Russia Improves Missiles

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Soviet Union has caught up with the United States in developing multiple ICBM warheads which can be steered to individual targets. Defense Secretary James R. Schlesinger said today

The Russians have successfully tested multiple warheads on two of their missiles. including the SS18, the world's largest intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM), Schlesinger said. He predicted the first Soviet deployments might take place by early 1975. At a Pentagon news conference. Schlesinger said the new warhead tested for the SS18 appeared designed to carry at least six hydrogen bombs in the megaton range, adding "it could have been more."

He said a new warhead successfully demonstrated for the smaller SS17 was designed to carry four warheads with substantially lower explosive power than those for the SS18. A megaton equals 1 million tons of TNT

The missile test, conducted within the Soviet Union, did not employ live bombs, Schlesinger said. But U.S. intelligence analysts were said to have been able to calculate the size of bombs that would be fitted on the missile by studying data from the tests.

Schlesinger did not say how he knew the new warheads had been successfully tested, but the United States regularly monitors Soviet missile progress with reconnaissance

WASHINGTON (UPI) President Nixon intends to in a jauntier, more confident embark on a series of public appearances in an effort to refocus national attention on major domestic and foreign policy problems away from Watergate.

Nixon will use as a springboard his address before the 74th annual convention of the Veterans of Foreign Wars in New Orleans Monday.

After a brief stop there, he will fly on to San Clemente. Calif., for a prolonged stay through Labor Day. Aides said Nixon will be "busy" as he seeks to recoup his standing in the popularity polls, now down to the lowest level of his presidency.

In California, he will hold his first press conference in five months. Deputy Press Secretary Gerald L. Warren commented that Nixon already has expressed his "views" and 'perceptions'' about Watergate, which may indicate he will not be receptive to questions about the scandal.

Magruder **Enters** Plea Of 'Guilty'

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Jeb Stuart Magruder, a key aide in President Nixon's campaign before.' last year, says he feels 'comfortable'' after pleading guilty to conspiracy in the Watergate affair.

"I feel as good as you can under the circumstances," Magruder said Thursday a short time after he entered the plea in U.S. District Court. "I decided it was best to plead guilty to the charges as stated, and I feel comfortable having done so." The charges against Magrud-

er accused him of conspiring to tap the telephones of the Democratic National Committee, hampering the investigation, concealing evidence and lying under oath. The information filed against Magruder by special Watergate Prosecutor Archibald Cox also accused him of taking part in a conspiracy to "misrepresent that the Central Intelligence Agency had an interest in limiting the investigation.

Magruder. 38, who was deputy director of the Nixon reelection committee in 1972. stood at parade rest as he entered his plea before Chief **U.S. District Court Judge John** J. Sirica.

"I plead guilty." Magruder said in a quiet voice Sirica postponed indefinitely the sentencing of Magruder and

The trucks were seized without incident Thursday night, but only after heavily armed troops and opposition congressmen persuaded truckers and their families to abandon a field in Puente Alto, about 12 miles south of Santiago, where the vehicles had been parked. The soldiers were put on

alert, however, to guard against possible incidents from the truckers and their families. Wives of the strikers occupied four radio stations Wednesday and broadcast appeals on behalf of their husbands. The vehicle seizure intensi-

trucks seized Thursday and removed engine parts to make the vehicles inoperable. The army said the trucks will eventually be towed to Santiago after court authorization is obtained.

Reaction to the seizure was immediate. The Small Businessman's Association put its quarter million members on a 'strike alert' in support of the walkout. Last October, owners of retail shops and other merchant groups joined a truckers' walkout that lasted 26 days at an estimated loss of \$200 million to the economy. Preparations have begun for a two-week journey that will take Nixon to France, Britain, Germany. Italy and Belgium as well as perhaps one or two other countries in western Europe.


A stop in Brussels will be keved to meetings with leaders of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) to coordinate a unified stand on forthcoming talks with Soviet leaders and other eastern bloc nations on a mutual armed forces reduction and similar European security problems.

