'Emigrants' team together again in 'Zandy's Bride'

BIG SUR, Calif. — (NEA) — At the edge of the sea, where the meadow ended in a cliff leading down to the rocky coast, they were shooting a movie called "Zandy's Bride." It looked like a great place to work.

"It's terrible," said Eileen Heckart, thereby bursting another bubble. "Everybody in the company has a cold. At this location there are black widow spiders. At the one we worked at last week there were rattlesnakes."

Still, it was beautiful. Perfect for the scene, a big barbecue, with Gene Hackman, as Zandy, escorting Liv Ullmann, as his mail-order bride, in this romantic western set in Big Sur in the 1870s.

Producer Harvey Matofsky said that, because of the high cost of meat, they wanted to boycott beef for the barbecue scene and use a vegetable substitute.

"But it didn't work," he said, unhappily.

Matofsky is a Brooklynite who now lives mostly in Rome, works with Federico Fellini and produced "The Last Tomorrow." Liv Ullmann says that she feels it is important these days to pick producers with as much care as you pick directors.

"You have to be very careful who produces your pictures," she says. "He cut the picture after the director is finished. My 'Pope Joan' was hurt that way. The producer showed it every night to his friends and then would cut it again, based on what his friends said."

She is working here with director Jan Troell, making his first American film after his smashing success with "The Emigrants" and "The New Land," in which she

starred. But she indicates he is not too happy under American conditions.

"Jan's specialty is photography," she says. "On 'The Emigrants' and 'The New Land,' he'd grab a camera himself and shoot. He isn't allowed to do that on an American film."

Troell shoots reasonably fast but there were still long periods of waiting. Every location fills those periods differently. This one had gone in for palm reading, due to the presence of a Dutch palmist named Marcel Broekman, who was part of a crew making a film about the film.

Liv said Broekman had pinpointed everything about her — "he said I idealize every man I meet and I guess I do. But I am worried. He says that from 35 to 37 will not be so good for me and I'm next to that age now."

Everybody had his palm read, even Troell, which astounded Miss Ullmann.

"He's changed so much," she said. "Two years ago, he didn't believe in that sort of thing. Now he reads books on astrology."

Hackman keeps moving from picture to picture. He says he is after financial security but won't do a TV series — "I don't want to be that secure." He says there is talk of a sequel to "The French Connection" but nothing definite yet.

"I'd really like to do a comedy," Gene says, "but that may have to wait. First, I want security. So I'll take the best offer that comes along."

Phase IV Questions And Answers

Questions and answers concerning President Nixon's Phase IV economic controls:

Q. What is Phase IV?

A. It's a complex set of wage and price controls imposed on most of the economy in the next two months. The object, as in Phases I, II and III, is to slow down the rate of inflation.

Q. What happened to the price freeze?

A. Prices are still frozen until Aug. 12 except in the food and health industries.

Q. Does that mean grocery prices are free to rise again?

A. Yes, many food prices will go up, some of them sharply. Beef prices will remain under ceiling rules until Sept. 12. But grocers and food wholesalers may raise prices only to reflect increased cost of raw agricultural products since June 8.

Q. Will nonfood prices also start going up immediately?

A. No. Industrial, wholesale, retail and service prices in most cases will remain frozen until Aug. 12.

Q. What happens after Aug. 12?

A. The price freeze is lifted on the rest of the economy on a sector-by-sector basis. Each sector or industry will be governed by a special set of rules dictating how much prices can go up. The administration has put forward a set of preliminary regulations in each case and will allow the public to comment on them until July 31. Then the rules will be revised, if necessary, and will take effect Aug. 12.

Q. How about wages?

A. The familiar 5.5 per cent standard for annual wage increases, plus 0.7 per cent for fringe benefits, still applies. It was mandatory during Phase II (November 1971-January 1973), voluntary in Phase III (January-May 1973) and now it's mandatory again.

Q. Do the rules cover everybody?

A. The Economic Stabilization Law itself requires that workers earning \$3.50 an hour or less be exempt.

Q. What about my apartment rent?

A. Rents are exempt, just as they were during Phase III.

Q. Is the government going to ration gasoline?

A. Despite repeated rumors, administration officials insist there is no plan to impose a World War II style gas rationing system. However, the proposed Phase IV rules contain an elaborate control system that would place ceiling prices on the petroleum industry. In addition, beginning Aug. 12, you should see a sign listing ceiling price and octane rating on every pump at retail gasoline stations.

