Pampa, Amarillo Out Of CRMWA

Pampa is now officially out of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority. Pampa was eliminated, along with Amarillo, at a meeting of the directors of the Authority in Plainview yesterday. The two cities were eliminated at their own request as members of the Authority. Commenting on Pampa's reasons for leaving the authority, members of the city commission stated this morning as before, that as a result of current underground water development, Pampa's entry into the authority, under the requirements then outstanding, would be detrimental to Pampa's economy and place the city under circumstances which would have more water coming in than could be used.

The summarized opinion of the commissioners was that they had to see Pampa lose the rights to the water but that under the circumstances, it seemed the best thing to do. It must have seemed the best thing to the citizens of Pampa, too, for no petitions to hold elections were presented to the authority. It was announced that Pampa could still stay in the authority after the city commission had passed a resolution to get out, by raising a petition, with the required number of names, calling for Pampa's participation in the Authority.

PLAINVIEW, Tex. — UP — The Canadian River Water Authority Tuesday drew up plans for a Nov. 8 election on a \$74.8 million bond issue after membership in the authority dropped from 11 to nine.

Development Board Named

The city commissioners this morning appointed five men to posts as directors of the Board of City Development, for terms of three years. The commission selected E. L. Henderson, George Cree, Jr., John Frick, Paul West and Joe Tooley to fill the newly created vacancies in the board.

In other action, the commissioners heard Mrs. Lillian Snow, librarian at Lovett Memorial Library, give a report on the work and progress made in services rendered at the library since its opening. Mrs. Snow, calling the library, "one of the biggest drawing cards in Pampa," stated that several people from the Pampa area used the library facilities. She stated that the library had circulated approximately 43,000 books since the first of the year. Fred Brook, city manager, presented a diagram for the commissioners' study, depicting proposed rearrangements of certain offices in City Hall. The session included payment and approval of bills for the month.

Adenauer Seeks Red Concessions

MOSCOW — UP — Chancellor Konrad Adenauer Tuesday demanded three major concessions from the Soviet Union in return for an agreement to insist Russian demands for the exchange of ambassadors.

A member of the West German delegation said they were:
1. Amnesty for Germans still held in the Soviet Union.
2. Agreement that the final borders of Germany in the event of reunification will be decided only by a formal peace treaty.

Estimates on the probable costs of the proposed new elementary and junior high schools were received yesterday from B. R. Cantrell, architect, by the school board during a meeting, at 5 p.m. in the business office of the City Hall.

A public hearing was set for Monday, Sept. 26, in the City Commissioners' room of the City Hall. Removal of the old ash trees on the east and front side of the present junior high school was approved.

