WASHINGTON -UP- Insiders will be listening for Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson's Moorhead, Minn., speech this week for a tip on Republican plans for dealing with organized labor in next year's presidential campaign.

Benson is scheduled to speak before a farm audience Friday evening. His last previous speech on farm prices aroused CIO President Walter P. Reuther to sharp reply. That speech was given Sept. 20 in New Orleans before the Farm

Equipment Institute. Benson did

union labor wage gains. But he squarely placed some of the blame

Instant Challenge Reuther challenged instantly, in viting Benson to join him urging congressional investigation of wages, prices and profits in the steel, automobile and farm equipment industries. Meantime, the word in Washington was that Benson had not cleared his speech with the White House where some of the staff was represented as

union leadership. But some of Benson's advisers were unimpressed. They have

upset by the secretary's potshot at

theme that some of labor's gains have been unwarranted and unfair to both the farmer and the consumer. That is a delicate and politically explosive proposition. Benson stated it at New Orleans, with special reference to farm equipment and some parts of the food industry in which he cited specifically higher wage, handling and

transportation costs. It has been suggested by some persons to Benson that he proceed further, direct his fire more directly at Reuther and spell out what he considers to have been the effect of CIO wage increases recently gained in the packing and farm equipment industries.

No Hint on Advice There has been no hint from the Agriculture Department that Benson will accept such advice or, more important, that the Eisenhower strategy board would permit him to accept it. What Benson has been urged to do is precisely what a group of Republican senators already has done - seek to carry political warfare to such union leaders as Reuther without

taking on all of his union members. Senate Republicans were shown this week to be distributing an attack on unidentified labor leaders

on charges of using "violence and coercion" in a conspiracy to control the 1956 election. Reuther was not named but he obviously was among those in the mind of Chairman Barry Goldwater (Ariz.) of the Republican Senatorial Campaign committee, who prepared the report.

Goldwater's summation said union leaders were making progress in a drive to control the Democratic party. He complained that the political per head tax levied by unions on members to help Democratic candidates drew from Republican and Democrats alike,

### Prejudice vs Tolerance attaining political power. And, dislike the fact as we may, it is the fact that except under pressure

There seems to be a tendency in our government school today to confuse positive knowledge and definite opinion with prejudice. Any person who is well informed on a given subject which has led to his holding a point of view with conviction is subject to being attacked by the double-domed professors as being "intolerant.

At Colorado University in Boulder, the assistant professor of sociology, Jiri Nehnevajsa, has been chairing a special committee, out to determine the extent of prejudice in the minds of matriculating students. The findings of this committee, ascertained by means of a 76-question survey are highly illumining.

First of all, the survey claims the depth of conviction regarding religion held by a student, reveals the extent of his intolerance. If he is devout, he is prejudiced. According to the report, "Catholic students are more likely to be intolerant. Protestants were listed second, followed by all other religions except the Jewish faith, then the Jews." The report added that agnostics were practically always tolerant.

But the survey probes other areas of thought and belief as well as the religious. And it establishes that students coming into the university for the first time tend to be more intolerant than those who have been there before. The freshmen and sophomore group are more prejudiced than juniors and seniors. Also, those with the best grades tended to appear as less prejudiced, and male students generally were more prejudiced than

But the key to the whole survey is discovered when the report includes this interesting comment: Students taking pharmacy, physical education, engineering and business courses, were most inclined toward prejudice. On the other hand, students studying psychology, social science, philosophy and modern languages were listed as least prejudiced. The survey did not say why.

But we should like to hazard an opinion The students concerned with facts, with science, with math or economics, with business and life as it is, were prejudiced. The students concerned with theory, intellectual gymnostics and guesswork were not prejudic-

And this state of offairs points up the sad condition in our schools of compulsion and governmental overshadowing. The prizes, the highest grades are given to those who retain an "open" mind. And the longer a student remains at the university the more surely does he come to know that his own ability to aroduate is in direct relationship to his ability to be tolerant of error and evil. For the aim of the curriculum as revealed by this survey is to create and maintain the mind in a well-poised vacuum. One should be certain of very few things. Uncertainty becomes the mark of the well educated. For in the tolerance and lack of prejudice in the mind of the uninformed, lie the stooges of tomorrow who will "hail caesar" without the slightest twinge of conscience, or the slightest awareness that humanity has been betrayed by their own vague compassion.

