Lawsuit Names President Nixon

the first time in history, the President of the United States has to answer a lawsuit filed by a committee of Congress. The Senate Watergate panel wants the constitutional batttle over executive privilege to begin sooner than the usual procedure

The committee filed suit in U.S. District Court Thursday demanding that President Nixon turn over five tape recordings of Watergate related conversations made in his office and documents concerning the activities of 25 current or

It asked that Nixon respond within 20 days, the normal time limit for a private citizen, but one-third the time allowed for a government agency. The committee suit named Nixon as both President and as an individual.

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M. (UPI) - Two search planes roamed above the central New Mexico mountains today in a hunt for a young boy police believe is lost and desperately pleading for help over a citizens band radio.

Search coordinator Richard Daerow said the search for the boy, who may be trapped alongside his father in an overturned truck, would be continued even if the signals, which officials have said could

be a hoax, died out. last airplane in said he felt fairly confident of two hearings on the radio." Daerow said. "We can't be certain if these were from the boy or someone trying to fool us.

Daerow said the signals had been reasonably pinpointed by the pilot during the night.

'It is very difficult to sort out whether we are getting radio 'skips' or someone is fooling us," Daerow said.

Though the boy in three days has never been able to identify himself beyond saying his first name is Larry, Damerow and other authorities agreed the search must continue on the assumption no hoax is involved.

The committee subpoenaed the tapes and documents July 23 after testimony from former White House aide Alexander P. Butterfield that Nixon's conversations in the Oval Office and the Executive Office Building

Nixon wrote committee chairman Sen. Sam J. Ervin, D-N.C., that he would not surrender the tapes but would consider "specific requests" for

The suit said Nixon's refusal was "unlawful, unwarranted, and in breach of his legal duty to respond to and to comply with such subpoenas.

Haldeman Heard Tapes Haldeman told the committee he heard two tapes of conversations between Nixon and his former counsel, John W. Dean

The committee asked the court for a declaratory judgment stating that Nixon had no right to refuse, a writ of mandamus requiring him to carry out his official duties and release the subpoenaed material and a mandatory injunction forcing him to release the tapes and documents from his personal possession.

A response to the 20-day time limit is expected next week. In another Watergate deve-

lopment, sources in Cox's office say that several corporate officials have admitted donating company money to Nixon's re-election campaign in viola-

tion of federal law. The sources did not name the executives or the firms, but said they volunteered the information following recent disclosures that the board chairmen of American Airlines and Ashland Oil, Inc. donated company funds to the finance

committee of the Committee to Re-elect the President. The sources said the newly disclosed donations amounted

to about \$100,000. A federal grand jury begins investigating Nixon campaign fund-raising next week.

Grain Prices Keep Rising

CHICAGO (UPI) - Wheat futures prices, pushed by unceasing demand for foodstuffs at home and abroad, rose the permissible daily limits at the opening of trading on Midwest exchanges today, and other grains followed suit.

It was the 10th consecutive day of increases in grain prices on Midwest exchanges and traders freely predicted \$5 per bushel wheat before many days have passed. There were few offers to sell wheat.

At Chicago, where the permissible daily price fluctuation in wheat contracts was increased to 20 cents Thursday by action of the Board of Trade, wheat for delivery in September went to \$4.54 a bushel, up the limit. Corn went up the limit of 10 cents a bushel, to \$3.27% for September delivery, and other months were up; oats up 6 cents a bushel, soybeans up 40 cents, so that it would cost a buyer \$10.25 for a bushel of soybeans

for delivery this month. At Kansas City, wheat rose the 25 cent limit to \$4.35 for September, and other months followed suit.

The heart of the bill, nas by Congress before it took a year's harvests would reach month - long recess, establishes government supported "target prices" significantly below they indicated there was little

In a statement, Nixon said: "It means that our farmers can expand production during the current period of worldwide food and fiber shortages without fear of a serious drop in farm income.

"Indeed, this law should help in our battle against inflation by encouraging farmers to produce at full capacity."

He said the cost of the program to taxpayers in the form of government payments to farmers would be reduced and in some cases eliminated because strong demand is



United Press International The Agriculture Department today said the cost of food in the United States during the second quarter of this year was 15 per cent higher than it was in 1972.

