





Crooked Books

There's an editorial writer for Farm and Ranch magazine called Tom Anderson who writes under a byline called "Straight Talk." In this day of slanted journalism, Anderson, who hails from the Tennessee Valley, has delivered himself of a fine, honest piece in the August issue of his magazine.

It takes courage for a man in the midst of TVAdominated territory to square off against the giant socialist bureaucracy there, but that's exactly what Anderson has done. And he brings out some information which is worthy of deep study by those of us who live in other valleys the socialist have sworn to rule.

TVA is making extravagant claims about the amount of money it saves electricity users in the valley. For the year just ending June 30, TVA says it has saved \$70,000,000 for the people of the valley. What is actually meant by this figure is that \$70,000,000 was put up by the good people of Texas, and New York, and Idaho and California so that the residents of Tennessee can get electricity with a part of the bill paid in advance. Anderson puts it: "The Tennessee river flows through three states and drains the other A

A 500-kilowatt hour monthly power bill in a Nashville home is \$6.90. In Asheville, North Carolina, over the border from TVA, the same amount of current would cost \$9.00. A Nashville merchant would pay \$78 for 6,000 kilowatt hours. One in Atlanta would pay \$163 for the same number of hours.

Of course these figures, taken out of context, establish the principal argument in favor of TVA. By using those figures Tennessee politicians expound the theory that government can provide cheaper power than private power companies, But why just power? Why not automobiles? And groceries? And trips to Europe? Why not, in fact, ask the government to take over everything, guarantee everyone an annual wage and every business man an annual profit?

The reason the governmen't can't do it for anything, INCLUDING POWER, is because the government keeps a crooked set of books and doesn't tell the truth about the real cost of operating TVA, If TVA figured its costs the same way the government forces private power companies to figure their books, and if TVA paid only 3 per cent interest on the money it borrowed to get started, it would have already lost \$169,-

Private power companies pay \$750,000,000 in federal and local taxes. TVA pays no federal taxes and only about \$3,400,000 in local taxes. If TVA paid taxes the same way Southern Bell Telephone pays them in the same territory it would be putting out more than \$76,000,000. Instead of a profit it would be operating in

This means it actually IS operating in the red, and by juggling figures, avoiding interest payments and skipping out on taxes, it can be made to look as though TVA customers are getting something cheaper than it

The fallacy of permitting government to operate any kind of business should be apparent. The solution in Tennessee is to turn the TVA over to private operation as quickly as possible. The solution in Texas and elsewhere is to be warned in time and not permit our government schemers to extend their foothold in the power business in these United States.

dlai Stevenson was in his best form the other evening at the University of Texas. That is to say, he charmed the ill informed among his listeners into the belief that he is far sighted as well as modest and candid. Mr. Stevenson would like the voters to believe that in these respects as well as in the goodness of his heart he stands apart from all leading Republicans and above all his rivals the Democratic nomination.

He was talking about economic policy. He was troubled about the current situation. He invited his listeners to regard him as one of the far sighted few who believe that enduring prosperity is preferable to a transitory boom.

Now in truth, Mr. Stevenson isn't lone or even in a minority when he professes to fear the bust that usually follows a boom. That kind f talk is commonplace among politicians until they have to do sething about checking an exding economy. Then the honest conscientious among them favor the necessary defiationary steps despite the certainty that fewjobs and falling prices will cost me votes. At the same time, the p politician immediately foreverything he ever said about ed to check a boom and demeelf wholly to denouncing ess of the monsters this wholly unneces-

iction upon the land.

Stevenson protested against the irresponsible behavior of his party. If its advice had been taken, the boom which disturbs Mr. Stevenson today would be altogether out of hand.

Mr. Stevenson's professed concern about the boom did not lead him the other evening to commend the Eisenhower administration for the measures it has taken in recent months to restrain the economy, such as the raising of the rediscount rate, the increased margin requirements, and the higher down payments on homes. Perhaps Mr. Stevenson thinks that more stringent measures are required, but he neglected to mention them. Would he have balanced the budget as most Republicans and some Democrats like Sen. Byrd have recommended? If so, it is odd that he did not exert his influence toward budget balancing when Congress was in session.

Danger Of Organizing

In many cities Community Chests have been taken over by what is known as "United Funds." When one goes into the way Community Chest and United Funds operate, one begins to see the truth of the statement that "an idea can not be organized." This statement was made by Henry Jackson in his introduction to The Thomas Jefferson Bible.