Q. Do the Phase IV rules cover everything?

A. The new regulations continue to exempt raw agricultural products. They will also exempt on Aug. 12 lumber and plywood, long-term coal production contracts, public utility rates and all businesses with 50 or fewer employees.

Steps on Safe Use of Ladder

One tool that is truly a fair weather item is the ladder. Comes those warm days of spring and early summer and the homeowner is dragging out the ladder to tackle a job he wouldn't touch during the winter.

Repairing gutters, touching up peeling paint, nailing down a loose roof shingle—jobs that get you up off the ground.

There's a right way and a wrong way to handle any tool and the right way is never more important than when using a ladder.

First of all, learn to carry the ladder properly. Find the center of gravity, the point at which the weight is the same at each end. Pick up the ladder and hang it on your shoulder at that point.

Once you have the ladder to the site, the job is to put it up and most people do that task wrong. The trick is to "walk" the ladder into position.

Place the ladder on the ground at the point you wish to put it up. Brace the foot of the ladder against the base of the house or a step or curb. Lift the other end. When you have that end up to your own height, start walking forward under the ladder. Advance your hands from one rung to the next.

Once the ladder is erect lean it against the house. If the base of the ladder was away from the house you will have to tilt the top toward the wall. If the ladder was right up against the house, pull the foot of it away from the house.

The right distance between the base of the ladder and



house is the next point that causes amateurs trouble. The right angle is very important. If the ladder is too close to the house it may tip backward. If the angle is too great the ladder may break under your weight.

The distance between the house and the base of the ladder should be one fourth the length of the ladder. A 20-foot ladder should have its base five feet away, a 12-foot ladder three feet away. Make certain the ladder is resting evenly and firmly. Metal ladders are especially prone to slipping, so make certain yours is equipped with rubber or other composition safety feet. This is important on concrete. Sandbags make a good base on a hard surface.

If there's someone around to help, have him hold the ladder steady. You can tie a rope from the base of the ladder to the house to be absolutely safe. On a straight ladder, never climb higher than the third rung from the top. On a step-ladder, no higher than the second from the top. You can't use both hands to work on a ladder. One hand is for hanging on. If you have to use both hands for a moment, lock yourself on by slipping one leg over the rung and hold onto the rung below with the heel of your shoe. Keep the soles of your shoes clean, free of mud and grease. Fix up an old bucket with a wire hook so that it hangs from the ladder. Put your paint can and brush in that. Haul it up with a rope rather than carrying it.

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Education Today

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The U.S. Supreme Court will accept briefs this summer in two cases that challenge arbitrary, forced maternity leave for pregnant teachers.

"The mandatory leave policy for pregnant teachers was born out of prejudice and ignorance," asserted Mrs. Susan Cohen, a social studies teacher in Chesterfield County, Va., in her appeal of a lower court ruling. She was the nation's first teacher to carry her challenge of a mandatory maternity leave policy to the highest court.

"In a very few instances it has been sustained as a matter of convenience," her petition said of the maternity policy. "It must be viewed for what it truly is, an anachronism, and nothing more."

Also pending before the Supreme Court is an appeal by the Cleveland, Ohio, school board from the first appeals court decision favorable to teachers in the area of maternity leave.

Equal Rights Asked
The two cases represent a recent wave of challenges to school board policies that require pregnant teachers to take unpaid leave for a specified period of time. Other challenges have been raised by teachers in Alabama, California, Connecticut, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Washington state.

Generally lawsuits ask the courts to guarantee the teachers their equal protection rights under the 14th Amendment in situations involving forced maternity leave, loss of retirement and salary benefits, endangered tenure and seniority rights and policies relating to re-employment after childbirth.

Providing legal expenses and support to the three teachers whose challenges have reached the Supreme Court is the 1.2 million member National Education Association. "Support of teachers in these pending cases demonstrates NEA's commitment to equal employment for women and its efforts to eliminate discriminatory practices against women in employment, personnel policies, compensation and promotion," an NEA spokesman said.

The Cleveland policy requires a pregnant teacher to take an unpaid leave of absence five months before the expected birth of a child and to continue on such status until the beginning of the first school term after the baby becomes three months old, NEA said.

Evidence Inconclusive
In a decision that called the policy "arbitrary and unreasonable in its overbreadth," the Sixth Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals in Cincinnati said: "Under no construction of this record can we conclude that the medical evidence presented supports the extended periods of mandatory maternity leave required by the rule both before and after birth of the child."