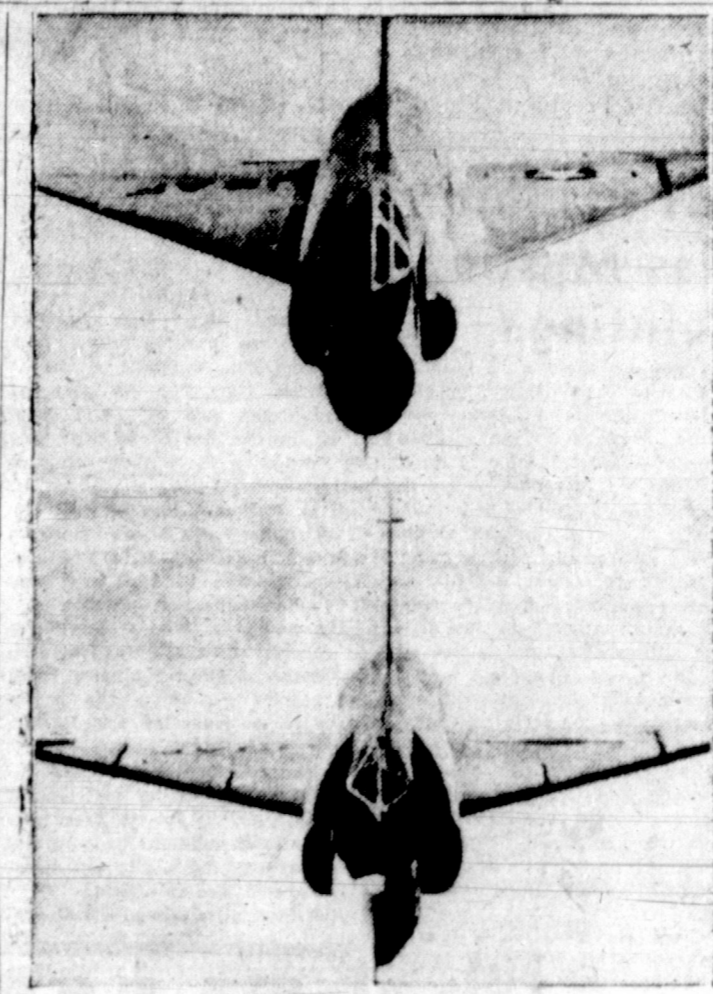

Solons Probing Red Air Power

WASHINGTON — UP — The Senate Military Preparedness subcommittee is ahead of behind Russia in production of inter-continental jet bombers and in development of intercontinental missiles.

The study will come as a climax to persistent Democratic complaints throughout the year that the administration's Air Force program is inadequate in view of recent Russian strides in air power. They study also may furnish Democrats with ammunition in case the administration makes a move to cut back Air Force spending to help balance the federal budget.

The importance Democrats attach to the inquiry is indicated by the fact Senate Democratic leader Lyndon B. Johnson, is taking a personal hand in directing the study although still recuperating from a heart attack. Johnson was made chairman of the subcommittee when Democrats on the armed services committee re-established it on a permanent basis earlier this year.

Johnson disclosed Monday that the subcommittee has undertaken "a thorough study of America's military air strength" covering production, procurement and delivery of aircraft, aircraft engines, rockets and missile systems.

Peron Said 'Stronger'
BUENOS AIRES — UP — Gov. Carlos A. Peron of Buenos Aires province said Monday that President Juan D. Peron "never was stronger and surer than now."

WALSH, Ill. — UP — Keron Walsh, father of nine polio-stricken children, stood on the front porch of his wooden farmhouse Tuesday and said: "We need a lot of prayers. He was getting them. And lots more besides."

All through the night and into the day, nearly every one of the 670 residents of Durand trekked to Walsh's farmhouse, offering prayers, food, money and help on his 160-acre spread. Their sympathy was aroused when the ninth of the Walshes' 14 children was stricken within 10 days after the first case. The latest victim, Edward, 15, was stricken Sunday and taken to Winnebago county hospital, in Rockford, 15 miles southeast of here. A brother, 17, was afflicted Saturday and was in critical condition at home.

Longshoremen Support New York Harbor Union

NEW YORK — (UP) — A dock workers strike spread rapidly along the Eastern Seaboard Tuesday. All New England ports, Philadelphia, Jacksonville, Fla., Savannah, Ga., were shut down by a "general strike" order sent out Monday to support 30,000 striking New York harbor dockers in their fight against the New York - New Jersey Waterfront Commission.

Baltimore piers were being worked pending a decision of the International Longshoremen's Association (Ind.) district council which began meeting at 8 a.m. Work also was uninterrupted on New Orleans piers.

At Miami, longshoremen were called to a 10 a.m. meeting to take a strike vote which union officials predicted would tie up the port.

Truckers were advised to halt all cargoes bound for export from New York. Railroads were to consider Tuesday an embargo against shipments to piers along the entire coast.

The I.L.A.'s top leadership ordered a port shut-down from Maine to Texas Monday, apparently in an effort to obtain federal intervention in the dispute which the governors of New York and New Jersey have insisted must first be handled by the waterfront commission.

