

BETTER JOBS Year By R. C. HOILES

"We Are Less Educated Than 50 Years Ago" The above quotation appears on

the cover of "U. S. News & World Report" for November 30. It is a summary of an exclusive interview of the "U. S. News & World Report" with Dr. Arthur Bestor,

Professor of History at the University of Illinois. At present he is on leave of absence from his university and is filling the chair of American history at Oxford

University. The first question asked Dr Bestor was: "There is a lot of talk these days that our schools are not doing their jobs properly. What do you think is wrong with education in America today, Dr.

Bestor?" Dr. Bestor's answer was: "When you come right down to it, what's wrong is that the schools have lost their sense of purpose. Schools today are undertaking a large number of activities that aren't essential to education at all. The result is that these unessential activities are squeezing out the basic subjects for a very large number of our students." Then the article goes on to in-

quire as to how reading and writing and arithmetic are being taught. Dr. Bestor says they are being taught but they are being treated too casually all the way through school.

Then the interviewer asks: "Are the schools paying less attention to the teaching of science, mathematics, history and foreign languages than they used to?"

Dr. Bestor answered: "Yes, they are. In fact, lots of American high schools don't even offer courses in the basic sciences and advanced mathematics, that is, geometry and algebra. And an increasing percentage of American students aren't taking the courses even when they are offered."

Q. "Is the situation getting better or worse?" A. "Worse. A responsible esti-

mate is that last year some 1,500 high schools reduced the number of their courses in science and mathematics, or dropped them entirely." Q. "Is there a relationship, do

you think, between the shortage of scientists you hear so much about today and what we have been doing with education in the last 30 to 50 years?"


A. "A very obvious relationship. The figures of the U.S. Office of Education show that in 1900 nearly

84 per cent of all American highschool students were taking some science courses. That has dropped to only 54 per cent today. In mathematics the drop has been from 86 to 55 per cent." Q. "What do you mean, falla-

"Well, for one thing, the professional educators began to get very confused about the fundamental purposes of education. And here I mean the professors of education - those who teach teachers - and the school administrators, that is, the superintendents and principals, not the actual classroom teachers. The teachers themselves were just obeying orders. "In my judgment, the real purpose of a school is to teach youngsters how to use their minds effectively ... Q. "What are they giving them in place of the fundamentals?" A. "Well, they say a student should be trained for his job. Or, that he should be taught what these people call 'life adjustment.' They say, for example, that instead of teaching a child history or geography, you should teach him how to act when he goes out on a date. This they call 'social studies.' Or, instead of requiring him to study literature, they give him pointers on how to select good radio programs." The doctor blames a lot of our trouble in education to the pro-







Why They Cannot

The reason government schools cannot educate as efficiently as private schools is that government schools are not based on the law of justice, on any moral law. They are based on the use of aggressive force. They are a complete denial of the Commandments and the Declaration of Independence, that governments derive their just power from the consent of the govern-ed. They, thus, have no moral axioms from which to reason, from which to use as a guide to determine what is just and unjust and what is right and what is wrong. And education that is not based on moral law. as voluntary education can be, certainly cannot influence by example the students attending such a school. It is a

denial of the statement made by St. Paul: "Be not deceived; God is not mocked: for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap.

And when government schools are sowing might - makes - right, there are no principles, pragmatism that whatever works is right. that the means does not predetermine the results, of course they cannot really be useful to the students or to the nation. Reaping What We Sow
