The heir to the Fisher fortune is due in November. But Debbie still looks the same, even in a tight pair of blue jeans she wears at Universal-International studio for "Tammy." She's working six days a week, from the crack of dawn to 8 p.m. to finish the picture by Saturday.

Next Monday she and Eddie drive to work together to re-star in their first picture together, "Bundle of Joy," at RKO, an aptly-titled opus that also marks young Eddie's movie debut. In that picture, the expectant mother not only dances, but does a rock and roll jitterbug.

Video Vittles Concerned With Television Cooking

NEW YORK — UP — Video Vittles is a firm concerned with what's cooking on television. The reason—it usually cooks it.

Founded back in 1951, Video Vittles supplies fodder for the maws of TV shows. It numbers among its customers Arthur Godfrey, Garry Moore, Martha Raye, Steve Allen, Dave Garroway's "Today" and Arlene Francis' "Home" Show.

The outfit was started by Kit Kinne, food editor of NBC-TV's "Home" show (she recently stepped down to have a baby) and now includes three other happy bakers — Martha Arvin, Anne De Hoed and Sally Wells.

The girls spend their working hours puttering around in a handsomely appointed kitchen they've set up.

Food Must Be Telegenic
The equipment they use is standard, but the chances are that whipping up a meal at Video Vittles is nothing like anything that has ever happened in your kitchen. On TV, the food must be telegenic — the object is to make the

broccoli look like Lollo-Rosetta as well as sound like her.

Heat on the sets is a constant worry. Whipped cream melts, so thinned down cream cheese must be substituted. Aspic must be fortified with extra gelatin so it'll hold up. And ice cream is an impossibility.

"We use frozen mashed potatoes for ice cream," explained Mrs. Arvin. "And if the show's in color, we color the potatoes blue so they'll look white."

Color is another problem. Tomato soup looks black on black-and-white TV, so green pea soup is used in its place. For color programs, tomato soup must be toned down to pink because red bleeds.

Beef Looks Black
The meats that come over best on TV are pork chops and veal because they're light colored, explained the ladies of the firm. Best looks black.

"Carrots and broccoli are di-vine," said Mrs. Arvin. "And so are eggs — in both color and black and white."

Automatic Bar Is Newest Gadget Now

SAN FRANCISCO — UP—Tired of lifting up those heavy whisky bottles? Lack strength to pull out the corks? Just can't seem to stop pouring? Then try the latest labor-saving device—the automatic bar.

All you have to do with this \$4.99 gadget is set the dial to the highball of your choice, press a button and extend your hand for the filled and chilled glass. It takes three seconds.

*The machine won't lift the glass to your lips. You have to do that yourself.

The machine was invented by Huntly Briggs, assistant advertising manager of General Controls Co. It will be used at conventions and the like to show the effectiveness of the firm's automatic controls.

It took Briggs six months to build the machine. The firm claims a midwestern executive has offered \$10,000 for it and Briggs thinks maybe there are enough Texas millionaires around to establish a steady market. The cost probably could be cut in half if the machine went into regular production.

The automatic bar weighs 200 pounds, is 44 inches high, 36 inches wide and 22 inches deep. At one side is a magazine containing ice cubes and a small sink. Along the top are racks holding five bottles upside down — one of bourbon, one of scotch and three of mixer — water, plain soda and sweet soda. A spout from each leads to a single spigot.

Suppose you're gasping with thirst and want a refreshment. Here's what you do:

Place an eight-ounce glass under the ice cube magazine and press it against a lever. Two ice cubes will fall into the glass. Then put the glass under the liquor spigot. Turn a control wheel to choose your liquor and your mix and the amounts you want of each. Then press a button.

But don't try to fill your glass more than half full of whisky. That makes the machine sulk. A red light goes on and it won't pour.

But if you're not greedy, a golden stream pours into your glass. Now try telling your troubles to an automatic bar.

