Ike Briefed On World Developments

AUGUSTA, Ga., Nov. 28 (UP)—President Eisenhower received a detailed briefing on overnight world developments Wednesday but the White House declined to comment on reports of an increasing Anglo-American rift over the Middle East.

"I haven't any comment on that," said Press Secretary James C. Hagerty when told that acting British Prime Minister R. A. Butler had called a special cabinet meeting to avert a break with the United States.

Hagerty was careful to confine his "no comment" to British-American relations. He said he thought the general picture in the Middle East had "eased greatly" over the "last two or three weeks."

The President said through Hagerty Tuesday that no weakening or disruption of relations among this country and its Allies should be deduced because of "one particular incident" — the Middle East blow up.

Mr. Eisenhower went to his temporary White House office at the Augusta National Golf Club at 8:30 a.m. Wednesday to receive a highly confidential briefing on developments in London and elsewhere in the world. The President's communications have been greatly expanded for this trip in view of the tension gripping Europe and the Middle East.

Later, before stepping to the golf tee, the President named Ellisworth Bunker, retiring president of the American Red Cross and a well-grounded diplomat, the new ambassador to India.

Burglary Here Is Admitted

Three airmen who are AWOL from Amarillo Air Force Base have admitted the burglary of Whitney's Service Station, 422 E. Frederic, on the night of Oct. 9.

The three airmen are: Gilbert Angullar Jr., 18; Robert Charles LaMore, 20; and William A. Harrison, 17.

Word was received yesterday by the local sheriff's office and police department that the three airmen were being held by the U. S. Marshal at Garden City, Kan., following their arrest by the F.B.I. on a charge of transporting a stolen car across a state line.

The marshal reported that the three airmen had signed a statement in which they admitted breaking into a service station in Pampa on the night of Oct. 9 and taking oil, candy and a battery. Jim Conner, chief of police, reported yesterday that the burglary at Whitney's Service Station was the only one which occurred in Pampa on the night the airmen reported they entered a service station here.

Red China Leader Visits With Nehru

NEW DELHI, Nov. 28 (UP)—China's Premier Chou En-Lai arrived here Wednesday wearing the blue Communist uniform which thousands of Americans learned to recognize in Korea. He landed in a special Indian airliner escorted by eight Indian jet fighters.

Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru, his daughter, Indira, China's ambassador Pan Tzu Li and other officials greeted the Communist premier at the airport.

Chou acknowledged the greetings Indian-style, with his hands pressed together as in prayer, while thousands of Indians chanted such slogans as "India and China are brothers" or "long live Indo-Chinese friendship."

Nehru, who plans to discuss a "broad range of (unspecified) subjects" with Chou during his stay, expressed hope in an airport speech that "we shall be able to serve the cause of peace and harmony."

Chou expressed similar sentiments.

"The leaders of our two countries will try jointly to further the cause of peace in Asia and the world," he told the crowd at the airport.

"Friendship and cooperation between the two countries which were first to enunciate the 'five principles of coexistence' are of special significance for the promotion of world peace and international cooperation."

High on the list of topics to be discussed by the two men there undoubtedly is the subject of Nehru's visit to Washington, during which he is expected to renew efforts to enlist U.S. support for the admission of Communist China to the United Nations.

Nehru is expected to try to persuade President Eisenhower that Chou, if granted a UN seat and a vote in the Security Council, might be able to persuade the Russians to get out of Hungary.

U. S. Studies Secret Report On N. A. T. O.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (UP)—The United States Wednesday studied the secret report of "three wise men" on the Atlantic alliance as a possible step toward healing the U.S. rift with Britain and France.

The report, prepared by the foreign ministers of Canada, Norway and Italy, calls for increased political and economic cooperation among members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO).

Drawn up at NATO's request, it was received here during the weekend and is under intensive study by U.S. officials. First American reaction was said to be highly favorable. Other NATO members also are studying it.

The proposals may form the basis for the first big push by this country to reestablish close bonds with its British and French NATO allies. The setting for the project could be the Dec. 11 meeting in Paris of NATO foreign ministers which Secretary of State John Foster Dulles is slated to attend.

The United States has come out openly for increased cooperation among NATO members beyond the military sphere. Officials see this as one way to overcome the dividing effect of the British-French action in Egypt which was made without consultations inside NATO.

Foreign Ministers Lester B. Pearson of Canada, Halvard Lange of Norway and Gaetano Martino of Italy were designated by NATO last May to advise on "ways and means to improve and extend NATO cooperation in non-military fields" and to improve NATO unity.

They were styled the "three wise men" because it was hoped their recommendations would form the basis for preventing a deterioration of the Atlantic alliance. Such deterioration was feared if the alliance continued along a strictly military course.

New Hotel Campaign Goes Over \$500,000

Chaplain Says Negro 'Forced' To Resign

NEW YORK, Nov. 28 (UP)—A former Air Force chaplain charged Wednesday night that Pentagon officials resorted to threats to force the resignation of a Negro Air Force lieutenant who he said was convicted of a "trumped up" drunk driving charge in Mississippi.

The Rev. Benjamin H. Adams said he based his charge on information from a "top official in the Pentagon." Adams, who was Lt. Titus A. Saunders' chaplain in the Air Force at Columbus, Miss., in 1954 when the lieutenant was tried and convicted, was interviewed on a Mutual Broadcasting System program.

Given Choice
Saunders was given a choice of either resigning or being discharged from the Air Force. He submitted his resignation last Saturday, changed his mind Monday, and then later reinstated the resignation. On Monday, Saunders charged that the Air Force ultimatum resulted from pressure by Sen. John Stennis (D-Miss.).

Adams said that Saunders went to Washington Friday on orders from Lockbourne Air Force Base at Columbus, Ohio, where he had been stationed since his transfer from Mississippi. The State of Ohio has rejected attempts by Mississippi authorities to extradite Saunders, Adams said the Washington trip was presumably for a hearing.

Adams said the unnamed Pentagon official told him that Saunders came to the Pentagon Friday determined that he was not going to resign.

War Extension In Mid-East Charged

LONDON —UP— Soviet Foreign Minister Dmitri T. Shepilov charged Wednesday that the British, French and Israel intend to attack Syria, Lebanon and Egypt. He said the "imperialists have not abandoned their plans."

Shepilov made the charge in Copenhagen shortly after a U. S. State Department spokesman accused Russia of stirring new Middle East tension by sending large-scale arms shipments to Syria.

At the same time, a Moscow radio broadcast warned Britain it was "playing with fire" by not withdrawing all its troops from Egypt.

The United Nations, meanwhile, more than doubled its police force in Port Said and announced that "virtually all elements" of a 4,100-man international force would be deployed in Egypt within two weeks.

Shepilov said he had "unconceivable information to the effect that Britain, France and Israel intend to attack Syria, Lebanon, Egypt and other countries in the area."

Shepilov made the statement to newsmen in Copenhagen while stopping off on a flight back from the UN General Assembly meeting in New York.

It was not clear whether Shepilov was referring to events before the Anglo-French and Israeli invasions of Egypt or to current threats.

Sources close to the Danish government took a grave view of Shepilov's remarks. They said they might be taken as a hint that Russia was readying "preventive interventions" in the Middle East under the pretext of safeguarding Arab nations.

In Egypt itself, the UN sent 207 Danish infantrymen to Port Said to patrol the Anglo-French occupied city in the Suez Canal zone. They were joining an advance task force of 190 Norwegians also on duty there.

UN Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold said virtually all 4,100 UN troops pledged to the force would be posted out within two weeks to save the peace. He said the UN was aiming at a 5,000 man force.

In London, the British admiralty announced it has dispatched "large reinforcements" to join the eight salvage ships already working at clearing out Suez Canal obstructions despite Egyptian objections that it should do the job with UN aid.

Dorsey's Death Ruled 'Clearly Accidental'

GREENWICH, Conn., Nov. 28 (UP)— Bandleader Tommy Dorsey's death was "clearly accidental" and a "highly personal" note left by his estranged wife had no bearing on the band leader's death, Police Chief David W. Robbins said Wednesday.

Seeking to dispel an aura of mystery surrounding the case, Robbins said "there was no point in trying to develop" the undisclosed note "into something it is not."

But Robbins said the case would remain open until receipt of results of a state toxicologist's examination of Dorsey's vital organs. The report is expected next week.

Coroner Edgar W. Krentzman said he planned no formal inquest.

