

### Have Learned Little

To underestimate the ability of the enemy is no more disastrous than to overestimate one's self. And it seems to us that in this year of 1955, we are not nearly so far removed from savagery and barbarianism as we fondly try to believe.

There are many arguments to be advanced which lead to the conclusion that, after all, most of us fall pretty short of our goals a good deal of the time. Perhaps we have overestimated our ability to a fatal degree. We cite but one example. However, its implications should be compelling.

The scene is the American stock market, June, July, August or early September of 1955. Bustling activity on every hand! The market moves under the sign of Taurus. Optimism, glowing forecasts!

Prosperity has been enthroned in a new temple. She is the new Goddess, and American business hastens to pay obeisance. Just the right mixture of government interference, government taxation, government coercion and we've licked the problem of depressions forever. So opines the merchant, casting sheep's eyes for a new go-rnment contract. Up is the only known direction. After all, if ones goes up far enough doesn't one move free of gravitational pull? Gay Phoebus in his golden chariot rides the high blue.

The scene shifts to Denver. There, amid gathering clouds, glorious Apollo plays at quoits and fish. The bears are always in the woods and now they sally forth "Isn't it our turn, now?" This prosperity is phony!" Apollo answers: "Government must assume its full partnership responsibility on the American scene. Business will be good in the foreseeable future. All is well."

Sir Oracle has spoken. The click of changing stocks can be heard across the land. Confidence was never so high. Vast plans for even vaster projects (with the help of federal money), are shaping in the future's glass.

Now It is Saturday morning, September 24th. The three Fates are spinning out a thread. The pendulous lips are moist, the great splay thumb pauses. Lightning shatters the early morning still. The great Goddess Prosperity is suddenly invisible in her Potomac Shrine.

Saturday the market is closed. Gloom shrouds the nation. By Monday commitments have been made. The doors of the Exchange crack open to rushes of selling. n a few days sixteen billion dollars is trampled under foot in the pits where augury is supposed to be a science.

But Apollo is not yet for for Olympus. His wise men and soothsayers were quick to attend him. He lives.

In far away New York the news serves as a balm Men with pockets stuffed for trade, quietly leave the tables and go home.

A single heart-beat in Denver seems to be pumping up the market. In a few weeks, despite an occasional blush, the urge is "upward, ho," and the feverish activity is resumed.

But now we see how pagan we truly are. When Apollo smiles, the sun shines and buyers spend their money. When Apollo frowns, clouds appear and trade diminishes. Apollo falters, buyers vanish, and the great wave is the sale. The nation's economy, its propensity for good and evil, are tied inexorably to the toga of one

But this is barbarism. This man for better or for worse, is just a man. He is no immortal. Nor has he power to stay the tides nor to bid the sun stand still.

Were we truly civilized we would have confidence In IDEAS and PRINCIPLES. Since we are not, we cling to the figure of a hero. We lend pantheonic splendor to a human personality, adorning it with powers it does not have and sanctifying it with greatness which is not there.

If we understood the nature and meaning of freedom we would place no faith in fallible human clay. If we really believed in free enterprise and in our own integrity and perseverance the cardio-vascular system of a particular individual could not affect the future of our business or our land by one ectopic beat.

For then, we would have abondoned pagan dependence for enlightened independence. We would build on foundations of solid rock, rather than the quicksands and quagmires of government benevolence.

Alas, the Roman forum and the American mall seem but a moment separated in history. The ancient Latins weren't much good. They fell for the hooey of "Pax Romanum" promoted by their Caesar, They worshipped Caesar. And they tied their business success to him. When he smiled, they laughed. When he moaned, they died in the arena. Hail, Caesar!

But a civilization tied to the abilities, the vagaries, the aptitudes and animosities of one man proved wanting In 2,000 years we have learned so much?

Compromises are sometimes necessary but not as between right and wrong, not as between truth and error. If compromises are accepted under these latter conditions they themselves also are errors.

