# Irish-Strife Grows

BELFAST (UPI) - Police found the garrotted body of a man in a Roman Catholic area of Belfast today while bonfires burned in Protestant areas to celebrate a 283-year-old victory that made them the dominant force in Northern Ireland.

Police said the man, who was not identified, was strangled with barbed wire.

It was the 845th death in nearly four years of political and religious strife among Protestants, Catholics and security forces.

Earlier, British commanders ordered 28,500 troops and police to keep the peace during Protestant celebrations of the battle that established their dominance over the Catholics nearly-three centuries ago. Bonfires burned before dawn as the celebrations began.

'We are on full alert throughout the day." a security spokesman said.

Parade organizers said about 100,000 Protestants were marching in Belfast and 17 other cities and towns to celebrate the victory of King William of Orange over Catholic King James II in the 1690 Battle of the Boyne

Authorities cancelled police leave, called up 2,000 reservists to reinforce 4,000 regular police and placed on duty the 6,000 part-time militiamen of the Ulster Defense Regiment. In addition, 16,500 regular troops were on duty.

Security officials said Belfast where about 23,000 Protestants were marching, was the worst potential trouble spot.

The celebrations got under way at midnight Wednesday with hundreds of street parties around bonfires. Huge crowds drank toasts to Protestant heroes, sang patriotic songs and occasionally pitched effigies of Catholics into the fires.

The effigies included figures representing Pope Paul VI and Gerry Fitt, leader of Northern Ireland's main Catholic political group, the Social Democratic and Labor Party.

To prevent possible bombing attacks by the Irish Republican Army (IRA), the army warned that troops might blow up any cars parked along the Belfast parade-reference to the fact bomb-laden cars are a favorite IRA weapon.

Most parade routes were through Protestant or downtown areas. At one point in Belfast where the route neared Catholic neighborhoods, troops erected high canvas screens to keep Protestants and Catholics from seeing each other.

# Nixon Keeps His Silence

WASHINGTON (UPI) -President Nixon has remained silent about the Watergate investigation this week, keeping to his decision not to speak out until the current phase of the Senate probe is concluded in early August.

Nixon has gone about his business at the White House since he returned Monday from an extended stay in California, spending much of his time working on his Phase IV economic program.

Deputy Press Secretary Gerald L. Warren ruled out an announcement on the new economic controls this week. but said he expected a presidential statement "relatively soon.'

If he follows his pattern, Nixon may head for his Camp David, Md., mountaintop retreat this weekend where he may make his decisions on curbing inflation in solitude.

While Nixon's personal involvement was played down, he had at his command a team of six lawyers, headed by Leonard Garment and J. Fred Buzhardt. who were handling all legal aspects of White House involvement in Watergate.

Warren disclosed Wednesday that former Presidential aides under investigation in the Watergate affair are no longer permitted to copy documents they worked on while they were at the White House.

He said that the new order against copying the documents went into effect May 23.

Filling stations in scattered areas reported there still wasn't enough gasoline to go around, but across the country there was more available than there has been at any time this summer, the American Automobile Association (AAA) said Wednesday.

While gasoline supply and distribution inequities continue to inconvenience motorists and dealers to some degree in every area of the nation, most dealers expressed considerably more optimism than the statistics reveal," the AAA said.

The AAA said its survey of gas stations along major travel routes in the United States showed 46 per cent were operating at normal hours and allowing motorists to fill their tanks; 48 per cent reported closing early, and only 10 per cent were still limiting the amount of gas a motorist could

Motorists in less populated areas were warned to make sure they have enough gasoline. especially evenings and weekends, when many gas stations

# Haldeman, Ehrlichman Tried To Cover Acts

WASHINGTON (UPI) - John N. Mitchell testified today that former presidential advisers H. R. Haldeman and John D. Ehrlichman were among those who had an "active concern" last year in hiding the truth about Watergate and other criminal acts.

The former attorney general, during a third day of questioning by the Senate Watergate Committee, said he believed that both campaign and White House officials helped shield President Nixon from the full story of the "horrors" involving

his subordinates. "Is it your impression that the President was being misled by as you were misleading the President?" asked Samuel Dash, the chief committee

"I believe that would be, would certainly be, the impression I would have," Mitchell replied.

