Texas sheriff said today a handscrawled map of possible new gravesites and "many other items of evidence" had been found in a cabin used by a homosexual bachelor accused of killing at least 27 young boys in the worst mass murder in. modern U.S. history.

San Augustine County Sheriff John Hoyt said the map pinpointed several locations in the San Jacinto National Forest in southeast Texas. The sheriff would not say if officers would begin digging for more bodies in the map area.

"I'm not trying to be evasive," he said. "But we just don't know yet whether we have good evidence or bad evidence.

Hoyt, in Houston to confer with Texas Rangers on the case. said the map, shovels, a sheath of plastic body bags, three pairs of gloves-one tinted with lime-and a partially used sack of quicklime were found at the cabin near Lake Sam Rayburn owned by the father of Dean Allen Corll, 33.

Most of the bodies found at three locations in Texas were wrapped in plastic bags and sprinkled with lime

"The map centers on the New Waverly-Huntsville area and we're going to be checking it out," Hoyt said.

Houston Police Chief Herman Short disclosed Monday that a "torture board"-the item allegedly used by Corll to strap down his victims to torture and kill them-was found in the cabin

All the victims were teenaged boys allegedly procured Elmer Wayne Henley, 17, by and David Owen Brooks, 18, for Corll. Henley has admitted. taking part in the torture. sexual abuse, murder and burial of some of the victims. Brooks said he helped Corll and Henley bury some victims but said he was not involved in the

actual killings. Sheriff's deputies recovered four bodies Monday on the beach east of Galveston, raising UO Z7 **Houston District Attorney** Carol S. Vance went before a grand jury today to seek murder indictments against Henley.

"We will not do any more 'scheme of sex, sadism and work today in Chambers County unless there is new information arising." Chambers County Sheriff Louis Otter said.

The four bodies discovered Monday were unearthed in the Chambers County resort of High Island as spectators including bikini clad girls watched. Most of the digging operations were handled by a yellow grading machine called a maintainer.

"If you hear there is a maintainer working down there today we're just putting the beach back in better shape than we left it," Otter said. "We're going back and fill up the ditches we left yesterday.

> **First Grave Discovered** The first grave found Monday actually was discovered by a truck driver poking the beach with a stick Sunday night. "When I brought the stick up,

Both Honley and Brooks have been charged with murder. Henley said he killed Corll last Wednesday during a paintsniffing orgy when Corll threatened to kill a 15-year-old girl and a 20-year-old man Henley brought to Corll's house.

In 1971, the bodies of 25 farm hands were found buried along the Feather River in Northern California in what was, until today, the worst known mass murder in the United States this growing affluence.

He Dated Girl The mother of Frank Aquirre, 19, who also lived in the same area of Houston, known as The Heights, said her son had been dating the girl before he disappeared.

The father of another known victim, Fred Hilligiest, said his son attended the same junior high school with the girl and "most probably knew her."

By United Press International Orders to halt the bombing of Cambodia went out today from a peaceful Marine Corps base overlooking Pearl Harbor on the Hawaiian island of Oahu.

American pilots and crews were instructed that the last bombs were to be dropped before midnight EDT tonightending more than a decade of U.S. combat involvement in Southeast Asia and 160 consecutive days of the intensified air campaign in Cambodia.

In those six months, the U.S. Air Force has dropped more than 240,000 tons of bombs on suspected rebel emplacements in Cambodia-nearly half again the 160,000 tons of conventional explosives dropped on Japan in World War II.

U.S. warplanes used their last hours in Cambodia today to give guerrillas in the jungles around Phnom Penh a final pounding before the cutoff. The heavy bombing shook foundations and rattled windows in the city, but unruffled Cambodians went about their business as usual;

The orders for all U.S. forces to comply with a law ending bombing and combat activity throughout Indochina as of Aug. 15 came from the office of Adm. Noel Gayler, commander of U.S. forces in the Pacific headquartered on Oahu. The directive was in response to an agreement ending the American campaign in Cambodia

But the day before, Lon Nol went on nationwide radio to proclaim his government will fight "until final victory. I will not leave. The Khmer (Cambodian) Republic will win even more victories over the enemy after the 15th of August, as it has done before that date."

Monday. a Cambodian government spokesman said informal contacts were being made between the Lon Nol regime and the insurgent Khmer Rouge (Cambodian rebel) troops. But he warned the war would continue so long as the North Vietnamese continue their intervention in the country.

That view was reiterated today in Tokyo by Sim Var. Cambodia's ambassador to Japan. He said if Sihanouk returns to power, the country will be destroyed by North Vietnamese aggression.

