### **Parents File** Race Suit

DALLAS-UP-The parents of 28 Negro children filed suit in federal court Monday demanding that the children be allowed to attend white schools in Dallas.

The parents allege the Negroes tried to enroll in Dallas white schools a week ago but were turned away. They ask an injunction for bidding the school board to keep

the children out. Dr. B. E. Hewell, chairman o the executive committee of the Dallas Association for the Advancement of Colored People, said the parents of Dallas Negro children 'resent the arbitrary 'go slow' at titude of our board of education.

"They want their children treat ed fairly and justly, as all other children are treated. The board (has) said it was making a study of the problems of integration,' Howell said,

"To date, we have had no information regarding the progress of this study. We now feel that our remedy against the 'do nothpolicy of the board of education lies in the courts."

Dr. Edwin L. Rippy, president of the school board, said it is "regrettable that the NAACP is impatient with our present pro

gram." "The policy pursued by th school system at this time is in line with the judgement and con science of the board of education according to our interpretation of the Supreme Court decree," Rippy



Some people who feel that the welfare state is the "wave of the future" believe that their faith rests on firm scientific ground. Bolstering their faith is another widely held belief that man, in the evolutionary scheme of things always moves onward and upward. Both of chese views are blasted, very scientifically, by a promiment New York professor of biology, Dr. Horace W. AStunkard, writing in the current issue of Science.

"The welfare state - security, with contingent subsjection and dependency — offers an easy way of life, that it is a slippery path, which by a slow, gradual process Ileads to loss of integrity, greater bondage, and eventual degradation," Dr. Stunkard says.

And as for evolution, he points out that contrary to the popular belief that change always moves in a forward direction, there probably have been as many "Yetrogressive as progressive changes" in the long history of the animal and insect world.

Dr. Stunkard's analogies of conditions among animals and among men ought to rock the firmest faith of those who believe that all our troubles can be corrected with a liberal does of "scientific planning." For example, he states that "progressive evolutionary changes are correlated with an active, vigorous type of life, whereas the adoption of sluggish, passive and inert habits lead to regressive changes in the physiology and structure of animals.

The social life of ants and bees are particularly clear examples of the unhappy results of trading liberty for security. Ant colonies, Dr. Stunkord reports, are typically efficient welfare state affairs, but in order to maintain that state of group perfection, "individuals are bound to permanent monotonous conditions of servitude." "Under the surface of the apparently serene tran-

quility of the ant colony the most savage and pitiless events are taking place: murder, regicide, pillage and forays against other colonies in which the adults are killed and the larvae and pupae are carried off to slavery.

The honey bee is described by the biologists as a pathetic little creature who burns herself out and dies exhausted after a few weeks of feverish activity.

Dr. Stunkard believes that the study of human history of the animal kingdom and of evolutionary geologic history all point to the conclusion that independence, not security, is the essential condition of progress.

### BETTER JOBS

The Right To Be "Wrong"

Those people who believe the state has a right to do things that they know would be unjust and unethical if done by an individual, seem to believe that a man or a state does not have the right to be wrong.

W. H. McComb has an interesting article in the September issue of the Freeman on that subject. He discusses in this article the segregation problem of the South. He puts it this way:

By order of the Supreme Court of the United States, a Southern

father is now required to send his child to a school occupied largely possibly even entirely - hy Negro children. With or without reason, he finds the compulsory association distasteful. It is contrary to the mores in which he grew up. The order is just as repulsive to him as if he were commanded to attend a church not to his liking or to belong to some

lodge with whose members he is not on friendly terms. Perhaps he an unintelligent bigot, as those who instigated the order would have it. Even so, the order denies him the fundamental right to be 'wrong.' "It must be remembered that

this Southern parent contributes his share of taxes toward the maintenance of the school to which he sends his child. Presumably, therefore, he has a proprietary interest in the management and conduct of this school. Thus the right to be 'wrong' is conjoined with the right of property. The Supreme Court order violates both these rights, and it is interesting to note that this judicial body came to its decision by going beyond the Constitution and finding support for it in 'modern scientific authorities. Reference to such 'authorities. seems to be a new way of circumventing the limitations put on the political power by the Constitution, as a guarantee of freedom. "Three Courses of Action.

"This father is not alone in demanding that he be allowed to choose his child's associates. It has long been common practice in the South for white people to send their children to white schools, and, if the truth is known, the Negroes prefer keeping to themselves. The Supreme Court decides that such separation of associations is in some way contrary to public policy. The decis on presumably solves a 'race issue. But in point of fact, in invading the privacy of Southern life, in denying the basic right of choosing one's associates, it actually creates a new issue, fraught with danger. Unless and until the Southern father has a change of heart, the Court order will seem to him to be a tyrannical act which he must resist. He has three courses of action

The first of these alternatives is to fight this edict with 'fifty years of litigation.' This has been proposed. A widely publicized editorial in the Richmond News Leader concludes with the following paragraphs:

For one thing, the legal struggle with its inevitable headlines will fix for at least a half century a bitter and rancorous racial conflict in American life. It is not too far-fetched to observe a spiritual relationship between these pseudo-liberals and the carpetbaggers of Reconstrucdays. For these 'uplifters' will not hesitate to use the power of this vote to force compliance with the order even during the years of litigation. ## The Doctor Says

The vitamin deficiency disease known as scurvy has been known for centuries and is not yet a condition which we should forget. It was recently pointed out

again, in an interesting article by a physician in Winnipeg, Canada, that when Vasco de Gamma sailed around the Cape of Good Hope in 1498, 100 of his men perished from scurvy out of a crew of 160.

On this continent in 1535 scurvey broke out among Jacques Cartier's men One of the sailors learned from the red Indians of a decoction from the needles of spruce trees which cured the complaint. CAPTAIN COOK MADE his

men eat tresh food to keep them free from scurvy. Regulations enforcing the consumption o daily rations of lemon juice were introduced into the British Navy in 1804 and to the Merchant Marine in 1865.

The situation is delightfully put in these stanzas: 'The scurvy flew through the schooner's crew As they sailed on an Arctic sea.

They were far from land and their food was canned, So they got no vitamin C.

If you don't get Vitamin C." TODAY WE KNOW exactly how to prevent scurvy and to cure it but it still exists: The Winnipeg physician stated that during one period of five months, eight cases of scurvy were admitted to the wards of Winnipeg General and Childrens Hospitals alone.

Sourcy comes on slowly. Loss of weight, a feeling of weakness, vague pains in the legs, and pale-sess of skin are typical. Soon the gums begin to become swollen and spongy, and bleed easily when brushed or rubbed. The changes n the gums may become so bad that the teeth loosen and fall out, If vitamin C is absent in the diet for a long time, the bone of the jew can actually decay. It is worth

The breath becomes foul and the tongue swollen and red. Bleeding under the mucous membrane of the mouth is common, Gradualby the skin becomes more dry and rough. Swelling around the ankles is common, the heart palpitates and its beat becomes more feeble and irregular mental depression is characteriste. 