The department also said the production of wheat, corn and soybean crops will set new records this year, but experts said prices probably will not come down because the big crops are less than had been expected. In other developments:

-President Nixon accepted a compromise with Congress on a new farm bill that administration officials say will be the kick-off for a full-scale drive to increase food supplies. Higher

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Curt Gowdy has emerged as television's top sportscaster appearing on both NBC and ABC and when he can steal a few days from his busy schedule he devotes his time to his own favorite sport, fishing.

A personable man with a relaxed outlook on life, Gowdy and his wife, Jerre, have been married 24 years. He is probably the only weekly television personality who makes his home in Wellesley Hills, Mass., a handy 25 minutes from the Boston airport.

Because he spends almost as much time in jets as he does at home, flying to cities across the United States, a nearby airport is

Gowdy, a former six-letter man at the University of Wyoming, lives in a large English tudor home of red brick set on five acres which includes a swimming pool. He first went to Boston to broadcast the Red Sox games in 1951 and liked the area so well he decided to stay

They both love New England, so they purchased a 500-acre farm near Franconia, N.H., more than a year ago. The ancient house is built of native fieldstone and looks like an old English hunting lodge. There are seven bedrooms to accomodate the Gowdy offspring and their friends.

They are the parents of Cheryl, 22; Curt Jr., 20, and Trevor, 16. It's a 21/2-hour drive from Boston to their country home, a trip Jerre and Curt make as often as possible during the summer. When the snow begins to pile up, the Gowdys enjoy skiing on nearby mountains. They own three snowmobiles for family fun in

In summer Curt enjoys fishing in nearby lakes and streams. But if he gets the itch to fish in winter he and Jerre fly down to their condominium home in Key Biscayne, Fla. Weekend Worker

Curt works almost every weekend of his life broadcasting baseball, basketball, football and special sporting events, so he must schedule trips to New England or Florida during the week. The Gowdy home in Massachusetts is furnished in gracious antiques and tiffany lamps. The New Hampshire house is more rustic and has a breath-taking view of the mountains.

One room in the Gowdy home is a radio studio. Curt broadcasts his network show from the house, saving him the drive to Boston. He also owns three radio stations - in Laurence, Mass., Laramie, Wyo., and Portsmouth, N.H. He is also international field tester for the Berkley Co., which is a labor of love. The firm manufacturers Curt Gowdy fishing rods.

When he's not broadcasting or fishing — which is seldom — Curt enjoys a game of tennis. But patching up the New Hampshire farmhouse has been a major preoccupation in the past year.

Many Proposals


There is certainly no shortage of suggestions. I have on my desk a memo prepared by the National Chamber's public affairs experts. It is a tight summary of the major campaign reform proposals. It is 16 pages long. And more are

coming out every day. These proposals range all the way from changing the term of office of the President and members of Congress to financing all campaigns with government funds. Most of them center on limiting the amount of money a candidate may receive, or the amount a

donor may give. The trouble with such limits is they usually invite a search for ways to get around them. And the search is usually successful. It must be remembered that at the heart of the present scandal is the fact that existing campaign finance laws were evidently violated.

The key terms are not as easy to define as might be supposed For example, Sen. Foghorn receives a \$1,500 "honorarium" for addressing "The Annual Conference of Red Tape Manufacturers." Is that a legitimate lecture fee or a

contribution? Or the rising young executive becomes very active in the affairs of the Bullmoose Party, and makes some big personal contributions. Later, his annual ompany bonus turns out to be larger than usual. Is his contribution a personal contribution (legal) or a corporate contribution

U.S. Gets 'Firm Notice' To Let Argentina Alone

UPI Foreign News Analyst The United States has been put on firm notice to stay out of Argentine internal affairs.

If there were any doubt that Peronism had returned to Argentina this incident and another should be the convin-

The second was the action of the Peronist party in naming Isabel Peron to be the vice presidential running mate of her husband, Argentina's former dictator, Juan D. Peron in September's presidential elec-

The party action was both a political strategem and an example of the nostalgia which has led Argentians to look to the past to find a cure for the nation's economic and political stagnation of most of the last 18

The first incident found a United States envoy guilty of the something less than diplomatic tact by putting into writing his objections to legislation pending before Argentina's Peronist-controlled congress. Clear Warning

A story leaked to the Buenos Aires newspaper Cronica, said that Max V. Krebs, U.S. charge d'affaires, had written a memo warning that legislation pending before congress would have an adverse effect on foreign investment in Argentina.

