



Here beginneth the account of Nathaniel Morton, secretary and keeper of the records for the Plymouth Colony, concerning those memorial circumstances of the year 1620:

So they left that goodly and pleasant city of Leyden, which had been their resting-place for above eleven years; but they knew that they were pilgrims and strangers here below, and looked not much on these things, but lifted up their eyes to Heaven, their dearest country, where God hath prepared for them a city (Heb. xi 16), and therein quieted their spirits.

When they come to Delfs-Haven they found the ship and all things ready; and such of their friends as could not come with them followed after them, and sundry came from Amsterdam to see them shipt, and to take their leaves of them. One night was spent with little sleep with the most, but with friendly entertainment and Christian discourse, and other real expressions of true Christian love.

The next day they went on board and their friends with them, where truly doleful was the sight of that sad and mournful parting, to hear what sighs and sobs and prayers did sound amongst them; what tears did gush from every eye, and pithy speech pierced each other's heart, that sundry of the Dutch strangers that stood on the Key as spectators could not refrain from tears. But the tide (which stays for no man) calling them away, that were thus loath to depart, their Reverend Pastor, falling down on his knees, and they all with him, with watery cheeks commended them with most fervent proyers unto the Lord and his blessing; and then with mutual embraces and many tears they took their leaves one of another, which proved to be the last leave to many of them

Being now passed the vast ocean, and a sea of troubles before them in expectation, they had now no friends to welcome them, no inns to entertain or refresh them, no houses, or much less towns, to repair unto to seek for succour; and for the reason it was winter, and they that know the winters of the country know them to be sharp and violent, subject to cruel and fierce storms, dangerous to travel to known places, much more to search unknown coasts.

Besides, what could they see but a hideous and desolate wilderness, full of wilde beasts, and wilde men? And what multitudes of them there were, they then knew not: for which way soever they turned their eyes (save upward to Heaven) they could have but little se content in respect of any outward object; for summer being ended , all things stand in appearance with a weather-beaten face, and the whole country, full of woods and thickets, represented a wilde and savage hew.





In the fall of 1953 a farmer planted 18 acres of wheat. The was nothing unusual about this. But there would be

unusual consequences. The farmer owned 480 acres of land. The Government gave him

an acreage allotment for only three acres of wheat. An acreage allotment is the

maximum number of acres of a crop a farmer can harvest and remain eligible for Government price support.

Refused Government Handout But this farmer didn't want Government price support. He never had accepted a dime of Government handout. He hadn't sealed any corn. Hadn't sealed any wheat.

So when the Government told him he couldn't raise more than three acres of wheat if he wanted to be eligible for a Government loan on it, he didn't pay any attention.

He had 18 acres of old, wornout pasture land. It was part of some land he had recently bought to add to his farm. It was weedy, He decided he woould improve it by reseeding it.

He didn't get possession of the land until September 1. He decided he'd plow it that fall and it to wheat. The wheat would crop for grass seeded next

In the spring of 1954 he seeded red clover and fescue grass in the wheat.

Not Grown For Sale The wheat ripened. He harvested it, put it in the granary. He never had a thought of selling It. He would grind it and feed it his hogs, he decided.

Meanwhile the Government had termined that marketing quotas uld be placed on wheat. Mar keting quotas are another form of control in addition to acreage al-

When marketing contro's are every farmer who sells wheat

has to get a marketing card. This

card is given to him only after he has complied with all the regulations. It permits him to sell the amount of wheat he produces on the acres allotted to him.

But the farmer we're writing about had no intention of selling wheat. Se fed it to the livestock Several days ago he got a letter from an official of the Government. The letter reminded him the allotment was three acres. He had planted 18. This was an excess

of 15 acres. The Government official said the number of 15 excessive acres multiplied by 17 bushels - the normal yield for his farm - made 255 bushels.

The penalty for this overproduction of wheat computed at \$1.12 a bushel would come to a total of \$285.60. "Demand for payment thereof is

hereby made," the letter said. "We trust that you will avail. yourself of this opportunity to

make voluntary payment." the letter continued, "thus avoiding the additional expenses and inconience which always accompany egal action." This may sound like it, but this

since perhaps not all such deaths are recognized or traced to the correct cause. Furthermore, it is estimated that there are more than 100 times as many nonfatal poisonings as there are fatal ones!

Particular mention should be made of some of the common substances around the home. Many people, for example, not recognize the fact that pirin is dangerous, particularly when an overdosage is swallowed by a child.

In the first 500 poisoning cases reported to the Chicago Poison Control Program, for example, 84 were the result of aspirin poisoning and 73 of these from swallowing flavored aspirin. SINCE THE WAR a number of useful chemical substances

against most of the common insects such as mosquitoes, ants. and flies, have been developed and placed on the market. Not all of these are harmless to human beings.

One of these, chlordane, has considerable poisonous possibilities not only when swallowed but when inhaled or even when it comes in contact with the skin. I HAVE REFERRED, on other occasions, to the hazards from some of the cleaning fluids almost all of which are poisonous when swallowed, some of which are inflammable and some of which are dangerous from inhalation of fumes if they are used in a close space.


The possibility of entering a chess tournament in Oklahoma City next Dec. 2-4 was discussed. Several indicated a desire to participate.
