



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Carries Warning

The report carried recently in the Whirligig column by Ray Tucker on the pro-Communist attack against the McCarran Internal Security Law is another link in the chain of evidence that pressure groups are constantly at work against the traditional American form of government.

Tucker says some of the activities of those who have signed the document attacking the constitutionality of the law. But apparently there are behind-the-scenes angles not reported in the daily press wires of the story. So far as can be learned, only one newspaper, the Catholic Tablet of Brooklyn, a notably anti-Communist publication, carried the full list of names of the signers. On the other hand, the New York Times, which often devotes many pages to publishing a full and detailed report of Washington activities, carried "only a few sticks" of type on the story and printed only nine names of signers. The New York Herald Tribune carried only 13 names and the Daily Worker, the Communist mouthpiece, carried 67. As Tucker points out in his column, there were 360 "notable" names signed to the document,

A breakdown of the list also is of interest. Of the signers there were 94 ministers and rabbis, 87 educationists and 23 physicians. One signer was Sen. Pat McNamara, Michigan Democrat. Another signer has the same name as James W. Ford who twice ran with Earl Browder as candidate for Vice President on the Communist ticket. A Ford by that name was prominent in advising and stirring up the bonus army evicted from Washington in 1932 by military forces commanded by "Doug" MacArthur and his aide, a young fellow known as "Ike" Eisenhower.

It is unfortunate that newspapers in many parts of the country will never be given a full and detailed report on such a story, either for the information of the editor or for general consumption. There is a constant cry of "no space" by the wire services out of Washington and New York "because we must be competitive" but when an opportunity arises for one service to be really competitive and provide something another doesn't it is overlooked. We have written to the Tablet in Brooklyn for a -copy of their story on the matter and hope to be able to report on it later.

Two New Ideas To Me

I want to pass on a couple of new ideas that recently entered my cranium. They are not original. I got the ideas from reading. One I got from reading "The Free Trader" magazine, published in London, the only free trade magazine issued in the world.

In this magazine there was an article on "God and The Frontiers" by the Bishop of Berlin (D. Dr. Otto Dibelius.) The article had a summary of his ser-

On Wars

The article states: "The time has come for the people of all nations to be ready for new ways of thinking, for a real inspiration. To each human being God has given the right to live and to work where he wishes to do so, the right to speak his mother tongue, to live his traditional way of life, to educate his children as he wishes along with others of the same way of thinking."

Notice the Doctor emphasises the fact that one of the causes of war is a fear of a conquering government educating their children in a way the parents do not like. As the Doctor says, that if each person had the right "to educate his children as he wishes along with others of the same way of thinking," to work where he wishes to speak his own tongue and to live his traditional way of life, then the citizens would not be so concerned as to what gov ernment he had.

In other words, if we did not have the welfare state, which includes "educating" children, we wouldn't be so concerned as to be willing to sacrifice life to determine what government should pro-

tect our lives and property. What Weakens Government A second idea was what is certain to weaken a just government.

I'd often heard it said that when government attempted to do things foreign from what its original purpose was, that doing so weakened the government in its ability to perform the desired service. I never had this really made clear to me entirely until I read an essay by Herbert Spencer on a limited government.

He made it very plain how a just government can be weakened whose purpose is to protect men's lives and property; that is to give each individual a monopoly on his own life - no more, no less; to attempt to see that each and every person gets all he produces - no more, no less. And that, it seems to me is all that a just government should try to do, and was the original purpose of our Founding Fathers.

