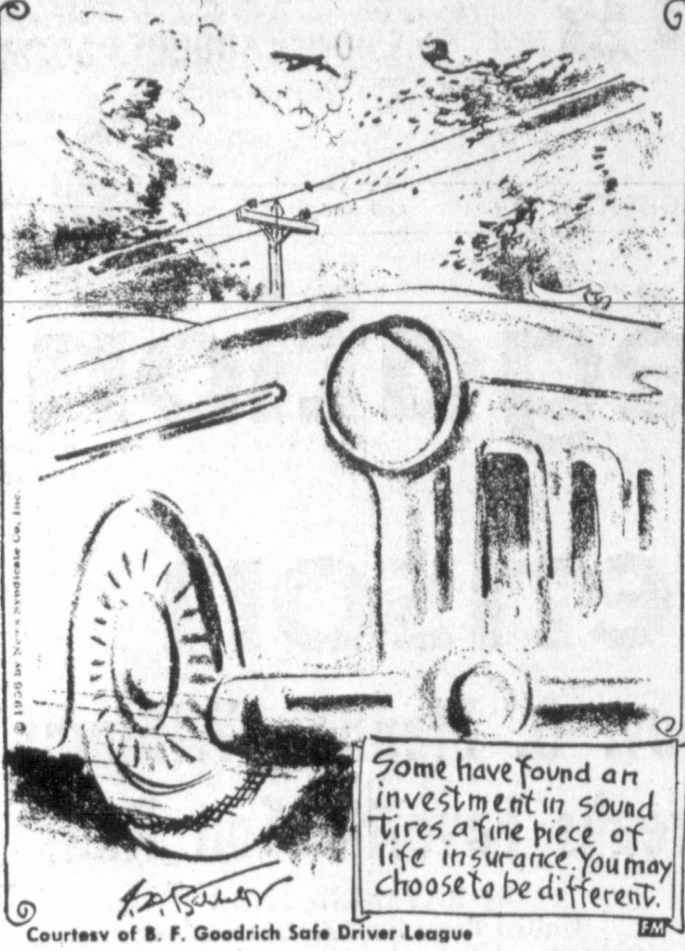

"We believe it is in the best interests of the party that uncommitted delegations favorable to Gov. Stevenson should come into his camp now and thus help to consolidate liberal strength around him."

Williams said his delegation was "reserving the right" to go through the formality of placing his name in nomination, as a courtesy, but that his Michigan delegates would be free to vote as they pleased on the first ballot. He urged them all to vote for Stevenson. But the caucus poll turned up 11 votes for Harriman and 1/2 vote for dark horse Sen. Stuart Symington.

Defense Secretary Wilson Says U. S. Leads Arms Race

DALLAS (UP) — Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson said today that the United States leads the world in the arms race and has the weapons and military power to disastrously defeat any enemy.

Wilson spoke at the 57th annual encampment of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and in his speech answered five questions which he said the Defense Department is most frequently asked about the nation's security.

The first question was about the nation's ability to win a war. Wilson said this country not only could win, but he also doubts that any potential enemy would attack, because of the consequences.

The second question was about the position of the United States in the arms race and the third was whether there are differences among Wilson's military advisors about the best way to defend the nation.

Differences Present "My reply is that there are differences today and there always have been among military men," he said. "This is due in part to the fact that each service is highly dedicated to a belief in the value and effectiveness of its own weapons and strategic concepts."

"The mere fact that a potential land army of millions of men to protect its vast terrain or to maintain order internally against possible revolution does not mean that we must match that figure."

He said the Defense Department is often asked whether it is more concerned with balancing the budget than with insuring the nation's defense. He said this is not so.

The fifth question, Wilson said, was whether the armed services would not be more effective combined into a single service under one chief of staff. Wilson said he didn't think so and that merging the armed forces would only cause differences of opinion to pop up in other forms.

Injured Boy Receives Aid From Brother

SKELLYTOWN — (Special) — Prompt administration of first aid by Ted McKissick, 12, to his seriously injured brother, Guy, 9, this week helped control the loss of blood and prevent shock in the younger boy, it was reported. Mr. Truman opened a news conference with a blast at newspapers which have said that his espousal of Harriman's cause would harm the former President's place in history.