The President was engaged several days ago in "long range scheduling." apparently involving his European visit.

He will be meeting with allied leaders at a time of mounting pressure to reduce the 300,000man American troop level in western Europe.

White House advance teams are expected to go to Europe in September to nail down the details of Nixon's meetings with Europeans heads of state.

The President will be traveling with his senior diplomatic and military advisers, including Henry A. Kissinger and Secretary of State William P. Rogers. Mrs. Nixon will accompany the President

JERUSALEM (UPI) - An Arab accused of hijacking a Lebanese airliner to Israel to promote peace in the Middle East said in court today he "only meant good" and "didn't mean to commit any crime."

At the brief hearing for Mohamed A-Touni, 37, police asked that he be sent back to jail while charges against him were prepared. The procedure is common to Israeli law.

A-Touni told the court : "I do not deserve to be imprisoned. I only meant good and I didn't mean to commit any crime. I planned this for years and I made sure to protect the passengers to assure that no harm would come to them."

Judge Elieazer Goldberg turned down A-Touni's plea not to be imprisoned and sent him back to jail after a 10-minute hearing.

A-Touni appeared disheveled and unshaven 18 hours after he commandeered the plane on a flight from Benghazi, Libya to Beirut

Reading the charge sheet. Judge Goldberg said A-Touni "hijacked the plane while threatening with arms. When the plane was over Cyprus, he forced the pilot to land at Lod." A court interpreter translated from Hebrew into Arabic for A-Touni

A-Touni appeared drunk when he took over the plane Thursday afternoon, wielding two pistols he bought in Alexandria. Egypt. The plane landed at Tel Aviv's Lod Airport. where Israeli security officers entered a hatch underneath the plane and overpowered A-Touni from behind. No shots were fired.

None of the 119 persons aboard the Boeing 707 was injured. They slid down the plane's emergency chute and were given refreshments in the airport's lounge until their

IN GALVESTON AREA Sheriff Orders Bodies Search

HOUSTON (UPI)-**Galveston County Sheriff** ordered a road grader to scrape some beaches along the Gulf Coast today but doubts the machine will find any buried **bodies**

"I don't expect to find any. but I think it is my responsibility to check the area more thoroughly," Sheriff J. B. Kline said.

Six bodies were found last week on the beach of High Island. Seventeen bodies were found buried beneath a Houston boat shed and four others in the pine forests of East Texas.

The 27 young men were killed during the last three years. El mer Wayne Henley, 17, and David Owen Brooks, 18, have been indicted for some of the murders. They said Dean Arnold Corll, 33. was responsible for killing the boys.

Astros Testing **Devices** HOUSTON (UPI) - Skylab's astronauts, with their workday

crammed with experiments, fly their Buck Rogers type miniature spacecraft again today to see if the jet propelled unit can aid future spacemen.

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Nancy

Alan L. Bean and Jack R. Lousma had nearly six hours each allotted for testing the back-mounted flying device while crewmate Owen K. Garriott views the sun.

The third and final test of the maneuvering unit calls for Bean to wear his full spacesuit to evaluate the bulky device which is powered by 14 nitrogen propelled thrusters. Bean wore only a light jumpsuit and crash

helmet on the other tests. Bean said earlier he did not plan to test again a hand held wandlike unit which has thrusters on each end because it was not a practical device for future astronauts. The larger unit might be used for repair work or experiments outside an orbiting craft.

The pilots also were scheduled to photograph the volcano Langila off the coast of New Guinea to give ground scientists data on the interaction of volcanos and the surrounding waters.

Skylab program director William C. Schneider said Thursday the third crew of astronauts to visit the station will be launched Nov. 9 for a 56-day stay. Gerald P. Carr. Edward G. Gibson and William R. Pogue could launch earlier if problems in the station require a crew for repair work, Schneider said.

The November launch will give the pilots an opportunity to view possibly the brightest comet this century as it passed 80 million miles from Earth. The comet Kahoutek will be visible to persons on Earth starting in mid-December. but special instruments on the station will gather data that will be blocked by Earth's atmosphere.