"It would appear to me that mystery is being sought where no mystery exists," the coroner said. Both he and Robbins said they accepted the medical examiner's finding that the 31-year-old Dorsey choked to death on some food particles in his sleep.

Both Robbins and Krentzman agreed in a joint statement that the contents of the note would not be divulged "because of its personal nature."

Dorsey, fully clothed, was found dead in bed Monday at his palatial 23-room home. The note was found nearby. In an adjacent bathroom was an empty bottle which usually contained sleeping pills, according to police.

Homecoming Reservations Total 108

Reservations for the Third Annual Homecoming celebration for all ex-Pampa High School students currently number 108, according to Cameron Marsh, assistant principal of Pampa High School.

Mrs. Inez Carter Purchases \$55,000 In Subscriptions

Pampans expressed their desire for a community-owned hotel for Pampa by purchasing a total of \$94,400 in new hotel stock since Tuesday noon and the prospects are fairly certain for an additional \$90,000 with most of this amount promised on a conditional basis, according to reports made at a meeting of the executive committee and the general sales force for the hotel campaign in the Palm Room last night.

With the addition of the \$94,400 last night, the total amount of stock purchased in the hotel now stands at \$522,400.

Fred Neslage, general sales manager, reported the largest stock subscription to date. Stock in the amount of \$55,000 was purchased by Mrs. Inez Carter yesterday. Upon hearing of Mrs. Carter's purchase those attending the meeting last night rose as a group and applauded her action.

The general sales force reported a total of \$26,500 in stock subscriptions in the proposed hotel with the Women's Section reporting \$17,400 of this amount and the Men's Section reported \$9,100. The executive committee reported a total of \$12,900 in sales in addition to the purchase by Mrs. Carter.

The prospects for an additional \$90,000 were reported. This sum is expected from a package plan inaugurated Monday by Myron Hockenbury, head of the firm directing the campaign.

According to the plan, a total of eight subscriptions needed to be raised from \$5,000, or below, to \$10,000 with the condition that all eight would be obtained before any of the increases would be effective. At the meeting last night it was reported that seven of the eight increases have been obtained and as soon as the other one is obtained these increases would be effective.

Those who increased to \$10,000 on this conditional basis were: Motor Inn Supply, C. P. Buckler, Pampa Daily News, Dr. M. C. Overton, Ivy Duncan, Citizens Bank and Trust Co. and B. L. Hoover.

A package group of ten increases to \$5,000 was set up on the same basis with a total of seven of the ten having been secured prior to last night. Those to increase to \$5,000 were: Coca Cola and Faltstaff, Friendly Men's Wear, Hugh Burdette, R. L. Pugh, B. R. Cantrell, F. M. Culberson and Ivy Duncan, who later increased to \$10,000.

It was decided that a total of 20 increases from \$1,000 to \$2,000 should be secured on the same conditional basis and a total of 15 of these increases were reported last night. Those to increase were: Joe Tooley, Scott Oil Co., Pampa Concrete, D. A. Finkelstein, Elmer Fite, Roy S. Bourland, Ralph Gardner, R. F. Gordon, Nunn Electric, Frank Smith, Clayton Husted, Paul Crossman, Kirk Duncan, Ray Duncan and Clyde Patheve.

Following the report on the conditional increases Hockenbury talked about indirect benefits to be received by Pampa from the construction of a new, modern hotel. He reported that the building cost of approximately \$950,000 would mostly be spent in Pampa on materials and salaries.

He continued by stating that the hotel would mean a new industry in Pampa with a new payroll to be spent with local business firms and people stopping at the hotel during the course of a year should leave \$750,000 in new money in Pampa.

He reported that the new hotel would mean that Pampa would have many conventions held here. He stated that the average three-day convention should result in an additional \$22,000 in new money for Pampa.

A direct benefit will be obtained by stockholders in the interest on debentures and in the dividends that will be paid on the stock.

He stated that a new hotel will mean a new community center for the citizens of Pampa and that the hotel will increase real estate values. The hotel should also mean a general growth of Pampa and will advertise Pampa throughout the country.

Hockenbury concluded by stating that the goal had to be reached. (See HOTEL, Page 2)

Blanket Pardon Offered

VIENNA, Nov. 28 (UP)— Hungary's puppet government offered a blanket pardon Wednesday to any of 92,000-odd "illegal" refugees who return home before new year's.

The official Budapest radio said a decree will be published "shortly" promising amnesty to any of the thousands of men, women and children who have braved Russian guns and sub-zero weather to flee to the West — provided they return this year.

Another decree offering a general pardon for "several other crimes" is in preparation, the official radio said.

Hungarian refugees in Austrian emergency camps received the offer with bitter laughter. None showed the slightest interest in taking advantage of it.

Despite the tightened Soviet border precautions which have stemmed the flow of refugees somewhat in the past few days, 4,800 Hungarians made their way to this country in the past 24 hours. A total of 92,325 refugees have been registered by authorities here since Oct. 28.

While puppet Premier János Kadar tried to woo anti-Russian Hungarians abroad, reports from Budapest said his regime is cracking down ruthlessly on foes of the Soviet at home.

Kadar himself denounced anti-Soviet writers Andras Sandor and Miklos Gimmes Tuesday night as "criminal counter-revolutionaries" who will be "sought out and put on trial."

Reports reaching here Wednesday said Sandor has been arrested, but there was no word as to Gimmes' fate.

Sandor, a member of the Peasants Club whose anti-Russian demonstrations touched off the Hungarian revolt, is the latest of a number of fighters for freedom reported under arrest in Hungary. Talks scheduled to take place between Red China's Premier Chou En-Lai and India's Premier Jawaharlal Nehru in the next two weeks may have "an important effect on Hungary."

The Communist radio in China has repeatedly echoed the Soviet charge that the Hungarian rebels are "Fascist counter-revolutionaries," but the Budapest broadcaster said a Communist newspaper in that country has expressed hope that Russia can be persuaded to "repair" relations with Hungary.

Anti-American Feelings In Britain Are Snowballing

LONDON, Nov. 28 (UP)—Anti-American feeling snowballed among Britons Wednesday. But their political leaders and newspapers warned against the dangers of the split in western unity.

British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd cautioned that only Communists can gain from the "acute difference of opinion" between Britain and the United States over Middle East policy.

Foreign newsmen reported they were beginning to be "cold shouldered" by British friends because of the U.S. stand on the Middle East.

In France, too, resentment at the American Middle Eastern policy remained as high as ever Wednesday, although it appeared to be less vocal than in Britain.

The London Independent Evening Standard reported that "day by day the tide of anti-American feeling gathers force in Britain."

"Underlying these attacks is the feeling that Britain has been let down by the United States. America's actions, so the critics argue, are dictated by pique. Britain has supported the United States in past disputes on policy. Why does America not stand by Britain now?"

The Evening Standard said the anti-American feeling "finds outspoken expression today in the motion, signed by a third of the Tory backbenchers, deploring United States policy in the present crisis."

Spry, Lean Man With Twinkle In His Eye Is Practitioner Of Year

 SEATTLE, Wash. (UP)—The nation's "most outstanding family doctor" is a spry, lean man with a twinkle in his eyes who has delivered babies in boxcars and fought blizzards to tend the sick.
 Dr. Edward M. Gans, 80, Harlowton, Mont., was selected by the American Medical Association's house of delegates Tuesday to wear the gold medal and hold the title of general practitioner of the year.
 Dr. Gans, a graduate of the University of Minnesota, has been a "country doctor" for 51 years. He has never had a plush uptown office or a carriage trade practice. Instead, his patients have included the iron workers in Minnesota's Mesabi range and the shepherders and cowboys of the Montana prairies.
He Works in Melting Pot
 "My first practice was in the Mesabi country and this was an education in itself," Dr. Gans said. "The Mesabi was a melting pot of nationalities, and the combination of cultures and manners, mixed up with payday and liquor, put me on a busy schedule right from the start."
 He recalled that one of his first patients was a pregnant woman lying in labor on a filthy bed.
 "I bathed her and made the bed with clean sheets, only to return a short while later to find she had remade the bed with the dirty bedclothes and redone her dirty gown."
 But Dr. Gans finally had his way and the baby arrived in good shape.
 "Ten months later," he recalled, "I had a call at the same house to treat another patient. There was the baby, husky, healthy and eating head cheese, drinking beer and walking all over the place."
He Sticks to It
 After six years in Eveleth, Minn., Dr. Gans moved to Dickinson, N. D., and then on to Montana, where he settled in the town of Judith Gap. Seventeen years later he moved to Harlowton, where he has practiced for the last 27 years.
 "You might call me a horse and buggy doctor," he said. "But that wasn't my only mode of travel in those days. I've used railroad handcars, haywagons, and half-broke horses to reach my patients."
 One maternity trip in the teeth of a Montana blizzard kept him from home for three days.
 His patients have included shepherders suffering from stomach ulcers, a common ailment in parts of the west because of the monotonous diet of flapjacks, bacon and strong coffee.
He Overcomes Fever
 During the winter of 1920, the

