flows into the Wichita River, within the next 48 hours. The Wichita Falls police department said early Tuesday that several families had already been evacuated from their threatened homes in the southwest part of town and an undetermined number of others had evacuated them-

The Wichita Falls Civil Defense unit and Red Cross had some 50 trucks standing by to evacuate families. Cots were installed in the National Guard Armory and an emergency shelter was set up in the Wichita Falls Boys' Club.

The swollen streams were brimming over from rains measuring more than seven inches in the watershed feeding Wichita Falls' lakes Kemp, Wichita and Diveren in the South Plains since last weekend, turning cotton fields into lakes and bringing the harvest to

a sudden halt. Meanwhile, the Brazos River in Northwest Texas, which went on a rampage only last week was on the move again from the same rains. Sheriff Wesley Stiles of Sevmour issued a warning to farmers to move their cattle to high ground in Baylor county because of expected flooding by the Brazos.

At Wichita Falls, the Wichita River was rising approximately two to three inches an hour and reached 19.65 feet early Tuesday, about two feet above flood stage. Weathermen expected it to crest late Tuesday at some 22 feet. The river reached 21.43 feet in the 1950


A two-day total of 7.2 inches had fallen at Crowell in the tast three days, Quanah had 4.10, Paducah 4.50 and Vernon 2.50.

Rainfall was fairly general elsewhere over the state, and forecasters said there would be little change. Most of the shower activity continued in a broad band from suothwest Texas, spreading northeastward through the Childress-Wichita Falls area.

The heaviest concentration was in the Midland-Childress-Wichita Falls sector. Childress reported 2.13 inches for the 24 hours ending at 6:30 a.m., of which 1.47 inches fell since Monday midnight.

Lubbock reported 1.56 inches, while Midland had 58. Wiehita Falls reported .59 inches for the 24-hour period. Alpine and Presidio .39, El Paso .35, downtown Fort Worth .12. Beaumont and Port Arthur .02 and Abilene a trace.

Home Firm Dedicates New Plant

TYLER, Tex. -UP- James R Price, president of the nation's largest home producer, dedicated his firm's new \$1.5 million Tyler plant Tuesday with a forecast the corporation would soon be producing 300,000 houses a year.

The Tyler plant of National Homes Corp. was completed in little more than six months. The company said it built the East Texas installation to serve its rapidly - expanding markets in the South and Southwest for its prefabricated houses. James R. Price, president of the

company, said at dedication ceremonies "we think it is conservative to estimate that at least 50 per cent of all private, nonfarm, residential buildings will be done our way within the next 10 or 15 years."

"We think this means a market of well over three quarters of a million prefabricated houses per annum

"National Homes is doing 40 per cent of the current market,"
Price added, "and we intend to get not less than our present share, which would mean at least 300,000 houses per year."



election is Kubitschek's vice presidential running mate, Joao Goulart. Goulart is president of the labor party, which Vargas

Under the Brazilian constitution, candidates for the presidency and the vice presidency run separate-

If Goulart is elected, it is quite possible that the generals will intervene and refuse to permit him to take office.

The army forced Vargas to dismiss Goulart as minister of labor in a prelude to the late president's

Army May Intervene It was charged, at the time, that Goulart was trying to organize the Brazilian Labor party, with Vargas' approval, along the lines of the Argentine labor organization which Dictator Juan D. Peron

made his country's political power. Gen. Canrobert Pereira Da Costa, chairman of the Brazilian joint chiefs of staff, said in a speech on Aug. 6 that politicians had brought Brazil to the brink of "revolution and chaos."

Pereira Da Costa said then that the armed forces might find it necessary to intervene in the presidential campaign.

South's Error

It is unfortunate that W. E. Debnam, author of "Then My Old Kentucky Home, Good Night!," which is an attempt to circumvent the recent Supreme Court decision on segregation in public schools, cannot see the basic error that lies in his support of the public school system. Like many other Southerners (Mr. Debnam comes from Raleigh, N. C.) he had no objection to the public school system so long as White and Negro children did not attend the same school. But when the Supreme Court ruled that the policy of "equal but separate" public schools in the South was discriminatory against the Negroes and forbidden by the Constitution, Debnam and many of his "equal but separate" school followers immediately rose to battle,

His book is given over to an effort to show that the Negro slaves of the South had a pretty good time of it, albeit they were slaves, and that the Negro race as such is not the equal of the White Race. He apparently has overlooked the point that the Founding Fathers in the phraseology "all men are created equal" had no intention of indicating that each man is the exact equal of the next. What they said and felt was that all men should have equal rights

Debnam concludes his book with a plan that will, he hopes, solve the racial integration problem in the public schools in the Southern states. He proposes that the public school system be continued on what he calls an "integrated basis." He then advocates that "any parent, White or Negro, who does not want his child to attend the public integrated school be allowed - be reguired — to send his children to a private school . . .

"We propose that private school education be made within the reach of every child in the South, regardless of Race or condition, through the use of tax funds already available under the present school program.

"Let the parent signify whether he wants his chirdran to go to an integrated public school or to a private school-that would be operated, if the operator chooses . . and he most certainly would . . . upon a segregated

"Let the notice of school selection be given for enough in advance to give school authorities in each district an opportunity to determine what will be the public and what the private school enrollment so facilities can be made available for each operation, using what are now public school facilities for private schools in those instances where they are not required by public school enrollment. In a tremendous majority of Southern communities the integrated school could assemble in the nearest phone booth.

