T'S THE LAW

When property is placed in trust it is turned over to a trustee who will see to it that it is properly managed for the benefit of a person or persons you name as beneficiarles. It is a method if disposing of your property and may be used in conjunction with a will.

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Trusts have many advantages, A trust may be used to provide in come for persons unable to sup port themselves, to provide funds for a child's education, as a means of establishing an annuity, or to provide a gift for a charitable in-

In these days of high taxes, a trust may be utilized to minimize the tax burden. If carefully planned, a trust may decrease inc and inheritance taxes.

A trust arrangement works roughly in this manner. A person who desires to create a trust is called a grantor. The grantor chooses a trustee. The trustee may be abank, an individual, or a trust company. The grantor through a trust instrument tells the trustee how to distribute the trust property or income. The trustee will then manage and distribute the trust proceeds or property in whatever manner the granto rr desires.

A very common arrangement is to place the property in trust with directions to pay the income from the property to a wife for her life, and on her death the trust is to end and the property is to be distributed to the grantor's children. An interesting type of trust is that which is sometimes called a spendthrift trust. This is an arrangement whereby one sets up a certain sum of money to be given out to another to a definite rate per month or per year, or under definite restrictions.

This type of tust is generally used in wills where a person desires to leave money to an individual, but feels that the individual is not capable of properly caring for the money and that if left to them in full that the party receiving the money will spend and waste the mony and not receive the maximum benefit from it.

Trust property quite often consists of securities. The law regulates the type of property in which trust funds may be invested. However, the grantor may designate the type of investments the

trustee may make. The effectiveness of a trust is dependent largely on its proper creation. To avoid the pitfalls and dangers of lawsuits and ineffective trust operations, a trust instrument should be properly prepared. A poorly planned or carelessly drawn trust instrument can not only defeat the objectives of its creator, but may prove costly as well. Your lawyer can advise you

whether a trust arrangement will be advantageous in your particular situation, and is qualified by education and experience to prepare properly the legal papers necessary to set up a trust. If you have in mind some bank or trust company to act as trustee, that firm's trust officers will be glad to discuss the matter in a conference with you

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

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Big And Little Print

There's a standard joke about the nature of contracts. A wag will nearly always tell you that the big print gives it to you and the fine print takes it away. The lawyers who draw up contracts are supposed to be guilty of this practice. They show favorable clauses in big bold letters. The small print which provides all manner of retaliations against you, is supposedly so difficult to read that a person will forego that pleasure and sign

The Wall Street Journal has editorialized about this particular fact in reviewing action being taken in the United Nations respecting the so-called "Covenant of Human Rights." Fortunately, to date, the United States Senate has turned down the ratifications of this "Covenant," probably because the Senators have learned to read the fine print.

But, the American people should be appraised of what the United Nations is attempting to do and be warned in time. For in the very first draft of the "Covenant of Human Rights," government powers of coercion and seizure were guaranteed, while the big print seemed to do just the opposite.

The Journal puts it this way: "Even the first blueprint which was supposed to free people from undue government restrictions amounted to authority for governments to do just about anything they wanted to concerning people's freedoms.

'A simple example will suffice. One of the articles 'quaranteed' freedom of speech and assembly by grant-Ing everyone the 'right to freedom of expression' and the 'right to peaceful assembly.'

'But in the next lines these 'rights' were subjected to penalties, liabilities and restrictions as provided by such laws as a government thought necessary to protect national security, public order, health, morals and safe-

And this is the whole record of the "Covenant" or the "Declartion" of human rights, as well as the entire United Nations and the rest of its polyglot subsidiaries. It professes to do one thing. But in the end it reverses itself and does the opposite.

All of the BIG PRINT concerning the U.N. says it is an agency to promote world peace. But in the small print, it provides ways and means of using the combined aggressive force of various governments in compelling members and non-members to toe the collectivist line. In other words, it actually promotes violence and war. And the "Covenant of Human Rights," the very heart of the U.N., is hailed by Eleanor Roosevelt and other one-worlders as a great and good device to define and extend the rights of individuals.

