Invasion Of Matsu, Quemoy Apparently In The Making By WILLIAM MILLER

TAIPEI, Formosa -UP- The Chinese Communists were reported Friday to be bombarding both ends of the Nationalist off-shore island chain in an apparent prelude to an invesion of Matsu, Quemoy or both.

Heavy Nationalist Chinese air and naval patrols were reported the past week, Nationalist ources believed an attempt was more likely against Matsu or its satellite island of Kaoteng.

Sketchy reports received here told of continued artillery duels between Nationalist and Communist gunners at Quemoy Island, southern anchor of Chiang Kai-Shek's island defense chain just off the mainland, with the Reds pumping in 700 shells Thursday alone.





So long as our governmental plenipotentiaries are votaries of the goddess of popularity so long will they seek to obscond with our funds for purposes of winning friends and influencing people. And devotees of this pmozingly fickle goddess often find themselves in grotesque and ridiculous poses, for worship at her shrine entails all manner of strange and unnatural posturings.

In the end, of course, money buys no friends. It merely purchases envy, greed, dependence, treason, and a host of other ills. But, as we taxpayers are learning, this fact has no apparent effect upon the tax collectors. True to their religion, which places the majority on a pedestal, they are incapable of logical thought and manage to rationalize every selfish and egotistical whim into a bit of holy writ

As an example of the extremes to which pursuit of popularity may lead us, witness the recent moves in the Department of State. There, the dignified brief-case and striped-pants set have decided that to win more friends abroad, dignity should be supplemented with a little hepcat, give-me-some-skin familiarity.

Consequently, Representative Adam C. Powell Jr., a Democrat of New York, has announced that steps are being taken to augment our diplomatic courier stable with a string of real cool, real gone bopsters. Honest, cats, this on the plain and, flat.

Of course, Powell has an interest in this particular departure from the hum-drum, staid formality of State Department protocol. After all, he is married, to that ivory-tickling Hazel Scott and is somewhat of an expert on the Dark Town Strutters Ball.

If you are slightly nauseated, you should feel downright ill to learn that last year Congress appropriated \$5,000,000 for just such exchanges of artistic phenomenon. And you should also be more than passingly revulsed to know that the tawdry "Porgy and Bess" which has been showing all over Europe to less than enthusiastic turn-outs, is now showing in Moscow. There, the Ruskies will have a chance to chuckle mercilessly over the Tyrics of "the things that you're liable to read in the Bible . . . ain't necessarily so." This show, if nothing else, ought to convince them that America is everything their propaganda experts have been saying

We must be old-fashioned. Someway we had thought of our State Department as something more than just a branch office of USO road shows. But then, we have always been considered. "square" since long ago we recognized the so-called Americana of the jazz age as nothing but imported Africana which we are now powdering and shipping back to its point of origin branded with the fiction "Made in the U.S.A."

Time was when the State Department upheld the American traditions of freedom and liberty. Those were the days when the torch on a certain statue in New York harbor burned brightly, and tyrants around the earth trembled at the thought of arousing the wrath of free men in the home of the brave.

The Statue of Liberty should be taken down. It is an affront to her holy symbol to keep her there. We should erect the hep-cat goddess of popularity in her stead. We may not have any principles left, but at least the world will know that we are true exponents of broken



Little Known Dangerous Labor Laws

Very few people who are not engaged in business know the handicaps the business man has in trying to prevent organized labor from taking away from the owners of property their right to choose how it should be operated. I doubt whether there is one person in a hundred who knows that an employer engaging in interstate commerce does not have the right to refuse to hire a union man or to discharge a union man, even if he has no union contract, without being subjected to a suit by the discharged union man for pay after he had ceased to work. The only defense an employer has in such a case is to prove that he was not discharged because he was a union man, and, of course, it is

very hard to prove a negative. On the other hand, an employer can discharge a non-union man or refuse to hire a non-union man without being subject to any legal action for pay not earned by the worker. This condition gives the union man an awful advantage over the employer that believes our standard of living will increase much more rapidly if we have a free market for labor - that is, the products of labor - as well as for commodities. This condition makes it very difficult to keep labor unions from gaining complete control over our lives.

Laws Favoring Labor Unions

Labor unions have succeeded in getting, the assistance of the federal government to use aggressive force against an employer who believes that workers who have a clear conscience and will make an individual binding contract are much more desirable than workers who belong to a labor union and thus cannot and will not make an individual binding contract.

In 1914 organized labor was successful in amending the Sherman Anti-Trust Law that made it a crime for any conspiracy to establish a monopoly. They were suc cessful in exempting members of labor unions and farmers from being subjected to the Sherman Anti-Trust Law.

The only time the Sherman Anti-Trust Law applies to the labor unions is when they enter into a conspiracy with the employer create a monopoly. They have a perfect right to create a monopoly under the Clayton Amendment and rob other workers from an equal right to help establish values and to compete in producing wealth. This Clayton Amendment certainly violates the principles set forth in the Declaration of Independence that all men are endowed with certain inalienable rights. This makes classes out of men and organized labor has a right to do things that are a crime if done by employers. Thus, it is

Another law that makes it difficult for the employer to retain an unhampered market is the Norris - Laguardia Law passed in 1932. This law makes it a crime for an employer to make a condition of employment that the worker will not join a labor union that enters into a conspiracy to prevent hiring the man that will do the most for the reward paid. In other words, it prevents him from showing preference to a man with conce over a man that has turn ed his conscience over to the will of the majority or the labor bosses. .The Norris - Laguardia Law also made it difficult to get an injunction to stop a plot or a conspiracy of workers to injure the employer and his customers.

Then in 1937 the Wagner Law was passed that practically turned the management of business over to the labor bosses and the politicians. That was so raw and unjust that it was finally amended by the Taft-Hartley Law that did away with the closed shop but substituted the union shop that required everyone to join the union after a short period of employ-

These laws, together with the rulings of the labor board, as mentioned above, that makes it a crime for an employer to prefer a non-union man to a union man and makes it legal to prefer a union man to a non-union man, give the labor union monopoly almost unlimited power.

Organized labor would not be dangerous if the employer and the consumer were the final judge of what was produced and what they were willing to pay for it, Labor unions have grown because they have enlisted the federal government in making laws that require the federal government to use aggressive force against the emloyer who believes the Declaration of Independence means ex-

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
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
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