Mitchell, Nixon's campaign manager until two weeks after the June 17, 1972 bugging arrests at Democratic headquarters at the Watergate, said he had dicussed the situation fully with Haldeman and Ehrlichman sometime last year, although he said he could not give a date.

**Denies Knowledge** 

Both men-Nixon's closest confidantes until their resignations from the White House staff April 30-have denied any knowledge of the affair until this past spring.

"You did speak to Haldeman and Ehrlichman in 1972?" Dash asked Mitchell

# Brazilian Airliner's Pilot Hailed In Crash Landing

a France (UPI) - The pilot of a Brazilian Varig airliner was hailed today as a hero for the skillfully executed crash landing of his flaming airliner. It apparently was smoke and flames that killed the 122 victims, not the crash itself.

Rescuers who rushed to the wreckage in a lettuce field outside this Paris suburb said the victims died strapped in their seats, choked unconscious by fumes and then burned by the flames that started in a restroom and flashed through the aircraft, fed by the emergency oxygen system.

Firemen who brought out the Blackened bodies said many were in the correct position for a crash landing-heads down and knees together.

Doctors fought today to save the lives of the seriously ill among the 12 survivors of the Boeing 707 jetliner. One survivor died in a hospital today. bringing the official death toll to

All the survivors were crewmen. Among the badly injured was the pilot, Gilberto Araujo Da Silva, hailed by Frenchmen today as a hero for guiding the plane past rows of houses to a safe landing.

"He was perveless-a hero" said one news broadcast.

The plane was only two miles -90 seconds flying time-from Orly Airport at the end of a 5,800-mile flight from Brazil when it ditched, "like a bomb," according to one witness, because of a fire which a survivor said started in a rear toilet, apparently as a result of a short circuit.

A local farmer who was among the first to reach the plane said: "I got into the cockpit and two crew members were unconscious in their seats. their faces black. The passenger compartment was silent."

"A fireman tried to get to the door but was beaten back by the smoke." another farmer said "It was like a furnace. Then I covered my head with my shirt and got in... It was quiet in the passenger area and I could not see much for the smoke but I think they had been killed already, first by the smoke, then the flames.

The crash was the worst in France since June 1962, when an Air France Boeing 707 crashed on take-off from Orly Airport, killing 131 persons.

Among them were many from Atlanta, Ga., who had been on an art tour of Europe

Investigators today played back tapes from the aircraft's 'black box' flight recorder to hear the last communications between the plane and Orly ground control. Aviation authorities already had made it clear the cause of the crash was a fire that started in the tail section, apparently from a short

# U.S. Dollar Loses Gain

LONDON (UPI) - The dollar took a sudden nose dive on world money markets today, reversing steady gains made over the previous three days.

The unpredictable currency tumbled 89 per cent in value in Amsterdam and slipped back in Paris, Zurich, Frankfurt and Tokyo It held steady in London and gained slightly in Hong

On the big London bullion market, the price of gold jumped as the dollar sank-the usual pattern. The metal went up \$1.75 to \$120.50 an ounce from Wednesday's closing price of \$118.75. Gold gained \$1.50 an ounce in Zurich.

Dealers said the dollar was dropping because there was no solid evidence government central banks were intervening to

The Americans are trying to talk the dollar up rather than pull it up," said a bank official in Paris. "There is no confirmation the Americans are doing anything," said another French banker.

'We still have no indication any central bank has intervened to support the dollar." said a U.S. bank representative in Frankfurt. This conflicted with word from some experts who said Wednesday it appeared government bankers were prepared to come to the aid of the ailing currency.

The dollar tumbled today to 4.08-4.09 francs in Paris, down from 4.17 at Wednesday's close. In Switzerland it sank to 2.85 Swiss francs, down from 2.89.

Against the all-important West German mark the American currency lost a fraction at the market opening, priced at 2 3875 marks compared to Wednesday's 2.4050 close.

