## 'Operation Safety Haven' Refugee Airlift Gets Underway

(Editor's note: Veteran United Press reporter H. D. Quigg has flown to Europe to cover "Operation Safe Haven," by which the U.S. Air Force will fly 9,500 Hungarian refugees to the United States. His first dispatch follows.)

MUNICH, Germany (UP)—Some 350 Hungarian refugees—the vanguard of 15,000 who will be lifted by air and sea to the United States under White House directive—were scheduled to arrive here late today.

The Air Force's "Operation Safe Haven," which will spread a flying carpet of transports for 9,500 of the refugees from Munich to McGuire Air Force Base, N.J., will start Tuesday—weather permitting.

Brig. Gen. George B. Dany, commander of the Military Air Transport Service (MATS) task force which will perform the airlift, told newsmen his sirmen would work through Christmas. The schedule calls for all 9,500 to be airlifted to America by the end of this month.

Mary Go By Ship  
The remaining 5,500 will go by ship from Bremerhaven to the United States. The first C4 type military area transport vessel is scheduled to depart between Dec. 18 and 21; the second between Dec. 23 and Christmas Day, and the third between Dec. 29 and 31.

A U.S. Army spokesman announced that the first 350 refugees are expected here today after a three-hour bus trip from Salzburg, Austria.

The Army will care for them overnight, providing them with food and medical and dental care. They will be put up overnight at a former German army barracks.

Army Band On Hand  
A. J. Linsley Dorman, public information officer of the Army's southern area command, said the Army here will be able to house and care for 2,000 refugees at one time.

The 30th U.S. Army band planned to greet the first group of refugees today.

## Terror Reigns In Hungary

VIENNA (UP)—The Janos Kadar puppet regime unleashed a new campaign of terror through-out Hungary today in an attempt to crush totally the Hungarian workers—backbone of the anti-Communist resistance.

There were reports some Russian troops who went into Hungary believing they would fight Anglo-American "Fascists" were sickening of the bloodshed after realizing the brutality of their true mission.

The Moscow-imposed Kadar regime finally stripped away the pretenses of democracy Sunday. It clamped martial law on dying Hungary, and outlawed all regional workers councils. Workers proclaimed a new general strike.

All communications with the West were severed by the puppet Communist government in an attempt to prevent a new armed uprising.

The last time Hungary was cut off from the West was Nov. 4 when Soviet armored forces struck by surprise to crush the freedom revolt and install the Kadar regime.

The government crackdown followed a call by the Budapest workers council for a 48-hour general strike in all but the most essential industries to begin at midnight Sunday night. The strike was called to protest the mass arrests of labor leaders.

The council also appealed to the workers of the world to join in the protest against the Communist oppression.

In calling the strike, the Budapest Workers Council which had been negotiating fruitlessly for weeks with Kadar, signed its own death warrant as well as that of the other regional councils.

The Hungarian presidential council's communique announced martial law would become effective at 6 p. m. (11 a. m. est.) Tuesday. It listed several reasons for the declaration which would permit a drastic purge of the "counter-revolutionaries."

## Censure Of Russia Asked By US, Others

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (UP)—United States and 15 other world powers join today in a demand that the United Nations condemn Russia for "depriving Hungary of its liberty and independence."

The resolution placed before the General Assembly calls on Russia to agree to withdraw its military forces from Hungary under U.N. observation and "desist forthwith" from any form of intervention in Hungarian affairs.

The resolution was originally sponsored by the United States, Argentina, Australia, Belgium, Denmark, El Salvador, Ireland, Italy, The Netherlands, Norway, Pakistan, Sweden and Thailand.

Chile, Peru and the Philippines added their names to the resolution late Sunday, and more countries were expected to be added today.

Thirteen nations demanded last week that Moscow and Budapest admit U.N. observers to Hungary to study the situation in that embattled country. They set Friday midnight as a deadline for an answer, but the deadline passed without a reply from the Soviet government or the Hungarian puppet government of Premier Janos Kadar.

Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia refused permission to U.N. observers to survey the Hungarian situation from the borders of those two countries. Austria granted permission, and no reply was received from Romania.