The court noted that the policy was established two decades ago for instructional continuity, relief of administrative problems and because "teachers suffered many indignities as a result of pregnancy, which consisted of children pointing, giggling, laughing and making snide remarks."

Peron Faces Supreme Moment

For Juan D. Peron, this is his supreme moment, the one he has waited for for nearly 18 years.

There has been many attempts to explain the success of Peronism. One is that he gave dignity to the Argentine workers. He himself says he delivered what he promised. His opponents have accused him of reckless spending, of torturing his political enemies and of permitting blatant corruption in his government.

There is truth in all of it. He has described Peronism as not a political party but rather a doctrinal movement. Certainly it is nationalist, structured on the idea of a corporate state such as set up by Benito Mussolini in Italy.

He describes capitalism and communism as having been overtaken by time.

Disavows Extremists
"We consider capitalism as the exploitation of man by capital and communism the exploitation of the individual by the state," he says.

As he has prepared himself for a resumption of rule in Argentina, he appears to be disavowing both the extreme right and left of those groups avowing Peronism.

He already is being denounced by some of the young leftists. Others say he is only biding his time before leading them on a violent revolution.

At the moment he appears to have been successful in putting together a coalition based on moderate and conservative elements among Peronists, among businessmen and the clergy and among the military. He has the solid support of top unionists.

There have been no signs of any attempted purge against his former enemies. Some senior generals have been retired but that is all.

Matter of Waiting
Despite earlier denunciations of the United States and of imperialism in general, there has been no over-all move against foreign investment; in fact, to the contrary. General Motors, Ford and Eastman Kodak, for example, have been reported going ahead with plans for increased production.

It is said foreign investment also will be sought for development of a copper industry.

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Henry's NATO Trip Postponed

BRUSSELS (UPI)—A planned visit by president adviser Henry A. Kissinger to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) has been put off until the autumn, a NATO spokesman said Thursday.

NATO Secretary General Joseph Luns announced last month that Kissinger would come here to discuss ideas for his "new Atlantic Charter" with the NATO ambassadorial council.

The spokesman said the ambassadors and Luns met recently with Kissinger and President Nixon at the San Clemente White House. He said Kissinger's visit is "likely in the autumn now."

European nations have balked at the "charter" idea. But they agreed in June to study their "relationships" in the light of changing times and this study would form the basis of the Kissinger talks here.

The ambassadors opened the study Wednesday with a 30-minute discussion.

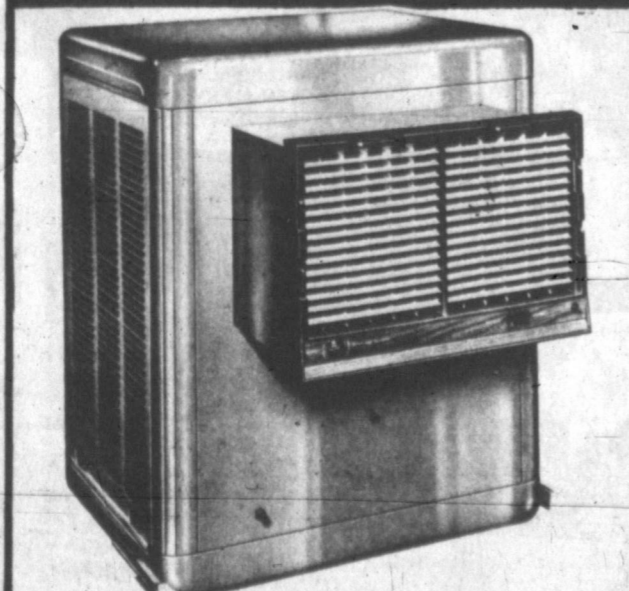

(Scribners, \$5.95) Baker, best known for his book on Ernest Hemingway, turns to a spare, straight murder mystery this time when a headless body is found at the foot of Gay Head, a promontory at one end of the Cape Cod island of Martha's Vineyard.

IN AFGHANISTAN

Most Residents Indifferent Towards Democratic Regime

By PHIL NEWSOM UPI Foreign News Analyst For the international young hippies drawn to the Afghanistan capital of Kabul by cheap drugs whether Afghanistan is a kingdom or a republic will make little difference.

For, despite its ancient origins, Afghanistan is less a nation than a circumstance.

