economic conditions.

The political unrest broke into the open in February when university students became involved in riots with Falangists. The students were supported by monarchist elements.

Last month strikes started breaking out in northern Spain in protest against the lack of balance between wages and living costs.

**Strikes Spread**  
The strikes started in Pamplona, a bulwark of Nationalist strength. They spread to the Basque country to the west and to Barcelona, Spain's greatest industrial city, in the northeast.

Franco has just met the situation by making a series of important speeches on policy. In them, he set the following pattern for his regime:

Spain remains nominally a monarchy. But the Falange party is the basic political movement. "The Falange can govern Spain without the monarchy, but the monarchy cannot govern without the Falange."

The army must be "the backbone of the motherland." The complete loyalty of the army is necessary to defend internal order and prevent subversion.

**Hopes to Live Long Time**  
Franco "hopes God will let him live many years longer for the good of Spain and the frustration of his enemies." This was a plain statement to the strong monarchist movement that Franco has no

intention of giving up the power he has held since the end of the civil war in 1939.

Finally, Franco promised to do all he could to improve the lot of the worker. He called for worker participation in management as providing part of the answer.

Perhaps the most interesting feature of Franco's outline was his notice that, at 82, he has no intention of restoring the monarchy within the foreseeable future.

**Declares Successor**  
Franco announced March 31, 1947, Spain was a monarchy. In event of his own death or incapacitation, a king or regent would be named.

Don Juan of Bourbon is the heir to the throne. But the Falange prefers his 18-year-old son Don Juan Carlos as king when the monarchy is finally restored—as it well may be in time.

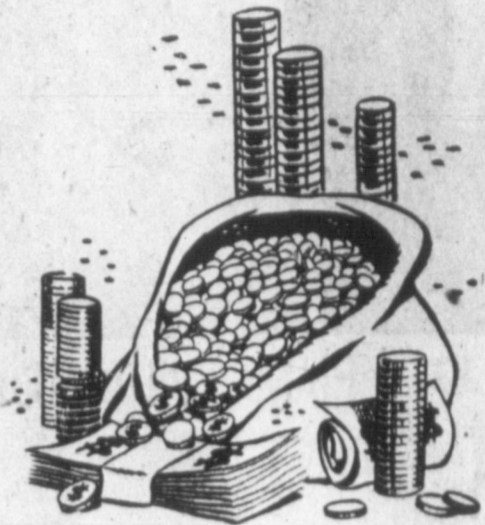
Dispatches from Madrid say Franco is expected soon to give some word of encouragement to the monarchists. Many if not most of them do not like the Falange. And the monarchist movement is still strong. It includes especially many influential business men and many army officers.

But "El Caudillo" — the leader, as Franco is called — has shown he intends to maintain the rule he has exercised for 17 years. His leadership is unquestioned. And even if he felt like giving up the leadership many of the most ardent monarchists probably would agree this is not the time to do it.