P. H. Haegen family of Buffalo, Mont., came down with scarlet fever. Dr. Gans not only treated the sick, but he also attended the household and did the farm chores.
 But Dr. Gans has contributed to the medical profession in more ways than his practice. His two sons also are doctors. The eldest, Dr. Gans and his wife celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in Harlowton, Mont., and the youngest, Dr. Edward Gans, practices in Oakland, Calif.
 A daughter, Mrs. Don O'Connor, lives in St. Paul, Minn. Recently, Dr. Gans and his wife celebrated their golden wedding anniversary. They have 11 grandchildren.
 Dr. Gans held a news conference Tuesday which one reporter missed. The doctor willingly returned to accommodate the newsman.

Insects Developing Resistance To Insecticides

COLLEGE STATION, Tex. (UP)—Boll weevils and some other insects are developing resistance to insecticides, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has reported.
 Researchers at the experiment station revealed that boll weevils may have developed resistance to chlorinated hydrocarbon insecticides, such as dieldrin, endrin and toxaphene, in some sections of Texas.
 The report said chlorinated hydrocarbons failed to give commercial control of weevils during the 1956 season in several cotton fields in the Brazos River Valley near Hearne.
 Calcium arsenate and several phosphorus compounds controlled the insects in the same fields where the chlorinated hydrocarbons failed, but troublesome safety precautions are necessary in their use, it was reported.
 Researchers recommended continued use of chlorinated hydrocarbon insecticides unless further research proves complete resistance to them.
 The Columbia River, which flows 1,214 miles from source to sea, is ninth longest river in the United States.

Russia, Yugoslavia Break Important Aspect Of Revolt

 The breach between Soviet Russia and Yugoslavia is emerging as one of the most important aspects of the Polish and Hungarian revolts.
 It will be difficult for Soviet Premier Nikolai A. Bulganin and Communist Party leader Nikita S. Khrushchev to reach any workable agreement with President Tito for cooperation for a long time to come.

Russia's position in Communist-ruled Eastern Europe has been weakened beyond complete repair in the last few weeks. Tito's position as the big independent Communist leader has been correspondingly strengthened.
 The present Russian campaign of repression in Romania and Bulgaria seems to be aimed in great part against the threat that Tito's influence might soon rival Moscow's in those two countries.
Afraid Of Tito
 But Russian leaders seem to be afraid to attack Tito himself too violently.
 Tito and his official organs have been roundly denouncing the Kremlin for more than two weeks for their policy toward Poland, Hungary and the other satellite countries.
 Moscow's criticism of Tito has been remarkably restrained. It is evident that Soviet leaders want to avoid a complete break. They obviously are trying to leave the way open for cooperation.
 But the "Titoist" movement of independent Communism has gone too far, and the division between Moscow and Belgrade has become too wide.
Three Centers Of Communism
 In fact, there are now three centers of world Communism—Moscow, Belgrade and Peiping.
 It seems impossible that Soviet Russia ever can hope to restore

the position of dominance it held before Tito's break with the late Josef Stalin in 1948.
 Communist China is steadily strengthening—at Russia's expense—its influence in East Asia.
 And in Europe, Tito seems to be establishing himself as the real leader of a future group of independent Communist countries.
 In the Polish and Hungarian revolts, the Kremlin suffered its worst blow politically since the Bolsheviks took over Russia in 1917.

Recognized Tito Danger
 Bulganin and Khrushchev recognized the danger of Titoism to their grip on the East European satellites when they made their pilgrimage to Belgrade in May, 1955 to patch up relations. Khrushchev also went to Yugoslavia last September.
 Then came the satellite revolts, first in Poland, then in Hungary. Tito made a speech on Nov. 11 sharply attacking Soviet leaders. He said the Soviet government had made "a fatal error" by its bloody intervention in the Hungarian revolt.
 Finally came the betrayal by the Russians of Hungarian Premier Imre Nagy, now under arrest by the Soviets. Tito has demanded in formal notes to Russia and Hungary that Nagy be released.
 Whatever happens to Nagy now, it seems clear that Russian-Yugoslav relations will remain bad for the foreseeable future.

His Protest Went For Naught

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (UP)—Shelly James Hurst, fined \$20 by Peace Justice Clyde Kissinger on a charge of speeding 85 miles per hour, protested: "Your honor, that car won't go 85. If it will, I'll pay you \$40."
 The justice ordered a deputy to have Hurst's 1947 model car clocked by a patrol car. The deputy reported that when he stepped on the gas, the old car hit well over 85.
 Kissinger declined to accept the additional \$20 from Hurst, but lectured him on safe driving.

CONGRESS DEBATES FIRST RESOLUTION, 1789...
AMERICA'S OLDEST HOLIDAY.
 MRS. SARAH HALE AND PRESIDENT LINCOLN Ponder Making Thanksgiving an Annual Holiday 1863.



The oldest and most truly American of our holidays, Thanksgiving, was celebrated by the Pilgrims in a feast with their Indian friends in 1621. Two years later, the first real Thanksgiving was set aside, not as a harvest festival, but as a day of prayer. A resolution proclaiming our first national Thanksgiving was passed in Congress despite vigorous debate, and George Washington set aside Thursday, Nov. 26, 1789, as "a day of Public Thanksgiving and Prayer." President Lincoln, influenced greatly by the plea of Mrs. Sarah Josepha Hale, issued a National Thanksgiving Proclamation on Oct. 3, 1863—in the midst of the Civil War—making Thanksgiving an annual holiday. Since that time, every President has proclaimed Thanksgiving a legal holiday, on which the whole nation closes its shops, offices, schools and banks, and offers thanks to God for the blessings of our free and bountiful land.

Reds Sending Arms To Syria

 WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (UP)—The State Department accused Russia Wednesday of "attempting to create further tensions" in the Middle East by shipping arms to Syria.

Department Press Officer Lincoln White said the Russians have sent "substantial shipments" of weapons to Syria in recent months, some of which were delivered after the start of Israeli-Egyptian hostilities.

He said the United States has expressed concern to the Syrian government about the situation. He did not know whether complaints have been made to Moscow.

Arms Adding to Tensions

White said the United States takes the view that the Soviet arms shipments are "adding to these tensions in the area." However, he carefully avoided accusing Russia of violating a United Nations resolution on this point.

The Nov. 2 resolution called on all members to stop sending military equipment to "the area of hostilities." Technically, Syria is not included in the area.

White said U.S. diplomats in Damascus have been carrying on discussions with the Syrian government for several days. He said the envoys stressed "the need to reduce prevailing tension through the cooperation of all states concerned."

Iraq Not Cause of Tensions

White also was asked about current friction between Syria and Iraq, which has asked the United States for arms. He emphasized that Iraq is not the cause of increasing tensions.

Other officials said the United States is sympathetic toward the Iraqi arms request but must weigh it against a number of complicating factors.

They pointed out that Israel probably would begin a strong new campaign for American arms if the United States increased shipments to any Arab state. Additionally, they said, it might give the Russians new grounds for pouring arms into Egypt and Syria.

Have Tough Decision

WASHINGTON (UP)—The District of Columbia commissioners are trying to decide which of two songs to make the official song of the nation's capital. One song—proclaimed official in 1951 and then apparently all but forgotten—is called "Washington." The other is called "The District of Columbia Is My Home Town."

At Camden Town stop, however, the stationmaster ordered the piano off the train. The students, who said they were enroute to a rock-and-roll party, pushed the piano onto the platform and disappeared.

So the men who man the galley have a problem. Foods, such as fruits and vegetables, which taste as though they had just been plucked or dug, are what the boys want.

They Get It, Too

The NBO sees that they get it, but it takes doing.

Meats are among the frozen "Musts." They must be kept frozen until they are ready to cook. The Navy wants them to taste as though they just came from the steer or hog or lamb. The "salt horse" days of the old Navy are gone.