The bills in question prohibit-ed foreign investment in some areas, including exploitation of natural resources, and limited profit remittances abroad by

oreign companies. Disclosure of the meno immediately led to demands in both houses of the congress that Krebs be declared unwelcome in Argetina and that his expulsion be considered.

It was a clear warning that the old days of an easy relationship with Argentina's former military rulers were over, and that from now on the United States would have to give top consideration to the Argentine nationalism and anti-Americanism that are badges of Peronism.

Peron Avoiding Extremists It was just 22 years ago that Peron supporters named Peron's wife of that time, the vivacious and tempestuous

of 1951. Such was her charm and her hold on the Argentine people, especially the workers, that there seems little doubt she could have made a substantial contribution to the winning

But on Aug. 31, less than two weeks after receiving the nomination, she announced her decision not to accept it.

Actually, she didn't need it for she already was a coruler with her husband.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (UPI) -Don Rickles does a funny thing to a room full of strangers-he turns them off like a light.

Bill Cosby, on the other hand, gets his best responses, someties, from strangers.

'We've demonstrated this phenomenon time and again," says Dr. Howard Pollio, professor of psychology at the University of Tennessee. He is trying to find out what makes people laugh in a study backed by the U.S. Public Health Service and dating back to 1970. "Humor is a fragile lady."

Pollio says. "She slips away very easily. As psychologists we are looking for that set of conditions that always serves to bring the lady around. "There must be a million

theories about why people laugh," he says. "But at this point no one actually knows.

Cosby's Own World Pollio classifies Rickles as a here and now comedian." dealing with whatever situation he finds himself and his audience in at the moment. And Pollio has found that an audience made up of close acquaintances is more likely to enjoy Rickles than an audience of strangers.

"The reason is that Rickles is embarrassing the hell out of you by talking about all kinds of taboo stuff," Pollio says. "The individuals in the audience assume a closed-in and protective position, with arms folded and legs crossed."

Cosby, on the other hand, sometimes gets his best response from an audience of strangers. His material poses no threat to the audience. And served the same purpose that Isabela's may this time-to bring under one tent the various factions that always have characterized Peronism

Therefore, she, too, may be expected to withdraw at the strategic moment to make way for another candidate probably to be drawn from the Radical party, Argentina's second lar-

the audience are better able to concentrate on Cosby's material without being distracted by others in the room, Pollio says.

Cosby is clasified as a "then and there" comedian. "He creates a little world of his own and invites you to step into it with him through his stories." Real Laughter Lingers

Pollio has also found that a 'shill" in the audience is helpful to comedians, helping to break the ice at appropriate times with their laughter.

This effect lends some validity to a laugh track on a television broadcast.

'But the thing is," says Pollio, "the laugh has to sound right. People don't like being fooled. And a laugh track that has the wrong sound turns off laughter rather than promoting

Pollio says that natural laughter may explode suddenly, but it never dies out abruptly. Real laughter tends to linger, fading out slowly after reaching its peak.

Pollio also has found that the predictability of the punch line or development of a story has little or no effect on laughter. He has found, for instance, that Cosby is more predictable than Phyllis Diller who makes use of a lot of one-liners. But Cosby gets more laughs than Diller.

'That would tend to disprove the surprise theory of laughter," Pollio says.

Regardless of material or style, Pollio says, audiences tend to group comedians according to physical traitswomen, for instance, fall into a group in the minds of most people, and black comedians are generally grouped together

sas City this week. The climb followed Tuesday's call by the American Bakers' Association for federal control on wheat exports. In a telegram to President Nixon, the bakers warned that, in the absence of wheat export controls, bread will "disappear" in most of the United States by June of next

Wheat futures climbed by 10 cents Wednesday-the limit permitted-at the opening of trade on the Chicago Board of Trade. There were few trades. September wheat was quoted at \$4.24 per bushel, up the limit for the eighth consecutive day. marking a 150-year record.