Thailand Captures Drug Ring Leader BANGKOK (UPI) — Narcotics agents said Thursday they captured a man described by U.S. officials as responsible for much of the opium and heroin trade in Asia.

The suspect was identified as Lo Hsing-han, a Chinese resident of Burma.

Agents said that since 1964, Lo has operated a private army that moved opium and heroin caravans from north Burma to the outside world.

They gave few details of the arrest, but sources said Lo apparently seized near the district town of Mae Hong Son in Thailand, about 400 miles north of Bangkok, during a massive search operation by Thai and U.S. narcotics agents using helicopters and light aircraft.

Although called a crossroads of Asia, most of its roads in fact are passable only to the camel or to vehicles with four-wheel drive. Its boundaries were set up for the convenience of the 19th century Russian and British empires.

Early Takeover It has no way to the sea, no navigable streams, no railroads and few natural assets.

It has a 1,200-mile border with the Soviet Union, a 50-mile border with China and others with Iran and Pakistan.

Until the July 17 announcement of the king's overthrow and the establishment of a republic, Afghanistan had been ruled at least in name for 40 years by Mohammad Zahir Shah, himself the product of the violence endemic to the country.

He had taken over at the age of 19 after the assassination of his father in 1933.

It is a matter of some irony that it was the king who introduced the beginnings of democracy to Afghanistan after ousting the man who now has deposed him, Gen. Sardar Mohammed Daud.

Promise Seems Doubtful Daud, cousin and brother-in-law of the king, served as prime minister for 10 years, 1953-1963, at the head of a clique of cousins and uncles who held the king a near prisoner.

Daud took advantage of the king's absence in Italy to announce the overthrow, accompanying it with the declara-

tion the new regime would establish a "genuine democracy," an assertion which seems doubtful in view of the record.

Over the years the king had taken full advantage of Afghanistan's strategic location to gain the most in aid from the chief cold war competitors.

In the last 20 years, Soviet military and economic assistance has come to around \$1.5 billion. The United States has helped with around \$450 million and China with about \$72 million.

Hashish Traffic Flourishes In the last 10 years, Afghanistan and Kabul especially has become especially noted as a mecca for thousands of young westerners hooked on drugs.

It has been estimated that 150 to 300 tons of opium are produced illegally each year in inaccessible areas possessing a feudal autonomy largely free of outside control.

Most of the opium is said to go to Iran.

But also across Afghanistan's porous borders flow an estimated one to two tons per month of hashish, the best in the world. About a third is said to reach the United States.

One of those contributing to Afghanistan's reputation as a drug center is Dr. Timothy Leary, currently serving a term for prison escape and a conviction on marijuana charges after being extradited from Afghanistan.

NEW YORK (UPI) — "The Little People" series on NBC will be retitled "The Brian Keith Show" for the new season. The star still plays a pediatrician, and the locale remains Hawaii, but there will be some expansion in the way of story material to give the program a wider appeal.

"Marcus Welby, M.D." ABC's doctor series starring Robert Young, will begin its fifth season in the fall.

"The Carol Burnett Show" will have a program originating in the new opera house in Sydney, Australia, at its official opening, which is to be attended by Queen Elizabeth II on Oct. 20. The taped program will be aired here later on the CBS series.

CBS will telecast the Miss Universe Beauty Pageant finals in a two-hour program, via satellite, from Athens, Greece, at 10 P.M., July 21.

Raymond Burr is creeping up on his personal record of nine years in the original Perry Mason series as his current "Ironside" skein prepares to begin its seventh season on NBC.

Note for basketball nuts: on Dec. 15 at 5:15 P.M., ABC will telecast from St. Louis the game between collegiate champion UCLA and North Carolina State, both of which finished the 1972-73 season with perfect records.

"I saw this poor little derelict church and it was a house of God forgotten by man...It broke my heart," Miss Hayes said.

Hooked big one SYDNEY, Australia (UPI) — Marine engineer Ron Scott took 90 minutes to catch one of the biggest sharks off Sydney for many years. Scott hooked the 905-pound, 13-foot tiger shark on 80 pounds breaking strain line five miles off Dee Why, one of Sydney's most popular beaches.

Money measure NEW YORK (UPI) — One short-range solution to the currency crisis would be for foreign nations to spend some of the excess dollars they accumulate to buy common stocks of big U.S. companies, according to Carl A. Gerstaecker, chairman of the President's National Export Expansion Council, and board chairman of the Dow Chemical Co.