Yet, if its pronouncements are read carefully, it will be seen that the only rights retained by any individual would be those which some government decided the individual could keep without endangering the political power of the ruler.

Now it is a physical impossibility to go in two directions at once. One must either favor liberty, or its opposite, slavery. And liberty is never bestowed by a government. It is, instead, a gift of the Creator and is natural to man. Slavery is a gift of government. If the rights of the individual are to be primary

then the "Covenant" should state that NO GOVERN. MENT HAS ANY RIGHT OR POWER TO MAKE ANY LAW RESPECTING A PERSON'S RIGHT TO FREE SPEECH, FREE ASSEMBLY, WORSHIP, EDUCATION, EMPLOYMENT, ETC. On the other hand, if the power of a government is to be primary, then that government assumes that it can arrest and prosecute anyone who displeases it by speaking, meeting, worshipping, teaching or working contrary to the way the government thinks such person ought to speak, meet, worship, etc.

It should be remembered that governments have no rights. Individual people have rights. Government only has authority, and that is granted by people who have rights, but only on a limited and temporary basis.

The entire United Nations operation including the "Covenant" resolved itself into a conspiracy in fine print, aimed at granting governments certain "rights" and enslaving people to those governments.

Fortunately the U.S. Senate has refused to back "Covenant." What a tragedy that it has ratified the United Nations Charter itself. A great bulk of our present international predicament can be traced to that Charter and the fine print in it. We should repudiate it and get the United States out of that collectivized in-

JUST WHEN THE TIMES call imperiously for a return to absolutes, we hear again, and in the highest court of the land, the specious words: the only absolute is that there are no absolutes. We who believe in objective truth, who cherish immutable standards of individual and civic morality, we who treasure rights inherent in nature, who know that there is a law higher than the assumption of science or the caprice of compromise or the whim of a majority - ours is the high duty to clamor for a return to the Natural Law of absolutes, without which our society is doomed to continuing frustration and despair.

THE ABANDONMENT of the Natural Law in our national life has precipitated a series of disasters that sicken the soul in remembrance - the folly of the veto in the United Nations which cripples the world's hope for peace, the havoc raised upon Hiroshima, the blood of our sons in the senseless stalemate of Korea, the nations by subversion and infiltration slipping out one by one into the night of tyranny, the representatives of a free people consorting with international thugs who sully the age with hostages and bondage. We are adrift from the moorings of the Natural Law and are perilously afloat on the seas of expediency and compromise where, without compass or chart, we fall from futility to failure so calamitous that even our freedom pales.

IT IS AXIOMATIC that our view of life shapes our view of law. If, in the caprice of the pragmatism of the late Justice Holmes, life has no goal nor human action meaning, then we have inevitably only muddled and muddied views of life and of law that paralyze the mind in reflection and palsy the will in resolution. Our country's confusion and indecision before the face of an enemy vowed to our destruction are directly due to a denial of absolutes n our national life. Today scence discovers new laws in nature, and our legislatures deluge us with new enactments, but we have unately neglected the law behind all laws; the law from which all order and harmony flow-that intrinsic, immutable and universal law in nature which is the root of all law and the source of all

IN A DAY OF RECKONING, the return to the Natural Law looms as a minimum formula for survival. The mood of the moment anchors only fear. Chaos follows upon confusion, and earnest men seem no longr even to understand what sincere men say. The Natural Law enshrines the high hopes God had in the gift of human liberty: it mirrors perennially man's position at the neak of the universe. The enemy of the Natur al Law is not merely the enemy of God, of morality, of society, of life itself. He is in increasing despair an enemy of himself.

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

Norton, a delegate to the White House conference on education, said that while states and local communities have increased their school funds in recent years, the national government has marked

Norton gave his views as the Hobart 1,800 conference delegates prepared to consider the touchy federal aid question Wednesday afternoon. Another thorny item on Wednesday's agenda was how to overcome the pressing shortage of school

It appeared that the administration may be ready to recommend more money in outright federal Russell grants for school construction than its current aid bill provides.