The union defied court orders obtained by both the commission and the waterfront employers. Shippers, not involved in any dispute with the union, have claimed damages for \$1 million-a-day losses from the seven-day strike.

Perishables were spoiling on piers throughout the harbor and other cargo lay idle in tied-up freighters. Loss to the longshoremen themselves, in wages and welfare benefits, was estimated at \$2,700,000 so far by the New York Shipping Association, representing employers.

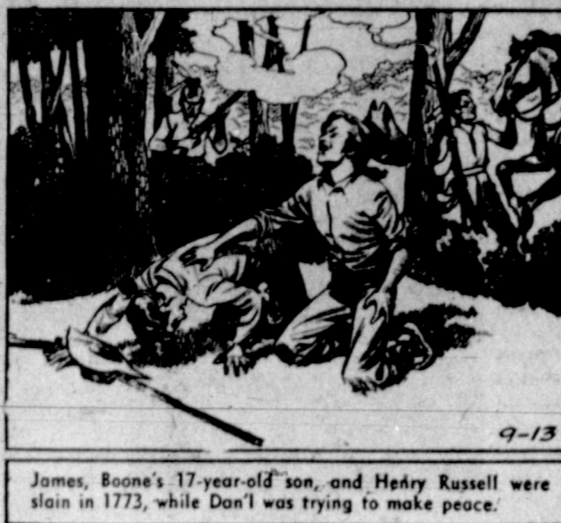

Name Governor In Traffic Case

SANTA FE, N. M. — UP — The governor of New Mexico was scheduled to appear in court Monday afternoon to face a misdemeanor charge filed by a motorist who was arrested in a crackdown on traffic violators.

Gov. John F. Simms was accused by the motorist, Russell Benedict of Santa Fe, of violating a state statute by using the very device that snared Benedict.

Benedict claimed he was trapped by an unmarked automobile bearing Montana license plates and driven by a New Mexico state trooper. The car turned out to be Simms' official limousine.

Benedict was charged with violating a traffic regulation in following another vehicle too closely.

In his complaint against the governor, Benedict also named the state policeman who gave him the ticket, officer J. D. Mason, and the head of the New Mexico state police, Joe Roach.

Benedict's attorney, Henry K. Miller Jr., asked Montana state authorities last week how the governor had managed to obtain the Montana license plates. He received no reply.

Benedict's case is expected to be heard sometime next week.

'Babe' Starts Cancer Fund

GALVESTON, Tex.—UP—Famed woman athlete Babe Didrikson Zaharias, ready to leave a hospital after her second battle against dread cancer, Monday announced establishment of a nationwide fund for the early detection and treatment of cancer.

The fund, to be known as the Babe Didrikson cancer fund, was announced at the University of Texas Medical Branch, John Sealy Hospital, where the great woman golfer has been under treatment for the past three months for a pelvic cancer lesion.

French Want Sultan To Retire

PARIS—UP—France instructed its resident general in Morocco Tuesday to open immediate negotiations with Sultan Sidi Mohammed Ben Moulay Arafat to persuade him to retire.

The government of Premier Edgar Faure dispatched an order to resident general Pierre Boyer De La Tour to start talks with the sultan who is the key figure in Faure's solution of the Moroccan crisis.

De La Tour has talked with the sultan in the past but Arafat has clung to his cherished throne despite the strong French pressure.

Persistent reports from the Moroccan capital of Rabat said the aged sultan had decided to "bow to the will of Allah" and step down from the throne. His replacement by a three-man regency council is necessary to the Faure plan.

