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## Our Stand On Schools

We are happy to hear from John R. Young, one of our readers, who has chosen to take issue with us respecting our stand on government education.

We are always glad to hear from persons either who. ogree or disagree with us. When we hear from those who agree, we know that they have had similar experiences and have drawn similar conclusions to ours. When we hear from those who disagree, we like to check our conclusions against theirs to see if we are being consistent with the principles enunciated by the Ten Commandments, the Golden Rule, and the Declaration of Independence.

When we find we are in error, we hasten to set the record straight. This has happened on occasion, as no human being is ever infallible. When we find, however, that we are not in error, then we renew our faith in the principles we hold to be true and seek ways and means to present our convictions with ever greater clarity so that all may understand.

We have examined Mr. Young's letter with interest and have come to the conclusion that his point of view has been engendered largely by a sense of shock which he must have experienced when he learned through our editorials of the sad plight of our government dominated schools. Rother than investigate himself to ascertain whether our report was accurate or not, he has leaped to defend these same schools. This is a gallant gesture, and worthy of something a little better than our government school system. So we reiterate our position. The use of force and

violence in our government dominated system is bringing all manner of unhappy situations to light. And reader Young may rest assured that the word-"accurately" also applies to our efforts in revealing the truth about what has happened to our schools.

To bring reader Young up to date we would like to suggest that he read carefully the book "Why Johnny Can't Read," by Rudolph Flesch. This has made the best seller lists and is considered by many to be authoritative.

We would also like to recommend a perusal of the John Dewey philosophic studies, so that he may acquaint himself with the fact that government education. in the Dewey concept was a matter of harnessing the educational process to a political objective, so that the students themselves could become useful instruments in remaking society.



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

of "non-grading" and general promotion on the basis of age rather than merit or knowledge. This we know to be true through the accurate and skillful reporting of trained observers who have visited school rooms in the government-dominated schools and written in shocked surprise at what they found. We also know it to be true as a result of our own first-hand experience with a number of Dewey devotees in school rooms all the way from coast to coast.

While these things are so, it is also true that some government schools are worse than others. In some, and only recently, the public clamor of what has been revealed has served to stem a generation's rush toward collectivism. In others, the rush continues.

But the principle point we wish to make is this. We are so heartily and whole-heartedly dedicated to the idea of sound education, that we cannot and will not be silent when we see the government intruding into a field we deem it to have no business in.

We support the separation of church and state. The church has not needed the force and violence of the tax collector, nor the political maneuverings of the politicians in order to sustain itself. It functions on a voluntary basis, as indeed it should. Religion is a personal affair. The state has no business in it.

We maintain that the same principles to be invoked in the gap between church and state apply to school and state. Independent, private schools can face the problem of providing sound and constructive education far better than any school system which has become a pawn and a plaything of bureaucrats whose ambition knows no bounds.

It is because of the political influence in our government schools that so many of them have adopted "progressive" education, collectivist ideas and concepts, and actually go out of their way to preach a dependency upon government and the downfall of free enterprise which is as unpatriotic and un-American as the Communist Internationale. We are not just criticising government schools for the sake of being unpleasant.

We are criticising them because we hope and pray for the day when the American people will wake up to what has been going on in the real red school house, and will demand that politicians, bureaucrats and tax collectors get out of the educational field and stay out.

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
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