Rates were little changed in London and see-sawed on Asian markets. The dollar dipped slightly in Tokyo, selling at 264.40 yens compared with Wednesday's 265 quotation. In Hong Kong, the dollar went up dollars

sharking and extortion. The Senate permanent investigating subcommittee has been inquiring into the commutation of the sentence and in a statement today said it was seeking "additional information regarding the presidential commutation from former White House counsel John W. Dean III and others."

In Addition to Dean

It was understood that in addition to Dean, who as Nixon's counsel cleared the proposal of pardon, the investigators want to question Richard Kleindienst who was attorney general at the time.

A subcommittee spokesman said that Dean would be interrogated in the "immediate future" but no date has been set for calling Kleindienst.

At the same time, Chairman Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash. announced that Gerald Martin Zelmanowitz, the key government witness in DeCarlo's conviction, will testify in open hearings Friday.

Zelmanowitz, 36, will testify on stolen securities and related frauds involving the use of secret foreign bank accounts by organized crime figures.

Zelmanowitz, who, according to Jackson, has admitted being a front man for organized crime figures in moving money through European banks and

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Agriculture Department has predicted a potential record grain and soybean harvest which could ease inflationary pressure on food prices this fall.

Don Paarlberg, the department's chief economist, told a news conference following the issuance of a monthly crop report, that meat prices probably will rise after current ceilings are lifted because of an earlier boom in livestock feed cost. But he said the bumper corn, soybean and wheat crops forecast Tuesday should help by both reducing feed prices and persuading farmers to reverse recent trends toward slowing meat, poultry and egg

production. Paarlberg said he could not foresee "any prospects of lower food prices to any appreciable extent for the rest of 1973." but he said the "favorable" crop report should speed an administration decision to move out of the price freeze and into a more flexible economic control program

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





# ustin's Chief Electrician Sees Flexibility As Aid For Energy

AUSTIN (UPI) - The chief electrician in the energy-short capital city of Texas believes it will take flexibility and a little Rube Goldberg inventiveness to keep the lights on for the next six years.

"Those are going to be the tough ones," said R. L. Hancock, the director of Austin's electrical utilities. "Our options are going to be pretty limited but we're just going to have to try to patch the system through, try to keep functional, and look for improvements all the time."

Hancock inherited one of the more challenging tasks to face a city official when he took over as utilities director in 1970. The seat of Texas government (Pop. 250,000) was moving into a period of unprecedented growth and maintained three highly efficient natural gas generators to keep the electricity flowing to the hungry consumers.

An extensive street lighting program was nearing completion and more Austinites than ever were employing central air conditioning to fight the hot Central Texas summers.

Then Began Nightmare But last November a series of events produced nightmarish possibilities for Hancock and his generator crews-Coastal States Gas Producing Co., from which the city gulped millions of cubic feet of natural gas weekly to convert to electricity. revealed it no longer had enough gas to supply all its

"The situation deteriorated so quickly that in the course of those first curtailments we were immediately forced into enlarging our reserve fuel oil program to 20 million gallons," Hancock said.

Throughout the winter and into the summer months, the city emerged from one gas curtailment and fell into another. Mayor Roy Butler urged citizens to cut electrical consumptions by setting their air conditioning thermostats on 78 degrees, and, in turn, the city blacked out street lambs and decorative lighting on its many landmarks.

Hancock became one of the city's most quoted public offic-

# Science Today

Maine has a scenic coastline, beautiful evergreen forests and an abundance of mosquitoes and black flies.

With most pesticides that effectively control the pests banned, a professor of entomology at the University of Maine is working on a control plan designed to make outdoor living more enjoyable without ruffling the feathers of environmentalists.

Ivan N. McDaniel's good news is in the form of planarians, a type of freeliving flat worm that is not parasitic but eats mosquito larvae. Another type planarium eats blackfly larvae.

"Planarians have a big appetite," the professor said in an interview. "Where they are present in water pools, they can manage a 96 per cent reduction in mosquitoes.

More Research Needed McDaniel said he cannot forsee the use of planarians causing any environmental damage. He said they already live in many of Maine's woodland pools and are part of

the ecological balance. "I can't see much harm in surpressing mosquitoes and black flies," McDaniel said. 'Most materials that have been effective in controlling them have been banned. It seems we have to go to some form of biological control."