By CARLA COMBS Nancy Dingus, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G.W. Dingus, 1821 Mary Ellen, has been selected as an American Field Service foreign exchange student.

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Nancy, a 1973 graduate of Pampa High School, was selected locally to apply for AFS after an interview with the Pampa AFS board.

Four students from Pampa applied and two were accepted to apply nationally.

Nancy was one of the two. She was accepted nationally and guaranteed as an exchange student only after she answered many written questionnaires and reference forms.

The American Field Service is an organization that was formed after World War II.

Students who participate cannot return to America or see their American parents while participating in this program. The reason that AFS wants to have students live a completely different life with no American influence.

Nancy began corresponding with her German family soon after she was accepted. She will be staying with Mr. and Mrs. Krawautschke. She will have a brother, Horst, five, and a sister, Susie, eight.

Her German father, Dietrich, works for a metal works firm and is a race car fan and avid TV follower. Her German mother, Christel, likes to cook, knit and do vard work. Susie is a tomboy and Horst plays with lego blocks.

Nancy has been preparing herself for living in Germany during the past year by taking German lessons from Mrs. Rosa Brewer, a Pampa resident. She feels that the language barrier will have little influence on her German life.







also observe a cremation" That's what it said on page 212 of my guidebook on Bali. I shuddered -I had seen pictures of public cremations in other Asian countries and that hind of work I didn't that kind of luck I didn't want.

But when I quoted the guide book to our Balinese guide, he smiled and said, "Yes, perhaps we will be lucky -- it is a very joyous ceremony I didn't get to see a

cremation ceremony during

our four-day visit to this fabled island in Indonesia.

But the Balinese, who

Hinduism, Buddhism and island worship, have no fear of death, I was told. They believe

in reincarnation and regard

death as passing from this life to a far better one.

"It is a most joyous time, colorful ... with the body covered by a large paper, a beautifully decorated horse, cow or fish," an islander said.

"Then they are consumed by flames and taken in ashes in a

About 300 years ago a French politician by the name of Jean Baptiste Colbert, financial aide to Louis XIV, asked a French manufacturer by the name of Legendre what he (the politician) could do for industry. Legendre was said to have replied, "Laissez - nous faire;" that is to say, "Leave us alone

The reply probably was not flippant. Colbert was known as a stern task master and had in fact introduced the galley slave system to the French navy. Legendre's advice was not taken, but his famous phrase was taken up. In the next 200 years, "Laissez - faire' economics became a doctrine that salted the industrial progress of France, England and the United States.

The claims of Laissez - faire are three - fold: that the "let alone" principle (non intervention by the government) tends to stabilize prices, tends to produce more of that people want, and tends to divide goods and services fairly between the owners of the tools and the operators thereof. The per' of its greatest influence. 1840 to 1870, provided some confirmation of these claims. Industrial empires rose in Europe, in England and the United States. But about that time; it was found that some industries became so big that they dominated the business scene to the point that they could virtually dictate unfair contracts, suppress competition and oppress the workingman. In short, it was found that powerful tycoons began to act like the powerful politicians of former years.

H. L. Hunt Writes **HELPING PEOPLE** HELP THEMSELVES

The problem of poverty is one of the most perplexing issues confronting the people of the United States.

-No single issue has been more obscured by emotional appeals from self - serving politicians and collectivist - minded social reformers. The major effect of the shortsighted gimmicks offered as alternatives to the problem of poverty has been to undermine the most effective economic system ever created.

The definition of poverty is always relative to the accepted standard of living of the rest of society. In this respect, poverty will always exist since some individuals are not motivated to achieve this standard.

However, the personal enterprise profit - motive system has made it possible for those who truly wish to do so rise above the poverty level through their own efforts. In fact, the dilemma we face today is a result of the tremendous accelaration of economic progress made possible by this system.