"I am not worried about the personal consequences," Mr. Truman said. "I am shocked that any liberal Democrat would abandon the New Deal or the Fair Deal as out of date," he said.

The former President, making an energetic last ditch effort to stop Stevenson, said he thought the former Illinois governor might represent the "destruction of social philosophy" if he won the nomination here.

Mr. Truman said he had nothing personal against Stevenson; as a matter of fact, he liked him. This brought a big laugh from the reporters assembled in the flood-lit crystal ballroom of the Blackstone hotel.

He said his basic purpose in this Democratic nominating convention was to put across a "fighting candidate" who was not hobbled by "reverations or evasions."

Moderation Hit He said he feared that Stevenson followed "the counsel of hesitation" which would lead the Democratic party into the hands of moderates.

Mrs. FDR Criticized Mr. Truman also criticized Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, widow of the late President, who recommended to the convention in a speech that they forget the New Deal or the Fair Deal and look to the future.

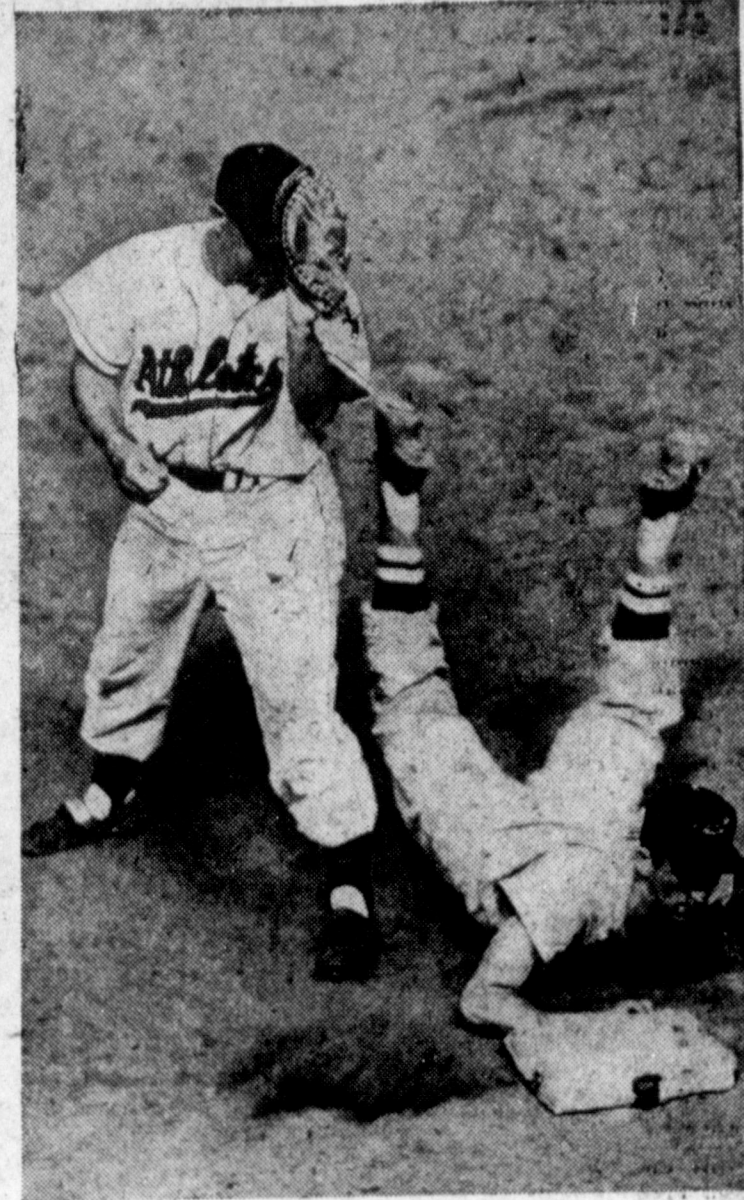

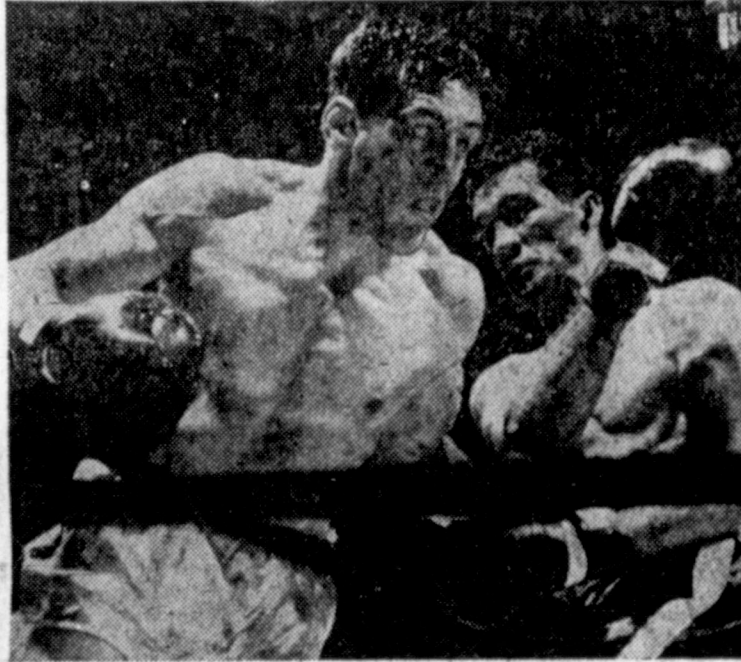

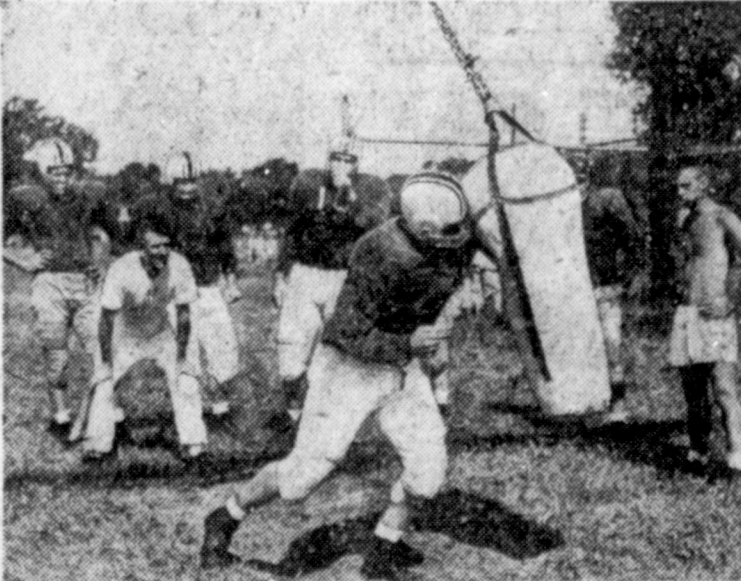

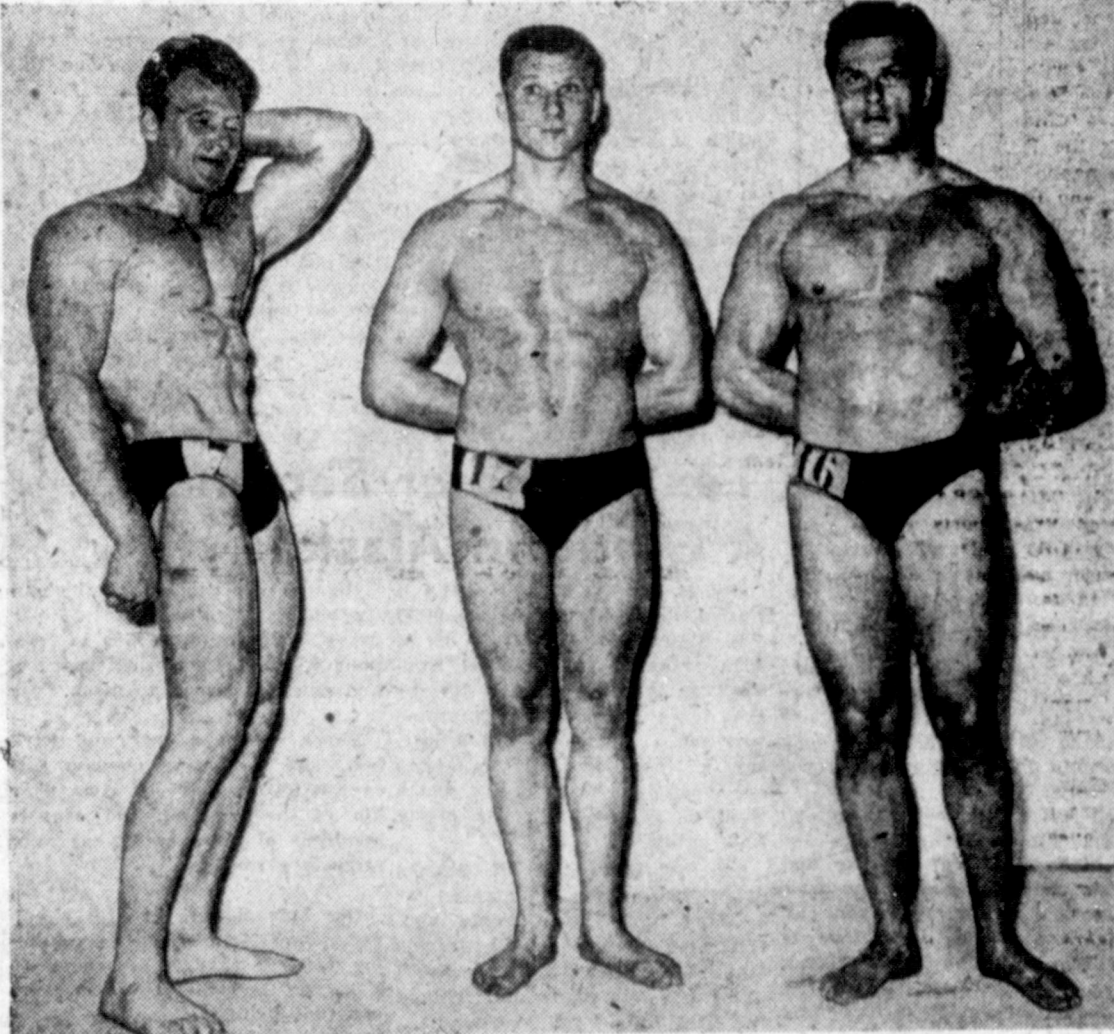

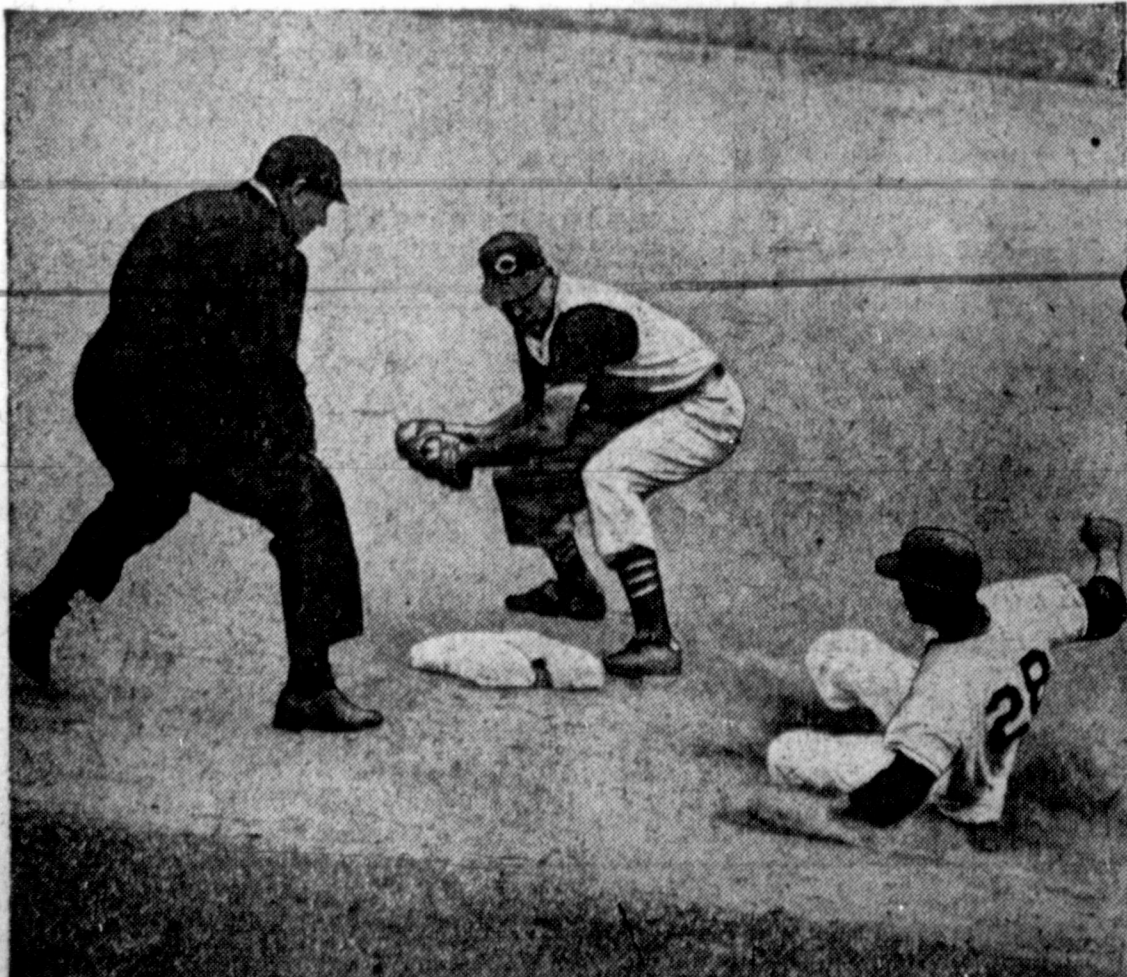

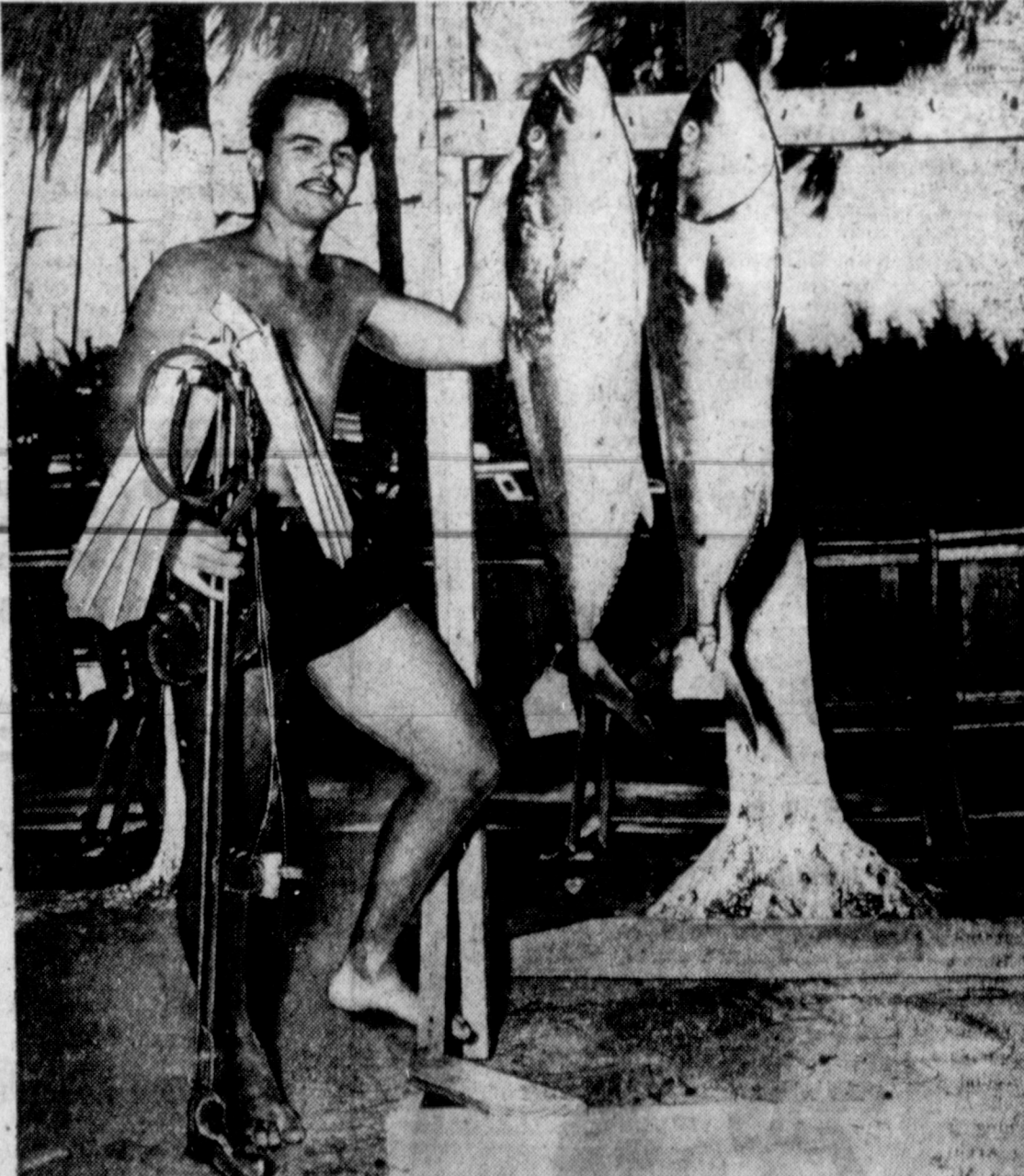

G.O.P. Governors Would Be Veep

 SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Two Republican governors set off new ripples today in the surface of GOP convention plans with statements that they would be willing to run for vice president, if asked. However, neither Gov. Goodwin J. Knight of California nor Gov. Theodore R. McKeldin of Maryland declared themselves as candidates. Knight indicated to a California labor convention at Long Beach that he is "available." McKeldin, who put President Eisenhower's name in nomination in 1952, told reporters he would be glad "to accept the No. 2 spot" if I should be selected by President Eisenhower. Although neither statement appeared to ruffle top GOP strategists, they added new fuel to the possible scrap over Harold E. Stassen's determined effort to dump Vice President Richard M. Nixon in favor of Massachusetts Gov. Christian A. Herter. Stassen is expected to open headquarters here later this week. Meanwhile, his persistent campaign against Nixon held the main interest of GOP forces arriving in increasing strength for the convention's formal opening Monday. While most of the talk centered around a possible fight over the vice presidential nomination, the Republicans set out to iron out quietly — if possible — their only two contests over seating of delegations. As in several conventions, the squabbles concerned two normally-Democratic states, Mississippi and South Carolina. The GOP national committee's subcommittee on contests, headed by Albert K. Mitchell of New Mexico, called a meeting for this afternoon behind closed doors to consider the contesting claims. The full national committee will take up its recommendations