# The Eagle Smiles Too

Great cries of anguish have recently come from the entrenched "right."

Americans have expressed themselves as shocked and distressed that the Eisenhower administration seems to seek the "Geneva spirit" in an effort to smile tooth to tooth across our difficulties with the Soviet. We cannot see any reason for surprise.

We all know that the greatest fear the ruling men of Russia have is that they will be forced out of power. They will stop at nothing to retain their political ascendancy. They must do whatever is necessary to keep the communist party on the throne. To this end they have committed every crime known to man. They live in a state of towering apprehension. The winds of international displeasure could bring on a case of political pneumonia. They must, at all cost, keep their subjects docile and tax-paying.

The Kremlin grizzly is a terrifying beast, we all admit. We shudder when we think of it. We marvel that an American administration will have anything to do with it. But there is no reason to marvel if we will look at the American administration. The problems it faces are precisely those of the Russian cabal of commissars. Those who hold the highest positions in our land are committed to the doctrine that the "party" must stay in power. And, while it is true that in an effort to stay in power, certain inhuman acts are not countenanced, still others are assayed by the boys at the top which could make your blood run cold.

If you doubt this, look at what has happened to men like Martin Dies, Joseph McCarthy, General Douglas MacArthur, Dean Clarence Manion, J. B. Matthews and a host of others who have dared to throw the perfidy of our own paltry leaders squarely in their faces. And what of the persecution of the Manuel Millers? What of the programs of vilification, the lies, the innuendoes, the character assassinations that go on hourly against anyone who dares to suggest that our political masters are dominated by motives other than sweet love

What of the entrenched radicals who inhabit the propaganda arms of the United Nations and the National Education Association?

"Ah," you say, "this may be true. But there is a document that prevents the kind of activities here that admittedly occur in Russia. That document is the Constitution." True. The document is here. But it is violated and by-passed every day. Men are being fired for daring to oppose the communist line. And some have been forced to undergo a sojourn in the maditouse to keep them from revealing the dictatorial tactics of our masters on the Potomac. And their principal offense has been that they depended on the Constitution rather than on the rabble-rousers who seek to make the document

In short, the first chill wind of international adversity may strike to the very marrow in the heads of our entrenched bureaucrats in Washington. They will do anything, almost, to keep the wind away. They must, at whatever cost, keep their subjects docile and tax-paying.

Then where is the vast difference between the Soviet administration of grinning tax collectors, and the Eisenhower coterie of similar propensity? Of course they'll see eye to eye. The only reason the Soviet has taken so long in learning to get along with us was because the men in power over there had read the American Constitution. But where does freedom go, when the eagle folds its wings to roost in the bears lair? How are the rights of the individual to be upheld, when the two greatest political machines the world has ever seen interlock their

When individual freedom and responsibilities are stolen through the use of the big lie; when alleged security can triumph over honor and integrity, what then? A meeting of the minds between these two great powers may prevent an immediate war. But it can do nothing else save expand slavery.

# BETTER JOBS

Patroit Studies Education

I want to continue to quote from a little booklet issued under the heading of "Look, Vigilant Parents, Toward Education!." This little book was written by Everett Tidley Taylor, Post Office Box 78. Diablo, California. A free copy of it can be secured by dropping Mr. Taylor a card.

Mr. Taylor is so interested in education that he has communicated with 1200 people on the subject and his conclusions after this study are presented in this 24page pamphlet.

Since our spiritual and material well-being largely depends on the kind of education the youth is exposed to, I can think of no more important subject than citizens getting a better understanding of what education is and what we are getting in government schools. From here on Mr. Taylor is speak-

"In the consideration of extremes, we would have, on the one hand, all phases of education governed by law. Parents would be required to send their children to school whether they wished to or not; and to pay for the support of schools, whether they could afford the tax burden-and other sacrifices-or not. In this extreme, teachers would be required by law to have certain qualifications, to work for certain wages, for a certain period of time, and where required. In this extreme, children would be required by law to attend school for a certain number of years, to take certain courses of study from certain textbooks and in certain schools. It is apparent that the United States has not yet reached this extreme, but may be approaching it.