Var. who has held many important ministerial portfolios in the Sihanouk and Lon Nol. governments, said "If Sihanouk returns to power with the Khmer Rouge, North Vietnamese troops will not leave Cambodia. Auto, Steel Firms **Request Increases**

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United Press International Auto and steel makers were first in line Monday for increases as price controls ended under Phase IV.

Chrysler Corp. asked the Cost of Living Council for permission to increase prices on 1974 models by an average of \$71. American Motors also applied to increase car prices an average of \$55.

Ford and General Motors were expected to apply for similar increases for their models coming out in the fall.

Under Phase IV, prices can be increased only as much as higher dollar costs to the seller Big companies, those with annual sales of \$100 million or more. are required to give the council 30 days notice before raising prices, but the increases are automatic if the government does not challenge them. **Reinstatement Asked**

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

Persons in Southwest Texas were most critical of their judičiary, of which 29 per cent drew "poor" ratings. In the Houston - Galveston area and other parts of East Texas 19 to 21 per cent of interviewees rated the job their judges are doing as poor.

He said the government already holds plots of land in appropriate tourism sites. At each site, as he envisions the plan, a group of prefabricated rooms would be arranged to make a hotel of the appropriate size for the location. The rooms would be leased from the manufacturers, who could pick up and deliver units as the needs of the hotel expanded or contracted.

The hotels would be operated by a joint company with 50 per cent local capital and 50 per cent from an international company with a high marketing capability, such as the major airlines that serve the island.

The international company would be in charge of marketing the hotels.

There are about 225 such stations in the country. They live off local contributions, educational subsidides and the federal government's annual appropriations for the Corporation for Public Broadcasting which has grown from \$5 million in 1968 to \$45 million in the current year. They also sell advertising time.

Currently there is a controversy between the CPB, which holds the pursestrings, and the Public Broadcasting Service. which does most of the programming. CPB Chairman Henry Loomis wants the PBS to refrain from national programs of a controversial nature. Most of the public and educational stations disagree and were getting some support from national advertisers in financing such programs.

of KCET of Los Angeles, the country's third largest public TV station, made a crosscountry trip to call on big corporations for help in financing programs for public and educational stations.

Drain problems are among

some and can be messy but it is one of the easier home repair problems for you to solve. The trouble is most likely to be in either of two places-the drain opening in the sink or the trap right below the sink.

Check the drain opening in the sink first. Look at the stopper or strainer. Clean out the material that has cathered in and around it.

Metal stoppers that are in place permanently tend to gather slime. This in turn causes other material to cling and stop the drain.

Kitchen sink strainers lift out for easy cleaning. Lavatory sink stoppers are usually held in place with either a nut above or a coupling below. The coupling will be just above the trap. You will have to examine your setup carefully and loosen or remove these fittings to free the stopper.

Cleaning away material that gathers around stoppers will prevent problems at this point

NEW YORK - (NEA) How does the idea of having a few thousand extra dollars grab you? Does it make you smile? If it does, you're dif-ferent from the average hard-working citizen, according to Eleanor Holtzman, noted con-sumer behavior generalist who sumer behavior specialist who is a senior vice-president and director of information services of DKG advertising agen-

Money and how it is regarded and used is her busines:

"Research indicates," she said, "that there is a negativism about money that per-vades all aspects of handling it - saving, borrowing and spending

"Money," she claims, "is the key to the good life. But most factors that characterize people's attitudes toward it are negative ones.

"This is largely a result of anxieties about not attaining goals," she explained, "and is fed by the secrecy surround-ing personal wealth."

She pointed out that most people think of saving not for a nice vacation, a boat, a car or something pleasurable. They save for a rainy day. And because their thinking is disaster oriented, they have difficulty in saving.

Mrs. Holtzman is a wife and mother who has a home to run and a career that gives full expression to her talents. She became interested in money and how it is used some years ago when she did research for such consumer clients as the Dollar Savings Bank, Getty Oil and Corning Glassware.

"One thing I learned," she said. "is that when people save to have something against disaster, it's like buying 'death insurance.

Frightened people save, she believes. The more optimistic invest. People with real

Owners are scheduled to consider inter-league play for 1974 and the return of baseball to the nation's capital.







> Communication Every military man understands tha communications are all-important. If they are interrupted, even the greatest commander cannot direct his troops to victory. Admiral Mahan, the great exponent of seapower said: "Communications dominate war; broadly considered, they are the most important single element in strategy, political or military." 