**Struck by Auto**

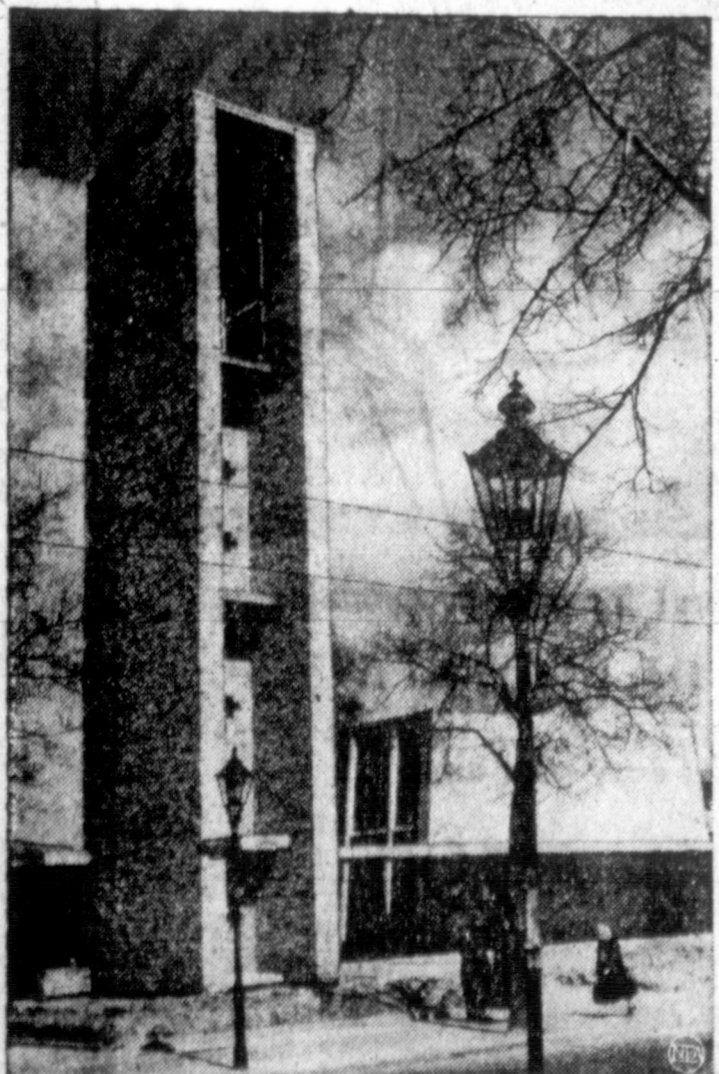

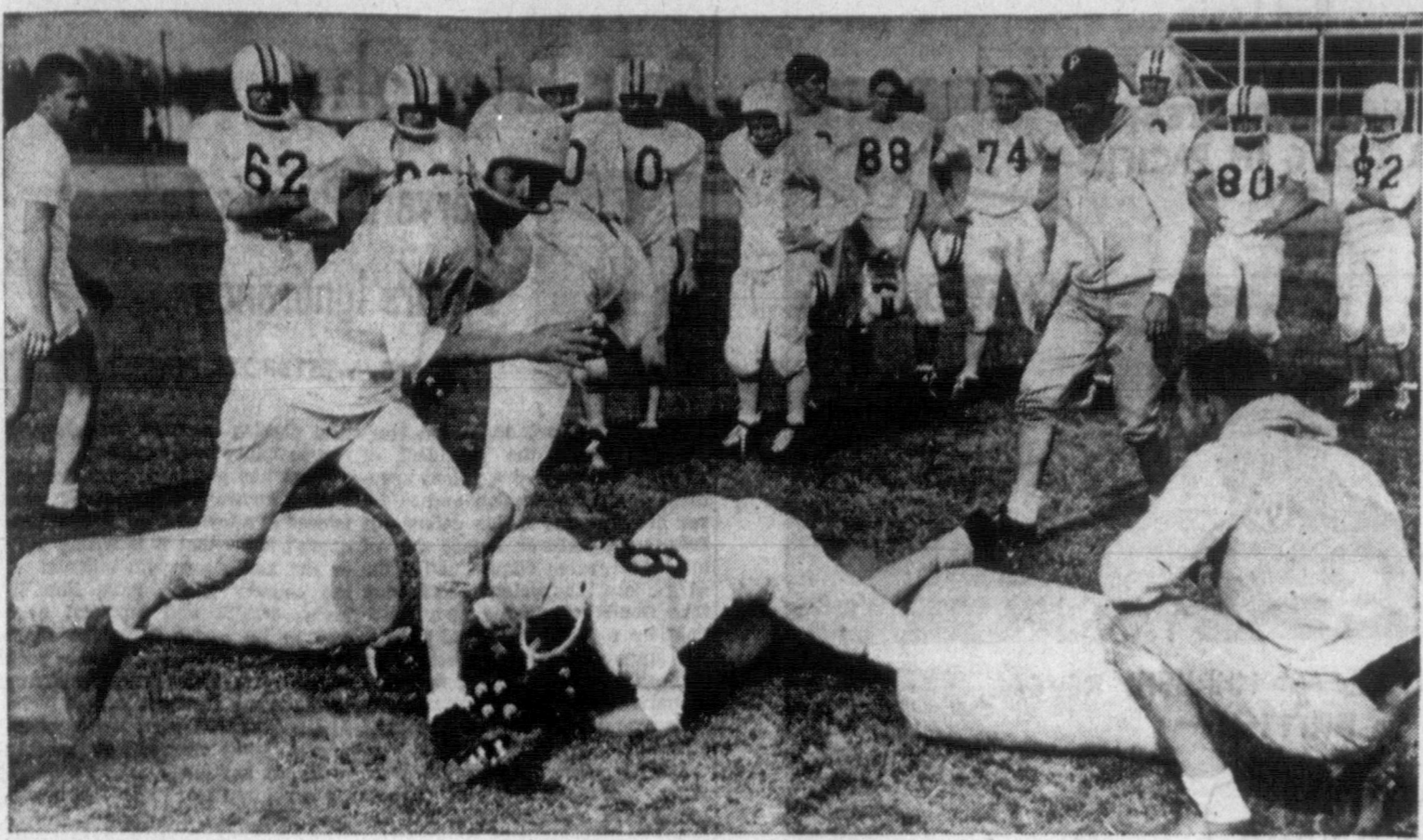

But, four days of rain that has cut practice to a minimum only served to heighten Middlecoff's chances of picking the \$5,000 top money at the end of the 72-hole struggle Sunday and winning his first title since the Phoenix Open early in February.

The course, one of the nation's toughest tests under normal conditions, played exceptionally slow and long Thursday as the first threesome of Byron Nelson, Walker Inman Jr. and Don January opened play.

Hogan, who is still looking for some tournament in which he can claim five championships (he has won several of them including Colonial four times), will be a major threat to Middlecoff's favorite's role if he can find a putter that will work for him.

And, Masters champion Jack Burke has been sticking close to par in early practice rounds before the rains came, indicating he might be ready to add another plum to go with his sensational victory at Augusta over Middlecoff and amateur Ken Venturi.

Stocky Gene Littler, the California burrhead who made a shambles of the Tournament of Champions field last week end for the second straight year, also is among those regarded as having an excellent chance.

Better for Long Hitters  
But, with the course playing as slow as it is, the odds will lean heavily toward the longer-hitting pros like Middlecoff and Mike Souchak, the big former Duke football star who holds this year's Caliente and Azalea Open crowns. **Schools May Appeal Bans**

NEW ORLEANS — UP — Reaction from officials of schools joined by some of the stiffest penalties ever handed out by the National Collegiate Athletic Association Thursday ranged from surprised shock and amazement at the severity of the punishment to possible appeals.

In all, six schools were blasted by the NCAA policy - directing council for rule violations, with Auburn, Florida and Louisville drawing the stiffest penalties ever imposed for violations of which they were found guilty.

The punishment in most cases barred the schools from participating in post-season bowl games, invitational tournaments, NCAA championship events and probation, but did not affect their regular season competition or their participation in conference tournaments.

The council's action definitely will hurt some of the schools who have strong returning football or basketball teams with tournament and bowl hopes.

Three Added Wednesday  
Auburn, Florida and Louisville felt the whip of disapproval in Wednesday's closing session, while Texas A&M, Mississippi College and Kansas were penalized Tuesday.

The council lowered the boom on Auburn. The Alabama school was placed on three years probation, the longest term ever handed out, because an assistant coach gave twin brothers Harry and Robert Beabe \$500 each to enroll at the school.

And it barred Auburn from participating in NCAA championship and invitational events for the first two years of the probation, and also warned any further violations might bring expulsions from the NCAA.

Florida was given a two-year probation and its athletic teams barred from competition in NCAA and invitational events for "offering prospective student-athletes financial aid in excess of that per-

mitted by the association, including illegal transportation to home and back.

Louisville's basketball team was placed on probation for two years and ruled ineligible to participate in NCAA and invitational events.

