Gov. G. Mennen Williams Breaks Favorite Son Ranks

United Press Staff Correspondent CHICAGO -UP- Michigan Gov. G. Mennen Williams broke the ranks of favorite son candidates at the Democratic National Convention today and threw his support to Adlai E. Stevenson for the presidential nomina-

Williams released his 44-vote state delegation at a post-midnight caucus. He urged other fence-sitting delegations to join him in flocking to the Stevenson banner to avoid the "unforeseeable" dangers of a deadlocked convention. A caucus poll of the Michigan delegation indicated Stevenson would get at least 321/2 of its votes on the first ballot, and Williams said he hoped to make it

ents as toppings. Several readers have asked whether a chicken can go from freezer to frying pan or broiling rack without thawing and cook suc

cessfully. Dr. Faith Fenton of the New York State (Cornell) Experiment Station replies:

In general, it's best to thaw chicken before cooking. However, cut-up chicken for stewing may go hard-frozen into the water. But cutup broiler and fryer chicken gen erally needs thawing to separate the pieces unless the pieces are wrapped separately before freez-

When it comes to frying, it's difficult to get a brown crust on pieces that are not defrosted. Chicken that is to be dipped in eggs and crumbs before frying needs thawing first.

'Giveaway' Congress

Reams and reams of copy have been written about what happened during the just-closed session of the 84th Congress of the United States.

There are those in the Republican Party who claim credit for having done the most for the people. Democrats also are making claims that what was done was to their credit — after all they controlled the Congress.

But David Lawrence, editor of U. S. News & World Report, accurately depicted the 84th as the "give-way" Congress.

"The freest in spending, the most extravagant in giving away the taxpayers' money, the biggest in 'log-rolling' deals — the system whereby members reciprocate in aiding each other's projects — this is the strange record of the 84th Congress," is the way Lawrence described the Washington lawmakers.

He points to more than 60 billion dollars in appropriations, "much of it as a plain subsidy to big voting groups." They included expanded federal payments for milk to be given free to children in public schools and summer camps, the "soil bank," log-rolling military expenditures, and major projects benefitting particular localities and privileged groups in the electorate.

There were increases in pay for legislators, judges and grants under the so-called social security programthe "largest amounts of 'welfare' money ever voted.

He pointed out: "Many of the schemes, moreover, call for relatively small payments at first - just a few millions a year now — but they build permanently into the governmental scheme of things a new series of expenditures which will pile up new appropriations for future Congresses to provide annually.

Lawrence called this a "non-radical Congress," after qualifying it by saying he was speaking "broadly." The legislators balked government-ownership advocates from getting public power projects which "could start the downfall of private electric power companies," and they also opposed socialistic features of public housing and blocked amendments to the Taft-Hartley Act, which the labor bosses — but not necessarily the union members find so distasteful.

Except for the segregation issue, a federal publicschool construction fund of \$1,600,000,000 would have been voted, Lawrence noted. Only in foreign aid was there a tendency for drastic economies, he said.

There was "almost nothing" about reducing the ever-expanding tax burden.

Where is all the money coming from to meet the new obligations just piled on the taxoayers by Congress?" Lawrence asks. Then he answers: "It may turn out that the 84th Congress made a new record of some kind in preventing any income-tax cuts for many years to come. The spending drive now is so strong that, if the American people do not check it, they will find the 85th Congress outdoing its predecessors in giving away public funds.

'What is needed now are non-partisan groups of taxpayers in every congressional district to organize a lawful revolt and to encourage those candidates to run for office who will check the spending streak."

The Doctor Says

By EDGAR P. JORDAN, M. D.

There are, as most people are aware, several different possible causes for impaired hearing. Furthermore, there is a wide variation in the degree of hearing difficulty among those in whom this sense has become damaged. In other words, one person who has hearing trouble may require treatment quite different from anoth-

Among the most important causes of deafness is one known as otosclerosis. This is a condition found most commonly in young white adults, especially women, There is frequently a family tendency to this disease - indeed it may be hereditary - and the condition has a tendency to get worse. At first, roaring in the ears is common. Both ears are commonly involved.

THE LOCATION of the difficulty in otosclerosis is in the tiny bones in the hearing apparatus which plays a vital part in the transmission of sound from the outside to the reception centers in the brain.

A method of preventing the development of otosclerosis has not been discovered. Treatment, nevertheless, has been advancing,

For a number of years, for example, there has been available an ingeniously devised and complicated operation for some patients called the fenestration operation. This has been employed on thousands of patients, many of whom have obtained successful results though there have also been

many failures. SINCE 1952 another operation

for this type deafness has also been made available. This consists in entering the involved area and freeing the little bones which have been tied down by the otosclerotic process so that they can again aid in the transmission of

This "mobilization" or freeing operation can be used in the same type of case in which the fenestration operation is also employed. In other words, it is suitable for some but not all patients. It has now been performed on several hundred and the proportion of good results is increasing as experience

with the operation grows. It is an easier operation to perform than the fenestration operation though both, of course, involve great skill. It can be done under local anesthetic and there

are few complications. THE RESULTS from the mobilization operation are apparently (my far) not quite as good as from the fenestration operation. That is, there are not quite so many who get good results. However, this is often true of a new procedure until sufficient experience is gained with it.

Furthermore, the mobilization procedure does not prevent trying the fenestration operation at some future time for those who fail to get desirable results from the first.

One cannot help but be encouraged by the development of new methods to improve the hearing of those who are afflicted with various types and degrees of deaf-

No doubt the future will bring still further improvements.

the Coveting Commandment?" After reading Article 4, Section 2, which is as follows:

"The Citizens of each State shall be entitled to all Privileges and Immunities of Citizens of the several States.

"A person charged in any State with Treason, Felony, or other Crime, who shall flee from Justice, and be found in another State, shall on demand of the executive Authority of the State from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the State having Jurisdiction of the Crime.

"No Person held to Service or Labour in one State, under the Laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in Consequence of any Law or Regulation therein, be discharged from such Service or Labour but shall be delivered up on Claim of the Party to whom such Service or Labour may be

Beral answered: "It merely says that because a person flees one state it doesn't make him free. Another state would return him for his trial."

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