Read Psalm 84

We must search according to law. The search for spiritual certainty must be made according to spiritual laws. We will not have been engaged in such a search for any length of time, if we are really serious in the matter, without discovering that spiritual states are subject to exact conditions. Certain attitudes will be found to produce certain spiritual conditions with invariable dependability, and other attitudes will be found to produce other spiritual states with equal dependability. This means that for every spiritual state we covet there is a corresponding spiritual attitude we must assume. Adopt the attitude and you achieve the condition. If we cannot choose their effects, to get the effects we must choose exact attitudes. All this calls for a careful study of our own life and a comparison of our experiences with the experiences of others. Spiritual laws work in the same way in the lives of all persons.

I have suffered this day, O God, and I do not know why. Move upon my mind to clarify my thinking, that I may understand myself clearly and rectify the errors which I have made and which cause this spiritual tension under which I suffer. Amen.

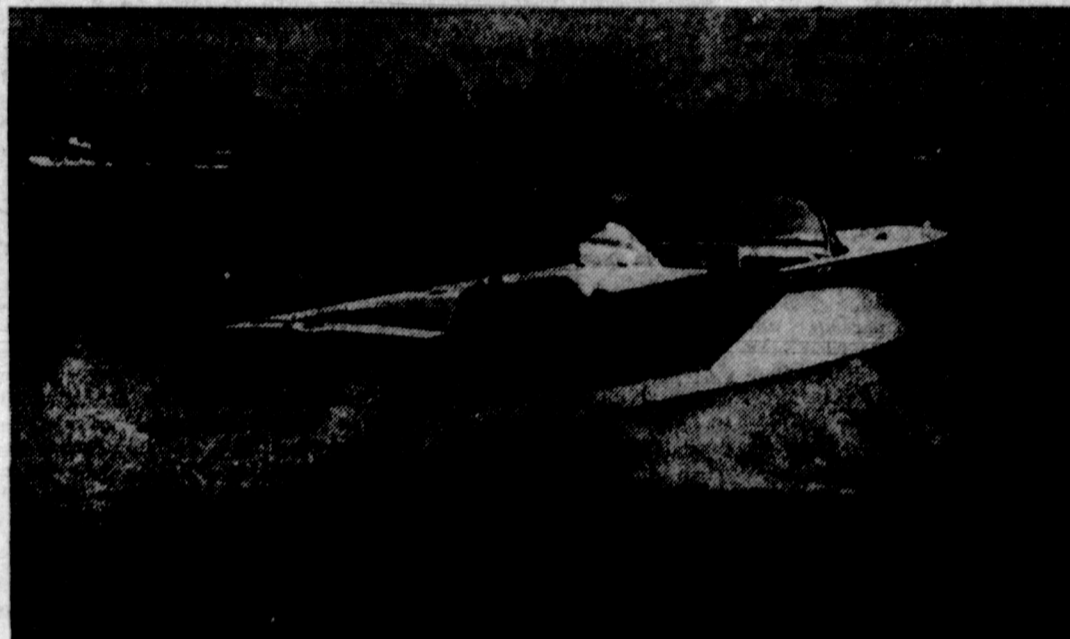

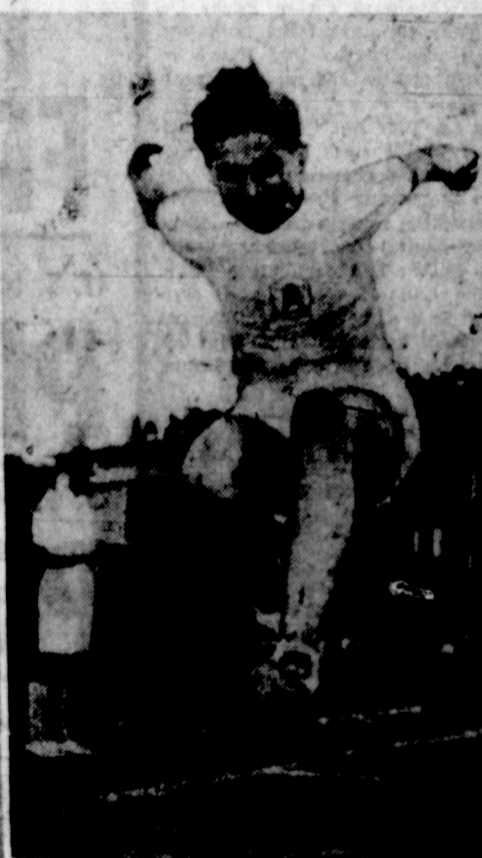

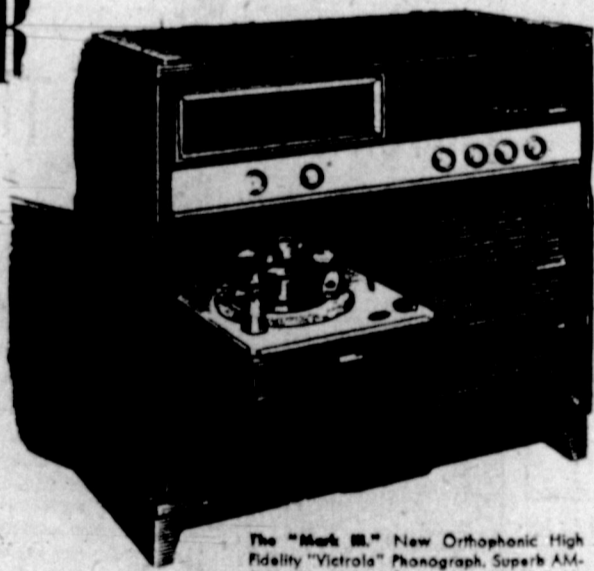

THERE'S SOMETHING NEW on the fashion scene this fall — in addition to the new fashions themselves. It's an attitude. The fashion conscious aren't relegating a costume to one place, one occasion, one time of day. They're not saying, "this is for the office" or "this is for running about our suburb" or "this is for a day in the city." They are building their own costumes from separates, combining them variously — with an addition here, a subtraction there — making each piece serve multiple purposes.

