IT'S THE LAW IN TEXAS *

How can you determine whether the title you are receiving in a real estate transaction is good bad or indifferent? Although at first glance there may appear to be more than one alternative method, purchasers usually find that all roads of complete title security lead to a lawyer chosen by the prospective buyer to represent his interests.

In the first place, the Contract of sale should state the QUALITY OF TITLE to be conveyed to the purchaser, If the contract does not so state, then the seller may be obligated to sell - and the purchaser bound to buy - only whatever title the seller happens to possess, which may actually be quite defective. This may be true in spite of fact that seller is in possession, has a deed to the property, has been paying taxes, etc.

A real estate title is a claim of ownership or right to land and to the improvements, such as houses and other structures, located thereon. It may be partial or complete, as determined by the numerous facts in each case. If it is com person's claim-if you can prove your right thereto against all the world, it is a GOOD TITLE. If, in addition, the evidence of your claim of ownership is contained in the proper public records, it is a GOOD RECORD TITLE, Ordinarily, only a GOOD RECORD TITLE is considered salable, being sometimes referred to as a GOOD MARKETABLE TITLE,

When you buy a house, you want a title which is good, so that you and your heirs will not be troubled while enjoying the use of premases. You also want that title to be marketable, in order that it can be sold when you are ready to sellwithout the expense of perfecting title before your buyer will complete his purchase.

Having made certain that your contract of sale indicates the exact nature of the title to be conveyed to you by the seller, how do you go about assuring yourself that will receive the specified quality of title? People have varied ideas about this matter.

Some consider themselves safe when they gain possession of an Abstract of Title or a General Warranty Deed. But an Abstract is merely an outline of public record on the tract of land - a history of the title - which anyone may purchase, regardless of ownership.

A General Warranty Deed from a responsible seller is comforting to have, but is a poor subustitutue for careful title examination, True, it entitles you to sue the seller for damages cecuaust dyedeb ufasd damages caused by defects in the title. But serious defects may not come to light until long after the seller is dead, has moved to an unknown address, or is bankrupt.

00

Safer procedures include your attorney's examination of the Abstract tendered by the seller, and the purchase of a Title Insuruance Policy indemnifying you as the insured for the full amount of your investment. In any event you will want your attorney's advice when closing a real estate transaction.







But of all the shopworn entries that keep popping up in the lists, Harold E. Stassen, the Minnesota Flash, seems by far the most motheaten plater.

Harold who now handles some vague duties in the Elsenhower administration in relation to disarmament after a luxurious spell as "giveaway" expert for the Republicans has been galloping after the presidency for 20 years with a past performance chart perpered with

His following in important political circles wouldn't fill a hall closet and old line bosses don't trust him any further than they figure to throw him.

Harold came charging out of Minnesota in the Thirties when GOP fortunes were at such a low ebb that any hack could get a seat at the council fire. In 1940 he showed up at the Republican convention with a group determined to fight Wendell Wilkie's nomination to the bitter end. By the time the convention was over Stassen was Wilie's floor manager! In 1944 and 1948 he was right handy, willing and oble, if Dewey wasn't wanted, but was left both times at the gate. He was more energetic in '52 but the late Senator Taft trounced him in the Ohio primaries and the Eisenhower write-in vote against him in his own state must have been embarrassingly exasperating. Humans Are Fallible

"We ask those who seek to shackle free and open competition to reflect on the consequences," said Henry Ford II recently, "The short-range effect might be to afford a measure of protection for those in a weaker competitive position. The long-range effect would only be to put a damper on America's constantly rising standard of living by penalizing the most important man in

There is another important factor involved here. Human fallibility being what it is, no one is wise enough to say with accuracy who may be and who may not be in a weak competitive position. No one can do more than offer an opinion which time may prove to have been in grave error. A perfect example is found in the campaign of 20-odd years ago to shackle the chains with punitive taxes and other class legislation, on the grounds that this was the only way to save the independents from extinction. Had that goal been accomplished on a national scale, it is obvious that competition would have been lessened, at a tremendous cost to consumers. Luckily it didn't happen. But the independents didn't die either. They met the chain competition with merchandising techniques that pleased the public. So today chains and independents operate competitively side by side with each doing well and each with its established and respected place in the community.

When we attempt to replace natural economic law with human judgment — and, particularly, political judgment — we are begging for toruble. We put road blocks in the way of progress. We discourage enterprise and bring about stagnation. History is replete with

The Doctor Says

From time to time influenzathe dread "flue" bug - has spread over large sections of the world.