September wheat futures pened at \$4.431/2 at Minneapois Wednesday-up the 20cent daily limit for that exchange. The Minneapolis price was believed to be an alltime high for wheat futures in the United States.

At Kansas City, September wheat futures reached \$4 a bushel on bids. However, there were no sellers as dealers held on to their grain in anticipation

of further market gains. Futures trading is the purchase or sale of commodities for delivery at a future sale. September wheat futures, for example, represents the portion of the wheat crop expected for delivery in September.

The record high wheat futures prices were attributed by most traders to high export commitments which have created a short supply of wheat.

DEAR POLLY — I am answering the reader who wanted to know what to do with a lot of plastic flowers. Why not make a "Flower Ball?" Wash the flowers in a good detergent. Cut stems off up to two inches from each flower. Push these flowers into a styrofoam ball about eight inches in diameter. offspring known as rock. The rhythm that was popularized in the 1950s by Elvis Presley, Bill Haley, Fats Domino and Joey Dee - among others - now seems old-fashioned when compared with the sounds of a Mick Jagger or any of the rock stars who rely on crashing amplified outpourings.

About the only tie which binds the parent and rebellious scion is a tendency toward exhibitionism - Presley with his swaying hips, Jagger with his scarf and David Bowie with his makeup.

Even so, rock and roll is not about to die of old age. In recent months, several record companies have gone to their vaults to reclaim the tunes which were so popular during the relaxed Eisenhower years. The latest is one of the best, Dick Clark's "20 Years of Rock n' Roll" (Buddah BDS

5133-2), a two-LP album. Clark has presided over "American Bandstand" on the broadcast bands for two decades and almost everybody who was anybody appeared on his show.

Jubilee, Mercury, Sun, Decca, Laurie, Roulette, Atlantic, MGM, Warner Brothers and other record companies, some of them long extinct, contributed their hits to this collection to give it the full dimension it requires.

Among the numbers are 'Sh-Boom" by the Crew Cuts, "Rock Around the Clock" by Bill Haley, "Peppermint Twist" by Joey Dee, "Woolly Bully" by Sam the Sham and the Pharoahs, "Do You Believe in Magie" by Lovin' Spoonful and "Crying in the Chapel" by the Orioles.

Unfortunately, Presley is not represented, possibly because of contractual red tape. This omission is unimportant. however, since Elvis has made numerous recordings for RCA Victor that are available at most record stores.

While it is impossible to predict the outcome of an engagement involving personalities of separated generations - such as a fight between Jack Dempsey and Joe Louis or an assessment of Babe Ruth and Hank Aaron — it is safe to say that Presley would have been a great star had he started his career in the 1970s instead of the middle 1950s.

During the last week of June, Presley made four appearances in a two-day period - matinees and night shows - at the cavernous Nassau Coliseum just beyond the limits of New York City and packed the massive auditorium in each

appearance.
Presley was showing the inevitable encroachments of time upon man. He was somewhat heavier than the lithe man who returned to live appearances after a nine-year ence in 1969. The swiveling hips no longer gyrated and the dynamic leg movements were almost reduced to wobbles. Yet Presley electrified the audiences with his personal magnetism and extracted squeals from girls who were not yet born when he came out of Memphis with "Blue Suede Shoes.

Texas Residents Bothered With Crime P

public opinion survey on criminal justice, partially funded by Gov. Dolph Briscoe's Criminal Justice Council, has been conducted in Texas in connection with a 39 - month, four - state study called Project STAR. The survey is aimed at improving law enforcement by identifying roles, tasks

and performance objectives. The findings, just published, will be used in developing education and training programs. They reveal some interesting attitudes pertinent to police. courts and corrections as they operate in Texas.

This article, the first of a series of five, deals with public opinion on crime generally and on broad criminal justice issues confronting the state.

AUSTIN - Crime and crime related problems stand foremost among the concerns of Texans, according to the findings of a public - opinion survey on criminal justice partially funded by Gov. Dolph Briscoe's Criminal Justice Council.