He said much more research is needed before an effective biological control program can be implemented. "The planarians will virtually wipe out all the mosquitoes in some pools while in others they will be less effective."

The professor has tried spreading the planarians around to new sites in the state and said he has had some degree of success in getting them to adapt to a new environment. "I see no real problems in mass producing them and moving them to new areas," he said.

**Mosquito Control Ahead** He said the planarians can reproduce in three ways. They can lay eggs, or can reproduce by division —a process called transverse fission. Finally, they have the unique ability to regenerate. That means if a planarian is cut into two parts. rather than dying, the organism simply grows into two new organisms.





## FBI Agents Make Arrests For Securities Fraud nia, Italy, Panama and Switzer-

NEW YORK (UPI) - A 44year-old New Jersey man was arrested by FBI agents Wednesday for allegedly masterminding a scheme to dispose of more than \$18 million in stolen and counterfeit securities in California and abroad.

An FBI spokesman identified the suspect as Peter Raia of North Bergen, N.J.

The arrest, the FBI said, was the result of an indictment 67, also Los Angeles. returned July 10 by a federal grand jury in Manhattan in which Raia and 15 othersincluding seven Europeanswere charged with conspiring to dispose of more than \$18 million in stolen and counterfeit securities in Belgium, Califor-

Among the charges against Raia were conspiracy and interstate transportation of stolen property.

FBI agents also arrested in Florida, Dominick Mantell, 55, of Emerald Hills, Hollywood, Fla., and in California, Jerry Marc Jacobs, 29, of Acardia, Calif., Evelynn Jacobs, Los Angeles, and Louis Gittleman,

The spokesman said arrests were the culminatation of a major securities investigation with "international ramifications" by the FBI.

He said the FBI was aided in the investigation by the Justice Department's joint strike force

said New York City detectives and a number of foreign police agencies "maintained continuous contact with the FBI throughout the investigation."



# Padres Liable

SAN DIEGO (UPI) -Superior Court judge has ruled the San Diego Padres are liable for breach of contract and damage suits if the team's new owners go ahead with a plan to move the club to Washington, D.C. But the current parent city is still not happy.

# America Vs. U.S.A.

Do you know the name of the with the political establishment country you live in? A survey shows there is a difference of opinion. Specifically, the question was, "What is the name of the country you live Eight of the ten respondents replied that they lived in the "United States of America." The other two part of the country. But we replied they lived in "America." Now let us explain why we believe the question and the answers are important.

According to the Constitution. the official name of this country is the "United States of America." At several points in the Constitution that phrase is shortened to "United States." Under the Articles of Confederation which preceded the Constitution, the official name of the government was "United States of American in Congress assembled." Going back to the Declaration of Independence that predated the Articles by two years, you also find the phrase, "United States of America in General Congress, assembled." Since a national government had not been formally organized as of 1776, the phrasing in the Declaration must have referred to the existing state legislatures that had been derived from the colonial legislatures. At any rate, the designation "United States" - whether in longer or shorter form - has always name should not fasten the denoted a government or a

But people do not live in a government, they live in a country. For example, if a persons says that he lives in the City of Pampa - or Borger, or Miami, or Perryton - you do not understand him to mean that he resides in city hall. For city hall is merely the political authority that has jurisdiction over the city; it is not the city itself. Similarly, the words "United States of America" are the name of the national government that has jurisdiction over the country; it is not the country itself

One hates to mention the Cold War in the sophisticated Seventies. The Soviet Union and Communist China are our friends. Who dares to differ?

Father Daniel Lyons, Editor of the National Catholic Newspaper, Twin Circle, dares, Here is how he laid it on the line for Manion Forum listeners not too long ago:

"There's no question in my mind that the Communists in Moscow have made a concerted effort to kill any talk about the Cold War. They are always talking about the detente, which we have heard so much about ever since 1920. This detente does not work. Every time there is a war, the Communists seem to be on the other side, except in World War II when we went to their aid.

"There will not be a war between Peking and Moscow, for a long, long time at any rate, because Peking is simply to weak and the economy is so poorly handled that they're simply never going to be able to threaten Moscow as a nuclear power.

