

Legion Action

The left-wingers and one-worlders have received a considerable setback as the result of the recommendation of the American Legion convention condemning UNESCO and asking for an investigation of the organiza-

Not that such action on the part of the legionnaires means that the fight against this insidious organization is won - far from it. Having watched for some time the manner in which those fostering such organizations and ideas operate, we feel certain that there will be no resting on the oars by those who are determined to undermine American sovereignty and bring this nation into a world government operated along the lines of

Quite properly, the American Legion asked for the first step that can be taken: the abolishment of the United States National Commission for UNESCO. This is an American commission set up by and approved by the President who appoints the members of the commission. This can, and should be abolished.

Actually, there is no way in which the United States can abolish the United Nations Educational Scientific and Cultural Organization which is an agency of the United Nations. Nor can the United States abolish the UN. We can, however, withdraw our membership in the UN and refuse to support the UN in any way. Such action on the part of this country would virtually spell the end of the United Nations for it could not exist if the United States did not support it.

The Legion gave strength to its resolution by declaring that no Legion representative would be sent to any UNESCO session, thereby lending support, and called upon Congress to investigate whether UNESCO is "interfering" with educational systems in this country.

Such an investigation, of course, would really be window-dressing since the record is fully documented and known. Followers of UNESCO from its inception have determined to force their philosophy into American (and possibly other) schools. They were successful for instance in obtaining \$500,000 American taxpayer dollars to pay for a "study" and rewriting of American history so that it would not find itself in conflict with the ideas of the one-worlders. In Los Angeles there was, until a great storm was made, direct teaching of UNESCO philosophy which tended to undermine a belief in traditional Amer-

It is cheering, therefore, to those Americans who have been battling UNESCO and other agencies of the United Nations to see that the fight has been so successfully won in the ranks of the American Legion. It gives encouragement and hope that other organizations of similar patriotic intentions will follow the lead of the legionnaires and make similar condemnation of UNESCO and in part bring about a more critical scrutiny of the entire United Nations set-up.

Getting the UN out of the US and the US out of the UN is certainly not the solution to all of the problems that beset America today. But it would indicate that a trend has been started that would move us in the direction of more and more freedom for Americans and away from the "road ahead" toward eventual Socialism and Communism.

Cheering, too, was the demand by the Legion that an Investigation of all tax-exempt foundations be carried on fully and quickly.

This demand was made all the more timely with the disclosures that the Fund for the Republic, a Ford Foundation baby, is involved in a new scandal. This one involves a report that three weeks after

he refused to tell a Senate Internal Security subcommittee whether he ever had been a Communist, a one-time newspaperman joined the administrative staff of the controversial Fund for the Republic. He is Amos Landman, of New York City, who was

among those named as members of a Communist cell by Winston Burdett, Columbia Broadcasting System commentator who confessed that he was a former spy for the Soviet government.

Landman took the Fifth Amendment a score of times in two appearances before the Senate committee. At the time he was publicity director for the National Municipal League which fired him forthwith.

Landman's employment with the Fund for the Republic was confirmed by W. H. Ferry, the Fund's vice president, who said that the job was "temporary" and would end Nov. 1

Landman, a former reporter on the notoriously pro-Communist paper "PM," now defunct, was one of the most defiant of those accused by Burdett.

It was interesting to note the viewpoint of Ferry vice president of the Fund for the Republic, who calmly admitted that the officers of the Fund knew that Landman had tried to hide behind the Fifth Amendment but that "this fact alone did not appear to the officers sufficient reason to bar him from temporary employ-

With such a viewpoint publicly expressed, it is little wonder that more and more people, including members of the American Legion, are looking critically at all such organizations as the Fund for the Republic.





BETTER JOBS By R. C. HOILES

The Primary Tyranny I recently talked to the Sertoma

Club on the subject of the primary tyranny. It is not a pleasant subject to talk about nor to write about but we cannot reduce tryan-

Most of our trouble comes from persons who regard themselves. and are generally rated, as honest and good American citizens. To the degree that we reduce tyranny, to that degree will we have more freedom, more honesty, more character, goodwill, peace, production and

a higher standard of wing. It seems reasonable that the above statement is correct. For this reason we should not hesitate discussing an unpopular subject, even though some people might think they are hurt. But no one is really injured by having special privileges or his act of tyranny taken away from him. He himself is a slave to this tyranny or

these special privileges.