Wednesday. In other major pre-convention activity, the resolutions committee begins deliberations Wednesday on a platform for Mr. Eisenhower and his running mate to use during the fall campaign. Sen. Prescott Bush (R-Conn.), chairman of the platform committee, told a news conference that the platform will emphasize the philosophy of Mr. Eisenhower. He predicted that it would be "brief, forthright and honest with the American people."

Chadwick, 25, Pevryton, Tex., and two of his small daughters were killed in the crash. His wife and another daughter, six weeks old, were injured. Johnson, a former president of the Oklahoma Junior Chamber of Commerce, was defeated last month in his bid for re-election.

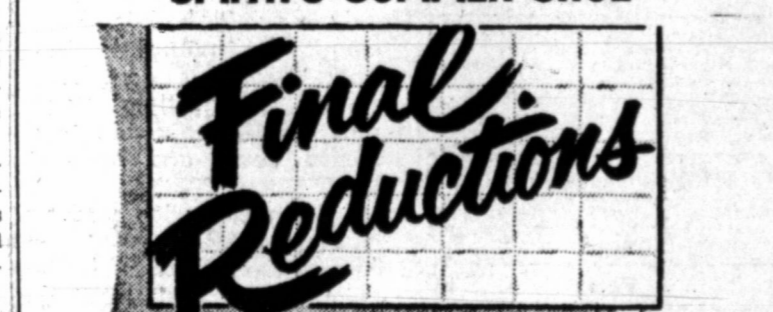
Roosevelt Family Views