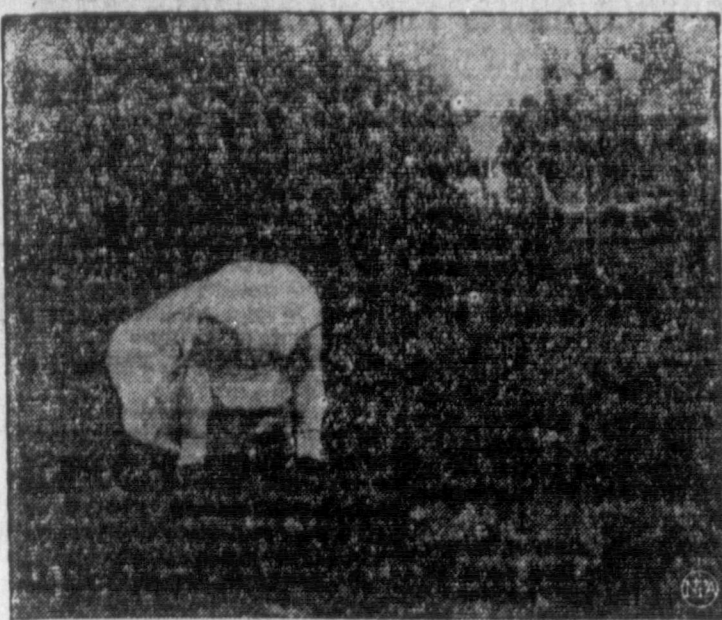

French Policy To Be Talked In National Assembly Meet

The confused political situation in France may start to clear up soon.

The National Assembly, the controlling House of Parliament, will start a debate on Thursday on every aspect of French policy.

Foreign policy, internal financial, economic and social policies and policy throughout North Africa will be included.

Socialist Premier Guy Mollet, leader of the government "Republican front" coalition, proposed the debate. He demands a blanket vote of confidence.

What Mollet wants is a complete new start after serving as premier since Feb. 1.

He is expected to give, for the first time, a detailed and specific program aimed at bringing peace in Algeria.

French political experts predict that Mollet will get his vote by a big and possibly by an overwhelming majority.

Mollet leads a minority government. His coalition actually holds only 185 of the 595 seats. The full strength of the chamber is 627, but there are 32 vacancies.

Mollet holds office largely because the 146 Communists and four fellow-traveling progressives support him.

Many members of the assembly disagree with Mollet's North African policy and with various aspects of his internal and foreign policies.

But very few of them feel that this is the right time to overthrow the government. Hence Mollet is expected, in a sense, to get a new start. How long he will last then, nobody cares to predict.

But there are strong indications that France is moving steadily toward a decision to strengthen its government after going through 21 cabinet overthrows since the end of World War II.

Whatever happens to Mollet in the next few weeks or months may bring the decision.

Want Stronger Government

There is growing feeling in France that it is absolutely necessary to strengthen the government. Mollet himself has proposed a meeting of all French Republican parties to consider changes in the 1946 constitution and give the cabinet more stability.

Strong right wing groups favor a constitutional change which would give the French president, now a figure-head, something like the authority which the President of the United States holds.

The trouble with this is that Frenchmen generally shy away from the "strong man" type of government. They want no dictators. They prefer the present system under which the National Assembly, like the British House of

The fugitives are Carmine De Biase, a New York killer, and Eugene Newman, termed a "trigger-happy" bandit who shot his way out of a police trap in Buffalo, N. Y., last year.

KANSAS CITY — UP—Dleyk Stone of Winfield, Kan., a basketball star at Kansas State the past three years, has signed a baseball contract with the Kansas City Athletics. Stone, a six-three right handed pitcher, has been assigned to the A's farm club at Abilene, Tex., but will be optioned to Seminole of the Class D Sooner State League.

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Phoenix Productions Produces Fearless Controversial Films

HOLLYWOOD — UP— The year's most fearless movie makers: a team that makes films on a guilt-by-association red hunt, segregation and the life of Sigmund Freud.

The first of these unusual movies is "Storm Center," in which

Bette Davis plays a motherly librarian who refused to remove a book on Communism from her shelves. She is accused of being a Communist because she once belonged to some organizations which later were listed as red front groups.

Producer Julian Blaustein and

writer-director Dan Taradash (an Oscar winner for writing "From Here To Eternity") made "Storm Center," and will film the other two stories for their independent company, Phoenix Productions. The reaction of "Storm Center" previews indicates it may be one of the most controversial pictures of 1958.

"Film never has been done before on book-burning or guilt-by-association," Blaustein said in an interview Monday.

"We believe provocative movie

stories should not be ignored just because they're controversial. But it's wrong to make a movie only to be controversial. We just happen to be interested in subjects with which some people disagree."