"The U.S. trade deficit amounted to almost \$7 billion last year," Gerstaecker said in a speech at Notre Dame University. "If foreigners purchased \$7 billion worth of stock annually it would give us time to solve our basic, long-range trade problem."

Telephone Interconnections Growing

NEW YORK (UPI) — The telephone interconnect business is growing so much that the big telephone common carrier firms ultimately may get out of equipment manufacture, Claude C. Conti believes.

Conti runs a telephone interconnect firm in the New York metropolitan area called Telectronics Services, Inc. It is one of 750 companies created in this business by the famous Carter phone court decision of 1968 that stopped telephone companies from forbidding interconnection to their lines of privately made phones and equipment.

That ended the telephone equipment monopoly of the Bell System and a few major independents. Since then, Conti said, sales of privately made telephone equipment have increased at almost 50 per cent annually. Sales of the industry last year were \$120 million and should hit twice that this year, he said.

Sweet, fresh air with ventilating fan

NEW YORK (UPI) — If your guests can tell you had onions for dinner, or that your husband's smoking cigars again; if there are times you just have to throw open all the windows, no matter that it's dead of winter, or that the air conditioner is laboring to keep out a heatwave — give some thought to ventilating fans.

Chosen and installed properly, in rooms where there is an odor or moisture problem, or where heat builds up, ventilating fans can keep air circulating and keep it sweet and fresh.

Charles Kenney, who concerns himself with residential ventilating products at Scovill Manufacturing Company's NuTone Division in Cincinnati, suggests ventilating fans for:

- Kitchens, laundries, bathrooms, where heat and airborne odors, grease, smoke, as well as moisture, are a problem.
- Basements, which may be underground with poor natural ventilation and the likelihood of dampness.
- Attics, where air often is stagnant and summer temperatures soar.
- Rooms, such as family rooms, where people congregate for parties and smoke and heat may be a problem.
- Workshops and hobby rooms, garages, where air may contain pollutants that not only are unpleasant but may be dangerous as well, such as certain sprays, fumes from paints, solvents and adhesives, and carbon monoxide.

Kenney says there are two basic types of ventilating fans. One is mounted inside the room on the wall or in the ceiling, and can be included in combination with a light or with a light and supplementary heat source. There also are exterior mounted wall or roof units which leave completely silent the room where the ventilator is located.

He says: "Location is the key to proper use of a ventilating fan. Ideally, a built-in wall or ceiling fan should be placed directly across the room from an incoming supply of air, such as a doorway. The moving air will ventilate the entire room as it is drawn through the exhaust fan to the outside."

Kenney warns against "short-circuiting" of air movement. This is particularly true in bathrooms where tub and toilet areas should lie in the path of the air movement as it travels to the exhaust. Short-circuiting, he explains, means the air cuts a corner instead of venting the entire room.

Attic fans can be particularly valuable. "An attic cooling fan placed on the roof," Kenney says, "circulates air through the attic by bringing it in through openings in eaves, overhang or gables."
"This results in more evenly balanced temperatures throughout the home, and protects building materials from deteriorating effects of excessive heat and moisture," Kenney says. "Air conditioning equipment operates less frequently and for shorter periods of time. With such a fan, the whole house, air conditioned or not, will stay more comfortable."

In the kitchen, Kenney explained a range hood that has a funneling action is superior to a wall or ceiling fan.

There are three types of range hoods:

- Ducted, with built-in power unit; will exhaust smoke, odors, grease-laden air, moisture and some heat.
- Ducted, with exterior-mounted roof or wall fan; not only draws all air contaminants or effects of cooking to the outside, but is quieter and makes more efficient use of its power than the fan motor built into the hood.
- Non-ducted; stops smoke, grease and odor with a bank of charcoal, fiber glass or aluminum filters, then feeds cleaned air back into the kitchen.

Kenney says the size of a ventilating fan depends on the particular circumstances. You would need a different fan for use in a baby's room where diaper odor might be the problem and a workshop where spray painting is done.

Each room should be checked carefully — with professional help if necessary — to be sure the right fan is picked for the job to be done, and that it is installed properly.

Even one or two fans, in the right places, can make for easier breathing.

"I think the Bell System eventually will decide its future is in the common carrier communications business and it will spin off or sell Western Electric Co., its huge manufacturing arm," Conti said. He thought General Telephone & Electronics, the largest independent telephone carrier, also eventually would dispose of its telephone manufacturing arm, GTE Automatic Electric Co. of Northlake, Ill.

