Discrimination

The task of practicing discrimination in this world of mounting political pressures is an endless one. But it is increasingly important that persons capable of independent reason, make use of the discriminating faculties with which they have been equipped. Today, the tendencies for lumping people and ideas into categories is almost universal. The tendency is juvenile and corresponds to the small boy who judges the western movie by dividing the cast into "good" guys and "bad" guys. The world is not made up of "good" guys and "bad" guys. It is, rather, inhabited by human beings all of whom have some good in them, all of whom have some bad in them. The urgent necessity is to evaluate men without lumping them into categories. Type casting may be a sound business practice for a Hollywood executive. It is a sorry way to seek to understand the meanings and purposes of life.

We know a number of persons who favor the Bricker Amendment. We can be counted among this number. But we are appalled by the pro-Brickerites who don't know WHY they favor an amendment to limit the treaty-making power of the chief executive. While, in this case, we might admire their conclusion, we are saddened by the fact that virtually no cerebration has occurred to cause them to claim the viewpoint that they say they hold.

bon questioning, we learn that they feel the way they do because (1) Some member of a club to which they belong told them they should be for the amendment. (2) They heard Dean Manion on a radio broadcast and he said they should favor the amendment. (3) Well, the Constitution is rather old-fashioned and ought to be brought up to date. (4) Prasident Eisenhower is against the amendment; therefore, they are for it.

This tendency toward what has been characterized as "group-think" has an even more pernicious ramification. John Smith voted Democratic in the last election. Therefore, John Smith is an unmitigated scoundrel from which nothing good can ever come. Peter Brown praised Joe McCarthy for his fight against communism. Therefore, Peter Brown is a demagogue of the lowest rabble-rousing order. Mary Smith belongs to the DAR. Therefore, Mary Smith is a reactionary old fuddy-duddy who worships her ancestors and doesn't know we live in a changing world.

Rubbish! Sheer, unmitigated balderdash!

A man makes a patriotic speech. He is hailed as a fine, upstanding American. Secretly he may be plotting union violence and subversion. When will we learn to praise a person . . . any person where he is right, and criticize him when he is wrong? Why must we insist upon a world composed solely of heroes and villains?

If we would ever win the war of ideas, and defeat the socialist communist menace in this country, we will do it only when we discriminate between the good and the evil in the individual, and learn to prise the one while we may despise the

As an example of our own willingness to do this very thing, today we hold in highest esteem the governor of Utah, J. Bracken Lee. Here is an outstanding American. Lee has been outspoken in his Americanism in most instances. He favors this nation over any foreign power. He is refusing to pay his income taxes because some of his money is being sent in an unconstitutional manner to foreign potentates. He believes in a government of limited powers. He wants the government to get out of competition with private business. For these things we love and admire him.

Not long ago, however, Lee advocated federal aid for the development of the Upper Colorado. At this point we criticized him. We still admire him for his views in most cases. In this one case he is very wrong in our opinion. We do not think the is above reproach because of his outspoken Americanism. Nor do we think that he has gone beyond the pale because of his one known instance of favoring socialism,

Take Senator McCarthy as another example. We have been and remain enthusiastic supporters of the Red hunter from Wisconsin. That is, until he embarks on the farm program in which he calls for 110% of parity. There, Mr. McCarthy is actually favoring a communist-inspired idea, even in the midst of tracking down the Reds.

We still like McCarthy. But we think his farm policy is most unworthy of him.

All of which adds up to an unpleasant but inescapable fact, which is, that the majority of people are pretty inconsistent in their views. We still believe that the truly American way of discriminating is to praise individuals if and when they base their thinking and actions on principles. And to criticize them when they fail to do so, and seek to encourage them to correct themselves.

Nock's "Our Enemy The State," nor Herbert Spencer's 'The Man Versus The State," nor John Ruscard's "Bankruptcy of Liberalism," nor du Nouy's "Human Destiny.

He never refers to current authorities on our form of government like Isabel Paterson's "The God of the Machine," nor Rose Wilder Lane's "Give Me Liberty." nor Von Mises' great masterpiece, 'Human Action," nor his "Planning for Freedom," Dr. Orval Watts' book, "United Nations," nor his great book, "Union Monopoly, It's Cause and Cure," nor Palmer Prentice's "Hunger and History." nor "The Revolt of the Masses" by Ortega Gasset," nor Allen Rucker's "Labor Road to Pienty," nor Henry Grady Weaver's The Mainspring of Human Progress and How Not To Prevent It.' Then each must strive for objective truth; and as there is no public authority to control opinion, adults must be supposed to exercise the final judgment on what they learned in school, after they have graduated. Nowhere will there be any inducement to teach the 'supremacy of the state' as a compulsory philosophy. But every political controlled educational system will inculcate the doctrine of state supremacy sooner or later, whether as the divine right of kings, or the 'will of the people' in 'democracy.' Once that doctrine has been accepted, it becomes an almost superhuman task to break the stranglehold of the political power over the life of the citizen. "A tax - supported, compulsory educational system is the complete model of the totalitarian state.

"The extent of the power exercised, and its final implications are not yet recognized in the United States, because parents are allowed to send their children to private schools, or to educate them at home - although they must still pay the school tax. But when that permission is granted, and the educational standard is prescribed, it is revocable; it is no longer a right, but a permission, In Russia, in Germany, it is no longer permitted.

"Undoubtedly the good people will ask, out of artless perplexity and a short memory, how are children to be educated if there are no tax-supported compulsory public schools? The answer is by private schools. Anyone who wished could open a school, to which parents could send their children on payment of the necessary fees, which would naturally vary a good deal. Primer education could be given at home, as it generally was in the United States up to fifty years ago most children could read, write, and perform simple addition before they started school. The standard of education in New England was much higher a hundred and fifty years ago than it is not. Nine-tenths of the useful knowledge the average person possesses is certainly acquired out of school. Who taught the population of the United States to drive motor cars? It was not done in school, and could not have been. The practical skill by which the average man gets a living is not learned in school. There is no reason to suppose that children would remain untaught. Before the Civil War, some of the Southern states passed laws making it a crime

to teach a slave to read or write.




