

Los Angeles is no novice in the longhaul water business. In the years 1907 to 1913, it built the Owens River aqueduct and extended it in the 1930's. Later it was prime mover in the 400-mile Colorado River Aqueduct.





languers and owners of businesses are human beings. They are not, as the labor bosses would have us believe, some totally subhuman species, filled with arrogance and greed and without a spark of decency or mercy in their make-up. Yet, it is true, that in the course of building an economical sound America, businessmen have, from time to time, become their own worst enemy. We submit that their failures at certain levels are proof of their very human characteristics, rather than indications of either super or sub mentalities.

We have consistently sought to uphold free enterprise. But it is time that we spoke up against some persons who pose as independent businessmen, who are knowingly or ignorantly engaged in destroying their own

This entire matter was brought to mind the other day when Inland Steel Chairman Clarence Randall, speaking before the American Bankers Association, had a few choice phrases reserved for the men in industry who refuse to abide by the rules which should govern

Said Randall: "Too many men in American industry think of free enterprise as a hunting license, as something they use to get what they want for themselves." Many of them, Randall went on to say, give verbal support to free enterprise while they actually sabotage the very system they pretend to believe in.

"The man who makes the discreet telephone call to a competitor before he puts in the new price is asking for the nationalization, the socialization that he so abhors. So is the man who seeks a government subsidy, a way of getting money out of the government and into his business and not getting caught at it.

Randall even uncorked his scorn for those who favor American bidders over foreign competitors. He opposed "the policy which funnels profits into the hands of certain corporations and certain labor groups. Surely the great corporations can struggle along without a 10 per cent edge over their foreign competitors."

Sounding more and more libertarian in his views Randall gave the back of his hand to "American business which cannot operate without a high protective tarriff. You cannot benefit one segment of the American people by a high protective tariff unless some other segment pays for it. You can restrict the flow of Venezuelan oil to the United States. When you do that, you make all of New England take a higher power cost because its fuel will cost more. The ultimate payoff is with the

men within the free market who "evade their responsibilities." He called for businessmen to voluntarily support "schools, churches, hospitals, which are all a part of the price of doing business." And he praised recent steps taken by a few leading industries in making large direct grants to certain universities which are independent and not on the government's list of tax beneficiaries.

These words from one of the nation's business leaders should be heeded by all and sundry. Free enterprise, when it is totally removed from government restrictions, taxations and controls, will flourish to bring in a world of wonder and accomplishment beyond our fondest

Free enterprise by itself, providing it does not shrug off its responsibilities, can prove more than a match for the old world, collectivized theories of communism and socialism. A world of peace and plenty is possible. Not through any government. Not through the Unifed Nations. But through the free market, where men and women have come of age and accept the responsibilities that rightfully they must assume in doing the things that

America is the great nation it is because of free enterprise. Fear that the free market will fail us is what is responsible for driving many otherwise splendid free enterprisers into the ranks of the protectionists who want to pass a law. It is high time we learned to trust the device which has made us the greatest nation the world

Dependence on government has been relied upon in all past ages because it has been easy to slough off our responsibilities on the self-proclaimed super-men who occupied the chairs of authority. But every time we have done this, collapse and destruction have followed.

Why can't we try freedom this time? It has worked for us amazingly in the past hundred and fifty years. There is NO evidence that it would not work for us in the future, providing we rely on it. Yes, managers and owners are human beings. It is certainly time for them to endorse the free market and be consistent in their support of the competitive system.

### BETTER JOBS

The American Crime Of Crimes I want to comment for several days on the American crime of crimes. I believe the Crime of Crimes in America is to have our youths read books in our govern ment schools that confuse them and help them to believe in any form

I went to the Director of Cur riculum of the Santa Ana, California Board of Education and asked him to tell me what civics book or history book had the largest circulation in high schools in the United States. He said that he believed that "A History of our Country" by David Saville Muzzey was a book more universally used in the high schools than any other book on the subject of history.