So aboard ship, the commissary officer must know how much

freeze space he has. And he must use that space to the best advantage. How does the commissary officer go about stocking up?

Well, that's a little complicated. Unless he got his know-how from practice, he runs to Vol. IV of the Busanda manual, Chapter 194, Para. 4117, dated 2 Aug., 1956.

Requirements Listed

It lists the normal stocking requirements, including the cubic measurement of space for the different foods.

But what the commissary officer is most concerned about is the storage of frozen food. Say the vessel is supposed to be out 30 days. How about storms and other things that can cause delay. So the officer doubles his order and then worries about what to do with the extras if the ship makes the trip on schedule.

According to the NBO, that's the part that makes the commissary officer start to "tuck in." Maybe there is a little room in the freeze box where he can "tuck in" some boneless beef, some fish filets, a few hams, a few slabs of bacon. In recesses here and there.

If any is left over it will get used later on. Meanwhile nobody starves on the way.

Ike Asks Polio Shots For Young Adults

AUGUSTA, Ga., Nov. 28 (UP)—President Eisenhower urged young adults between the ages of 18 and 35 Wednesday night to take full advantage of the now plentiful supply of anti-polio Salk vaccine.

Heretofore, the supply of Salk vaccine has been virtually limited to children of early school age.

Mr. Eisenhower's new policy on the vaccine stemmed from a report to the White House by Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare Marion B. Folsom.

"Through prompt use of increasing supplies of vaccine," Folsom informed the President, "the nation can go a long way—next year toward elimination of this dread disease."

"Secretary Folsom's report on the Salk polio vaccine deserves the attention of every young adult of every parent—in America," the President said.

"The supply of vaccine is now plentiful," he added. "I join with Secretary Folsom, the surgeon general of the Public Health Service and the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis in urging that the vaccine be used promptly—before the next polio season arrives."

Folsom reported that about 17-million doses of vaccine are "lying unused in the hands of the manufacturers."

"Additional vaccine is stockpiled in drug stores and physicians' offices," he continued.

Cook's Nook

After the lordly Thanksgiving turkey, what then? Lots of good dishes can be the answer.

At our favorite New England Inn, the Public House in Sturbridge, Mass., we learned about these two delicious variations on the leftover turkey theme.

CORN AND TURKEY CHOWDER
Four tablespoons dried-out salt pork, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 chopped onion, 2 chopped celery stalks, 2 sprigs chopped parsley, 2 cups diced cooked potatoes and corn. Stir water, 2 cups chicken or turkey stock, 2 No. 2 cans creamed corn, 1 cup cooked diced turkey, 1 cup hot rich milk or cream.

Saute onion, celery and parsley in salt pork fat until tender, but not brown. Strain fat off vegetables and add flour to the fat and cook without browning. Pour on the hot chicken or turkey stock and bring to a boil for 10 minutes. Add vegetables, potatoes and corn. Stir water, 2 cups chicken or turkey stock, 2 No. 2 cans creamed corn, 1 cup cooked diced turkey, 1 cup hot rich milk or cream.

Soach the oysters lightly in the water with the salt and pepper. Drain and set aside. Melt the butter over a medium fire and add the flour gradually. Cook 2 or 3 minutes, stirring constantly. Pour on oyster liquid and the cream slowly and continue stirring, cooking until sauce is smooth. Just before serving add poached oysters and turkey. Serve piping hot with slices of toast or in patty shells. Garnish with watercress.

CREAMED TURKEY AND OYSTERS
Three tablespoons butter, 3 tablespoons flour, 1 cup light cream, 8 ounces cooked turkey sliced into strips, 1/2 pint oysters, 1 cup water, salt and pepper.

Before her two children came, young Mrs. X. worked. With Mr. X. she shared the costs of marriage "50-50," helping him buy the car, the TV and other things they wanted.

They wanted their babies — but Mr. X. isn't going "50-50" on the cost of parenthood.

On late afternoons, his wife often feels resentment at having to bear the major costs alone. As she feeds the baby, trying to quiet young Rickey's fretful insistence that she fix his truck, her weariness under maternal burden is increased by her feeling that Mr. X.'s failure to share it is abusive and unfair.

She's not conscious that she expects "50-50" cooperation in care of their children from him; but she expresses it the moment he opens the door. "Oh, I'm glad you're here in time to give Rickey his bath," she'll say. "He'll need clean pajamas."

A father's work is not child care. Though as an understanding person he may assist us with it during emergencies, his arena of action is the world, not the nursery.

Were Mrs. X. to accept this biological fact, her maternal burden would lighten. She could bring to it fresh energy she now expends in unconscious rebellion at it.

One of the great perils of women's sharing the male role of Provider is that we start expecting men to share our female work as Mother.

It is most unrealistic, bringing us into direct collision with biological reality. Only so long as we remain a childless wage earner can we maintain the "50-50" business-luncheon deal with our husbands. The minute we start functioning as a female by having a baby, the whole silly fantasy of sexual sameness blows up.

In shock and resentment, we discover that though we've matched every dollar our husband gave to the TV set, he cannot possibly match what we have to give to our children. The fact that he doesn't possess our special bodily equipment for their nourishment and care has nothing to tell us. All we want is that he duplicate our parental effort as we duplicated his earning one.

In a recent article in Parents Magazine, Dr. Bruno Bettelheim puts it this way: "Though the completion of womanhood is largely motherhood, the fulfillment of moral, economic, political."

Cook's Nook

Sausage And Bacon Are Versatile Family Foods

By GAYNOR MADDOX
Pork sausage for cooking comes in links, in bulk and in country style (medium coarse). Here's the way to cook it:

Frying: 1. Put links in skillet with 2 tablespoons water. Cover and let stand 5 minutes. Drain, then cook over low heat, turning frequently, until sausage is well browned and thoroughly cooked.

2. Put links in cold skillet and cook over low heat 12 to 15 minutes, turning often until browned. Four off fat as it accumulates.

Baking: Place links on rack in shallow pan. Place on top shelf of a moderately hot oven (400 degrees F.) 10 to 15 minutes. No turning is necessary.

Here's how to cook bacon:

Frying: Place bacon slices in cold frying pan. Use low heat and cook until bacon is desired degree of doneness, turning once. It is unnecessary to pour off accumulated fat. Drain cooked bacon.

Broiling: Place bacon slices on

broiler rack 3 inches from heat. Turn once.

Baking: Place separated bacon slices on a rack in a shallow baking pan. Bake in a moderately hot oven (400 degrees F.) about 10 minutes, or until browned.

EASY PIZZAS (Yield: 8 pizzas)
Four English muffins, 1/4 cup butter or margarine, melted, 1 can (8 ounces) tomato sauce, 1/2 pound American or Mozzarella cheese, grated Parmesan cheese, oregano, bacon or sausage.

Cut English muffins in half; brush with part of melted butter. Toast. Spread each muffin with a tablespoon of tomato sauce. Cover with slices of American or Mozzarella cheese. Sprinkle with grated Parmesan cheese and oregano.

Spoon a teaspoon of melted butter or margarine on each pizza before putting into oven. Bake in a moderately hot oven (400 degrees F.) 15 minutes. Prepare bacon or sausage to top each pizza before serving.

Hawks' Pettit In Scoring Lead

NEW YORK (UP)—Bob Pettit of the St. Louis Hawks, the defending scoring champion in the National Basketball Association, has started to close in on Philadelphia's Neil Johnston in the current race.

Johnston remained in the first place during the past week, scoring a total of 336. However, Pettit vaulted from fourth to second place by tallying 108 points in four games and now trails Johnston by only nine points.

Paul Arizin of Philadelphia took 83 points in four games for over third place with 315 points, including games played last Sunday, while Clyde Lovellette of Minneapolis slipped from second to fourth with 285.

Amarillo Leads In 3-AAAA Statistics

As in the past weeks of performance, the Amarillo Sandies held leads in six of eight team division statistics of District 3-AAAA, according to the final figures released today.

The Sandies, who won the district title and now meet Paschal of Fort Worth in bi-district play Saturday, led in total offense, rushing, passing, total defense, rushing defense and penalties.

Amarillo trailed in two departments, pass defense and punting where the Sandies rated last and next to last, respectively. Amarillo finished up with an average of 423 yards per game on total offense with 327.8 per game on rushing. Sandies averaged 95.2 yards per game passing and allowed 205.3 yards per game in total defense. They allowed only 118.8 yards per game on rushing.

