Underpass Bids To Be Let Soon

Bids for construction work on the Hobart Street underpass will be let in the near future by the State Highway Department as the result of reports made to the department's Amarillo district office yesterday by Mayor Lynn Boyd. Mayor Boyd informed the engineers that all of the money for Pampa's share in the cost of the project would be available before the bids were let. He also told the engineers that most of the right-of-way had been obtained and that if the remaining right-of-way had not been purchased shortly, condemnation proceedings would be underway before the construction contracts are awarded.

Mayor Boyd told The News this morning that an agreement had been reached with the Hobart estate on the purchase of right-of-way along Alcock from Hobart Street. The city and county, who are paying for the right-of-way, had earlier agreed on a price for the right-of-way and this was agreed to yesterday afternoon by the estate. The only remaining section of right-of-way needed for the underpass and street widening project is that along Hobart Street owned by Caldwell's Drive-Inn. This property is needed to complete the widening of Hobart and of the Hobart and Alcock intersection. So far the city and Loyse Caldwell have not reached an agreement and if it is not reached in the near future the city will proceed with legal work on condemnation to fulfill the agreement made with the highway department, the mayor said this morning.

Bawdy Finish To 'Rackets' Investigation In Portland

WASHINGTON (UP)—The Senate Rackets Committee, insisting somebody was to be named today in sending the Justice Department additional information checked against the story of a Portland, Ore., deputy sheriff. The committee wrote a bawdy finish to its gaudy Portland hearing Wednesday. Two women dope addicts, one admitted prostitute, testified that Deputy Sheriff George Minnelly threatened them with jail unless they made false statements attacking the reputation of racketeer James B. (Big Jim) Elkins, the committee's star witness in

hearings on vice in Portland involving officials of the Teamsters Union. Has Additional Information Minnelly called his testimony a "hoax" and denied he threatened them or paid them money. Committee Counsel Robert F. Kennedy told newsmen today the committee has additional information which would throw light on the testimony of Minnelly, who was also questioned about his outside income. Chairman John L. McClellan (D-Ark.) sent Wednesday's testimony to the Justice Department and asked it to prosecute someone for perjury or subornation of per-

jury (inducing someone to lie under oath). Meanwhile, in other developments: —Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) said his regular Senate Labor subcommittee will begin hearings next month on bills to regulate union finances, including use of dues money as well as health and welfare funds. McClellan said Wednesday that Congress may enact legislation this year to curb labor racketeering. Targets Kohler Strike —Sen. Barry Goldwater (R-Ariz.), a member of the Rackets Committee, said he formally asked the committee to investigate the three-year strike of the United Auto Workers against the Kohler Co. of Wisconsin. The strike involves UAW President Walter P. Reuther, a favorite Goldwater target. —McClellan said the committee is "approaching readiness" for hearings on labor racketeering in Philadelphia and a West Coast city which he refused to name. However, the next city on the committee's agenda is New York where it will begin by investigating formation of bogus "paper locals" to swing a Teamster Union election. The committee will hold a closed hearing in New York Friday. The chairman said the Philadelphia hearing involves about half a dozen unions as well as the Teamsters. "Where there is trouble, you can more or less depend on it that the Teamsters are in on it," McClellan said. He said the Philadelphia case involves labor-management collusion, misuse of union funds and violence in an organizing drive among automobile distributors.

Airline Service Is Nearer For Pampa

C. R. Hoover, chairman of the aviation committee of the Pampa Chamber of Commerce, reported this morning that he received a call yesterday from Keith Kahle, president of Central Airlines, informing him of the studies recently completed by his company relative to establishment of regularly scheduled airline service from Pampa to Dallas and Fort Worth. Kahle said that he expected to have a representative in this area some time next week to present these findings to the committee and to make recommendations for the preparation of information and papers to be presented to the Civil Aeronautics Board for the establishment of such service. Hoover said that he was very optimistic about the final outcome in the committee's effort to obtain the desired service. He pointed

ed out that airline officials themselves had admitted that the last time Pampa had an air line run, it was not a very desirable route, nor were the schedules made up so as to be convenient for persons in the area wanting to make use of it. Present plans, Hoover said, call for the establishment of service which would allow anyone wanting to make connections in Dallas for flights to Washington, D.C., and any other Eastern city without too much wait or inconvenience. Also, he added, the present plan calls for a more direct route to Dallas and Fort Worth. Any airline service established in Pampa would be so arranged as to have the user in Dallas in the morning, allow him to complete his business and return to Pampa in time for supper, Hoover said.