If one group says twelve times twelve is 144 and another group contends that it is 160, why not try to discover the facts rather than assume the correctness of a middle course that twelve times twelve is 152. The middle ground plausible course to the unthinking who are not willing to bestir them selves in an effort to find the facts and are eager to appear tolhope of retaining popularity in all

#### BETTER JOBS

How I Discovered My Handicap

In the last issue I was naming some of the persons and books had come in contact with that hepled me realize that I had been handicapped by a diploma from a government high school and from a Methodist college. I pointed out that the man that presented the clearest case of what the government should not attempt to do was Frederick Bastiat, the great French philosopher.

Another great French libertarian was Adolph Thiers, first President of the Third French Republic in 1870. He wrote a book called 'A Refutation of Socialism and Communism or A Defense of Private Property." And since government schools is the Tenth Plank of the Communist Manifesto, he, of ourse, had to deal with all phases of Communism, including government schools

One of his arguments against those who argued against wealth being in private hands was asking this question: Would the working man be better off if the factory had never been built? The Socialists and Communists are all contending that the wealth would have been better used if it had been distributed to the workers and they consumed it than to have it put into a factory and tools by private owners to produce more wealth.

Straighten Me Out On Taxes I, of course, believed in taxes, having gone to a state school. I used to contend that I believed in voluntary taxes. I was straightened out on this error by Frank Chodorov, who pointed out there was no such thing as voluntary taxation - to use that term was a contradiction of words. That caused me to overcome the handicap that I learned from the state schools and Methodist college of believing in taxation.

Then I came to realize that goveraments, like anything else, should render service of enough value that people would voluntarily pay for their services. But, of course, when government is used to exploit mankind, as the United States Government and its subdivisions are now doing more and more such governments could not be supported on a voluntary basis.

40 Or 50 Years Of Handleap But it took me 40 or 50 years to partially throw off and outgrow and discard the handicap I received in government schools and a Methodist college. And I have not yet, by any means, completely discarded all the collectivist authoritarian ideas that handicapped me as a result of attending government schools and Protestant colleges.

It anyone knows of a Protestant college that is not handicapping its pupils in believing in the myth the divine right of the majorities or the infallibility of the Bible. I would be glad to learn of such

And since parents who have been handicapped by government schools and have never come in contact with persons who will answer questions without evasion and thus never overcome this handicap, believe their children can get an education at these kinds of schools, it is of the utmost importance that more and more people come to realize that one can get a better education by reading and talking to the close reasoners of the ages than going to college.

There's nothing we need more than better understanding as to the meaning of justice and the difference between right and wrong. And colleges and "educators" who have some subjects they will not publicly discuss are ill qualified to assist anybody in getting an education. They can only train, but not educate.

Our real danger is not from Communists or Socialists. It is from people who have been indoctrinated in some form of Socialism in their school days and do not even know it.

A good way to tell whether a man has been handicapped in his schooling and has never overcome the handicap is whether he will continue to advocate courses of human relations and will not attempt to answer questions to defend his position, nor can find anyone else holding a responsible position who will attempt to do so.

The man who still continues to advocate something that he or no responsible person will attempt to defend certainly has not overcome the handicap he learned in school, And the pity is he does not even know he is handicapped. That's the danger we face in America today.

One might believe in the law of gravity, another might deny it. It is extremely important to ascertain the facts before one adopts a socalled middle course by stepping off a cliff in the expectation that his fall will stop when he is half way to the bottom.

What we need is a resolute determination in all quarters to find the right course of action and then to adopt it, and not to go wobbling down the middle-of-the-road, comforting ourselves that we are at least half right. If truth lies on one side of the road or the other we are certainly wrong if we stay in the middle. 'et's try very hard to find out on which side the truth lies and then take our stand with other brave men who have been equally diligent in ascertaining the

Since this can occur only in a closed space, accidents of this sort are likely to be open.

of carbon monoxide are present that the victim becomes drowsy and unconscious so fast that these symptoms are absent.

THERE IS PROBABLY no such thing as chronic poisoning from carbon monoxide. One would expect it to be found in people who are exposed to small amounts of carbon monoxide for long periods of time, such as those working in certain mining operations, near furnaces, or in garages. Actually such persons do not seem to be harmed in any way.