In the dead time right after vacation when summer clothes begin to look pallid and wilted first thoughts turn to the daytime dress. This fall it's likely to be a coordinated skirt and blouse. They may be of the same fabric and color like the worsted jersey two-piece created by Melba Hobson for Heather Lane. The skirt is slim, smoothly lined, has a new side front closing ending in a double kick pleat, matched by a side slit in the bottom of the overblouse, its only other embellishment a double scooped collar of rib knit in two colors. It's good in the new jet heather but comes in many other colors even accommodating the many who can't face the between-season without "a little black dress."

AND THERE IS the skirt and blouse that deliberately are not matched either in fabric or color, but are so subtle combined that they are costume and a sophisticated one at that — like Nelly de Grab's skirt of looped worsted tweed striped in violet, grey and brown — the handsome fabric lavishly used in pleat on pleat, unpressed but flat, at the hips and

The Cleveland Indians aim to settle a couple of scores with the sad sack Senators Tuesday night, the first one having to do with something personal and the second one with something like \$10,000 per man.

On the personal side, the Indians are fed up with the increasing needling they have been subjected to from the seventh-place Senators, who have beaten them 12 out of 19 games this year.

Then there's the always vital matter of World Series money. The Indians, who lead the American League by 1 1/2 games, are convinced they can eliminate the last major obstacle in their road to the pennant by capturing at least two games of the three game series which opens with a twin-bill doubleheader at Griffith Stadium Tuesday night.

Some of the Washington players have even said the Indians are "afraid we'll knock 'em out of the pennant race" while others confidently assured members of the second-place Yankees, "We'll take care of Cleveland all right."

The Yankees, a game and a half off the pace and one game down in the all important "lost column," have troubles of their own. But their troubles could suddenly dissolve if they were to beat the Tigers Tuesday while the Indians lost their double dip to the pesky Senators. Such a series of events would result in a tie between Cleveland and New York for first place.