"Moscow and Peking cooperated very, very closely in Vietnam and they will cooperate very much together now, helping Hanoi and helping the Communists stir up trouble in Laos, Thailand, and Cambodia. There's really only one enemy in the world, as far as the United States is concerned, that carries any serious threat, and that is

the Soviet Union. "A recent best-selling book by David Halberstam, "The Best and The Brightest", refers to the Kennedy Presidential era. Halberstam says that we never had the courage to askourselves whether or not we should have been fighting for Hanoi, whether we were not actually fighting for the wrong side in Vietnam. Halberstam was a young cub reporter with no reputation at all in Vietnam ten years ago. He really created all the Buddhist crisis in order to bring about the overthrow of the government of South Vietnam in the assassination of Diem. That made him an instant hero.

"Halberstam goes back to the late '40's to tell us that Owen Lattimore was a distinguished Sinologist, as he calls him, a distinguished expert on China. He tells us that the four men who cooperated so much with Lattimore, John K. Fairbank, John Stewart Service, John Carter Vincent and men like Phillip Jessup, also, John Patton Davies, he tells us these were the best men in the whole foreign service. And yet all of these men kept telling us that Mao Tse-tung was a man we should back.

'Now what he says in the book is very dishonest. He says that these men predicted that Mao would succeed. What he fails to tell us is that these men said we should back Mao. That's the insidious part of their story. And he now tries to whitewash the whole thing by saying those men were right. They were right only if you wanted Communism



# Security Or Sell-Out--The New Red Challenge

In a matter of months, one of the most important international conferences in history is scheduled to be convened and probably not one out of one thousand Americans know anything about it. A "Conference on European Security" has long been advocated by the USSR and its Warsaw Pact allies to settle, once and for all, the fate of those nations swallowed up after World War II by Communist expansionism. The Western world has finally relinquished all previous objections, and preparatory sessions to map out an agenda for the Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe (CSCE), as it will be officially known, have been going on since last November in Helsinki. across the Gulf of Finland

from Leningrad, USSR. Moscow first put forth its suggestion for a conference in 1954 when the Big Four Foreign Ministers met in-Berlin. Ten years later, Poland's Foreign Minister Rapacki called for a European security conference in a speech before the United Nations, In March, 1966, Soviet Party Secretary Brezhnev, speaking before a Communist Party Congress, pressed the issue further. Four times in 1969, Communist Warsaw Pact countries renewed the call

for a conference. Official Communist publications, such as the Kremlin's International Affairs, have repeatedly stressed the importance of an "All-European Conference". The November, 1972, issue of International Affairs in fact. contained not one, but two lengthy articles, one of them stating that such a conference "would prepare the ground for the gradual elimination in the future of the division of Europe into military-political groups and their replacement by a collective security system" in which the Soviet Union

and its satellites would be

participants.

The best brief analysis of what Moscow hopes to achieve at CSCE is outlined in a critical statement issued by the AFL-CIO Executive Council as follows: "In yielding to the Soviet demand for a European Security Conference, the West has handed Moscow still another diplomatic and political success. The Soviets have sought such a conference more than eight years; they regard it as a means of furthering their expansionist designs in Europe. (Editor's note: While the AFL-CIO

contends that the Soviet Union has been pressing for years, the U.S. State Department's Bureau of Public Affairs informs The Red Line that the Communist bloc has actually been calling for a European security conference since 1954.)

"Specifically (says the AFL-CIO) the Soviet Union expects the CSCE to bring her the following gains: full and final recognition of Moscow's post-war conquests in East Europe; acceleration of U.S. withdrawal from, the continent; weakening of NATO (the North Atlantic Treaty Organization); hampering European political unity; giving the USSR a voice in West European affairs by the creation of a permanent European organ; increased access to Western goods, credits and technology."

If the Western nations soon to begin months of debate on so-called European security - yield to the Communists' demands, the cry for freedom from Soviet subjugation by the people of Hungary, Poland, Czechoslovakia; East Germany and other Iron Curtain countries will be silenced forever Recognition of the status quo of post-WWII boundaries, which will be demanded by the Communist bloc at CSCE, means that the non-Communist world would agree to abstain from exerting pressure favoring the liberation of these nations because such pressure would be regarded as an unwarranted interference in the internal affairs of a CSCE participating nation.