The result of attempt to organize an idea is to kill it and the truth of that statement seems to be borne out by the Community Chest's attempt to organize charity. The Community Chest organization is really killing charity. Now let's analyze the method used by Community Chests and see

why it is bound to kill charity. The plan the Community Chest operates under is to get different non-profit agencies into the organization and require them to agree that any contributions they receive over and above what is allotted to them by the Chest bureaucracy will be shared with all other agencies. A committee appointed by the Community Chest determines how much of the total raised each year is given to each agency. The agency has to agree to this and promise to report to the Chest any additional gifts it

Even if a contributor to the Chest does not want to contribute to one agency but wants to help another agency, he is in reality prevented from doing this. The Chest evasively tells the donor that he can specify what agency his gift is to go to. What the Chest does not tell the donor is that his specifying an agency does not increase what the agency receives. This is done by diverting other gifts from the agency specified to the agencies the donor does not want to assist. Thus, when a donor makes a gift, he helps the agency that he believes is not rendering a service to mankind. Thus the Chest fakes away from the giver his right to help the agency grow that he believes

The growth of each agency is determined not by the donors of charity but by the agency's ability to persuade the Chest committee dividing the funds to increase its share. The real donors have nothing to say as to what agency should grow. In other words, the Community Chest monopolizes charity, and monopolies always interfere with development of character and the sentiments that go with charity. This monopoly, of course, tends to deaden the initiative of the heads of the various agencies attempting to render service to the community and also tends to kill the pleasure that comes from giving when the giver hears that his gift does not increase the service he wants in-

When one analyzes the motives back of the promotors of the Community Chest, one is inclined to draw the conclusion that the real purpose of the Chest is to protect the cowardly business man so he is not obliged to give as much to charity as he would if he was not protected by the Community Chest. This protection is not needed by any business man who believes in liberty. The business man who doesn't have convictions strong enough so that he can say to a request that he does not believe in should go broke. He should not be protected from giving by the Community Chest. Thus organizing the idea of charity reduces charity just as organized monopoly education has greatly reduced education. And as Henry Jackson pointed out in his introduction in The Thomas Jefferson Bible, that organized christianity has retarded the under-

standing of what he calls the "undiscovered book." He observes: The religion of Jesus is an idea, a sentiment, a creative principle, an attitude to life. It is no more possible to organize it, with out defeating its purpose, than it is to organize the sunshine with out making it unwholesome." The way to kill an idea is to organize it and attempt to make

it a monopoly.





lic schools. It was the second state high tribunal in the South to take a stand on the side of the U.S. Supreme Court which ruled May 17, 1954 that Negroes may not be kept, out of heretofore white-

The Texas Supreme Court ruled last week that state segregation laws were unconstitutional and that state money could be used to finance integrated schools.

A lot of things could happen in Germany before then. One of them might be the emergence of Strasser as a power in German politics. at the head of a strong nationalistic party.

Strasser a menace

That would be bad news. Strasser is a menace. He is an unreconstructed Nazi even though he broke with Hitler in 1930. He is an excellent organizer. He has as material the always strong, if now relatively inactive, spirit of German nationalism.

Strasser announced the formation of his new party at a time when it is plain West Gormany is going to have some serious problems. They are problems which will cause the Western Allies anxiety.

One is the health of 79-year-olds Adenauer, now starting a long convalescence after an attack of pneumonia. As long as Adenauer is alive and functioning. West Germany is in safe hands. If anything happened to him, West Germany might be plunged into political

Times of chaos bring men like Strasser and Hitler to the fore. Strasser is 58, heavily built, with a big egg-shaped head the forehead of which is becoming steadily higher as he gets balder, and a deceptively mild appearance.

Strasser started out as a socialist. He met Hitler in 1920 through his elder brother Gregor, and be came a Nazi leader. He broke with Hitler in 1930.

Disagreed Over Socialism The break came not because

Strasser disagreed with Hitler's nationalistic and expansionist policies or his anti-Semitism. The of ficial name of the Nazi organization was the National Socialist German Workers Party, Strasser complained that the "socialist" part was being forgotten.

Otto Strasser fled to Czechoslo vakia after Hitler got into power in 1933, Gregor was murdered in the blood purge of June 30, 1934. Otto was deprived of his German citizenship on Nov. 3, 1934.