Both Auburn and Florida are members of the Southeastern Conference, which had already taken action against Auburn.

Checking Possible Reversal  
At Jacksonville, Fla., Chairman Fred Kent of the state board of control, said he was working "to find whether there was any possibility of our being able to obtain a reversal of the decision."

Professor H. P. Constans, chairman of the Florida faculty committee on intercollegiate athletics said he was "deeply concerned at the severity of the penalty."

"Coach Bob Woodruff, director of intercollegiate athletics," Constans said, "knew that athletic association funds could not be used for transportation to student athletes. However, he thought that it was permissible to have alumni and friends of the university provide such transportation. Upon receipt of notification from Commissioner Bernie Moore of the SEC at the last annual meeting that transportation could not be provided student athletes, the practice ceased."

Woodruff said "Our case was an honest mistake and a misunderstanding of NCAA rules." He would give no further comment.

Dr. Ralph B. Draughon, Auburn president, said "we took our medicine on the Southeastern Conference ruling and we'll take it on this one."

Kansas and Mississippi College drew the lightest penalties. Each received one year of probation for violation of basketball rules.

Texas A&M was banned from post-season events and invitational events and placed on probation a year and 13 days for violating NCAA financial and recruiting laws. The latter three violations occurred before last June 9.

**Wide Open Kentucky Derby Expected For Richest Run**

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — UP — The most wide-open Kentucky Derby in years may result in the names of 18 horses passing through the box Thursday when entries for Saturday's running of the classic are closed.

The size of the starting field has fluctuated all week. Trainers have hemmed and hawed about whether they actually would name their colts for the 82nd and richest running of the Derby at a fee of \$250 each. It will cost another \$1,250 to start.

The actual starting field for the mile and one-quarter golden gallop may not be known until final scratch time, 45 minutes before post time Saturday.

The trainers of Needles, Fabius, Pintor Lea, Career Boy, Head Man, Countermand, Terrang, Count Chick, Reaping Right, High King, Besomer, Jean Baptiste, Black Emperor, Ben A. Jones, Invalidate, No Regrets Come On Red and King O'Swords said they planned to name their horses.

It was certain not all would start. Syl Veitch, who trains Career Boy and Head Man for C. V. Whitney, said Career Boy would not go in the mud. But Come On Red will start only if the track is muddy.

The track was a muddy mess Tuesday after heavy rains. The long range weather forecast called for more rain before the weekend and possibly on Derby day. There has not been an off track for the Kentucky Derby since Citation won in sloppy footing in 1948.

Other doubtful starters — even though they may pass through the box — were Pintor Lea, Invalidate and King O'Swords. Pintor Lea apparently has recovered from a wrenched knee, but trainer Jimmy Jones has indicated he may put Pintor Lea in only to gain an additional day to prepare the colt. He will take him out if he isn't sound. Then Jones will would have Fabius, winner of Tuesday's Derby Trail, as a Derby starter.

Early Wednesday, trainer Frank Red Sanders said he doubted if King O'Swords would be entered. By mid-afternoon he had changed his mind.

Will Enroll at Tech  
LUBBOCK, Tex., April 28 — UP — Fullback Glenn Schmanke of the Alma, Kan., high school football team, has accepted an athletic scholarship at Texas Tech. The 195-pounder also participated in baseball, track and basketball at Alma.

**John Landy Ends Heavy Training**

LOS ANGELES — UP — John Landy, the man who conquered the four-minute mile, said he would end the heavy part of his training Thursday in preparation for his first United States meet here Saturday.

The world's mile record holder at 3:58 has been jogging on the coliseum grass and track, turning on short bursts of speed from time to time to put himself in top shape for the meet in which his most serious rival may be Ron Delany. Villanova. Delany is known for his terrific "kick" and has toured the mile in the best 1956 U. S. outdoor time of 4:04.9. He is unbeaten in the event.

Landy has refused to predict whether he could break his mark, but said that under ideal conditions he might be able to cut two seconds from the record.