Palo Duro, which finished second in district play, leads in pass defense by allowing only 36.3 yards per game and the Dons led in punting with a 38.5 average.

Pampa ranks sixth in total offense, fourth in rushing, last in passing, second in total defense,

third in rushing defense, second in pass defense, fourth in punting and sixth in penalties.

Bob Page of Borger took over the lead in total offense in the individual statistics from Lubbock's Charley Moore. Page, who had a field day Saturday against Pampa, finished with 778 yards. Of the 778, 400 was made by pass, a department where he ranks second to Amarillo's Soapy Sudsbury.

Moore leads in rushing with 740 yards, Joe Ted Davidson of Amarillo leads in pass receiving with 156 yards, Fred Parson of Monterey is the leading punter with a 48.0 average and David Russell of Amarillo is the leading scorer with 54.

Pampa's Dickie Mauldin ranked 10th in total offense and he was 10th in rushing with 294 yards. Robert Langford is ninth in rushing with 321 yards. Mauldin ranks seventh in passing with 5 of 22 completions for 81 yards and he's ninth in punting with a 32.3 average. Gary Heiskell is tied for fifth with a 36.0 average. Bobby Dehls ranked eighth in scoring with 26 points.

Coach Clifton McNeely will get a chance to see what he has produced after six weeks of training when his Pampa Harvesters open their 1956-57 basketball season in Childress Friday night against the Bobcats.

The game is the first of 23 slated for the season. Eleven of the games are non-conference matches with Childress, Vernon, Phillips, Portales and Clovis, N. M., Plainville and Altus, Okla. The District 3-AAAA campaign opens Jan. 1 against Amarillo's Sandies.

McNeely will take 12 players to Childress. Half of them are seniors and four of those last-year men will probably start. Only three lettermen — Jerry Pope, Tommy Gindorf and Dickie Mauldin — are back this year but many of last year's Shockers, who had a good season, are returning.

The Childress game begins at 8 p.m. The Shockers will play at 6:30 p.m. The Harvesters and Shockers play at Vernon Saturday night.

Coach Clifton McNeely will probably start the following Harvesters: Jerry Pope, 6-1; Tommy Gindorf, 6-6; Bill Brown, 5-11; Carroll Cole, 5-10; and Sam Condo, 6-2. All are seniors with the exception of Brown. Pope and Gindorf are the only lettermen. Another letterman, Dickie Mauldin, will probably see some action. He has just completed football practice and has not had enough basketball work as yet.

Starting for the Bobcats of District 3-AA will probably be Jimmy Connor, 6-5 junior; Dave Seal, 6-2; Ray Fulewider, 5-11; Bill Shahan, 5-11; and Butch Farha, 5-11. Only one veteran player came back this season for Coach Dick Risenhoover's Childress team and that was Harold Smith who broke a foot in practice this week.

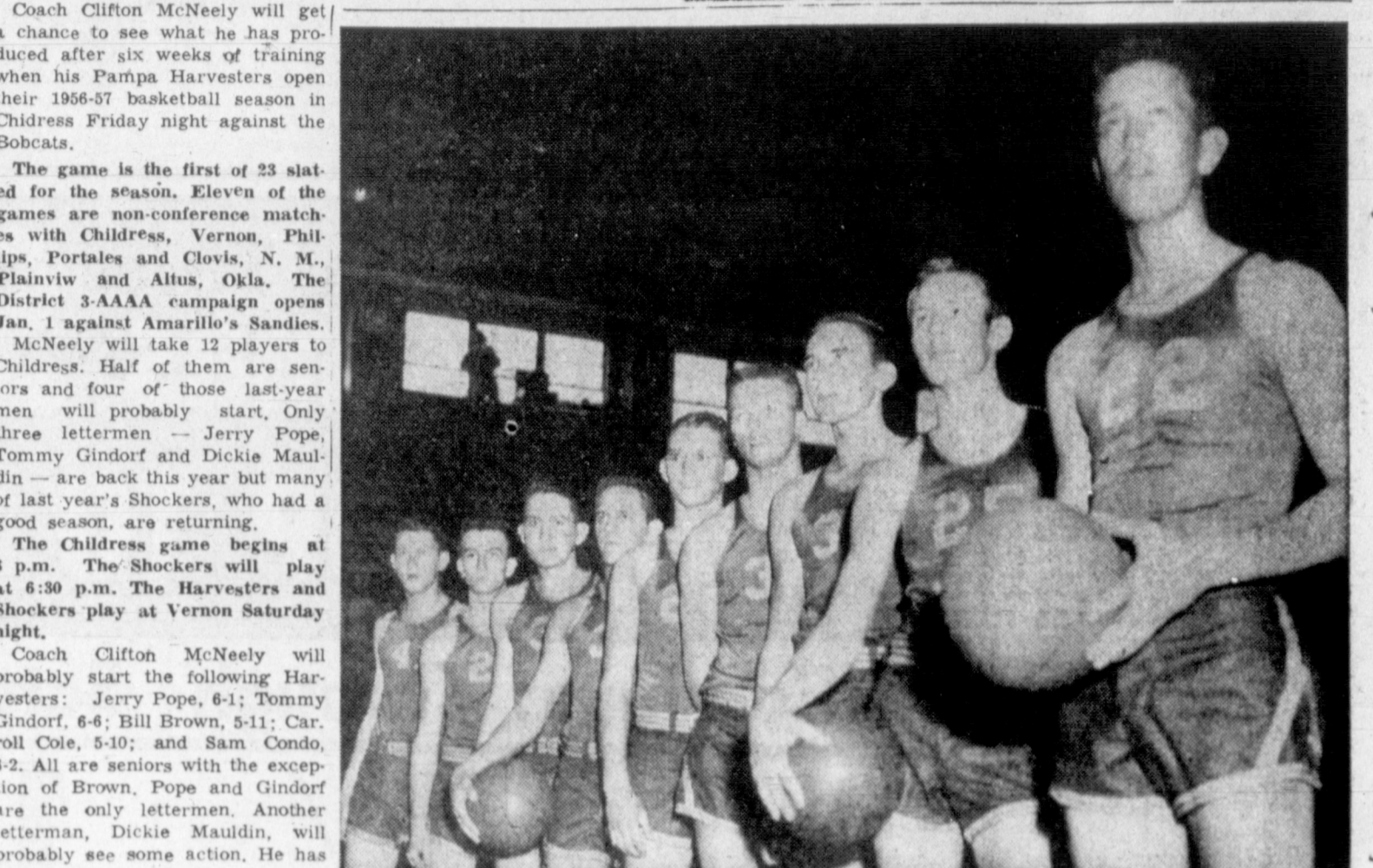
The Bobcats won 15 and lost 15 last year but went to the regional tournament. Most of their losses were to Class AAAA teams. Pampa finished the season with a 20-6 record and won the northern division District 3-AAAA title only to lose to Odessa in the district playoffs.

CRIMMINS OUT AT INDIANA
BLOOMINGTON, Ind., Nov. 28 (UP)—Bernie Crimmins resigned Wednesday after five disastrous seasons as head football coach at Indiana University.

Crimmins, 37, former Notre Dame player and assistant coach, quit effective Jan. 1. He handed in his resignation just four days after his Hoosiers closed out the 1956 campaign with a 3-6 record by losing to Purdue for the ninth straight year.

NEW YORK (UP)—New York Ranger center George (Red) Sullivan, who is suffering from contusions of the spleen, will be lost to the team for about a month. Sullivan, the team's leading scorer, was injured in Sunday night's game with the Montreal Canadiens.

Woodard Out At SMU

DALLAS, Tex., Nov. 28 (UP)—Chalmers (Woody) Woodard resigned Wednesday as head coach at Southern Methodist University "for the best interests of future SMU support and harmony."

Woodard is the second South-west Conference coach to resign this year. Coach Ed Price of the University of Texas, whose team won only one early season game, resigned earlier this month, effective Dec. 31.

Woodard, in a letter to university President Dr. Willis Tate and other college officials, asked that his contract that expires June 30, 1957, not be renewed.

"It is because of my high regard for SMU and because of my sincere wishes for the young men of the Mustang football squad that I ask that my present contract not be extended," Woodard said. "I am aware that many SMU students and supporters have been keenly disappointed in recent performances of Mustang football teams." He said. "I sincerely feel it would be to the best interests of future SMU support and harmony if a change is made in the position of head football coach."