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7 Persons Dead; Hundreds Homeless

New Thunderstorm Siege Expected In Flood Area

A new siege of thunderstorms was expected to sweep across Central and East Texas late today where floods already had killed at least seven persons, chased hundreds from their homes and inflicted millions of dollars in damage. Sheriff Henry Matyssek of Georgetown said flood and storm damage in Williamson county alone amounted to between two and three million dollars. Matyssek said at least 30 homes were either washed away or heavily damaged around Georgetown. He said farmers reported "heavy loss" of livestock. San Gabriel park, a 20-acre tree-studded area around the stream bearing the same name, was severely damaged. Five of the deaths came from

Wednesday's floods in Central Texas. Two others were drowned by floods last weekend. The U.S. weather bureau said showers and thunderstorms were expected to develop again late today over the east portion of West Texas and sweep across Central and East Texas tonight and Friday. Wednesday's storms were accompanied by about 20 tornadoes,

although most of them never touched the ground. One did, however, and destroyed a home and injured a woman west of Elgin. The San Gabriel River was receding at Georgetown, but at least 15 families were left without shelter. Others, the exact number not known, sought temporary refuge with friends and families. One report said nearly 100 families had

to leave their homes in Georgetown. Homes Wrecked One home, about five miles east of Georgetown and where an adjoining grocery was tumbled down the rampaging river, was swept away at Mankin's crossing. Matyssek and his deputies worked throughout the night. He said only wrecks of homes remained in the river bottom in

north Georgetown. Windows were gone, furniture tumbled or washed away and mud and water covered everything. Waco Creek flooded for the third time since last Friday and chased several families out of their homes again. Lightning struck an oil storage farm at Turnerton, near Henderson, early today, setting fire to two tanks of an oil and gas separator unit. Firemen prevented the fire from spreading to nearby oil storage tanks. At Killen, a city of 21,000 near Fort Hood, a family of three died when Nolan Creek became a torrent and swept their houses away. They were in it.

The body of Mrs. Benita Gonzales, 58, was found about 200 yards from the original site of her house. Her husband, Bedilio, was found dead half a mile from her body. The body of their six-year-old son Pedro was not recovered. Mrs. J. T. Walker, 17, of Austin, and her baby son drowned when

Test Of 'Doctrine' Possible

WASHINGTON (UP)—The United States may be heading for its first test of the Eisenhower Doctrine to help crisis-ridden Jordan in the Middle East. This possibility arose today in the light of President Eisenhower's joint statement with Secretary of State John Foster Dulles that they "regard the independence and integrity of Jordan as vital." The wording was deliberately the same as the language of the Eisenhower Doctrine, which offers U.S. military and economic aid to Mideast nations beset by international Communism. Diplomatic observers here noted that pro-Western King Hussein of Jordan Wednesday for the first time blamed international Communism for efforts to break up his country. If the United States decides Communism is behind Jordan's troubles, this could pave the way for application of the Doctrine. American officials have repeatedly accused Russia of "fishing" in the troubled Mideast and have no doubt Moscow is trying to capitalize on the turbulent internal crisis in Jordan. There is no indication U.S. troops will be sent to Jordan at this time. Presidential press secretary James C. Hagerty said Wednesday night as far as he knows King Hussein has not requested American help—a prerequisite for application of Eisenhower Doctrine aid. However, the Doctrine also provides for military and economic assistance apart from direct use of U.S. troops. Such military help could take the form of arms, military advisers or other aid if requested by Jordan.

Syrian Troop Withdrawal Is Demanded

Iraqi Armed Might Backs Hussein

The U. S. aircraft carrier Forrester and 13 other warships of the U. S. 6th Fleet sailed from France today toward the Middle East where a crisis in Jordan threatens to erupt into a major war. Adm. Edward Arnold, commander of the fleet, got his sailing orders at the same time King Hussein declared martial law in Jordan. Hussein declared a virtual military dictatorship in Jordan and demanded that Syria withdraw its troops from his divided kingdom. Dispatches said he was backed by the armed might of Iraq. President Shukri el-Kuwatli of Syria flew to Cairo with his top military and political officials for consultations with President Gamal Abdel Nasser on the deteriorating situation. Dispatches from Beirut, Lebanon, said King Hussein told Kuwait to remove the 3,000 or more Syrian troops from Jordan or face the threat of clashes with the Iraqi army.