Now lets see how departing from these aims not only weakens but absolutely makes it impossible for a government to fulfill these purposes. If the government's aim is to protect each and every man's life and property, then if the gov ernment starts any phase of the welfare state and uses aggresbenefit another, then it is not capable of protecting that man's property from which it takes to benefit

As an example: When the govcannot protect everybody's property. It can only "educate" violating the original purpose of the government. And the more it attempts to benefit or help one person at the expense of someone else, the weaker the government becomes as far as the original purpose was concerned, and the more it becomes a plunderer and legalized robber rather than a protector of men's lives and prop-

A legalized robber cannot protect the private property of those

crates. The exports from the Allied sectors of Berlin are mostly electrical devices, whose manufacture is one of the principal industries of our side of Berlin, and fine machinery. On the return trip the rucks haul in food, gasoline, oil, light - weight culvert and sewer pipe, and even liquid concrete for the amazing rehabilitation of the flattened city. Twenty thousand new habitations will be finished this year. The total for 1954 was 18.000. Back in 1949 the total was

only 3,500. There are only 110,000 unem ployed in West Berlin now, an all-time low, taking the post war period as "all-time," and 798,500 people are working at pay-jobs. About 106,000 more are self-employed as lawyers and doctors. Of course there is a constant but changing load of refugees from East Germany and the Soviet sector of Berlin but 96 per cent of the qualified "emigres" are flown out to West Germany as soon as they are cleared. Skepticism is necessary because the enemy naturally has sent in some agents with tales

West Germany, that is the federal republic, pays 85 per cent of the cost of supporting these people while they are in Berlin, and flying them out. The Republic can stand this without great strain because the Ruhr and Hamburg and the western farming industry are busting with prosperity and energy. There are only 500,000 unemployed in a population of 50 million. They are paying off their indemnities to the Sovereign state of Israel and to other claimants, with fascinating nonchalance. However, the prosperity of Western Germany is a topic which wil not be capsuled

into one paragraph here. German cars using the autobahn pay \$3.75 each way for the trip across the lost province. The buses pay 25 Marks which includes toll for eight passengers and a little less than two Marks more for each additional passenger. Trucks up to four tons pay from 20 to 45 Marks for 200 kilometers and trucks over 50 tons pay 80 Marks. The tribute on railway traffic is roughly equivalent, although different, of course in detail. There are variations and schedules but my only effort here is to indicate the size of the burden which the enemy has imposed on a city which was demolished by our bombers. FUNNY BUSINESS IN A FUND (Chicago Daily Tribune)

The so-called Fund for the Republic, a 15 million dollar offshoot of the Ford Foundation, masterminded by those waning geniuses, Paul Hoffman and Robert M. Hutchins, has been caught in another massive publication called "Bibliography of the Communist Problem in the United States" which was compiled and distributed at fund

The Hoffman - Hutchins outfit has been called sharply to account for the strange imbalance of its entries in this bibliography. Some of the best qualified writers on communism are either not listed at all or are inadequately represent-

One critic. John A. Sessions. writing in the New Leader, states, "Bibliographies have one important purpose - to direct future research workers to the most significant available materials. This bibliography, should it become a standard library reference item, could only have the opposite effect -that is, to direct future research workers away from some of the most telling indictments of communist techniques."

Harking to the outcry against their lopsided treatment, the professors who were recruited draw up the bibliography say that they will revise it. But a guestion remains - why the Fund for the Republic, with a large budget allocated to a supposed objective study of communism, always contrives to wind up on the anti-anticommunist side.

This is not the first of the funny things it has done. It was recently discovered that the fund had hired as press agent a person who had resorted to the 5th amendment when congressional investigators asked him if he were a Communist. At the same time, it was learned that the fund had taken on the former boss of the American Communists, Earl Browder, as an expert consultant and informant on communism, altho Browder has never forsworn his allegiance to Moscow and always represents the Communist party as an innocent vehicle of social reform and economic change.

It takes a considerable degree of cooperation from even the mos naive to swallow Browder's story, but the Fund for the Republic has no difficulties in accommodating itself to his views, just as it has had no trouble drawing up a bibliography that points in the wrong direction. These are only a few of the odder performances of this tax free outfit which justify the recent observation of the former commander of the American Legion that he would have no truck

Similarly, Arthur H. Dean, former law partner of Secretary of State Dulles, quit the fund's board of directors the other day in a dispute over policy. 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
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
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
