

Pagent Wants Jails

Since the problem of juvenile delinquency is still with us, Pageant magazine has shoved aside some of its cheesecake and printed a provocative piece entitled 'Time to Punish Delinquent Parents?" The item appears in the October issue. Hugh Sherwood is listed as the

Pageant should stick to cheesecake.

Sherwood, instead of presenting an unbiased and objective view of the problem, flings a gauntlet in the face of his reader by suggesting boldly: "Many authoritles on juvenile delinquency feel that parents should be held criminally responsible for the acts of their children." While admitting that JD is a growing problem, and while quoting from a number of eminent persons whose jobs tend to bring them in contact with wayward youngsters, the author reduces the "many" to three.

Justice Wilfred A. Waltemade of New York City's Domestic Relations Court, who in a fit of petulance sentenced three parents to jail on one Friday afternoon; Roger A. Pfaff, Los Angeles Municipal Court judge who is quoted as saying: "Make parents criminally responsible for the criminal acts of their children," and Justice Matthew J. Diserio, also of New York, who apparently doesn't really want to send parents to jail but would would like to scare them into thinking that is where they are going.

Of the three only Pfaff wants to perform that interesting legal maneuver of punishing a person who may be guilty of a sin of OMISSION by holding him responsible for the sin of COMMISSION of another.

To give Pageant due credit, the magazine also printed a letter from Judge William B. McKesson, presiding judge of Los Angeles Juvenile Court, who utters the most sane and sensible words with respect to the problem when he says: "I am apposed to the theory that criminal responsibility for acts of children can be imputed to adults. If a parent is to be criminally punished it should be for the parent's crime and not the child's delinquent conduct. If the parent has contributed to the delinquency of the minor, certainly the parent should be punished. But that is an entirely different matter than punishing parents because their children are delinquent."

However, the article by Sherwood brushes off the logic and argument of Judge McKesson and pumps valiantly for some way to send parents to jail.

Now, If the editors of Pageant magazine and Mr. Hugh Sherwood want to perform a real service, they might spend a little additional space in some upcoming issue revealing that: 1. Since policemen cannot seem to make delinquent juveniles toe the line, it is unlikely that unarmed parents can do much better; 2. That JD springs from a vast feeling of insecurity in the child which insecurity is fostered by our government schools with their emphasis on group thinking, crowd culture, and mass popularity, and their de-emphasis on true morality; individual worth and the spirit of competition; 3. That children learn by example, not only from their parents but from the government. And in this latter case they quickly observe that the compulsions of government tend to make parents evasive, fearful and unctuous. Since these are far from admirable traits, the children learn to disrespect their parents, even as their parents have learned to have disrespect for the law.

If Pageant would help solve the problem of JD, let it: 1. Work to expand private and independent schools so that government coercion is taken out of education; 2. Work to reduce the size and scope of our federal government, thereby freeing the people of the United States, and 3. Let it adopt the philosophy of individual liberty so that self-relience, self-responsibility and integrity can become a regular portion of its contents.

THE NATION'S PRESS

THE LEGION AND UNESCO (The Wall Street Journal)

There is current a great deal of criticism of the American Legion for condemning Unesco on the versive" educational activities. There is, quite possibly, some

room for criticism of the Legion itself for adopting the censorial resolution without debate on a special committee report which last spring said Unesco was not harmful. But even Legion critics admit that a debate would not have changed the temper of the delegates; the Legion twice before has gone on record as opposed to Unesco. The parliamentary maneuvers are thus beside the important question. That question is, why is the Legion opposed to Unesco?

The agency's very name United Nation's Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization-marks it as a group with a mission which, if it is to be successful, must engage in propaganda.

Well, any organization that engages in propaganda to sell itself immediately invites counter-propaganda. Unesco has issued manuals for teachers and guides for the revision of textbooks. Half a dozen organizations are busy selling Unesco and its proposals to the public. It is no wonder, then, that opposition has developed in a naon where in a gathering of any ten of its people there is likely to be some debate about whether t looks like rain.