Sixth Fleet Ships Sail For Mideast

After ordering armored battalions to take control in all cities he ordered pro-Western and Turkish-born Premier Ibrahim Hashem to form a government. Hashem immediately went before the nation with a radio message declaring his determination to "establish law and order in our homeland and give peace of mind to the people." Hashem said the revolt had assumed such proportions that "the government finds no alternative but to proclaim martial law and adopt stringent measures to preserve the safety of the homeland. Curfew Imposed King Hussein already had clamped a curfew on the main

cities of his kingdom after blaming the disturbances in Jordan on international communism. His actions came after a day of rioting in the streets of Amman, Jerusalem and other Jordanian cities in which police clashed repeatedly with mobs of demonstrators shouting for the return of Nabulsi. The mobs turned anti-American and shouted "down with the Eisenhower Doctrine" before the disturbances died out.

Pampa Rotarians yesterday heard Chief Go-Go-We-Osh of the Chippewa tribe tell of his "background and related Indian lore. The chief pointed out in his talk that it was the early colonists who started the practice of scalping when the scalp was used as the basis of paying a \$50 bounty for killing an Indian. The Indians took this as a method of warfare and instituted the practice themselves. Visitors and guests for the day were R. G. Keeler, Floyd Imel, Chas. Reibison and Charlie Riley.

CRMWA Obstacle Removed
The passage of legislation by the Texas Senate and House yesterday allowing the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority to negotiate water rates for individual cities has removed one of the main obstacles that caused Pampa to resign from the authority and one that has kept Pampa out. Mayor Lynn Boyd reported this morning. In making the statement this morning, Mayor Boyd emphasized the fact that the new legislation does not mean that Pampa will rejoin the group. He stated, "We will have a 'Town Hall' meeting before any action is taken." Pampa was asked to rejoin the authority last week in a resolution received from the directors of the authority. The measure passed yesterday was approved by the directors of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority two weeks ago. It eliminates a provision for uniform water rates for water which would be supplied from the proposed Canadian River reservoir. The uniform rate was objected to by Pampa prior to withdrawing from the authority on the grounds that towns close to the reservoir should not have to help pay for water lines to more distant towns. 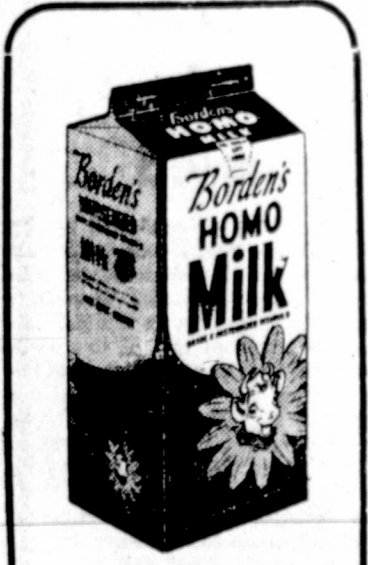

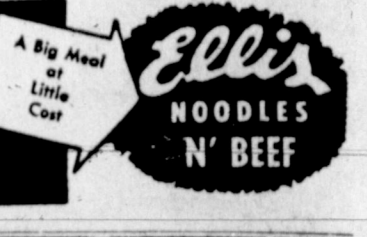

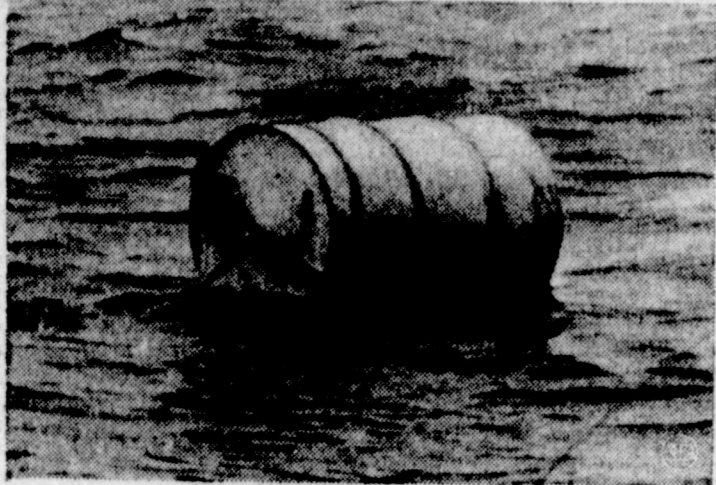

Ironic Twist Of Fate Is Due In Senate

WASHINGTON (UP)—An ironic twist of fate will be unfolded soon in the U.S. Senate. The principal characters are Charles E. (Chip) Bohlen and Scott McLeod, two of President Eisenhower's recent diplomatic appointments.