Actually, the results drawn from the survey by Mr. Nehnevojsa are ridiculous. There is no one less tolerant, religiously speaking, than the agnostic. He simply cannot condone what he suspects is ignorance and superstition in the religious practices of others.

Conversely, Catholics who cling to their religious and spiritual convictions are nearly always generous and tolerant of what they construe to be errors in the thinking and training of others.

Certainly, freshmen and sophomore students appear more intolerant. That is because when they first enter the university a few convictions still cling to them. After four years they are as uncertain and unconvinced as any group of brainwashees.

"Contest in Mass-Bribery"

"Another point was overlooked. This was the impact of the idea community in which universal suffrage existed. In such a community the mass vote is essential to of extreme emergency (such as the prospect of defeat in war) the masses are much more susceptible to the promise of 'Bread and Circuses' than to the summons to 'work and discipline.' Thus the politics of our day have become a contest in mass - bribery, in which the future is mortgaged in the most reckless fashion by the Left, and only very indifferently safeguarded by the Right.

"In 1900 the total Budget of Britain was 134 million pounds. Today it stands at something over 4500 million pounds. The State takes from the citizen on the average, eight shillings out of every twenty he earns. Defense, of course, is responsible for much of it. But the very necessity of vast defense expenditure derives from the fact that there are States in which the process of making the State omnipotent has gone even further than it has here. nI this field too, the potent State is the enemy!

"Expedient of Inflation" "But the State not only takes eight shillings out of every pound man earns. It depreciates the value of the twelve shillings it leaves. For, as a condition of sustaining the vast edifice of expenditure for which th State is now responsible, the State has been driven to the expedient of inflation. Henry the Sixth began a modest way of diminishing the proportion of precious metal in the coins of the realm. But he was an amateur compared with the modern State. Within my not very long life the value of the pound has dropped to a quarter of what it was when I was born. Millions of Britons have never so much as seen a gold coin!

"Extend the scope of the State, and you extend its power over the individual. Extend the scope of the State, and you must also increase the numbers of people employed by the State and the municipalities to administer the servces which the State has usurped Today there are some 1,500,000 civil municipal servants against. perhaps, half a million when I was a boy, And as the bureau eracy has grown in size, its mental attitude has altered. It now feels itself to be not the servant. but the master of the people as so many cases occuring today amply demonstrate. The vast scope of the modern State makes 'delegated legislation' inevitable. And delegated legislation' gives the bureaucrat the powers of a Parliament. And the more laws and rules, the greater the multiplication of offences, and the law itself falls into disrepute.

"The process of making the State omnipotent, and reducing the citizen to an almost complete impotence, has of course been vastly assisted by war. In war the Government assumes with the general consent, sweeping powers over life and property. Always it promises that, with the end of the 'emergency' it will give up these powers, and remove the status quo. But seldom, nay never, does it keep its promise.

"Only One Hope "Is there any hope that the drift towards a complete 'Etatism' may be arrested and reversed? I myself see only one hope. For fifty years we have been surrendering liberty in order to gain security thereby. While the illusion persists that this is possible, the process will go on, for the mass of men prefer the latter to the former Only when a sufficient proportion of the population realise that the sacrifice of freedom has not brought security will the reaction set in. The 'new poor,' the middle classes, already realise it. The worker, getting more pound notes in his pay packet than ever before, is bewildered and angered to find that the pound note buys nething more than a thin cord economic adversity which surely

"Although it is not true," says a high Administration official, these facts make it appear that the Jews have a mortgage on our foreign policy. Certainly, Nasser thinks so.

The deal may give Moscow a military and trading foothold in the strategic Middle East, precipitating a dangerous arms race and possible war between the hostile states. It is charged that the Arabs seek to "destroy Israel."