Next Blaustein will tackle "Guard of Honor" from the best-selling book about segregation in the Air Force during World War II.

Hollywood for years has been making coin from murder mysteries and musicals about psychiatrists. Next year Blaustein will film the story of the man who

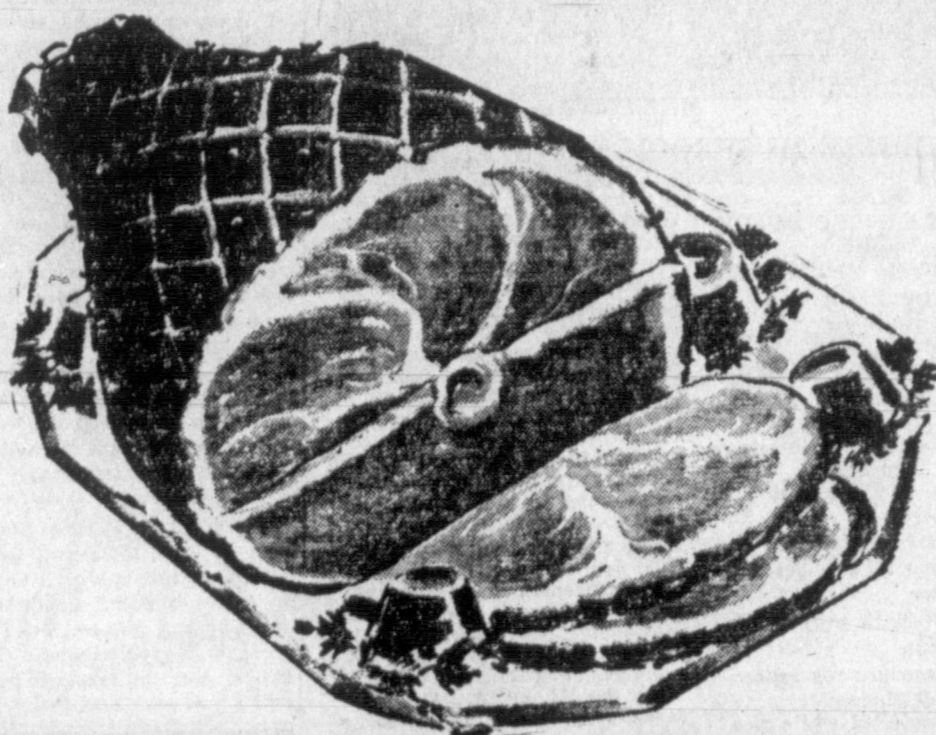
started it all — Freud — the father of psychoanalysis.

Some alarmed analysts have expressed fear the story would be Hollywoodized with stars arriving for the premier on couches. But most doctors the world over have shown "great excitement over the film," the producer says.

John Huston of "Moby Dick" fame will direct the Freud movie. Playing the great doctor will not be Paul Muni or Don Ameche in a beard, but a lesser known

actor who wouldn't be identified with previous roles. The movie will be based on a book, "Freud — Master and Friend," by Hanns Sachs.

Blaustein has planned the Freud story since he made films for the Army Medical Corps during World War II. He supervised one movie on psychoneurotics, "Let There Be Light," directed by John Huston, which won fame as an outstanding documentary.