"The Supreme Court decision requiring desegregation of schools in the South may well be an example of what will happen under an extreme rule of educational law. The decision piles a drastic Federal law on top of numerous state educational laws. Now will some parents rebel by taking their children out of the government schools? Will voters rebel by voting down bond issues and school taxes? Will some teachers withdraw to do other work, and others lose their jobs because there will not be funds to pay their salaries? Will students vandalize the government schools until they are desolate ruins? Will extremist whites and blacks destroy each other over this law-created issue?

"Clearly no law can force parents to like a situation they abhor: no law can make teachers effective as teachers; no law can make children study their lessons. Education under legal compulsion simply will not work.

"In the opposite extreme, parents-even parents of the animal kingdom-have the instinct to make personal sacrifices to educate their young, and no law can increase this natural instinct. Some teachers enjoy teaching and have the gift of inspiring children to learn; but many persons, even though highly educated themsleves, do not have this gift. No law can make a teacher more effective. In this extreme, some children have the instinct to acquire book knowledge; others would rather work with their hands. No law can make a child learn anything. In this extreme, the hard work and sacrifices of Nancy Lincoln and the ambition of Abe Lincoln made him, as evidenced by the Gettysburg Address, the most literate man of his day. This extreme declares that education, like religion, demands the exercise of free con-

"Comparing the emotional arguments in favor of educational laws with the extremes of education law, we see that they are not consistent with each other. The emotional desire that everybody should be highly educated brings forth the hope that this can be legislated into reality. However, extreme consideration indicates that a system of laws which attempts to bring this about does, instead, bring the exact reverse.

"On the other hand, the emotional arguments against educational laws are consistent with the extreme natural attitudes of human nature. Parents instinctively provide at least some education for their children who, in turn, have the natural desire to acquire knowledge. These instincts are consistent with the extreme that human ambition is the motive force to education and that conscience is and must be free. These natural instincts and these extremes are consistent, practical, workable, proven.

"The conclusion therefore is: There shall be no law respecting

RESPONSIBILITY DISCLAIMED (The Wall Street Journal)

Foundations which grant funds for research purposes with no strings attached will have a ready answer for those who wonder why some control over the way the money is spent is not retained by

the donors. The reply, of course, is that research is a search for truth and that to direct the paths of the research may be to let truth remain undiscovered, or even to violate it. Yet other questions occur which are not so easily answered. When the experimenters use the wrong methods to ascertain truth, are the researchers alone responsible? Or are the foundations, which are

tax-free, accountable to the public for the transgressions? Wichita jury cases, The Ford Foundation granted a sum of money to the law school of the University of Chicago to finance studies of commercial arbitration, the income tax law and the jury system. On their face these projects certainly had the look of

worthwhile subjects for research. But it was not long before the study of the jury system became a study of juror behaviorism. Microphones were hidden in jury rooms in five cases in the Wichita Federal Courthouse and the deliberations of the jurors were surreptitiously recorded. That this was done with the consent of the judges and lawyers involved is neither explanation por mitigation for the violence done to the jury system and thus to our system of justice.

The right to trial by jury is a Constitutional cornerstone in that system but it would be a meaningless one if the deliberations now conducted in privacy were conducted in public. No one but the jurors have any right to listen in on their assessment of the evidence. The dangers in any other course are obvious.

This particular study - more sociological than legal in its wiretapping aspects - has justly caused a great deal of citicism of the judges who permitted it, the lawyers who condoned it and the professors who conducted it. Also it has caused criticism of

the Ford Foundation, though the institution disclaims knowledge of the course the experiment was to take. But the fact that the Foundation provided the funds used for eavesdropping on Federal juries cannot be disclaimed. Certainly the general public will

hold foundations responsible for grants used in irresponsible ways, And unless the foundations themselves assume a responsibility for seeing that their grants are not misused, the unfortunate result doubtless will be that the Government will assume it for them.

For a foundation can no more disclaim responsibility where legal research is used for tampering with the jury system than it could if some irresponsible people used its funds for research into structural engineering by blowing up some public bridges.