Bonus Hurler for Tigers

Casey Stengel is sending his right-handed fast-baller Bob Turley to the mound against Detroit Tuesday while Bucky Harris, of the Tigers has given the nod to Bob Miller, a 20-year-old bonus hurler.

The third-place White Sox, who are 3 1/2 games back, are at Baltimore for a two-night doubleheader, while the Red Sox, who insist they still have a chance even though they are six games behind, meet the Kansas City Athletics in a twin-biller.

In the only game scheduled Monday night, the last-place Pirates defeated the seventh-place Cardinals 9-3 behind the six-hit pitching of southpaw Lino Donoso. Dale Long and Frank Thomas each homered for the Pirates, while Stan Musial clouted his 29th and 30th homers for the Cards.

Mexia Hospital To Add Building

BIG SPRING, Tex. —UP—The Board for State Hospitals and Special Schools Monday approved contracts totalling \$807,317 for construction of a 423-bed ward building at Mexia State Hospital.

The board, in afternoon ceremonies after a regular monthly meeting at Big Spring, formally dedicated three new buildings — two ward buildings and a central kitchen — at the Big Spring State Hospital.

In approving the Mexia contract, the board re-allocated funds to meet a higher construction cost on the ward building, originally scheduled to house 375 beds, thus reducing funds remaining for an administration-recreation building at the hospital to \$160,000.

At the same time, the board approved an alternate bid of \$20,200 to add 48 beds to bring total beds at the new Mexia unit to 423.

Dr. James A. Bethea, executive director of the board, said Elms-Kitchens Construction Co. of Austin was awarded the general contract.

King Of Cambodia Turns Out To Be Quite A Man

Plump, fun-loving young Norodom Sihanouk of Cambodia has turned out to be quite a man.

As king, he talked the reluctant French into giving his little Indo-Chinese country a pretty fair measure of independence.

Last March 2, he suddenly decided to quit the king business. Without notifying the French or even his own government, Norodom broadcast his resignation to the country by radio.

He designated as his successor his 61-year-old father Norodom Suramarit. He moved out of the palace and into his father's villa, trying to sabotage his policy of cooperation with the West and his program of political reforms. He decided to do something about it.

Held Assembly Majority The democratic party of Norodom's bitter political enemy Song Ngoc Thanh, a "neutralist" and one-time Japanese puppet, held a majority in the national assembly.

As a private citizen, Norodom formed a new party, the popular socialist community, and assumed its leadership.

In a fire engine-red sports convertible, Norodom set out on a stump-speaking tour. He campaigned from one end of the country to the other, speaking in cities and villages and at crossroads.

Sometimes his audiences numbered thousands, sometimes he addressed little knots of 10 or 15 persons.

The election for which he was preparing was held Sunday. Norodom's party won every one of the 91 seats in the assembly.

It was a personal victory for Norodom, and a sensational one. The 33-year-old ex-king had made himself within six months a potent party leader in politics.

His victory is important also for the Western Allies. Cambodia's 3,227,000 people, in supporting Norodom, have put themselves solidly in the camp of the Western Allies. They have voted against communism and against "neutrality."

A Political Boss Short, Jolly Norodom is a singular sort of political boss. As king he spent considerable

time playing his saxophone and leading his own orchestra in jam sessions that lasted until 4 a. m. He wrote, directed and acted in movies, the main idea of which was to give audiences a good laugh. A bachelor, he maintained a household of mistresses who have given him 11 children. He also maintained a personal troupe of 50 dancing girls. A snappy dresser, he had his suits tailored in Paris, where he attended the French army artillery school as a boy. He maintained a white-bearded astrologer to give him the portents of the stars.

But Norodom, as has been shown, has his serious side. He was more successful than any other Indo-Chinese leader in his independence demands on France. He once went on a sitdown strike to back up his fight, and set up a capital in the provinces.

He does not plan to assume any political office now. He is certainly head man in Cambodia.