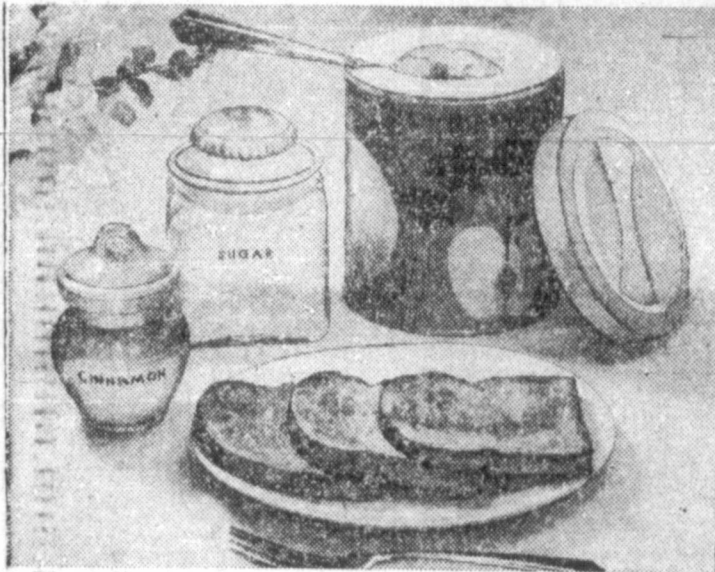

Meat Shortcake Is Variation On Liver

A new way to serve liver is a "find" for any homemaker. Cook 1 pound sliced liver for about 5 minutes in 1 tablespoon melted fat or drippings. Grind liver with one small onion. Cook 1/2 pound ground beef until brown but not hard. Combine liver and cooked ground beef. Season with 1 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Cover and cook slowly for 10 to 15 minutes. Stir in 3 tablespoons flour. Add 1 1/2 cups of either milk, water or vegetable juice and stir constantly until thickened. Serve piping hot on corn bread or biscuits. Yields four servings.

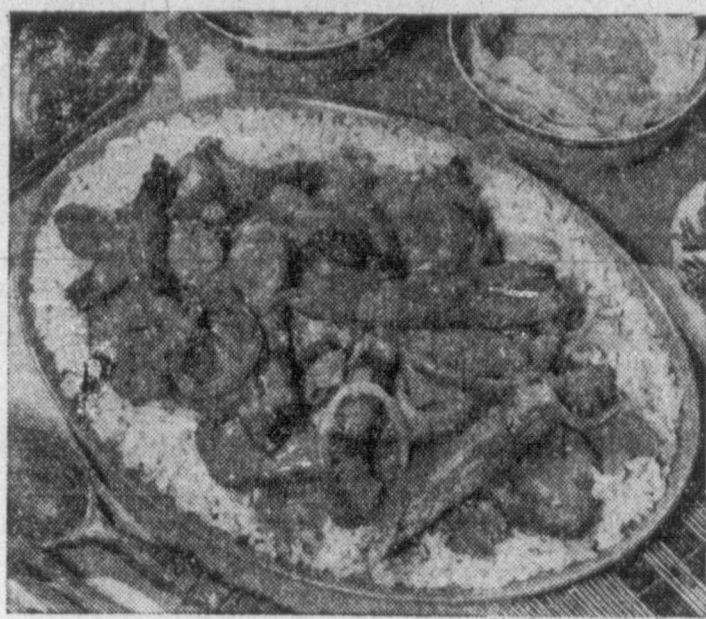
LUNCHEON MEAT EN BROchette

1 12-ounce can luncheon meat
12 cooked prunes, pitted
12 pineapple chunks
2 tablespoons melted butter or margarine
6 maraschino cherries, if desired
6 skewers, metal
Cut luncheon meat into 1-inch squares. Thread the squares of luncheon meat, pineapple, luncheon meat and cooked prunes on a metal skewer, repeating until skewer is filled. Brush with melted butter or margarine. Place on broiler rack and insert rack and pan so top surface of meat is 2 to 3 inches from the heat. Broil until meat is lightly browned on one side, turn, continue broiling until heated through. Serve with a maraschino cherry at end of each skewer, if desired. Yield: 6 servings.

If you're teaching a daughter to sew and you can't afford mistakes, let her start on crepe paper. Save scraps for her to try fancy stitches or the machine on. Let her start with a super-simple printed pattern.

If your husband's at all handy, have him make a little platform with castors on each corner for your scrub pail. That way you can push, not pull, your pail with you as you do floors.

CHINESE MUSHROOM-SOY STEAK

MENU
CHINESE MUSHROOM-SOY STEAK
HOT FLUFFY WHITE RICE
Buttered Broccoli
Relishes
Peach Salad
Lemon Custard

INGREDIENTS:
1 flank steak (1 1/4 to 1 1/2 pounds) cut in 1" wide strips about 5" long
1/2 teaspoon non-seasoned meat tenderizer
3 tablespoons cooking fat
2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
2 cups water
1/4 teaspoon black pepper
1/2 cup catsup
2 to 3 tablespoons soy sauce
1 cup sliced onions
1 1/2 cups uncooked white rice
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
3 cups water
1 green pepper, sliced into thin rings
1 3 oz. can sliced mushrooms and juice

METHOD: Sprinkle the flank steak on all sides with the meat tenderizer. Pierce the meat with a sharp fork at frequent intervals, to help the penetration of

the tenderizer. Let the steak stand at room temperature for 30 to 40 minutes.