In agreeing, after so many years, to the Soviet bloc's demand for a European security conference, Western strategists point to two hoped-for results: an agreement on mutual reduction of U.S. and Soviet troops in Europe, and the free exchange of persons, information and ideas between the East and West. The Communists are not about to agree to either of these proposals unless it is to their advantage.

Red China's 'friendliness" towards the United States now is due to the fear of Soviet aggression; just as in World War II Soviet "friendliness" towards the United States was due to their fears of Nazi aggression; and not because they ceased being



Young Boy Has **Blood In Urine** 

By Lawrence Lamb, M.D. Dear Dr. Lamb - About 15

months ago my 14-year-old son passed a few drops of blood. This happened after he had urinated. About a drop at a time. His doctor said he thought it was an infection and had him on penicillin for two weeks, a strict diet and restricted activity. Well I took him to a kidney specialist to see what he thought. He wanted him X-rayed and this checked out all right. He said to forget the diet and restricting of his activities. He scheduled a cystoscopy but the bleeding stopped. He said if the bleeding started again he

would do it then. Well, a month ago a spot was in his shorts and another one today. This wouldn't be enough for the doctor to be able to see where it was coming from, but it sure worries me. Everyone I talk with about it says they have never heard of this in a boy, only in

Is this very rare and does it have to be something serious? My son doesn't seem a bit concerned and says he has no

Dear Reader - There are several points along the urinary tract where bleeding can occur. It does happen sometimes in young boys. It does not necessarily mean a serious disease. No one can tell the significance of bleeding, however without a complete examination. The blood has no relation to the bleeding that is seen in women. More often it will occur in the urethral tube to some form of irritation or in the area around the prostate. In the absence of any symptoms it is unlikely to be due to an infection. Rarely, fresh blood of this type may indicate a tumor and it can be important.

You should make an appointment with a doctor and et your son talk to the doctor alone. The doctor can talk to you afterward concerning what he thinks should be done or if he thinks it is possible to wait to see if the matter takes care of itself. But I would not neglect seeing a doctor.

Dear Dr. Lamb - In reference to your column on low blood sugar, I was surprised to see that the three important don'ts were not mentioned. 1. Don't smoke. 2. Don't drink alcoholic beverages. 3. Don't use caffeine (regular coffee) or strong tea. have known this personally (in my own case of labile glucose levels, easily influenced by disregard of the three don'ts plus excess carbohydrate intake) for years and have also been so advised by my gastroenterologist.

Dear Reader with your three don'ts. There have been several columns on low blood sugar and, because of limitations in space, I've only been able to cover a limited number of points in each column. To the admonition not to drink coffee I would add a ban on even the decaffeinated coffee if one also utilizes sugar and cream with the coffee.

"Why Aug. 1?" demanded Sadat. "The union is not due to take place until Sept. 1. What's the hurry?"

"Because I've got to know where we stand before that date," retorted Qaddafi. "As of now, you are not sure what you want to do. I am, but you're not. It will take you at least a month to make up your mind - if

At one point, in response to a question about the ascetic 'cultural revolution" for Libya imperiously proclaimed by Qaddafi, he snapped, "We are prepared to sacrifice our wealth, but not our revolution. That is inviolate. We make no concessions on that. If Egypt and Libya unite, what applies to Libya applies to Egypt, too. That's the way it has to be.

As the newsmen eyed him with undisguised skepticism, the bombastic Libyan colonel bristled angrily and barked:

"The Egyptian press is reactionary and trivial. It is well known that it takes money from the reactionary governments and monarchs of Saudi Arabia and the gulf sheikhs. Your press needs drastic overhauling.

To another question on how the unity could be achieved, economically, financially, militarily, politically, etc., Qaddafi shrugged:

'Frankly, I am as perplexed as you are. I don't know on what form and what basis the merger can be brought about. We reached no conclusions. I am exception of the foreign willing to be reasonable, but on one thing I am unmovable. Our cultural revolution must be accepted as completely by Egypt as it is in Libya.'