"Monies appropriated for private school tuition could be paid through voucher made out to the private school selected by the patron and to be countersigned by both so there would be no opportunity to chisel on either side."

Apparently Debnam thinks that it is possible to operate private schools with public money and still have them be private schools. He doesn't seem to understand that if we are to have private schools, they must be exactly that - supported by voluntary agreement on the part of those wanting the school service with those supplying the service. Anything short of this is merely dodging the issue in order to get around an uncomfortable situation in the South that has been brought on by the Supreme Court ruling.

Debnam apparently gives lip service to a belief in liberty and free enterprise, but he fails to see that the use of tax money for a school system is in opposition to free enterprise and is another expression of a form of socialism. At one point in his book in which he is discussing quality, he says:

"In every state, every child in the several grades is taught from the same textbook theories of sociology and economics that have been selected to conform to the social and economic theories of the small group that happens to be in command. Some of these theories, in some classrooms, are so completely at variance with the social and economic and political truths upon which this nation was founded and have made it great and strong, as to curl the hair of any person who believes in liberty and free enterpirse. The Communists and the Socialists and the fellow-travelers are gaining ground all the time, and no wonder. They capture our children during the formative years of adolescence and hold them prisoner through all their mortal lives."

Having recognized that this is true and that it is counter to the traditional American belief in liberty, it is strange that Debnam cannot realize or recognize that the evil lies in the public school system itself. He apparently fails to see that there is no way in which a tax-supported government school, no matter how it is operated, can teach a belief in fundamental Americanism and a free enterprise system. Were they to attempt to, they would automatically condemn themselves. They would automatically show themselves to be inconsistent.

It seems odd that in the South there is such bitter opposition to required integrated schools that there have not been more people awakened to the basic evil in the system. Having been given a bitter dose of governmentschool medicine, it would appear that more of them would awaken to the fact that it is the public school system per se that is wrong — not the Supreme Court decision on segregation.

Writer Perturbed About Our Schools And Colleges

I want to quote from my letter from W. H. McComb on his ideas of what is happening in our schools and colleges.

Mr. McComb is author of "Res cue Our Little Children" and "The Businessman Must Save Himself As the title, "Rescue Our Little Children." indicates, he is interested in the mental and spiritual development of the youth of the land. He gives me permission to

He admits in his letter that "it is tyranny to compel an inoffensive bachelor to educate his sinful neighbor's brood of a dozen." He seems to think that tax-supported schools promote equality of opportunity to the youth of the land. He doesn't seem to realize that there's anything but equality of opportunity to the youth that attends government schools with the youth that is educated by parents or persons who believe in a government of enternal law rather than a government of men. And public schools, of course, are based on a government of men rather than a government of principles, The he goes on to write:

'So now all the boys and girls

go to school and learn juvenile delinquency; and many of them do not even learn to read and write. "Beyond a doubt, some of the results have been abominable. The professors have built up their business until it is now the nation's biggest monopoly with 2 out of 7 Americans devoting full time to it. For many years, looking into this business has been a chief hobby of mine. That is, I have been trying to make sense out of what the professors write about their business in the long shelves on education in the public library, without success. A chief conclusion: that America's professional school bosses now are the most pretentious and useless fakirs since the Borgias were selling chips off the true cross in the Middle Ages

"Digressing for one paragraph, I believe there is a central error in American thinking about education. That is the idea that teachers can pound education into kids whether they want it or not. I think they can pound in a little, but not a great deal; and hardly any on the higher levels. In other words, the impulse toward higher learning always must come from the student, not from the teacher, That is why I am hipped on the idea that education ought to be organized on a competitive basis the kids being permitted to race ahead to the goal posts. I find no record of any professor ever having thought of such a thing in 2500 years of education, so there is no hope of any such reform stemming from Columbia Teachers College or the NEA. But why shouldn't some big corporation snag the idea their own business! End the digres-

desert of the 'university press,' I have come up with a much more sinister conclusion. As far as I know. I am the only fellow who has made this soul-shaking discovery. I have written a book about it, in which I have not comprimised so it will probably not be printed. (Regnery has had it for 4 months, with no response to 3 letters except a postcard). (The American Legion Magazine printed 4000 of the least important words of it. out of 25,000, avoiding entirely this chief conclusion except by implication). This sinister conclusion, as far as it con be stated in a nutshell, is as follows: That the idea that the communists seduced a few of our professors is all wrong. The shoe is on the other foot. It is the professors themselves who have been teaching the essence of communism for 2500 years, so they are pushovers for the Marxian variety when it came along. They just called their own variety by different names.

"From my researches into tile

"It took all of 25,000 words to justify such an astounding conclusion, but I will try to condense the reasoning. The big difference between communism and our system is in the authority of the political boss over the producer. In Russia the authority of the boss over producer is absolute. Our Constitution told the boss to keep his toughs out of our gardens, so that such a producer as Ford could give us automobiles without even cutting the boss in on the profits. That, in my opinion, is the chief difference between the two sysstcms, at least the most important difference. It is the difference which has given to American Nethe citizens of Africa and Russia combined. Our most important freedom has been the freedom to own the profits from our own sweat. This freedom to own never has been taught in our schools. This real significance of our Constitution never has been taught by our professors, not even in the schools of law or political science."