U.N. sources said they believed some governments were reluctant to be too critical of Russia or Hungary for fear of reprisals from Budapest. They said the Kadar regime could make such reprisals by breaking diplomatic relations with countries maintaining embassies and legations in Hungary.

# Canadian Plane With 62 Aboard Is Feared Down

## Re-Integrated Clinton School Is Re-Opened

CLINTON, Tenn. (UP)—The integrated high school here re-opened peacefully today following a five-day shutdown because of new racial disturbances.

Eight Negro pupils—four boys and four girls—came down from Foley Hill, the city's Negro community, and walked into their classrooms.

About 700 white pupils, almost full enrollment, came to school in a jovial good humor. There were no catcalls and no jeering today in contrast to the heckling given the Negroes ever since the school was integrated in September.

At Knoxville, 20 miles to the east, 16 persons were to be arraigned today before a federal judge on charges of instigating racial trouble that caused the closing of Clinton high last Tuesday.

Most of the white pupils were already seated when the Negro pupils came through the main entrance of the embattled school. Police and deputy sheriffs cruised by in cars, but things were quiet. Only about 20 newsmen were on hand to watch the re-opening.

After roll call the student body went to the auditorium where school officials read slowly to the pupils a federal injunction against interfering with the integration—the same that brought the arrests last week. Then the ruling was patiently explained to the boys' girls.

"Everything was normal," police chief Francis Moore said. (See SCHOOL, Page 8)

## Anti-British Fights Erupt In Port Said

LONDON (UP)—Egyptian underground fighters in Port Said attacked an eight-man British patrol early today with hand grenades and machineguns, injuring one soldier. Seven Egyptians were arrested.

It was the first outbreak of anti-British violence since the military occupation of Port Said and authorities feared there would be more as Anglo-French troops evacuated the captured city.

Tension was rising daily in the Port City and there have been increasing reports of arms and ammunition smuggled to underground fighters in Port Said. Most foreigners have left in fear of Egyptian vengeance.

Soldiers Save Selves  
The eight-man patrol of the first battalion of Royal Scots was attacked on the fringe of the native quarters, but the quick-thinking soldiers saved their lives by diving for cover when they first saw the British.

## 78 Building Permits Are Issued Here

The city engineer's office announced today that it issued a total of 78 permits during November for construction and remodeling of residences and businesses totaling \$748,375.00.

Of the permits issued 46 were for the construction of new residences with the total value of \$593,150. Two permits for the remodeling of residences totaling \$27,975 were also issued.

Permits for the construction of new business buildings totaled three with a value of \$37,500 and three permits for remodeling of businesses at an estimated cost of \$26,500 were issued.

Two permits, one for the construction of a new church building and one for the remodeling of a church building, totaled \$50,000.

Permits issued for miscellaneous construction and remodeling work totaled 12 with an estimated cost of \$12,260.

## Americans Pause In Meditation For Hungary's Brutality Victims

Thousands of Americans from coast to coast paused in prayerful meditation today for the victims of what President Eisenhower called the "brutality in Hungary."

The President made the statement in urging Americans everywhere today to observe United Nations human rights day by lifting their hearts and prayers to the oppressed people of Hungary.

The peal of church bells at noon sounded the call to prayer in many cities. Flags were flown at half mast in some cities as a day long reminder of the sacrifices made by freedom loving Hungarians.

"On this human rights day," the President said in his statement, "it is for each one of us to recognize anew that we are brothers in our father's house, and each is truly his brother's keeper."

Tyranny Denounced  
"We cannot shed that responsibility, nor do we want to do so. Let us resolve on this day that the world shall never forget what tyranny has done to our fellow man in Hungary."

Mr. Eisenhower's statement, his most sympathetic to date on behalf of the Hungarians, also said the Soviet terror in Hungary "repudiates and negates" virtually every article in the UN declaration of human rights.

"That these human rights have been so flagrantly repudiated is cause for worldwide mourning," he said.

Among the cities holding special observances were San Francisco, Fort Worth, El Paso, Cincinnati, Albuquerque, Washington and Newport, Ky. New York and some other cities marked the day with special proclamations.

A moment of silence was observed in schools in San Francisco, birthplace of the United Nations, Fort Worth and El Paso. San Francisco Mayor George Christopher also asked all residents to join in prayer.