Melt the cooking fat in a large skillet. Add the steak and brown well on all sides. Push the steak to one side of the skillet. Blend the flour into the remaining fat. Cook, stirring, several minutes. Gradually stir the water into the flour mixture. Stir in the black pepper, catsup and soy sauce. Add the onions. Bring to a boil. Turn heat down. Cover and simmer 15 to 20 minutes or until the meat is tender. While the steak cooks, put the rice, salt and water into a 2-quart saucepan. Bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover with a lid. Leave over this low heat 14 minutes. Turn the heat off, but leave the lid on until ready to serve, or at least 10 minutes. After the meat cooks until tender, add the green pepper and mushrooms. Cover and cook 10 to 15 minutes longer or until the peppers are tender but still slightly crisp. Place the rice on a hot platter. Arrange the steak over the rice. Pour some of the gravy over the rice. Serve the rest in a separate dish.

This recipe makes 6 servings.

Light scratches on shellacked, varnished or waxed floors disappear when you use a solution of equal parts of turpentine, boiled linseed oil and white vinegar.

Follow these hints when storing bacon fat: store in small jars so bottom won't get rancid; date or number each jar, use oldest first; store in refrigerator.

Here's a wholesome, tasty recipe that's a meal in itself...one that's a picture to look at and a delight to eat because it is made smooth with quick-cooking rice cereal...filled with creamed chicken or left-over meat it makes a superb luncheon menu.

SPECIAL CARROT RING

1 cup water
3 tablespoons Cream of Rice, quick-cooking rice cereal
3 eggs, beaten
1 1/2 cups mashed cooked carrots
2 tablespoons melted butter
2 teaspoons minced onion
2 teaspoons minced parsley
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon salt
Bring water to boil in saucepan over moderate heat. Sprinkle in Cream of Rice so that boiling does not stop. Cook, stirring constantly. Stir a few spoonfuls of cooked rice, mixing well. Stir remaining ingredients into cooked rice mixture and mix well. Pour into well-greased 4-cup ring mold. Bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees F, until firm, about 1 hour. Turn out on serving plate while hot and serve filled with creamed chicken or fish and surround with cooked green peas. Makes 6 servings.

Combine orange juice, brown sugar and marmalade in a saucepan. Simmer 10 minutes. Stir in ground cloves. Spread mixture on ham and complete baking, basting frequently.

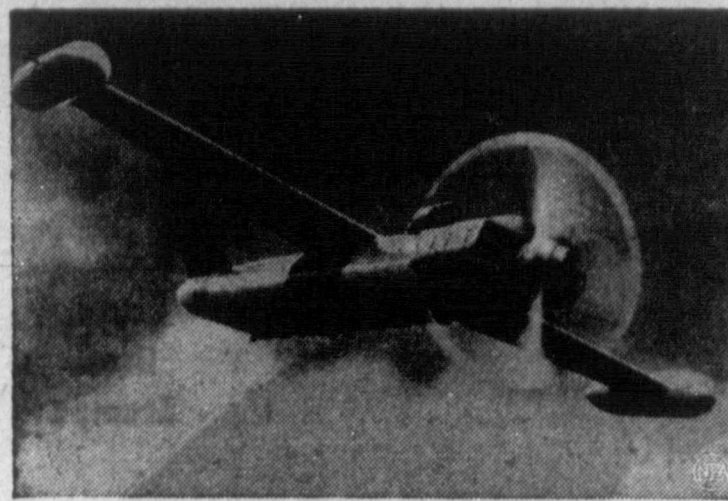

Cost Of Living Skyrockets In Florida

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla.—UP
 —The livin' is easy, and fun, for retired folks who move to Florida to live — but it's not cheap.

Some 25,000 of the 125,000 people who live in St. Petersburg testify that they are mighty happy with the sunshine, the sea breezes, and the activities designed particularly for oldsters. But many of them are having as much trouble making ends meet as when they were struggling to earn a living.

"Prices have almost doubled since I came here in 1946," one retired oldster said. "My pension has stayed the same. I can't ask for a raise and I am having trouble trying to get along."

Another oldster who retired here five years ago said he had cut his budget down to the bare essentials. . . food, clothing, utilities, and that's about all. "It's lucky for me I own my own my house," he said.

Presley Phillips of the Chamber of Commerce admitted it isn't cheap to retire to Florida.