The very miracles brought about in our age by the profit motive system have created expectations that keep running ahead even of the accelerating progress; and so have led to an incredibly shortsighted impatience that threatens to destroy the very system that makes such expectations possible The answer to the problem of poverty lies in the preservation of the profit - motive system. The most constructive remedy for poverty is to provide each individual with a means of helping himself. Neither government nor charity will provide permanent solutions to the condition of poverty, only the individual who is motivated to help himself.

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unfolding of industrial progress would bring such a stage was not unknown to the adherents of Laissez - faire doctrine, but they held it to be a passing phase that would in turn be corrected if government would stay out of the picture. On its face, the umpire theory was plausible. But that is the defect of human social inventions. The plausibility is not a competent substitute for

He must diminish the reward that the oppressors of mankind derive from collectivization without resorting to the combat tactics that they use.

That is a big order. That is the challenge to Laissez - faire three centuries after a French businessman gave a simple but profound answer to a French politician.



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

'Fires have a terrible fascination," says New York Fire Marshal Vincent Canty, "people like to see them." Nobody likes to see murders or earthquakes or hurricanes or traffic deaths - but fires apparently make some people feel good

'It's almost as if people are glad when they happen. It's exciting, it's free - it's like TV, I guess. And then afterward, you know, there's al-ways the fire sale," says one metropolitan fire commission-

The attitude, perhaps exaggerated, is not really a malicious one. Most Americans. eternally egotistic, do not fear fire because they believe they can control it. Streaking La-France engines, super pumpers, mile-high ladders and all the rest of the nation's fancy fire fighting technology con-tributes to a feeling of security. And even if the super pumpers peter out there is always fire insurance, so liberal at times as to make fire worthwhile.

But people don't see that. Not usually. And thus, accord-ing to Commission findings, it is people themselves who are usually at fault for children being caught in such fires. 'Most fires in America." says Bland, "are caused by people. They are due to carelessness or to mistakes. Commission figures indicate that at least 601,208 of the reported 826,600 building fires in 1972 were caused by "human action.

Most of this "human action is stupidity. The 177page Commission report. "America Burning," is almost a thesis on human stupidity. One Commission member. Dr. Anne Wright Phillips. a Massachusetts burn specialist. says that when she took a "fire intelligence" poll of 2,-019 Americans, minor and adult, the results were discouraging.

Three of four adults quizzed recommended over-sized fuses for ordinary lighting circuits. Almost no children under 7 knew they should drop and roll if their clothing catches on fire. More than one-quarter of the people questioned did not know that opening a hot door during a fire would almost certainly expose them to intolerable heat.





He was brutally frank and obnoxiously sensational One day he removed his wrist watch, placed it before him on the table and remarked: "If there is a God, I will give him fifteen minutes to strike me dead." Big Red. they called him. He loved his liquor and wild times. Life to him was a thrill a minute. There was no. one to stop him from going full speed ahead. After all, he gave God fifteen minutes and God passed it up:

Lewis spent the last thirty years - not the last fifteen minutes - the last thirty years of his life as a nervous, fumbling alcoholic. And when he died alone, among strangers, in a second - class clinic on the outskirts of Rome. An anonymous Franciscan nun recalled his words at the end. "At least let the sun come back." About fifteen minutes later he was dead. There are certain choices

which cannot be unmade, and certain consequences which not even God can take away. To take for a very simple example : if a young man or woman loses his or her purity, virginity, nothing can ever bring it back. The choice was made and the choice stands. God can and will forgive, but God Himself cannot turn back the clock and unmake the choice or undo the consequences. We do well to remember that there is a certain finality in life. The tears of old age cannot undo the failures of our youth. How we need to heed this warning! Not only guard your morals but guard your mind. If you lack knowledge, go to school and learn all you can. If you lack wisdom. go to God and ask for what you need. Psalm 111:10 says, "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom." You need the learning and knowledge which comes from teachers and books, but you also need wisdom for living life and that comes from God. Their ethical and moral sensibilities eroded and collapsed. Their ultimate vision was no further than the next wiretap.