History that is really of value to mankind, of necessity must be reduced to some eternal principle of justice. To what is a natural right and responsibility of each and every citizen? In other words. it reduces things as nearly as can be reduced by the mind of man to the first cause of why things

I found nothing in this book that would tend to inculcate and instill in the pupils' minds the fundamental, ethical principle of liberty and justice and the natural rights and responsibilities of man.

I also want to explain that the quotations taken are taken out of context but represent the tenor of the whole book, a form of collectivism. And if a man cannot analyze a book or a sermon or a speech without reproducing the whole thing, it is practically impossible to point errors and contradictions in anything. Invariably when a man is advocating any dishonorable act, if it is pointed out, his usual excuse is that his statements are taken out of con-

It seems to me there is nothing more important than what our children are taught to believe.

The book poses as being objective and being neutral. It has a clever way of using innuendo that this book indoctrinates into the mind of the pupil in a sly manner that young people do not recognize, that there are no eternal principles of justice and that the government is master and not the servant of the individual. Not only young people who read this book but elders who have read it in years past would have to read other authors that carefully explained that there are eiernal principles and that individuals received their liberty at birth and from God rather than from the state as this book would leave the impression to the careless reader.

The above is a pretty severe criticism of a book written by a man who was Professor of History at Columbia University for 15 years. A man who has written many books. He has written one on ethics as a religion. I want to read that book to see the ideologies of a man that wrote such a book as "A History of our Counti

A Free Democracy

At the beginning of the book the author writes a "Letter to High-School Students." In this letter to the high-school students, he tells the pupils that in a few years they will be carrying on our American tradition of a free Democracy, Most everyplace in the book he talks about our government being a Democracy.

On Page 101 he writes: "By securing the independence of the United States it gave this new nation the opportunity to establish the first great Democracy in history and to put to the proof the doctrine that freemen are able to govern - themselves, without the authority of kings, nobles or any other class of 'masters." But a pure Democracy makes the majority the master over each and every individual. I only found one place that he called it a Republic out of the many, many that he calls it a Democracy.

Near the close of the book, on Page 631, after relating how various parties who believed in a limited government had "predicted that the passage of this or that measure would mean the 'downfall of the Republic,' he writes: And still the Republic endures." But he never defines Republic or

What is the youth of the land to believe; that the United States is a Democracy where the majority have no respect for the natural rights of the individual or that this is a Republic? And a Republic is not, as is so often claimed, simply a representative government where the representatives can enslave the individual by representing the majority, but it is a government that respects the eternal, natural rights of every individual by not attempting to do anything that each and every individual does not, himself, have a God-given right to do. And if this be the proper interpretation of a Republic, then the United States has gone far afield from putting into practice the ideologies of a Republic



A NEW DREAM FOR THE SOUTH

(The Daily Oklahoman)

An amazing and inspiring message to southern states was given Thursday, Oct. 20, by Dr. Frank S. Soday, president of the Southern Association of Science and Industry. Dr. Soday is vice president Chemstrand Corporation. His address was given to the Southern Conference of Governors.

Space forbids adequate summation of his statements, but they reveal the fact that the south is confronted by a dream and challenge probably unequalled in the history of any land. Here are just a few of the in-

The South's proportion of the ration's manufacturing facilities has increased from 9 percent in 1900 to nearly 25 percent in 1955, To realize the magnitude of this achievement it is necessary to take a close view of the enormous industrial manifestations of the northern states, which have had a head start of nearly 250 years.

Today the South has approximately 15,000 manufacturing establishments that employ 50 or more workers. Its industrial output has increased from \$11 billion in

If the majority of U. S. laboring people actually wanted the so called oenefit and protection of union membership," they would have joined some union of their own free will long ago. The fact that the powerful pressures that have been put upon them to "persuade" them to join, proves conclusively that they prefer freedom to the dubious benefits of union membership. But now an official of the U.S. government blandly announces that the new big union is going to organize them anyway. If this is not potential dictatorship, what is it? And, if we do not fear it enough to fight it to a standstill, how much longer can we expect to retain our cherished American lib-


