

The order apparently marked the end of an era, because the crackdown was ordered by businessmen, who in the past contended, along with newly-elected Mayor George Roy Clough, that the life of the city depended on Gal-veston being "open." Texas law forbids gambling and liquor by the drink.

The crackdown in Galveston, which long has defied state law. followed a meeting Friday of chamber of commerce directors. 12 top island business leaders and Mayor Clough over "unfavorable" national publicity.

Businessmen Fed Up Clough, a radio station owner elected mayor last May, campaigned for an "open but clean" town." Businessmen lately have complained that Galveston's vice was scaring away tourists instead of drawing them to the island. They also said it attracted "un-

Bavory characters. The business leaders left no doubt they wanted a complete about-face and issued an ultimatum in the form of a resolution demanding an end to the alleged "lawlessness" dating back almost to the freebooting days of pirate

Jean LaFitte. "Over the years," the resolution said, "a situation has developed whereby a general feeling seems to have been born that Galveston is separated from the mainland and therefore is a law unto it-

'We Will No Longer Tolerate . . There has been a growing trend established by our officials of closing their eyes to violations of state and federal laws. Such a policy can culminate only in the complete breakdown of law and order in a community with the inevitable results that the lawlessness and deterioration of morals which follow affect the community as a whole. "We will no longer tolerate such

a course "We feel most strongly that every step must be taken to carry out and enforce the law. . . to put an end to the open flaunting of laws. . . and to further the ideal of making Galvestop a law abiding, reputable and safe community.

The shutdown followed, with Commissioner Johnston setting the 6 a. m. deadling Saturday for shutting down all vice in the city.

'Just Watch Results' "The resolution contains profound thinking," said Johnston. "I most emphatically intend to enforce the law as required in the resolution. Don't ask me to show my hand. Just water the business men of Galveston so strongly united on any one issue," Clough said.







"When delegating power and authority to 'good' men, remember that the power is apt to be inherited by 'bad' men.

"In the Old Testament, there are two thought - provoking stories of how a people brought about their own enslavement. The Doctor Says

By EDGAR P. JORDAN, M. D.

Several correspondents have complained that this column has discussed constipation more often than its opposite, chronic diar-

Certainly it is true that chronic diarrhea is also common and indeed, not infrequently, it represents a more serious afflicition than ordinary constipation.

One thing is certain: if the cause of diarrhea is not reasonably obvious and it does not stop after a short time an investigation of the possible cause should be made. Any diarrhea which lasts more

than a few hours or days can be called chronic. Someone with this difficulty suffers great inconvenience and cannot possible feel as well as if the bowels were behaving naturally.

Chronic infection with germs or with amebae (which are small animal parasites) are often responsible for this kind of difficulty. In such cases examination of the stools for these microscopic enemies should reveal the cause and the proper treatment can

ANOTHER SERIOUS type of chronic diarrhea_is produced by an ulceration of the lower intes-

The cause of this condition is not known, but many small ulcers form in the intestines and these are associated with diarrhea, bleeding, irritation and other distressing symptoms.

variety of chronic diarrhea, however, is of nervous origin. Many people who do not have an infection in the intestine or any other obvious cause for chronic diarrhea develop this condition whenever they are under emotion a! strain.

The reason for this is probably because the nerves which go to the intestines and cause the wavelike motions which force the waste

material through the bowel, are governed largely by the emotions. WHEN A PERSON with a "nervous" constitution becomes excited or upset the nerve control

of the intestines is also disturbed. Under such circumstances the wave-like motions increase, forcing the waste material through too fast and diarrhea results. One line of attack on this kind

of difficulty, of course, is to try to avoid emotional disturbances as much as possible. Diet and sometimes medication are also usualually of some benefit. There are less common causes

for chronic diarrhea also. Diarrhea may follow operations on the stomach and is often present in cancer of the bowel. Certain diseases of the body as

a whole, such as allergy, goiter or diabetes can also cause diarrhea. THE GREATEST DANGER from chronic diarrhea lies in the fact that many peoeple think it is not important and try to cure themselves by buying and taking some drug.

Several drugs may help for a short time, but if there is any serious condition responsible for the diarrhea, it is dangerous to postpone thorough examination and accurate diagnosis.

Finally, it should be said that chronic diarrhea is less frequent in communities with good sanitation - proper sewage disposal, pure drinking water, and adequate food inspection - than it is in areas where the sanitation is pri-