Surely we are not so numb or indecent to neglect the brutal ethical system of those persons who will do anything for their political leaders. Dr. Alfred Freedman. president of the American Psychiatric Assn., put it most clearly when hesaid

To hear John Ehrlichman parade nis ignorance of psy chiatry and to justify the burglarizing of a psychiatrist's of-fice on the grounds of national security; to ponder his gross insult in implying that physicians and nurses and aides could be prevailed upon to reveal patient's records: to contemplate his icy indifference to the erosion of democratic institutions. including doctor-patient relationships - all this boggles the mind and suggests a moral insensitivity at the highest levels of government

Watergate is putting the American judicial system to the test: Will the laws of this nation (and the religious morality which was inherent to their creation) be strong and sharp enough to cleanse our government of this massive corruption? All true religion begins in mysticism and ends in politics - that is, is fulfilled in the political encounter. Lawyers and jurists will now have a full exercise of that concept.

Perhaps it is more than appropriate that this month (Sunday, Aug. 26) is the international observance of "World Law Day." During the week they will discuss pressing world problems that have been close to the hearts of religious communities everywhere: prison reform, international protection of refugees, population control, legal protection of minorities, dangerous drug controls, pollution of air and water and a revitalization of the United Nations.

In preparation of this major law-religion event, the World Peace Through Law Center at 400 Hill Bldg., Washington, D.C. 20006 has an attractive brochure tracing the world's major religions and the legal systems, which have evolved from ancient faiths. Americans taking leadership in the African conference include Charles S. Rhyne, former President of the American Bar Association. Earl Warren, Chief Justice of the United States, Ret., and Mrs. Marion Dentzel.

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (UPI) -By the powers vested in him as baseball commissioner. Bowie Kuhn decided not to exercise any at all, thereby delighting the National League, dismaying the American, and killing off any possible chance of interleague play next year

Kuhn did all this by simply declining to vote yes or no Thursday, when the American League pressed him to do so in the deadlock with the National League over whether regular season inter-league play should be introduced next season.

'I did not vote it down. I did not vote it up." Kuhn said after the 45-minute closing session of baseball's summer meetings.

'Instead, I have created a special steering committee of five members, two club owners from each league and the commissioner, to have the authority to consider any and all aspects of professional baseball, including the subject of inter-league play, and to report back to the annual meetings in Houston with whatever recommendations they might make.

Inter-league play was doomed Tuesday, when the National League met and unanimously rejected the concept. The league reaffirmed its stand Wednesday and relayed its feelings to the joint session Thursday.



\$3.5 millio General Electric and Westinghouse Air Brake, the defendants, appealed the award as exorbitant, but lost. An Illinois housewife got a \$930,000 judgment against the maker of a can of drain solvent that exploded. All around the country awards of \$100,000 or more are multiplying in lawsuits over product liability resulting from accidents.

'These suits are costing industry several hundred million dollars a year and the amount will go up," says Professor Richard M. Jacobs of Newark College of Engineering at Newark, N.J. "The suits are products-or else. proliferating so that the trial lawyers may find in them a

source of income as lucrative as the auto accident suits." Jacobs is general chairman of the annual Product Liability Conference to be held this year at the Newark college Aug. 22-24. A panel of legal, insurance, engineering and business experts will discuss every phase of the industry problem.

Jacobs said around 200,000 product liability suits are being tried this year and 600,000 more will have been settled out of court by yearend. They involve products and claims ranging

head against the wall, feet close together, two inches from the wall, toes pointing straight ahead. Bend the knees slightly and turn them outward. Push the small of the back against the wall. Pull tummy in. Pull shoulders back and down. Pull downward with fingers. Push the top of the head up toward the ceil-

Hold this position and shift the weight to the left foot. Now bend the right knee up toward the chest, pulling the knee outward.

Return the foot to the floor. Shift the weight to the right foot and bend the left knee up toward the chest. pulling the knee outward.

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
