

cause you change your mind about a purchase than the store has to ask you to give back the goods that were sold to you because it didn't want to sell them after all. Suppose you buy a coat in one store and find that another company has it on sale for five dollars less. Must the store where you bought it take back the coat and give you a refund, or refund the difference in price? The seller is under no obligation to refund the difference, any more than he could make you pay the difference if he discovered that a competitor offered the same coat at a higher price than he had charged for it. Much the same rules apply to the

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refund of deposits. Unless it is the policy of a store to refund deposits on articles, or at least apply the amount on the purchase of some other item, the buyer is obligated to go through with the terms of the contract, even though he has changed his mind about the purchase.

When one selects, orders, and deposits money on the purchase of an article, the store is under obligation to deliver the article in accordance with the terms of the sale. If the buyer refuses to accept the article or pay the remainder of the purchase price, the seller can take legal action against him, ac-cording to the terms of the contract.

The same principles apply to a trade-in allowance on used mer-chandise towards the purchase of a new article. Such a trade-in allowance is considered the same as a deposit.

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'Democratism' In U.S.

There are few Americans in these United States who care to acknowledge themselves as either communists or socialists. Investigations made by skilled and trained observers have established beyond reasonable doubt that communism and socialism are collectivist bed-fellows. It is the purpose of this editorial to establish that the use of the term "democracy" is a cloak behind which such communist and socialist thinkers find refuge in this country.

By using this word, they are able to carry on the collectivist aims and purposes of both the communist party and the socialist ideology while pretending that they are loyal Americans. In short, we wish to show that in this country there are three-of-a-kind on the same couch. They are the communist, the socialist and the democratist.

In order to establish this, we must understand the two divergent and basic aims of (1) the American concept of individual liberty and (2) communist, socialist, democratist aims of ORGANIZING on the basis of permanent collectivization.

The ultimate objectives of these two opposite ideologies are quickly stated.

The American concept of individual liberty calls for a maximum of self-government, with the state enslaved to the will of the individual. Free enterprise, the right of the individual to do as he pleases with his own energies and the product of his own labor, is the cornerstone of individual liberty.

The American ideal is seen quickly to be the acme of Individualism. Inherent within it are faith and belief in God, conviction that there are certain fundamental and absolute moral certainties, dependency upon each person to exert himself according to his own wisdom. and his own conscience, applying whatever self-restraints that are necessary so that each individual guarantees the rights of others by voluntarily refraining from predation and from criminal acts of aggressive violence.

The collectivist concept has been stated succinctly by Karl Marx and other intellectual exponents of communism, socialism and democratism. "From each according to ability; to each according to need." This theme of the collective, often expounded as though it were a Christian virtue, is dependent upon a large and aggressive government, rather than upon the individual. Note that the phrase IMPLIES the existence (necessarily) of a third party . . . the one which is to TAKE from those who have, to GIVE to those who "need."

Raise Wage Levels? Very few people realize what labor unions do that keep wage levels down rather than raise them as labor leaders and most people believe. One often hears it said that la. bor unions in the past have helped

working men but now they've gone too far. But the person that so believes cannot tell what too far is any more than they can tell what too high is. This column has repeatedly

pointed out that labor unions had never produced an additional nickel's worth of wealth but had prevented billions of dollars' worth of wealth from being created. Now

I want to put this in a concrete form. Few people know what wealth is. Smaller Pie, Nof Bigger

Now let's suppose that wealth is represented by a pie, that most people like and want, that it represents all wealth; that it represents homes and furniture and draperies and musical instruments and television and radios and automobiles and trucks and railroads and airplanes and roads and factories and public buildings and clothing and art and books and things that are beautiful. In short, that it represents all wealth.

It is an axiom that this pie can only be produced by human labor participated in by a multitude of individuals. Now all these desirable things

are represented by pie. The bigger the pie, the larger the piece each person can have. Anything that increases the size of the pie is beneficial to everyone. Anything that decreases the size of the pie is harmful to everyone. I can not think of any possible way that labor unions have contributed anything to increasing the size and quality of the pie. And

I challenge any believer in labor unions who thinks they are beneficial to mankind to tell what they do to increase the size of the pie. By labor unions I mean those that limit apprentices, practice seniority, go on strikes; keep a lot of non - productive organizers and spend around \$1/2 billion a year trying to persuade people that labor unions are beneficial and getting laws passed that give them special privileges that are not enjoyed by unorganized workers.