Woodard was hanged in effigy on the SMU campus last Sunday night. His season record this year stands at four wins and five losses, with Saturday's game the last of the season.

Stram May Take Mustangs
There was no immediate announcement from SMU officials as to a successor to Woodard, but speculation favored Assistant Coach Henry Stram, the present backfield coach.

Stram came to SMU from Purdue last January and is considered a stern disciplinarian than the easy-going Woodard. The Mustangs offense early this season showed a definite improvement over a year ago under Stram's tutelage.

Woodard has been head coach at SMU for four years. His overall record to date is 19 wins, 19 losses and one tie.

Bell Expresses Regret
Athletic Director Matty Bell of

SMU said: "We regret very much that everything has not worked out satisfactorily for Woody as head coach of our football team. He is a fine gentleman and a good coach. We certainly wish him every success possible in the future."

"Woody is one of the finest men we have ever had connected with Southern Methodist University," President Tate said. "His fine Christian character and splendid example to his players have made a great impression on all of us. We shall miss him. All of the university wish him success and happiness."

Woodard came to SMU in February, 1953, from McPherson College in Kansas. He also had a highly successful career as a high school coach in Kansas.

His high school record at Kingman, Dodge City and Lawrence included 81 victories, 10 losses and two ties. In six of 10 years of high school coaching, his teams were undefeated.

YOUNG AWARD TO NEWCOMB
NEW YORK, Nov. 28 (UP)—Don Newcombe, who hurled the Brooklyn Dodgers into and out of the 1956 World Series, was voted the first Cy Young award Wednesday as "the major league pitcher of the year."

Wheeler, Happy Vie In Playoffs

Wheeler's Mustangs will go after the regional football championship of Class B in Canyon this afternoon when they meet the Happy Cowboys.

Game time is 2 p.m. The playoff contest will be held in West Texas State's Buffalo Stadium.

The Mustangs, who won the District 2-B title without a conference loss, advanced into regional play by winning over Groom's Tigers by penetrations. The two teams tied 7-7.

Wheeler has lost one game and tied one this season while winning nine. The loss was to Stinetten while the Mustangs tied Silverton.

Happ's Cowboys of District 3-B also advanced into the playoffs after a tie game in bi-district. Whiteface tied the Cowboys 20-20 and won on penetrations but later it was discovered that Whiteface was playing an ineligible player and was disqualified. The Cowboys have a 10-1-1 season mark.

The winner will have to settle for the regional championship since Class B winners do not play for state titles.

No Barrier Can Stop Oklahoma's McDonald

NORMAN, Okla., Nov. 29 (UP)—There's no barrier on the football field that can stop Tommy McDonald, Oklahoma's hustling fullback.

This fact was proven in the Missouri game two weeks ago. While covering a Missouri pass receiver, McDonald ran into a concrete wall in Owen Stadium—home of the nation's No. 1 football team. He rammed the wall with bone-shattering force and tumbled backward. A second later he bounced to his feet and sprinted back onto the field. A grin camouflaged a bad bruise or two.

It was characteristic of the way Tommy plays football for coach Charles (Bud) Wilkinson. He's full of energy, desire and enthusiasm. He plays on the theory that any Oklahoma offensive play that doesn't go for a touchdown is a failure.

McDonald says "a lot of people think we've had an easy schedule this season, but a couple of teams have been real tough, like Colorado and Kansas."

"Playing for Mr. Wilkinson and Coach Gomer (Jones) has meant a lot. They teach you to get along with people and handle different situations when they come up," McDonald remarked.

The 22-year-old Albuquerque, N.M., senior says one thing that

makes Oklahoma such a great football team is "the guys on the sidelines are right there on the field with you and play as hard as you do."

He will tell you himself that Oklahoma has the best line in the nation, and that he couldn't gain a foot if it weren't for the boys up front.

McDonald has sparked many Oklahoma drives to the goal line the past two seasons. The biggest thrill, he says, came in the Texas game this fall when he caught a 53-yard touchdown pass from teammate Jimmy Harris in the closing minutes of the first half.

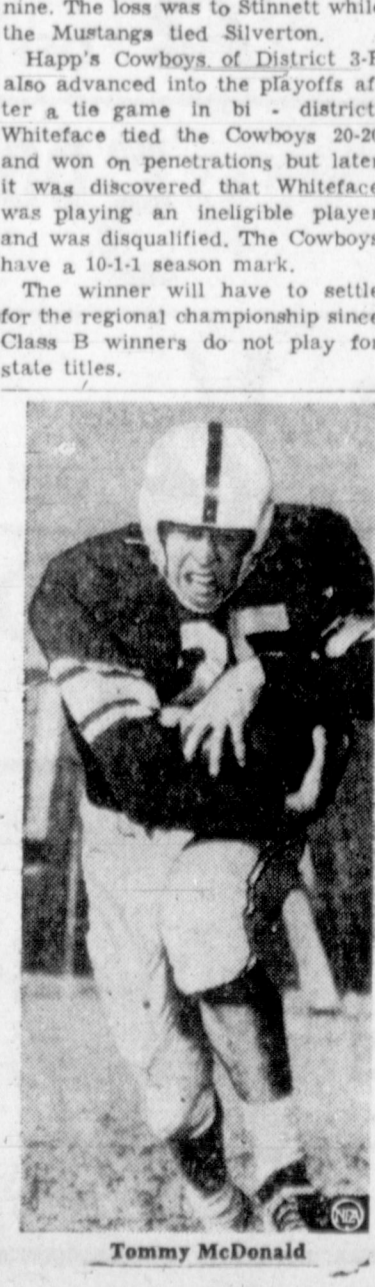

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U.S. Seeking Cage Win Over Russia Today

MELBOURNE, Nov. 28 (UPI)—The United States high-scoring basketball team sought a smashing victory over Russia Thursday to prove America's Olympic superiority in the game it invented.

There is no gold medal involved in the result and both teams already have qualified for the final round of the basketball tournament but there is plenty of prestige at stake in the long-awaited showdown meeting. The Russians confidently predicted before the start of the Olympics that they would end the United States' domination of the sport.

The contest is the highlight of competition which should bring the United States its 19th gold medal, in the 400-meter run, but figures to be a comparatively low-scoring day. The steeplechase is the only other final scheduled and the U.S. expects no better than a fourth or fifth place finish.

Start of Decathlon
Other highlights of the schedule include the start of the decathlon and swimming competitions, in which the U.S. has strong contenders. The second round of wrestling competition, the semifinals of the boxing tournament and competition in soccer, yachting, fencing and hockey also are on the program.

The United States entered the program leading Russia 306-214 in the unofficial point standings and 18-10 in gold medals. The Russians, however, won four gold medals to the United States' two Wednesday and cut 20 points off America's lead.

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Look At Old-Time Bath Tubs Reveals Several Oddities

WASHINGTON (UP)—Today's daily bath with tub, shower spray, soap bubbles, and phone handy generally is taken in private. No attendants needed.

But back in the days of the old Romans and Egyptians it was different. These guys had enough jewels to finance a bath in relay. One bunch to scrub the back, another to apply the 'rinse, and a third team to bail out the dirty tub.

The National Housing Center has on exhibit a bunch of tubs running back a long ways, one to B.C.

According to history, the B.C. tub was claimed by the Romans as their very own, but it was borrowed from the Greeks, who borrowed it from the Egyptians, made of white marble, it weighed more than half a ton.

Also on display is an American "bat tub." It resembled a lady's upturned straw hat and could just as well be called a "flying saucer." The bather sat on a raised seat. According to the inscription on the side of the relic, the bather, if she be a lady, often took crushed strawberries and plopped them in the drink as a "flying treatment."

In the 1880's there was a strict-

ly American phenomena called the "Closet tub." It was something like the modern "Murphy bed" in reverse and enabled the very modest ladies to lather away in private.

A first in double-duty tubs dates back to the 18th century. It also could be used as a chaise or settee and critics of the day called it a little on the naughty side. Made of wormy chestnut, it had a hinged lid that could be pulled over the top, like a quilt, "and it was possible to eat, drink and entertain friends" while soaping up and getting clean.

The wooden tub, 1750-1850, was something bound with wire. It was used by the whole family and always was kept close to the wood-burner in the kitchen, account of it being cold on fall and winter nights.

All of which reminds me of the first bath I can remember after running past the diaper stage.