Price Advantage Enormous
Conti said that so long as these two companies remain subsidiaries of common carrier telephone firms, they will be hampered by legal and other restrictions in competing with the interconnect equipment marketers.

The price advantage of the interconnect companies using American, European and Japanese equipment is enormous because they are not required to assess certain charges that common carrier companies must make, he said. Conti figured his company could save even a small business \$200,000 over 20 years compared with Bell System charges for the use of similar equipment.

For starters, there is a \$4,000 installation fee Bell must charge which Conti does not have to charge, and the monthly service charge for his equipment may be half that of a Bell company. The equipment would cost the user \$92,000 and the gross operating saving would be \$254,000 and the equipment would be still usable at the end of the 20 years.

Employees Need Training
So Conti believes that virtually all American business users of telephones will own or rent their phones and switching equipment in a few years as has been the case in some European countries.

Burns: what you should know

Health and safety officials say there are more than two million serious burn injuries in Canada and the United States every year. Many of these occur among children. In 1970 alone, more than 1,500 children were killed by fires and burns.

There are several types of burns, but treatment for all of these types must include, in this order:

- Prevention of shock.
- Prevention of contamination.
- Control of pain.

Never underestimate the severity of a burn. Burns are usually larger and more severe than you think.

In the case of burns from fire, here is what to do.

IF THE BURN IS MORE SERIOUS:

1. Get the child out of the burning area. If his clothes are on fire, do not let him run. This will fan and encourage the flames. Put the fire out by wrapping the child in a blanket, rug or other heavy material at hand.
2. If the burn is minor, immerse it in clean ice water, or apply ice packs to the area. Keep it cold for 10 or 15 minutes. (Never use dry ice.) Cover the burn with a clean gauze or cloth dressing, or a thick, no-stick plastic covering (clean plastic kitchen wrap works well). Consult a physician.
3. Keep the child lying down. Try to keep the head and chest slightly lower than the rest of the body. Keep the child warm.
4. If the child is conscious and can swallow, give him nonalcoholic liquids to drink.
5. Keep watching for shock and treat if necessary.
6. Take the child to a doctor or hospital immediately.

DO NOT use butter, grease, ointment or powders on burns. These increase the danger of infection and make treatment more difficult later.

If a child suffers an electrical burn you must get him away from the source of electricity immediately. Do not touch the child's skin if he is still touching the source, or you may also be electrocuted. Pull him away by grabbing his clothing or use nonconductive material, such as heavy cloth, wood or plastic to pull or pry him from the electricity source.

—Watch for signs of shock.
—If the child is unconscious, check his breathing and heart beat.
—If necessary apply mouth-to-mouth breathing and external heart massage at once.

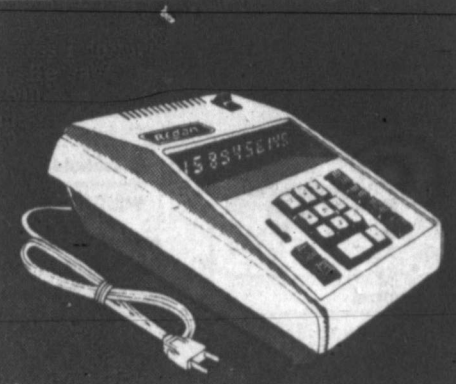
Immediately contact the doctor, hospital or police. If you are the only person available, however, continue mouth-to-mouth breathing and heart massage. Do not interrupt these procedures until:

- The child is pronounced dead by a physician, or
- The child begins breathing normally again, or
- More than four hours pass without success.

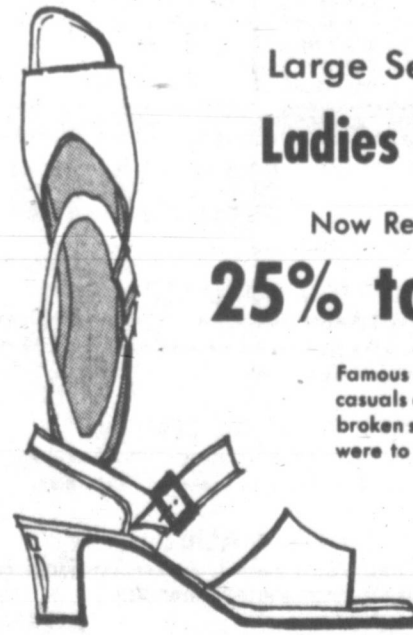