As an 85-year-old friend of mine, Charles T. Sprading, in his book on Equal Freedom, said, "A hampered thought is worthless. To get the truth the speaker must be unafraid. Speech controlled by fear is of no value to the hearer." That means that we should have free trade in ideas. And we do not have free trade in ideas when any individual is forced to subsidize ideas that he thinks are harmful. Those individuals that practice free trade in ideas develope intelligently, ethically and spiritually much faster than those that do not freely exchange ideas.

What Is Primary Tyranny The idea that government schools are a primary tyranny was not original with me. I first read it in a statement made by Rose Wilder Lane. She contended that government schools are the pri-

mary tyrany. Who is Rose Wilder Lane? She is an author of note. She wrote "Give Me Liberty," "Let The Hurricane Roar," and "Discovery of Freedom." She is not a slouch writer. She paid income tax one year of \$65,000 as a professional writer. She is a keen student of the American Government. She knows what the Founding Fathers intended the American Government to be. She knows that the government officials are the agents of the individual citizen, not their masters. For this reason, during the war, she did not even ask the government for ration cards. She did without ration cards during the war. So statements of a woman of this character should be worthy of consideration.

Another student of history and of ethics is Isabel Paterson, who wrote "The God of the Machine. Avn Rand said this book was the greatest book published in the last 400 years. Ayn Rand is the author of "Fountainhead." She sold the rights of it for \$50,000,00 Isabel Paterson contended that government schools was "tyranny naked." She put it this way: There can be no greater stretch of arbitrary power than is required to seize children from their parents, teach them whatever the authorities decree they shall be taught, and expropriate from the procedure. If this principle really parents the funds to pay for the is not understood, let any parent holding a positive religious faith consider how it would seem to him if his children were taken by force and taught an opposite creed, Would he not recognize tyranny

It is difficult to imagine any thing more tyrannical than to take away from a parent as many of the States are doing, the parent's right to educate his children the way he believes they should be educated. What most people do not see is that the government's permitting a parent to send his child to a non - government school and being the final judge of whether that school is qualified, gives the state a complete monopoly on education. They can withdraw this permit any time they see fit. And undoubtedly the only reason they do not withdraw it is because they are yet afraid of the protests that would come from honest, con-

scientious, Christian parents. To give the state the exclusive authority to tell what is education is putting the state above God. It is putting aggressive force

It is hard for me to imagine anything more tyrannical than the state using aggressive force to mold the minds of the youth of the land contrary to what the loving parents want their children to



After the hearing, the board will decide whether to "cancel, revoke or suspend" the licenses of the osteopaths and doctor.


Dulles, Tito Want Satellites Freed

laration by Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and Marshal Tito of Yugoslavia that the Soviet satellites should be freed may anger the Kremlin, it was believed Monday.

Dulles flew to Yugoslavia and conferred with the Yugoslav president for seven hours on the Adriatic island of Brioni. They issued a "common accord" calling for independence for the satellite

Diplomatic observers here said Tito's main idea was believed to be to have Communist states independent from Russia-as is Yugoslavia. However, neither defined the meaning of the word "independent" and neither went into

specific detail. But his statement came on the eve of the October revolution which first brought communism to Russia and was expected to cause anger in the Soviet Union. In formed sources said the Soviet Union always denied Russia was the 'boss' of the satellites and would find itself in a difficult position use of Tito's demands.

Court Downs More Racial **Barriers**

WASHINGTON -UP- The Supreme Court struck down more racial barriers Monday. It ruled Prairie Dr. that racial segregation in public parks, swimming pools and golf ourses is unconstitutional.

The high tribunal also invalidated a section of the 1950 Military Code of Justice that allows the armed forces to arrest and try Dean Dr. a veteran after his discharge to civilian life for a serious crime committed while serving in uniform overseas.

In still another major action, the court refused to review a lower ville ourt's ruling that it is unconstitu ional for the government to bar Duncan members of alleged subversive groups from federal low rent housing projects.