Mom used to have a galvanized tub which she used for washing juda during the week and family bathing on Saturday. Well, one unhappy Saturday, she had pulled us kids by the ears, one by one to take a sudsing. I was last. Dried and naked I found myself alone. I climbed aboard the copper clad stove in search of a cookie stashed in a compartment. I tumbled and wound up back in the tub, dirty water and all, and still have a few scars to prove it.

But as the Suez crisis drags on,

the bantering is taking on a more querulous tone.

The newspapers are downright outspoken about it.

"The cold-shoulders Britain over Suez," said a headline in the empire-minded Daily Express today.

How to Lose Friends
"Eisenhower—friend of foe?" asked the Evening News.

The Express story said Mr. Eisenhower had sent Britain into exile because of the Egyptian crisis. It said Britain was "losing confidence" in its Trans-Atlantic ally.

The opposition party and its press, which violently opposed Prime Minister Sir Anthony Eden's action in Egypt, was also joining the "criticize-American" campaign—but not as bitterly as the Conservatives.

Weekly Newsletter From Congressman Walter Rogers

IN THE NICK OF TIME
I recently had an experience which prompts us to make the following observation. In writing to our Senators or Congressmen in Washington, always address the envelope to him at the Senate Office Building or the House Office Building (as the case may be), Washington, D.C. You should also show the envelope that the addressee is a United States Senator or a member of Congress. The Post Office Department does an excellent job of getting these communications to the Senators or Representatives with the greatest of haste, realizing no doubt that it is a communication between a citizen of this country and the government under which he or she lives.

The experience to which I refer was to do with a letter that was addressed to me at a house in which I formerly lived in Washington. A young man who was desirous of entering one of the Service Academies addressed his communication to the residential address because it was a personal matter to him and of great importance. But, the Rogers family had moved to another house and the delivery of the letter was substantially delayed. However, it did come into my hands on the day before the date set for the eligibility examination of those boys desiring to compete for appointments to one of the Academies. I was able to get hold of this young man and to get into his hands a wire authorizing him to take the examination. He is a fine young man and it would have been a tragedy if he had missed the opportunity to take the examination simply because of a mixup in the mails.

Many people are under the impression that mail addressed to the office of a Senator or a Member of the House of Representatives very seldom comes to his personal attention, but I can speak for other members of Congress, but I can say that every piece of mail that comes to my office from the 18th Congressional District of Texas, or a person who has legal residence in that District, comes to my personal attention. This is true even though I may not be in the Washington office at the time the mail arrives. I make these observations so that everyone will know that it is much better to address communications to me at the House Office Building, Washington, D.C. It is a pleasure to receive your letters at my home, but there is much less risk of delay if the letter or wire is sent to the office.

THE WAR SITUATION
Although war might be declared in many quarters in this world before this letter reaches you, it seems to be the general feeling in Washington that the danger of any all-out war has lessened measurably. If Britain, France and Israel withdraw their troops from the Suez area and permit the area to be policed by the United Nations, the danger of any all-out conflict will be lessened considerably more. It

is hoped that by the time this communication reaches you these three countries will have agreed to the suggestions of the United Nations and have removed their troops. It is also hoped that by that time work will have commenced on removing the obstacles that are now blocking the Canal. It must be remembered that the accomplishments of these tasks, though a great forward step toward the solution of the problem, will not provide the answer to the fuel shortage in Europe because of the refusal of Arab nations to continue to furnish this oil. This problem is of staggering proportions and upon its proper solution may well depend the answer to the question of whether or not there is another war or peace in our time.

If this Middle East situation can be worked out to an early solution, it will enable the eyes of the entire world to focus on the Hungarian situation and certainly cause Russia some uneasy moments, not only as to the uprising in Budapest but also as to Russian policy in Roumania, Czechoslovakia and Poland. Russia would be in a very untenable position to deny entrance of United Nations observers into the Hungarian Capital. Such developments, as an early solution to the Near East problem, would afford an excellent opening for the Western allies to put Russia into a foreign policy corner where she would be forced to do one of two things. She would have to admit United Nations observers in an effort to try to settle the Hungarian dispute, or openly confess to the world that she was dominating her satellite states by force and arms and did not intend to take any other course.

FOREIGN AID AND THE FARMER
Few people realize that our foreign aid policy has been directly responsible for many of the ills besetting the American farmer. This country, among other things, did the following:
(1) Promoted through foreign aid an increase of 5 million foreign acres.
(2) Financed 26 hundred deep irrigation wells in India.
(3) Made available 260 million dollars in agricultural loans.
(4) Provided 3 billion dollars to promote agriculture in foreign countries.
(5) Provided half a billion dollars for farm machinery and equipment.
(6) Provided 738 United States paid technicians to give foreign countries the know-how. No wonder the American farmer is being pushed out of the world market.

Suez Crisis Fails To Unite Arab World

The Middle Eastern dispute has failed to bring about one development for which President Gamal Abdel Nasser of Egypt has long hoped.

That is the unity of the so-called Arab world of which Nasser wants to make himself the leader.

Events since Israel attacked Egypt and Great Britain and France moved into the Suez Canal have emphasized the disunity, rather than the unity, of the Arab countries.

The nations of the Arab League, and the three Arab countries of French North Africa, are united in their enmity to Israel and to British and French "colonialism." But their interests are divergent in some important aspects. And when the present situation cools off, Nasser may find himself farther than ever from realizing his ambition.

The latest development is a serious dispute between Iraq and Syria, both members of the Arab League.

Iraq is being accused of trying to stir up rebellion against the

government of Syria. Dispatches talk of the possibility of an open break between the two countries, and of the possibility that Iraq may move more troops into neighboring Jordan.

But the real point at issue is Iraq's fear that Syria may be taken over by its strong pro-Communist faction, led by Lt. Col. Abdel Hamid Seraj, chief of army intelligence.

U.S. Appears Helpless
This fear is fully shared by the United States, which sees no way in which it can do anything about it.

Nasser is more and more linking himself with Soviet Russia. He started out by getting arms from the Soviet bloc to use against Israel. Now he has made Russia his ally against Britain, France and Israel.

If a pro-Russian government managed to seize power in Syria, the situation in the Middle East would become even more serious.

One factor in the Middle Eastern line-up is that Iraq is a member of both the Arab League, formed against Israel, and the Baghdad Alliance, which was formed as a barrier against Russian aggression in the Middle East and Southwest Asia.

The Arab League is an alliance of Arab countries, all Moslem. The Baghdad Pact is an alliance of Moslem countries, with the addition of Britain, Britain's fellow members are Turkey, Iraq, Iran and Pakistan.

The United States tried hard to get other Arab countries to join the Baghdad Pact. They failed, largely because of Nasser. He saw the pact as a threat to his own dream of making himself Mr. Big of the Middle East.

When the present situation cools off, it may be found that Turkey, not Egypt will emerge as the dominant Middle Eastern country.

IT'S THE LAW * IN TEXAS *

"LAWYER TALK"
Many persons feel that the "whereases", "aforesaids", and other legal verbiage used by lawyers are intended only to confound and confuse the layman.

Nothing could be further from the truth. In drafting legal documents, the lawyer attempts to draft them in such a way as to exclude all ambiguities. In the last analysis, a legal document means what some court at some future time shall declare that it means. As a consequence, it is the lawyer's duty to his client to attempt to draft the instrument in such a way that it can mean only one thing.

Most any paragraph of non-legal language contains numerous ambiguities. When a lawyer refers to the "deed aforesaid", he is attempting to make it clear beyond question that the deed he is referring to is the deed mentioned in a prior portion of the instrument. Likewise, when he prefaces a legal document with a long list of "whereases", he is simply reciting pertinent facts for the benefit of the court to show the facts of the situation that lead to the execution of the instrument.

The difficulty with drafting a document in layman's language is that to the trained analyst such language is susceptible of several meanings, and consequently is likely to lead to litigation. It is the draftsman's purpose to avoid litigation which is usually expensive for the client.

Another reason why lawyers use legal language is historical in nature. Thus most deeds declare that the grantor "by these presents does grant, sell, and convey" the land in question to the grantee. Each of the words recited has a technical meaning. The words together have frequently been construed by the courts and consequently any lawyer knows in using

Devout Or Gay Yuletide Customs Come From Other Lands To Glorify World Christmas Celebration

Every Christmas children, and grown-ups alike, look forward to giving and receiving gifts. . . for gift giving has been an important part of the holiday season ever since the Wise Men and shepherds brought gifts to the Christ Child in Bethlehem.