Some member of one of every three households in the state has been the victim of a criminal act during the last year, the survey report indicates. In the last five years, 51 per cent of the families contacted reported having been

A like percentage of persons interviewed believed the danger from crime in their home communities to be greater than it was five years ago. Twenty two per cent of the men and 34 per cent of the women said they had stayed home because they believed it unsafé to go out substantially more than figures obtained in a national survey in

Burlary is the crime most generally considered eminent - 32 per cent — but only nine per cent had experienced it during the last year. Malicious mischief was the offense most

Burglary occupied second place, followed by auto offenses and consumer fraud with eight per cent each, larceny with five per cent and auto theft with three per cent.

The survey was sponsored by the Texas Commission on Law **Enforcement Officer Standards** and Education and conducted by the American Justice Institute, assisted by professional research firms. Findings were based on a cross section sampling of 749 Texans above age 18 in January and February, 1973.

Interviewees were asked their opinion on the most pressing problems facing their community.

Thirty - eight per cent of them - almost two out of five spontaneously mentioned a crime - related problem. In fact. more answers expressed concern for crime than for any other issue

With 18 per cent it was a need for more police protection; for another 18 per cent, the drug problem immediately came to mind. Responses from men and women ran parallel. After crime, Texans were

inclined to list the most pressing problems as ecology and pollution (19 per cent). transportation (17 per cent) and welfare and unemployment (16

Government corruption, at that time, came in for relatively slight concern, being mentioned

percentage listed problems of education and public morals; a slightly greater percentage were concerned with health and

In a similar survey conducted in California last year. responses were almost the same. Californians were more inclined to speak of "crime in the streets," while Texans responded in terms of "the need for more police protection."

Interviewees were asked to rank a set of nine specific issues according to their concern for each, then to rate the performance of local public officials in dealing with them. Official handling of criminal justice matters was viewed as somewhat inadequate in some areas, while over - emphasizing others.

Burlary and theft protection, for example, ranks first in concern but third in performance; providing equal ustice, sixth in concern but fourth in performance.

Protection from criminal violence, third in concern, was given a "two" performance rating, while rehabilitation of parolees, scored eighth in importance, was ranked seventh in performance.

Fear of crime varied sharply from one section of the state to another. Concern was only half as great in Northwest Texas as Southeast and East Texas, the survey found.

A racial factor was discerned also, with Mexican Americans and Negroes more concerned about the crime increase and more fearful of their personal safety in their own neighborhoods than Anglos.

Sixty - two per - cent of the Mexican Americans and 68 per cent of the blacks interrogated felt that the crime threat is greater than it was five years ago; 30 per cent and 44 per cent said they have feared to go out at times; and 29 per cent believed that victimization is greater in their own residential area than elsewhere.

The Texas public, says the survey report, largely agrees that harsh punishment does not deter most criminal behavior. 51 per cent agreeing with the premise, 28 per cent disagreeing.

You can make a case in two directions, based on the moral principles involved.

First you can say that the original owners retain title to all since they had earned or had been given same and had never willingly parted with it.

On the other hand you can argue that, whoever possessed the treasure originally had abandoned it. True, the abandonment was not of the original owners' desire, but it occurred by happenstance. The abandonment was effective in that the owners did nothing effective to recover their possession.

Thus a dispute is joined. There are two kinds of law by which the issue can be resolved. One is man - made law. The other is natural law. Man made law would say that the ownership of the property in question shall be determined according to rules fabricated in legislatures and in courts. Natural law says the issue shall be settled according to prevailing maritime customs. Since both custom and legislation are largely the product of men, what is the difference which set of laws

THE BIGGEST SPENDER One of the greatest challenges facing our tawmakers in Washington is bringing federal spending under control. The number one target should be the Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW), now the biggest spender in the

sprawling federal government. HEW will spend an estimated \$93.8 billion in fiscal year 1974, a substantial increase over fiscal 1973. Much of this money goes for programs which should be handled by local government.

Substantial cuts should also be made in HEW expenditures which have nothing whatever to do with aiding the needy. HEW is spending approximately \$36.2 million per year on self - serving publicity.

Although CBS television presented a major program. 'The Selling of the Pentagon.' condeming public relations by the Defense Department, not one word is said in the media

about HEWs publicity budget, which is \$10.6 million higher than that of Defense.

