Molasses Gives Taffy Flavor To Three Cake Frostings




The little brown jar of unsulphured molasses which stands on the pantry shelf gives a fine golden cast and taffy flavor to three different cake frostings. For white cake, there is a butter-coconut-molasses broiler frosting; for spice cake, a molasses penuche frosting; and for a favorite layer cake, there's the taffy touch to a seven-minute frosting.

Molasses Coconut Topping 1 package white or yellow cake mix % cup unsulphured molasses % cup butter or margarine 1 cup shredded coconut Prepare and bake cake according

to directions on package, using a 13 x 91/2 x 2-inch oblong pan. Com-bine molasses and butter: heat until butter is melted. Stir in coconut. Remove from heat. Spread over warm cake. Place under broiler heat 2 to 3 minutes or until coconut is brown.

Panucha Frosting cup butter 2 tablespoons evaporated cup sugar 2 cups sifted confectioners ulphured molasses

Melt butter in saucepan. Add garnish with nuts.



Vield: 1% cups. Molasses Taffy Frosting egg white, unbeaten 2 tablespoons unsulphured cup wat nolasses 1/2 teaspoon sait 1/2 teaspoon cup sugar vanilla

Combine egg white, water, sugar unsulphured molasses and salt in top of double boiler Beat over rapidly boiling water with rotary or electric beater until frosting stands in peaks. Remove from heat; add flavoring. Beat until spreading consistency Frost cake; if desired,

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Prohibition Is Evil

The Prohibitionists seem obsessed, in their promotional activity, with the erroneous position that liquor is intrinsically evil and that individuals who overindulge aren't really at fault.

Typical of this type of balderdash is an illustration in a Prohibitionist mailing which shows an army officer defending a soldier who is on trial for rape and murder. The officer, in the course of the defense, states: "Officers of the courtmartial — this soldier is not guilty of rape and murder. Beer is!"

Evidently the officers of the courtmartial were as little moved by this childish argument as the average voter will be inasmuch as the defendant was given a sentence of 199 years.

The mental process which endeavors to absolve individuals for their poor judgment by blaming some factor outside themselves is one of the great delusions which Jesus endeavored to overcome but here, again, is a lucid illustration of the Prohibitionist's inability to grasp the realities of life. One of the great problems constantly facing man is the extent to which he endeavors to blame his difficulties on someone or something else rather than a wrong attitude of heart. Of course certain types of difficulties are brought about externally and most of these have to be credited to initiated violence, both by individuals and government, with the latter the worst offender by far.

Though we haven't encountered a SINGLE PROHI-BITIONIST who has the fortitude to state that he believes he, as an individual, would have a moral right to keep his peaceful neighbor from alcoholic indulgence, still he contends it becomes right when he joins with the majority to keep his neighbor from drinking. In running to the government to try to prohibit the sale of liquor, the Prohibitionist gives proof of the fact that he determines right action on the basis of majority vote rather than recourse to higher law.

The complete absence of ethical deduction is rather an amazing stand when it is considered that the Prohibitionist tries to make a Christian case for his cause. As an associate pointed out to us, a majority who can make the sale of liquor illegal has the potential of making the sale of Bibles illegal. But, like the child, the Prohibitionist goes no farther than looking at the surface while ignoring the importance of the surface's supporting structure.

Was There Ever A Need For Labor Unions? A friend of mine who believes many of the practices nowadays used by labor unions are harmful, said there must have been

some need for labor unions in the

past or we would not have had them. That's a good question because if there was need for labor unions in the past, there might now be need for labor unions or might be in the future. So let's think out loud on that subject. It seems to me that a labor


union could perform a good service. Take a case where the employer was trying to hire his men for less than they could get someplace else, and treats his employees as if he owned them. He tries to intimidate his workers by making them feel that if he ever heard about them trying to get a job someplace else he would regard it as disloyal and would discriminate against him, if not fire him. A labor union that would represent workers of an employer of this kind and help them find a job that would pay them better materially and where the employer had respect for their equal rights to sell their services to the world's highest bidder, would be performing a real service to mankind. This indirectly would increase

production. It would increase production because employees produce more when they believe their employer is not trying to take advantage of them and treats them with the esteem and respect that all men are entitled to receive. And any arrangement that increases total production is beneficial to mankind. It is beneficial because whatever is produced willy-nilly has to be distributed in order to benefit the owner of this production.

Or take another case where the employers in a city, as has often been the case, get together, to eliminate competition between employers and agree that they will not employ any worker who is working for any other employer in the group; that the only way a man could change jobs and stay in the same city would be to quit and, then make application. It is easy to see that that is bad for the workers and bad for the employers and bad for the consumer. It keeps men in jobs when they are qualified to do different jobs that will pay them more. It de-

grades the character of the employer because he is taking advantage of his workers. He is entering into a conspiracy, into a plot to keep wage levels down. And wages should be increased

by the employers bidding against each other to get help to operate their tools and competing in sell-



THE UNTIRING LOBBY IN EDUCATION

The Committee for the Wille House Conference on Education has handed in a "final" report to Mr. Eisenhower as a sequel to the conference, which ended early last December. The report calls for the doubling of expenditures for public schools within a decade, for doubling of teachers' salaries almost at once, and for federal "emergency" aid to education. The White House conference, which was rigged by the National Education association thru its propaganda adjunct, the National Citizens Commission for the Public Schools, now reconstituted as the National Citizens Council for Better Schools, had preconceived purposes which were easily apparent. One was to say that all was well with the schools, the curriculum, and the teaching methods currently in vogue. Another was to roll up a propaganda snowball for federal aid. The White House committee,

consisted of 34 members, repeats and emphasizes these same points, which is not surprising, inasmuch as the committee pulled the wires

on the White House conference of the former National Citizens commission, was also chairman of the conference. It is to the credit of four members, among them President Frank Sparks of Wabash college, that they dissented from proposals for any federal aid, except thru: repayable loans.

They get a fictitious wage by reducing the real wages of the buyers of their product. This, of course, leads to one civil law after another, such as inflation as a way of cutting wages and a tyrannical dictator-planned economy rather than a free economy where all workers are equal before the law as they are before

It is because of this apparent temporary material gain that many people believe that collective bargaining labor unions are

beneficial to the workers as a whole. What they do not see is

the reasons that labor unions were established. But this kind of a means of being useful to their members is entirely different than the means used now. The means now, instead of promoting justice and thus increasing production and benefiting all workers, is by strikes by way of collective bargaining and by featherbedding and by seniority and