Students Mourning  
Students at Xavier University in Cincinnati wore black arm bands.

Flags at Indianapolis were flown at half staff.

The United Nations headquarters in New York took time out from considering a motion to condemn Russia to hear a special concert by the Vienna Philharmonic orchestra.

Mrs. Oswald B. Lord, U. S. representative on the UN human rights commission, urged that the day be dedicated to the Hungarians.

"To the courageous dead we pledge our determination that their supreme sacrifice shall not have been in vain," Mrs. Lord said.

Elsewhere, the Scripps Howard newspapers suggested editorially that the day be one of mourning—a day of remembrance of a monstrous crime against the human race.

## Ike Is Working On Budget Message

AUGUSTA, Ga. (UP)—President Eisenhower today completed his financial work on the 1958 budget and began the laborious task of drafting a budget message for the new Congress.

Budget Director Percival Brundage who conferred with the President here over the week end, said as he flew back to Washington, "we have finished the totals."

What Brundage meant was that the President and his chief administration advisers have settled on a total for the budget in the upcoming fiscal year.

"We now have all the totals—the big figures," Brundage told a reporter. "Now we must bring them together and start work on the message itself."

Brundage declined to guess—publication—at the size of the new budget, saying, "after all this work, we'll just have to wait for the printed version."

Brundage, who conferred here with the President, Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson and Chairman Lewis L. Strauss of the Atomic Energy Commission, said the new budget, if necessary, was completed and would start to the government printing office by Dec. 15.

Will Meet Nehru  
Mr. Eisenhower, who has been here since Nov. 26, planned to return to Washington next Thursday afternoon. After a briefing by State Department officials, he will receive Indian Prime Minister Nehru next Sunday afternoon.

The President issued a statement late Sunday asking the nation to join in observance of United Nations Human Rights Day with a "resolve that the world shall never forget what tyranny has done" in Hungary.

The President expressed the "horror and revision" felt by free peoples at the Soviet brutality toward the Hungarians.

## American Athletes Believed To Be Aboard Doomed Plane

VANCOUVER, B. C. (UP)—Seventeen aircraft were pressed into a desperate search today for a Trans-Canada Air Lines North Star as fears mounted that it may have plunged to its doom in one of the worst disasters in Canadian aviation history.

Sixty-two persons including 59 passengers and a three-member crew were aboard the four-engined Montreal bound plane, which was presumed to have crashed sometime Sunday night in the snow-choked Fraser Valley east of Vancouver. A TCA spokesman said that if all 62 died it would be the greatest toll of any air crash in Canada's history.

Several Americans were known to be aboard.

Names from the passenger list were trickling out of TCA offices in Montreal, headquarters of the airline. Among them were those of Mrs. A. A. Kafouri, Portland, Ore., J. E. Henderson, R. R. J. Isaquait, Wash., and two American football players, Mario Demarco and Mel Beckett.

Passenger Identified  
Another American passenger aboard the aircraft and just identified was Mrs. L. C. Burt, of San Francisco.

Gordie Strutridge and Ray Syrnky, two other football players, were also listed. All four were members of the Saskatchewan Roughriders of Canada's Western Conference.

Beckett and Strutridge played in the annual East-West Shrine All-star professional game here Saturday.

The airline refused to state if there were other football players aboard the plane, pending notification of next-of-kin.

Royal Canadian Air Force search and rescue personnel were working "round-the-clock in investigation of several reports about the plane, including one that said light had been seen on a mountain near the possible crash scene.

Little Hope Held  
They held little hope, however, that any of the reports had any basis in fact.

An RCAF spokesman said the report of the mountain lights was "just one of many that we received during the night. We're investigating it."

He said unidentified callers had told Royal Canadian Mounted Police in the area of spotting a "light on top of a hill" near Abbotsford, B. C., the site of an auxiliary landing-field some 50 miles southeast of Vancouver.

The spokesman added, however, that the RCMP had not reported any official such finding of its own.

The crew of 17 searchcraft, meanwhile, were ordered to Air Force operations headquarters in Vancouver in the pre-dawn blackness for briefing on the huge aerial hunt getting under way.

The armada was scheduled to start at 10 a. m. (See CANADIAN, Page 8)