Those who are struck down during the first few weeks on such epidemics may not be hit hard. But as the time goes by the disease gets worse. Victims develop high fever and more prostration; more develop pneumonia and other serious complications.

Even when epidemic influenza Is a' its peak, however, those who go to bed at once and stay there until their fever has been down for several days almost always recover.

Unfortunately, when a bad epidemic is present numerous members of the same family may be struck ill at about the same time. Thus, the one most nearly well is under great pressure to get up and take care of others. This early rising from the sick bed carries terrible risks.

THE LAST WORLD . WIDE epdemic of influenza was that of 1917 - 18. During that period more people in the United States died from influenza or its immediate complications than were killed in World War I.

WHAT IS NEEDED to combat influenza is a method of preventing it. The most promising line, as with many other diseases. is the development of a vaccine which can be given to human beings and which will raise their resistance to the disease.

Much research work has gone into efforts to develop such a vaccine but it has been hampered. Not only are there technical difficulties in preparing a vaccine which would do the job against all the varieties of virus, but also there has been comparatively little influenza during the past few years against which a vaccine could be tried out.

IT IS UNCERTAIN as to whether any vaccine now available would definitely stop a world-wide epidemic. However, there is evidence that a properly constituted vaccine is effective in at least some of the cases.

Further improvements in a vaccine against influenza are to be expected from additional re-

It may be mentioned that the vaccine is prepared from viruses grown on egg yolk, and therefore a few people who are sensitive to eggs or chicken should not re-

ceive this preparation. What we hope for particularly is the development of a highly effective vaccine before the next world - wide epidemic hits us, the latter being a likely possibility because of the history of the disBETTER JOBS By R. C. HOILES

would appreciate anyone pointing out to us how we are inconsistent "However, as more and more parents become aware of the government fiasco in its attempt to educate, and as these parents increasingly resume their natural responsibility of seeing to the proper education of their children, we can expect to see some interesting developments. Then more children will attend private schools, parent owned joint-venture schools and church schools. Such schools would demand better teachers than many of those who 'get by' in government employment. They would demand more efficient teaching than that found in government schools where there is a vested interest in inefficient teaching - the usual 'featherbed' practices to employ many teachers. For instance, we might expect a development along the following lines:

"We know that there are a few exceptionally good teachers -there is, probably, as high a proportion of outstanding teachers as there is of the best doctors, or of highly skilled craftsmen.

He suggests that due to the scarcity of good teachers that their classroom work be reproduced by a movie or television concern. I cannot believe that this would work because one cannot ask a movie actor any questions unless the teacher in charge can answer questions it would not de velop the reasoning faculties of the pupil. Mr. Taylor continues:

"We could expect the free-conscience educational method to have as much advantage over government operated child care centers as other parts of the free enterprise system have over other socialist activity. We can expect far better educational results with the expenditure of less time and mon-

"Now of course the free - conscience schools would have to be supported by church tithes, or tuition fees, or by parent contribution to joint- venture schools. However, such costs should be moderate under the suggested methods. And it is not to be imagined, after church schools are strong again, the cost - free education would be denied to any child whose parents could not afford tuition. Thus,

the only illiterates we should expect are those who refuse to learn. Indeed, some children who now instinctively rebel against government indoctrination would want to learn in the free - conscience

Suffer Little Children

"Finally, there is a good solution to the problems of education - a good solution in only words: 'Suffer little children, and forbid them not, to come unto me, for of such is the Kingdom of heaven.' Do you know what 'suffer' as used here means? At first one might think it means 'permit' or 'allow.' But aren't you persuaded that Christ used the word 'suffer' in a way that requires this definition: 'To feel or undergo pain of body or mind; to bear what is inconvenient?' Then the meaning becomes: You bear the pain of mind and the inconvenience of giving your children their chance for a Christian edu-

" '- - -, for such is the Kingdom of heaven.' After all of the fuss and furor over the government 'school' dream, after all of the thought and words so many of us have used in trying to 'co-exist' in the government 'school' Utopia, after living with the devilish nightmare that has enshrined ignorance at the expense of education, isn't it remarkable to find that we have had the answer before us all of the time? And in only nineteen words? Heaven, certainly, must be an abode of the educated - where ideas are exchange "easily, clearly, certainly. Our great problem. as humans, is that we cannot easily understand a plain instruction: 'Suffer little children and forbid

them not, to come unto me.' " Even if "suffer" means to permit or allow, a parent is not permitting or allowing his children to go to schools supported on a voluntary basis when he is sending them to government schools. The child cannot be two places at the same time. Invariably the parents should do as Mr. Taylor suggests -make a sacrifice to see that their children are sent to schools that can teach the difference be-

tween right and wrong. Government schools cannot do this because they are based on acts that are not right. They are based on the theory that the majority have a right to use aggressive force to make a man pay for schooling he believes is harmful.