As no one can tell how labor unions that practice these non-creative acts can increase the size of the pie, it is hard to comprehend how they can believe that labor unions can help the working man as a whole

By their rigidity of wages they prevent both parties in a transaction from benefiting, thus causing long periods of unemployment, until such time as wages are so adjusted so that both parties in the transaction - the employer and the employee - are benefited. REFLECTION with JAMES C. INGEBRETSEN President, Spiritual Mobilization

Various reasons have been given as to why the United States is a "rich nation" in a generally poverty-ridden world. The immediate physical reason

was stated recently by Dr. Haldon A. Leedy, director of the Armour Research Foundation, when he said, "In the last half-century, the nation's output per man-hour has increased 500 per cent."

Where else is this true? In large areas of the world, output per man-hour has hardly increased at all for thousands of years. This is the obvious, material reason why the inhabitants of those areas are almost as poor as their far-off ancestors were. To have more, it is necessary to produce more. But there is a more basic spiri-

tual reason why some nations have grown rich while others

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tion.

The state becomes the single dependable entity in the collective. Individuals are to be reared and controlled by the state. There is no necessity for God. If a belief in a divinity is maintained it is for purposes of political necessity rather than from profound conviction.

The economic aims of the collective are: state ownership and/or control of all means of production and distribution."

Let us quote from an authority on the collective, Professor F. J. C. Hearnshaw of London College, who has authored a book entitled "A Survey of Socialism." Here is what he says: "Step by step, land, mines, railways, ships, will be nationalized, municipalized, socialized. Private enterprise will be slowly but completely squeezed out of existence; competition will be imperceptibly but entirely eliminated. And the funds to achieve these ends will not be seized by lawless force (as in Russia); they will be quietly and remorselessly extracted from private enterprise and competitive industry themselves by a graduated system of predatory taxation. Nothing will be confiscated; everything will be purchased and paid for. The members of the possessing classes will, by some ingenious device or other, compensate one another, until (again gradually) their funds run out, when they will, to their great advantage, be compelled to resort to work, even if it be only to "earn a precarious livelihood by taking in one another's washing." Meantime the proletariat will rejoice. They will be servants of the beneficient state; their wages will go up, for they will fix them themselves through their elected representatives; their hours of labor will go down, for they will no longer have to maintain capitalists and landlords in luxury; they will begin to draw large pensions whilst they still have youth and energy to enjoy them; education, medical attendonce, amusements, recreations, transport --- all will be free and unrestricted. In the end, every one will be a blessed pauper, paying away all his earnings in rates and taxes, and in return being luxuriously maintained (so long as he does not display any recrudescense of individualism) on outdoor relief."

Here we see the essence of communism, socialism and democratism at work.

And what has Professor Hearnshaw said that is contrary to existing policies of both the Republicans and Democratic WORKING FORCE in our American government today? Nothing. Absolutely nothing.

Mail Fraud Looked For In Trust Co.

AUSTIN -UP- Postal inspectors are looking for evidence of mail fraud in the high-flying operations of the collapsed U.S. Trust and Guaranty Co.

This was disclosed Wednesday in Fort Worth by Lloyd H. Stephens, postal inspector in charge of the Fort Worth regional office. Persons convicted of mail fraud are subject to long prison terms. Meanwhile, an argument arose over how much investors in U.S. Trust and Guaranty can hope to salvage from their savings. Some had their life savings in the Waco company, now in receivership. Salvage Opinions Vary

A Waco attorney told a meeting of Trust and Guaranty investors Tuesday night that it "is conceivable everybody will get 100 cents on the dollar." In Austin, State Auditor C. H. Cavness "hoped" investors would get as much as 50 cents on the dollar back.

"We think it'll be 50 cents on the dollar-and we hope so-but at this point that's just a guess," the state auditor said.

"In a way, it seems not so good to guess at it because it's just flat not possible to make a guess until we know more," Cavness added. "I think it'll be a month yet before any intelligent guess can be made." Cavness said he couldn't com-