Indeed, it is not difficult to unerstand the Legion's opposition to stands in the way of fuller

world understanding. The Legion is composed of veterans who fought for this nation in a number of wars and who are thus disciplined to see in nationalism and patriotism the same dangers advocates of world government see.

One of Unesco's purposes is, of course, to promote sympathy for the United Nations as well as for its own proposals by avowing its intention to go to work on the "minds of men." This also is propaganda, and it also invites the expression of some opposite views.

Anyone the least bit familiar with Unesco's objectives knows that it is engaged in many different controversial fields, and that its programs have met with a lot of opposition. The Economist of London not so long back observed that "Unesco started life eight years ago with the fixed idea that it must have a finge: in almost every conceivable pie . . . and the impression has inevitably been created that it is no more than a happy hunting ground for

The American Legion thinks Unesco is more than that. But each of the views certainly acknowled edges that the agency is imbued with a rather active missionary spirit in a way that is certain to inspire active criticism.

Just now the Legion is being attacked quite bitterly by some people who are convinced that Unesco and the UN are the only answers to all the problems of the world. That, of course, is their privilege; but it is also the privilege of the Legion to say it thinks Unesco is frying to settle the problems in the wrong way.

"Do we not continually hear them quote Blackstone's assection that 'no subject of England can be constrained to pay any aids or taxes even for the defense of the realm or the support of the government, but such as we imposed by his own consent, or that of his representative in parliament?' And what does this mean? It means say they, that every man should have a vote. True: but it means much more. If there is any sense in words it is a distinct enuncia tion of the very right now contended for. In affirming that a man may not be taxed unless he has directly or indirectly given his consent, it affirms that he may refuse to be so taxed; and to refuse to be taxed, is to cut all connection with the state. Perhaps it will be said that this consent is not specific, but a general one, and that the citizen is understood to have assented to everything his representatives may do, when he voted for him. But suppose he did not vote for him; and on the contrary did all in his power to get elected some one holding opposite views -what then? The reply will probably be that, by taking part in such an election, he tacitly agreed to abide by the decision of the majority. And how if he did not vote at all? Why then he cannot justly complain of any tax, seeing that he made no protest against its imposition. So, curious ly enough, it seems that he gave his consent in whatever way he acted-whether he said yes, whether he said no, or whether he remained neuter! A rather awkward doctrine this. Here stands an unfortunate citizen who is asked if he will pay money for a certain proffered advantage; and whether he employs the only means of expressing his refusal or does not employ it, we are told that he practically agrees; if only the number of others who agree is greater than the number of those who dissent. And thus we are introduced to the novel principle that A's consent to a thing is not

determined by what A says, but by what B may happen to say! 'It is for those who quote Blackstone to choose between this absurdity and the doctrine above set forth. Either his maxim implies the right to ignore the state, or it sheer nonsense "6. There is a strange heterogeneity in our political faiths. The time was when a man's faith and his mode of worship were as much determinable by law as his secular acts; and, according to provisions extant in statute-book, are so still, Thanks to the growth of a Protestant spirit, however, we have ignored the state in this matterwholly in theory, and partly in practice. THEY'RE "GUINEA PIG" PIGS-These baby pigs at the Pfizer Agricultural Research Center, near Terre Haute, Ind., are being used for experiments in the new, but fast-growing science of using antiblotics in agriculture and animal husbandry. Ordinarily, the pigs would have received only sow's milk for the first 56 days of life. This results in the loss of about a third of all pigs farrowed, deaths being due to faulty nutrition, diseases passed from the sow and physical injury caused by the sow. Today pigs can the sow and physical injury caused by the sow. Today pigs can be taken away from the sow two to three weeks after birth and given a special "baby food" containing all needed nutrition plus a growth-stimulating antibiotic, such as terramycin. The antipiotic gets the pig to market about 20 per cent faster and guards against disease, such as scours.