The thought is the same today . . . to express love and goodwill . . . but the bearer of these gifts differs from country to country.

American children look forward to Santa Claus, plump and jolly, dressed in traditional red and white, with a snowy white beard. He carries his gifts in a pack on his back and is drawn in a sleigh by eight reindeer.

Santa Claus is supposed to come down chimney and fill the stockings, hung by the fire place, with little gifts and heap presents under the Christmas tree.

Children in many Latin American countries are in for a double treat. There are two dates for giving gifts to children. January 6 is called Kings' Day. Children leave their shoes outside and the Three Wise Men fill them with presents. The other gift-giving date is Christmas Eve or night.

United States customs have been creeping into the Latin American's holiday season, particularly in countries close to the states.

Costa Ricans, Cubans and Guatemalans are among those who now have Christmas trees.

In Norway, the birds are remembered with gifts of suet and choice sheaves of grain tied to trees; extra fodder is provided for the cattle.

Father Star listens to the children's prayers and catechism in Poland. If they have been good, Mother Star who is dressed like an angel in a white robe and veil distributes the gifts.

Swiss children also await a radiant angel who rides in a sleigh drawn by six reindeer.

English children also wait for Santa Claus, who looks very much like our American Santa Claus. They find their gifts tied to, and under a Christmas tree.

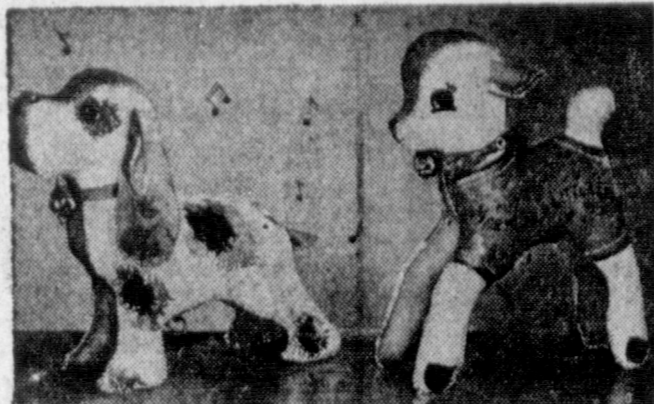
Dutch children wait for St. Nicholas who is dressed in traditional bishop's robes of black and carries a crozier and wears a mitre. He brings gifts for the children and places them in their wooden shoes.

When the Dutch settled in the American colonies, they brought

with them the tradition of St. Nicholas or "santeklas" as he was called. From the lean, rather stern St. Nicholas came our jolly Santa Claus.

Italian children receive their gifts from "La Befana", a good fairy, who carries a broom.

The Christmas tree has its origin in the 8th century when St. Germany. Replaced the sacrifices Boniface, English missionary to Odin's sacred oak by a fir tree decorated in tribute to the Christ Child.

Take Time To Flameproof Your Tree For Safety

Before decorating your Christmas tree, be sure to treat it with a flameproofing material.

This may be done in two ways — by spraying a flame retardant on the branches and needles, or by setting the trunk in a chemical mixture, which the tree absorbs.

Flameproofing compounds can be purchased at most paint stores — or you may be able to get the formulas for flameproofing compounds from your local fire department.

Just to be on the safe side, keep a fire extinguisher within easy reach near the Christmas tree.

Americans too, have contributed to our rich heritage of Christmas songs. In 1849, Edmund H. Sears, a Unitarian minister, composed "It Came Upon a Midnight Clear". "We Three Kings of Bethlehem Are" was composed by Dr. John Henry Hopkins, Jr., an Episcopalian rector.

Perhaps the best known and most beloved of all American carols, "O Little Town of Bethlehem" was written in 1868 by Phillips Brooks, a young Episcopalian minister. A trip to the Holy Land was his inspiration for the carol.

The gay holiday song, "Jingle Bells", has been popular for almost a century and was composed

by another American churchman, John Pierpont.

One of the prettiest, and most exciting sights of Christmas is the helter-skelter mound of beautifully wrapped gifts piled under the Christmas tree! Start early to collect the materials you'll need to add novel touches to your gift packages. Let your imagination have full sway and you'll find a clever idea to highlight each gift wrapping.

For pretty Christmas gift packages, just as important as the handsome or jolly decoration is to start with an attractive package. Here are a few simple rules that can make anyone an expert gift wrapper:

First: always use a box to be sure of having a neat package.

Second: Place box on the gift paper and cut paper, allowing just enough margin at each end for folding.

Third: Center box on paper and make a neat overlay. Tape.

Fourth: Fold edges of paper in at the corners, bring under edge up over top edge and tape.

It's also easy to master the art of making pretty ribbon bows. A flat bow is made from a length of ribbon looped back and under in graduated sizes and tied in the center.

To make a perky stand-up bow, fold the ribbon in several loops, fold in half and cut two V's at fold. Unfold and tie V's with narrow ribbon. Fluff out the loops.

Wrap them in red and white checked shelf paper and put a candy cane in the bow of each... try your hand at decorating with one of the glitter kits... sparkle your packages with multi-colored sequins... tie each with a sprig of holly and a tiny bell in the bow!

BETTER JOBS Competition

I quote: "I shall add but a few words on the subject of Competition. It is very clear that it has no natural tendency to diminish the amount of the enjoyments which are distributed over society. Does Competition tend to make this distribution unequal? If there be anything evident in the world, it is that after having, if I may so express myself, attached to each service, to each value, a larger proportion of utility, Competition labours incessantly to level the services themselves to render them proportional to efforts. Is Competition not the spur which urges men into profitable branches of industry, and urges them out of those which are unprofitable? Its proper action, then, is to realize equality more and more, by elevating the social level.

In those days some hotel men had a trick of lighting up all the rooms at night to deceive the public, but that was out of the question in this case because this Biltmore was way out in the Palmettoes at Coral Gables and hardly anyone but impetuous neekers ventured that far after dark. It was, in words of one syllable, a hell of a time.

Byoir sent down three bright young men to do a job. They were Gerry Swinehart, George Hammon and Charles Canny. Swinehart was in charge and he and Byoir figured that the best way to get the most of the best publicity was to bring down the White House roadshow which thereafter was to become a familiar circus all over the U.S.A. Frank Roosevelt was going out on the Nourmahal, a beautiful big bucket which Vincent Astor loaned him at a nominal price of nothing, including food for the moocher and his party as well as the ship's company.

Heywood Brown, a cheap phony with a sanctimonious pretense of contempt for the rich people, took advantage of the \$1 rate and when he can reasonably be elevated, namely, by an increase of material prosperity, ease, leisure, moral and intellectual improvement, in a word, by enlarging consumption. Clash Between Democratic Lawmakers Is Assured

WASHINGTON - A clash between Northern and Southern Democrats is assured when Congressional leaders and the increasingly influential group of Governors block out their program and direction during the next Congressional session and ensuing years. Looking toward 1958 and 1960, when they hope to retain Congress and then recapture the Presidency, the younger and more aggressive Yankees insist upon adoption of a more forward-looking set of principles than the two Texas leaders - Speaker Sam Rayburn and Senator Lyndon B. Johnson - have approved. They feel that the two men lean too heavily toward the conservative side in many instances. Almost every Northern Member of Congress, as well as Democratic Governors and Mayors, openly opposed the Johnson Natural Gas Bill, which was lobbied in such a questionable manner that President Eisenhower had to veto it.

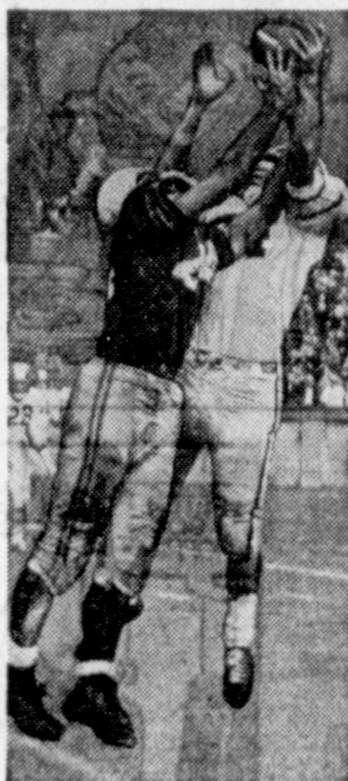