Another area which cries out for spending cuts is HEW staff salaries, which are increasing out of all proportion to any work accomplished

Wisconsin Congressman Les Aspin, normally known as a proponent of HEW, has roundly attacked its tendency to promote an excessive number of staff members into higher

paying positions. According to Congressman Aspin, the number of GS - 13 to 15 officials in HEW has increased from 3,300 in 1962 to 13,000 this year. In the last decade, the number of HEW bureaucrats earning more than \$31,000 per year has risen from

84 to 414. No honest observer can claim that the taxpayer is getting his money's worth from HEW. This waste of taxpayers' money by HEW bureaucrats must cease.

Mao Irked

Letters from Hong Kong to this reporter increasingly dwell on signs Mao Tse - tung is not happy with Chou En - lai's assumption of power in China. These writers indicate Mao

may regret the purge death of Lin Piao, his longtime ally and former heir apparent, now condemned as a traitor who plotted to assassinate Mao himself There is an implied suspicion

in these letters that, as happened a decade and a half ago, Mao may again have been forcibly retired to an honorary ceremonial role, with Chou's men now taking over.

These letters note that since 1971, when Chou's group gained effective superiority over its rivals. Mao has been very much withdrawn, except for receiving foreign visitors.

He has made no public appearance to show his personal support for Premier Chou En - lai or other members of the present leadership. In that period the title "chairman Mao's close comrade - in arms" has not been applied to

Mao has failed to appear in public on May Days and National Days. Though this has been explained in many ways, as one analysis from Hong Kong puts it, "If there were a will on the part of Mao to show his warmth, there are plenty of ways he could do so. Even a glimpse of him in a fast traveling car on some public occasion such as May Day would be enough to establish his

solidarity with his colleagues. Mao is not on record, even after Lin's downfall, of saying or writing anything definitely against Lin. There is not one Mao instruction issued specifically to condemn Lin. As far as is known, no Mao chaired meeting of the central leadership has been held to pass judgment on Lin's case.

Q: Have your feelings about the advisability of impeachment changed since 1969 when you strongly supported the idea that Supreme Court Justice William
O. Douglas should be impeached?

A: In the first place, the Constitution differentiates between the grounds for impeachment of a President and any other federal official. So I don't think you can really talk about impeachment of a member of the judiciary and impeachment of the President on the same level.

I see absolutely nothing that has been produced so far which under any circumstances would justify the initiation of impeachment proceedings as far as President Nixon is concerned

Q: As a long - time supporter of President Nixon, has anything that has come out since the election shaken your confidence either in him personally or in the way his administration is being run?

A: I still have the same faith in the President I had since the time I first met him. Nothing has been done by him that destroys my faith in him as a person or as a President.

Obviously I am disturbed by actions of people who worked with him in intimate relationships. We all make mistakes sometimes in the people we employ or the authority we give them.

In this case, those he did employ apparently did things that were contrary to good judgment and contrary to the law. And he assumed responsibility for what they did.

But there is a difference between assuming responsibility for the end result of their actions and actively participating in what they did.

Q: Executive privilege is relevant not only to Watergate. Do you think it applies to an administration which was bombing in Cambodia at the same time it was assuring the United States Congress that it was not?

A: Whenever a country. including the United States, is involved in a military operation, it has, in my judgment, the right to carry on cessary military actions for national security. These military actions can't always be fully disclosed at the time for security reasons.

Qt Isn't it carrying it a bit too far to keep from the public and the Congress even the name of the country where we are engaged in military operations? A: In the first place, it wasn't kept entirely from Congress There were members of

Congress, including myself. who were informed as to where our bombing operations were being carried out. Recently Prince Sihanouk

claimed the bombings began in 1963. That means they were carried out under Kennedy under Johnson and under Nixon. All on the basis that this was a part of a policy to try to achieve a peace or successful

Q: So there were members of the Republican minority in the House of Representatives making speeches, talking with voters and making decisions on the House floor, and operating on the assumption that we were not bombing in Cambodia, while all along we actually were and you knew it?

A: My principal point of view was that we were trying to solve a military problem to end the war, to get our prisoners of war back and to achieve peace in Vietnam.

