





Loyalty is one of man's most ennobling emotions. For the meaning of loyalty is closely associated with human devotion, above and beyond what would normally be expected. We cannot say of a person that he is loyal if at the first breath of adversity he forsakes us and hies him to our opponent's camp.

The term, localty, cannot be affixed to a person who is merely a fair-weather friend. Loyalty contains the connotation of adherence despite adversity. No one is ever truly loyal at a mere social level. Convictions must run deep, dedication must be contained in our steadfastness to a principle, place or person.

Thus, in these trying times, the loyalties of men are constantly being tested and challenged. And many times a man does not himself know the extent or the direction of his loyalty until the stresses and strains of colomity cause him to see the issues clearly for himself.

And in the actual realm f practical vota-getting, there are some who reveal nemselves as having a prior loyalty to the United Naons; to the administration; or just to the thought hat a particular piece of legislation might mean more

From our standpoint, we are not impressed when me poorly informed, non-thinking tax-supported perconality quakes in terror as we criticize some of the nstances in which our federal government has betrayed ts trust and violated the principles of liberty and freeom upon which our Constitution was originally based. or there are some so abysmally ignorant of the nature of our communistic and socialistic enemy that they do not seem to know that these two ideologies flourish in Washington, D. C. Like the solider, they have blindly accepted the idea that whatever tyranny is done in Washington: whatever evil perpetrated, whatever wrong ommitted, so long as it is our duly elected officials who do it then all is well. His only case histories of the emotional, physical, psychological and political injury to students through such teachings were in extreme situations plainly Communist, and in studies of two your men who were Communists on the campus and who knew it. (At UCLA such 'characters' were considered far

more annoying than menacing when they distributed their ridiculous literature at the public entrance to the University!) Far more important, -insidious and tragic, I believe are the 80-90 per cent graduates (half of them registered Republicans!) who emerge from college each year as moral and economic Socialists and don't

Bronchitis is usually classified as acute or chronic. In the former the disease is likely to start suddenly with symptoms similar to those of an ordinary cold. Heaviness or pains over the chest are likely to be present.

OTHER SYMPTOMS may or may not be noticed, but the most characteristic sign is a cough which comes off and on and causes a good deal of distress. Often the acute disease passes in a week or so but frequently it leads to chronic bronchitis in wh h the cough





No honest individual, having learned the facts about electric power development in this country, can approve putting government further into competition with the investor - owned companies. The factual story of the electric power industry, told in terms of foresight and research, is a drama of how people get things done in a free economy. Let's explore some of these facts

The United States produces 41 per cent of the world's electricity. The second nation in electricity production, produces less than 11

In 1947, following World War II, when the electric power industry was unable to carry out normal construction, it had six per cent margin of reserve capacity, At the close of 1954, it had a reserve of 21.5 per cent. In the nine year period, 1946-1954, it spent 181/2 billion dollars in new construction to bring its total plant It paid \$1,447,000,000 last year

in federal, state and local taxes, representing 23 cents out of every dollar received from its custon ers. Contrast that with Uncle Sam's own politicians' power development w. ch paid nothing into the federal treasury, and only token payments to state and local

The investor - owned electric power industry will spend \$2,700, 000,000 this year and \$2,400,000,000 next year. In the next four years it will add 234 new unuts for an additional 24,698,000 KW, bringing total capacity to 103,800,000 KW. All this has been done or will be done at no cost to any American taxpayer, no matter where lo cated, Contrast that with the cost to the American taxpayers when Federal Government takes on an electric power producing project, Because the investor-owned com-

panies look into the future and are willing to risk billions on what they see there, they have been a major factor in America's industrial growth. Their engineers already are preparing for 1965, by which time power needs are er pecied to be doubled, and to 1975. when, according to present indications, a possible maximum of 423 million KW will be needed - over

four times the present capacity, up, the price of electricity consistently went down. Seventy years ago when Edison invented the light bulb, the rate was 25 cents a KWH; in 1953 the average rate to residential customers

across the nation was 2.74 per

KWH-a new all-time low. Now the industry is deeply in volved in the field of nuclear research to assure eventual largescale production of electricity with atomic energy as a heat source. It is predicted that new nuclear fueled generating capacof total capacity in 1956 to 65 per

The Utah Power and Light Co. made atomic history on July 17 this year when for the first time, an entice town of 1,200 (Arco. Idaho) depended on nuclear power as its sole power source for one Niagara Mohawk Power Corp.

now is using atomic power daily on a commercial basis from AEC's Nautilus-type reactor at West Milton, N. Y.

Duquesne Light Company of Pittsburgh joined with AEC and Westinghouse more than two years ago to build an atomic plant at Shippingport, Pa. The electric company is contributing 5 million dollars toward the research and is building its own 60,000-to-100,000 KW power plant, Consolidated Edison of New

York is going forward with a nuclear plant of 236,000 KW on the Hudson River without government help of any kind at a cost of 55 million dollars, It is expected to be in operation by 1960. Space does not permit listing the many other investor-owned electrical companies-but 40 companies are already deeply involved in atomic research and development, at a cost of approximately \$185 million. They are proving that industry, under our American free enterprise economy, never stands still

Well, that's just part of the glorious record of achievement of the investor-owned electric companies. Surely it's a record that proves they are perfectly able to produce America's power needs of the future, using the meney invested by the people, not with U. S. tax dollars.