He said newcomers can expect living costs about the same as where they came from whether it is Chicago, Detroit, Toronto, Minneapolis—or Milwaukee.

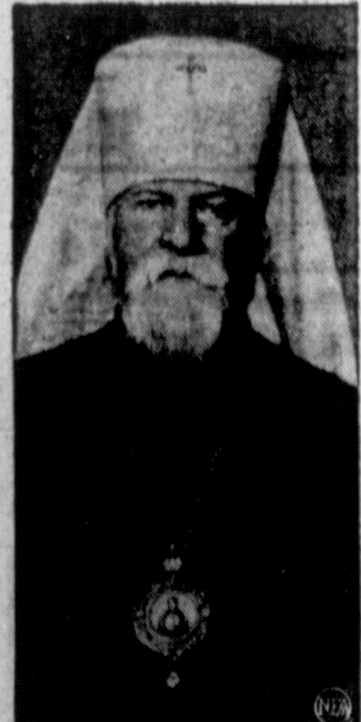
The Chamber of Commerce suggests a minimum income of \$200 a month to retire here. Fuel and clothing costs are slightly lower than in northern cities because of the climate, but food prices are about the same as in any city of 125,000 population.

A minimum family budget for two should provide at least \$50 a month for food, \$9 for electricity, \$5 for water and \$40 a year for fuel.

Most of the retired men and women in St. Petersburg own homes. New two bedroom homes can be found for as little as \$7,500.

Despite economic troubles most of St. Petersburg's community of oldsters are happy and enthusiastic about their lives since they quit working.