THE NATION'S PRESS

WHERE SECRECY STARTS (The Wall Street Journal)-

The House Government Information Subcommittee is scheduled to begin hearings today on secrecy in the Executive Department. Preliminary to the hearings the subcommittee made public reports from 63 departments and agencies on the amount of secrecy practiced and the authority for the

The practices vary widely. They range from that of the Central Intelligence Agency which tells nothing on the premise that it would be dangerous to say anything, to that of the American Battle Monuments Commission which tells everything on the premise that it would be pretty hard to hide the Jefferson Memor-

But somewhere in between is the balance of the other Government agencies and departments. Much of what they do is withheld from the public and sometimes

from the Congress. Now there is something gravely wrong in a situation where the public is denied information by a Government whose elected officials

are answerable to the public. It is not sufficient to say that this or that must be kept secret because to tell the public would be to tell a possible enemy.

No one, we think, would want the C.I.A. to say in the public square where its intelligence agents are or what they are doing. Nor do we think it is wise to reveal the intricacies of new weapons where an untimely revelation might aid an unfriendly nation. Even so, some check must be kept on what national security agencies are doing; how else can the Congress know the security we need is there? And the secrecy in Government

is found not only in agencies dedicated to national security. The secrecy is found in such differing agencies of Government as the Alcohol Tax Unit which refused in 1951 to speak the names of bartenders who were fined for watering or substituting one brand for another and the Patent Office which placed a secrecy stamp on a process for manufacturing manmade diamonis. These are some of the things

the House Subcommittee will turn up in the course of its investigation. Whether it will uncover the reasons for the growth of secrecy is another matter. We think there are two main

ones. The first is political. The party in power wants to stay in power. It can best stay in power by having as few mistakes as possible made public to provide issues for political opponents. It is as true of Democrats as of Republicans. Those out of power magnify the mistakes and those in power belittle them. Secrecy helps to hide them, sometimes under questionable executive directives. The second reason for secrecy's

facts can and do differ in the exercise of judgment" in releasing information.

The latitude of such censorship is as dangerous as it is plain. What is to be done about it? We think the place where secrecy starts is the place to cure it.

If the Congress will stop granting the legal privilege to operate in secrecy — even at times in secrecy from the Congress — and if the Congress will challenge secrecy orders unauthorized either by the Constitution or by statute, then the censor's stamp can no longer keep people from knowing what their Government is doing.

FORD STOCK SALE (Chicago Tribune)

The Ford Motor company, which Henry Ford incorporated on June 16. 1903 with \$28,000, is now worth more than a hundred thousand times that figure. And so far as we know that was all the outside money that was ever put into the business in bringing about this \$10 invested worth a million dollars because he was able to keep the bulk of the earnings in the business and because he knew how to use the money in a highly competitive business to realize a fabuous compound rate of return. The Ford company faltered in its founder's declining years, but he passed on a name and an enterprise which new management was able to raise to new heights.

In building a business of billion dollar proportions, Henry Ford made it inevitable that it would have to become a publicly owned corporation. The tax on his estate would have forced the public sale of the stock, if he had not left the bulk of it in the form on nonvoting stock to the taxexempt Ford Foundation. Only a small minority interest, in form of voting stock, went to his family. But as the Ford Motor company had even greater success under Henry Ford II, the Foundation's wealth became too great to be prudently held in the form of a single investment.

The Ford family lost most of its means to the foundation under pressure of federal taxation. Now, to make the foundation's stock saleable at a fair price, and make it eligible for listing on the New York stock exchange, the Ford family is obliged to give up more than half of its voting power in the company as well. The latter deprivation seems greater than it is. No aspirant for control of the company will engage Henry Ford II in a proxy fight. Twenty per cent is generally recognized as adequate for control He would need the support of only one-sixth of the publicly owned shares to

keep out any challenger. With the sale of some of Ford stock by the foundation, it will be confronted with the problem of reinivesting the money. As an investor it becomes one of the world's giants. With tax exempt scome on three billion dollars, it dwarfs all other fortunes or tusts. Its economic power is of a size never before known in this country or anywhere else. The activities which it sponsors and finances will inevitably receive the closest public scrutiny. It cannot defy or ignore public opinion. A multibillion dollar tax free foundation may well decide that foundations may

be big, but not that big.