In any war, as I said'a moment ago, where the security of American boys is involved, it isn't always in the national interest fully to disclose everything concerning military

Q: Then what you are really saying is that it wasn't in the national interest for the minority leader of the House of Representatives to inform all members of the Republican minority of what was going on

in Cambodia. A: I'm saying that the national security of the United States - and the saving of American lives - required that the information I had should not be published. I'm more interested in American lives and in peace than I am in being a blabbermouth.

Q: But is it being a blabbermouth to at least inform your Republican colleagues what was actually happening?

A: In these instances, the lives of American boys were involved. And in our efforts to achieve a peace, my decision and obviously the decision of many others - was that we should not discuss publicly these aspects of military operations.

The most famous of all these singing ensembles is the world renowned Salt Lake Mormon Tabernacle Choir, a mighty organization of 375 voices which had its beginning shortly after the pioneers first came to the Salt Lake Valley in 1847.

The Tabernacle Choir today, under the baton of Director Richard P. Condie, sings every Sunday morning on a coast - to coast CBS Network radio broadcast from Temple Square a traditional program since

The Choir gained national prominence in 1911 when it sang in New York City. It gave concerts at some 50 cities on the way and was honored with an invitation to sing for the U.S. President in Washington, D.C.

In 1955, the Choir drew widespread acclaim on a tour of Great Britain, Holland, Denmark, Germany. Switzerland, and France.





Three Magazines For All Readers

By REV. DAVID POLING

Some editors, church members and university students have contended that the religious press/publications have suffered from a narrow view. These critics argue that most religious magazines give a special slant, are targeted for a particular audience and may be promptly dismissed for any general reading enrichment. While this judgment may apply to a majority of religious journals, there are at least three, which we see, that merit a broad public readership. Although varying in editorial perspective, they measure up in excellence of reporting and presenting a fresh input of ideas and comment.

SALT LAKE MORMON TABERNACLE CHOTR

Christianity Today may well be the leading conserva-tive journal published today. It constantly scores in a news coverage that exceeds all other religious magazines put together. How they can afford the global reporting they produce is a mystery yet to be explained. Their staff or representatives hit every major world Christian meeting and their coverage of the Olympics will surely gain some awards from those searching for excellence. Christianity Today gave an entirely different slant on the experiences surrounding Munich and the Olympic Village. They highlighted the activities of the Jesus People who marshalled some big public rallies and created a major stir within the ranks of the Communist-bloc nations.

Unfortunately, much of this did not appear in the secular press-and not at all on television. One interesting item: The 2,000 young people involved in evangelistic effort succeeded in shutting down the free entertainment (sponsored by the host city) that featured nude sex acts in an outdoor theater.

On the theological left, with persuasion and influence is Christianity and Crises. Founded by the late Reinhold Niebuhr, with close attention from Dr. John Bennett, C and C mixes politics and religion like ham and eggs. It is the only journal in the Christian community that has It is the only journal in the Christian community that has regular articles by Roger Shinn, Michael Novak, William Stringfellow, John Fry and Margaret Mead. A recent copy is terribly pragmatic: John Bennett (former president of Union Seminary) offering four suggestions on how to handle controversy (like the war in Vietnam, Angela Davis) in the local church. Also, Michael Novak arguing that America is a gathering of minorities, that they are not going to "melt" and we should rejoice in being black, WASP, Polish and Italian.

Youth Magazine. Yes, we keep quoting it, for it has a timely touch that makes even the best secular youth magazines look tired. Youth is sponsored by six or seven denominations but they don't do any coaching and the editorial staff under Herman Ahrens is reaching nearly 50,000 every month. Their October issue is a prize, for it presents the best of its readers in art, poetry, photography and short stories. Read by adults as well as youth, it now finds its way into public libraries, high school reading rooms, church lounges. It's refreshing to see such a creative effort grow when so many magazines are

breathing hard for survival. Alas, none of the journals reviewed can be found in the drugstore racks or in the shopping center magazine corner. You get them by mail and this is a barrier for many potential readers. To overcome the communication gap, the editors of Christianity Today, Christianity and Crises and Youth have announced that the readers of this column may receive a free copy of their recent issue by writing to CLF Periodicals, 25 Beacon St., Boston, Mass. 02108. In an hour when so much is happening in the religious community, it is good to have some new ideas, controversy and creative response.