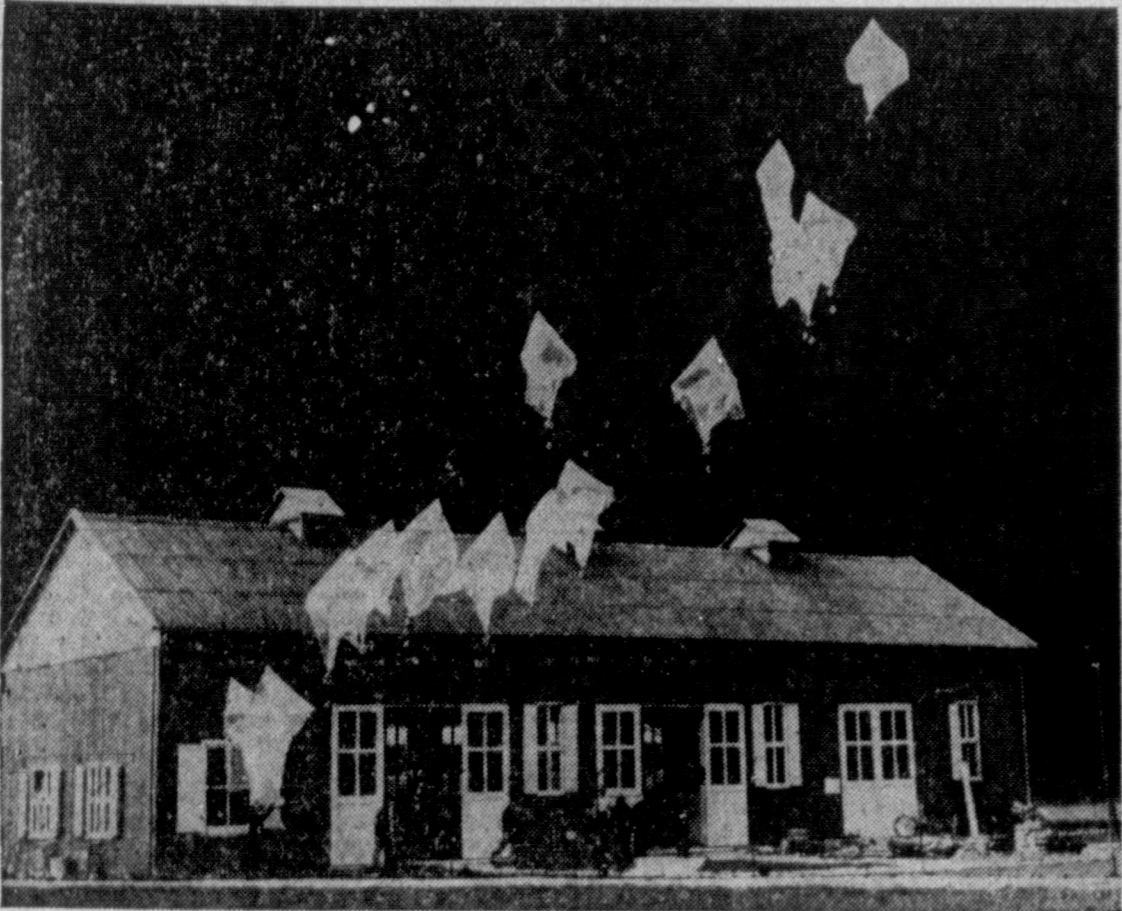

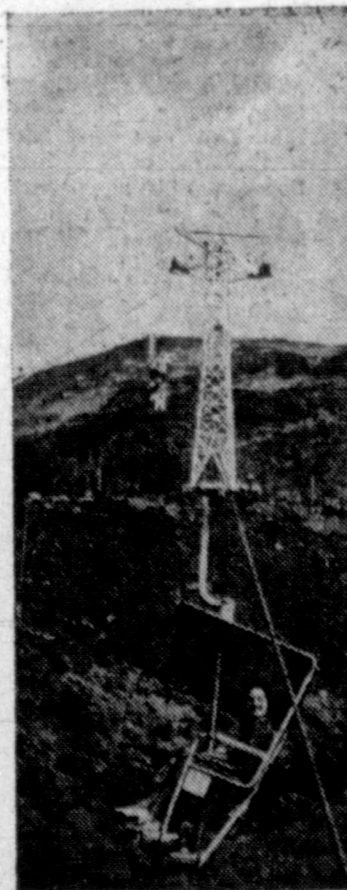

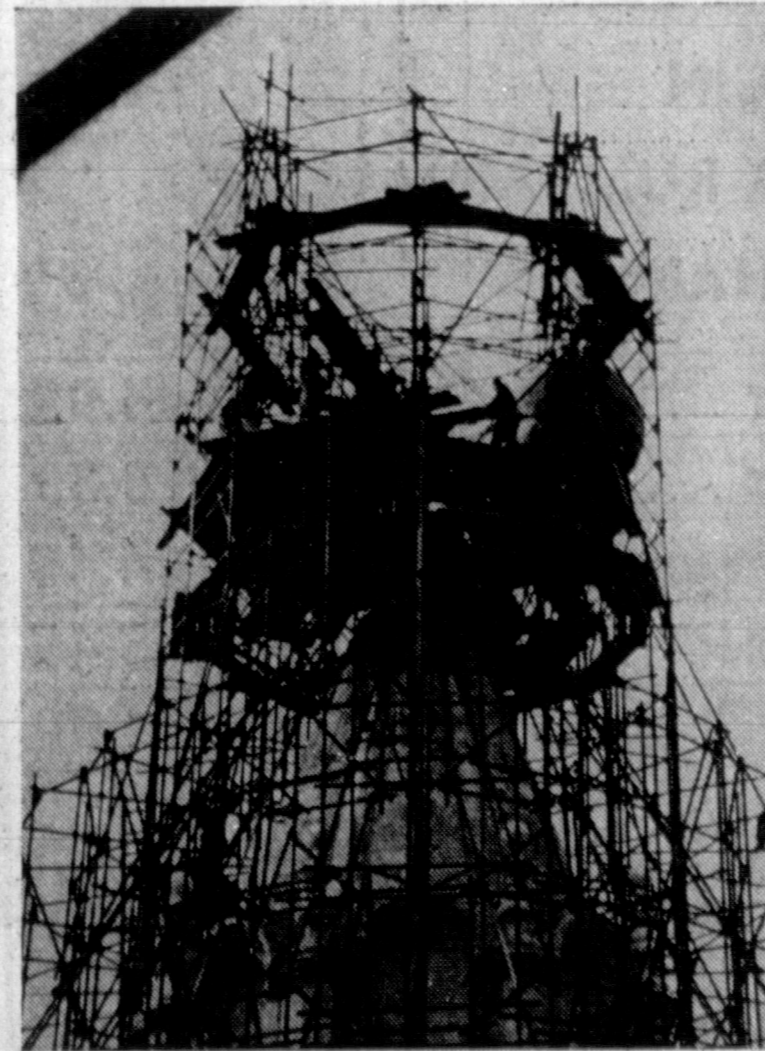