Four years ago almost to the day the Senate was engaged in a hot argument over Bohlen's fitness to be ambassador to Moscow. McLeod, new State Department security officer, and a former FBI agent, claimed to have found derogatory information against Bohlen.

The tables now have turned somewhat. McLeod's nomination to be ambassador to Ireland is being attacked by Democrats who on skittier areas. A famous milliner was asked about homosexuality in his field, Elsa Maxwell was questioned on her own sex life and that of the so-called international set. Peter Freuchen, the quiz winner, delivered a dissertation on Eskimo life.

Unhappy Thing
"The unhappy thing, of course, is the emphasis some people have placed on this kind of interview," observed Mike. "They charge us with sensationalism for sensationalism's sake."

"But we're not looking under any rocks. Our questions are penetrating questions, but they're fair—I don't think there is anyone who has gone into an interview with me who hasn't come out better than he went in."

Mike Wallace Shuttles Into Network Arena

NEW YORK (UP)—Mike Wallace, who has wowed this town during the past six months with a local interview show, shuttles into the network arena this Sunday.

ABC-TV will launch "Mike Wallace Interviews," a 30-minute opus, with Gloria Swanson the initial subject of Mike's buckshots. Subsequent shows will feature Orson Welles, Harry Belafonte, Gypsy Rose Lee, Mickey Cohen and Eldon Edwards, the imperial wizard of the Ku Klux Klan.

Wallace's interview program differs from other TV talk shows in its approach—Mike does not pussyfoot.

Former Taboos
"What we do is to go after certain kinds of things that have been taboo prior to this on TV," said Mike today. "We've talked to women about sexual mores, to Negroes about miscegenation."

"We've asked a former head of the Communist party about his motives, we've talked motives with sports figures and politics with writers and actresses."

"In a sense, what we have done is to ask people to justify themselves. We don't want the biography, the hard news story. What we're looking for is attitudes, the drives behind people."

Wallace has shepherded his interview show over the local Dumont channel here since Oct. 9, 1956 and frequently has touched

claim he is unfit to serve in such a role. Those Republicans who opposed Bohlen's appointment as ambassador to Moscow four years ago are voicing their opposition again to his nomination to be ambassador to the Philippines.

Senate Hearings Set
Hearings on both appointments will be held about April 30 by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

The hearings are being called after more than 30 other recent diplomatic appointments have been approved without question. Their proximity in time suggests to some Washington officials that McLeod may, in effect, be approved for the Dublin post with an indirect assist from Bohlen's supporters.

Bohlen's backers don't relish seeing the veteran career diplomat subjected to another ordeal where his security would be questioned. Aside from voicing some complaints, they may be willing to take it easy on McLeod. The Bohlen case of four years ago is still somewhat of a mystery. Republicans generally complained he had been too close to previous Democratic administrations despite his career status.

Gets Clean Bill
But the late Sen. Pat McCarran (D-Nev.) charged in the Senate on March 20, 1953, that McLeod had been "unable to clear" Bohlen "on the basis of information received from the FBI." Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy (R-Wis.) said he had known for years about Bohlen's FBI file. He said calling Bohlen a "security risk" was "putting it too weak."

Secretary of State John Foster Dulles assured the Senate Foreign Relations Committee that an FBI investigation left "no doubt" Bohlen was loyal and no security risk.

There is no doubt McLeod felt strongly about opposing Bohlen's

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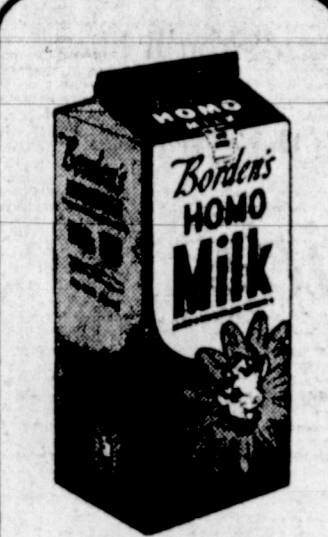

Sandwiches Are Picnic-Day 'Must'

A perfect picnic day is any day you happen to feel like having one. The simpler the menu the better, so long as food is plentiful, and of course, sandwiches are a must. Here is a suggestion for your first picnic of the season:

PYRAMID SANDWICHES
16 slices buttered enriched bread
¼ cup Chicken-Pimiento filling
4 slices boiled ham
4 (1-ounce) slices process cheese
3 tablespoons cream cheese
1 tablespoon milk

Make triple-deck sandwiches. In each, use 3 fillings: Chicken-Pimiento, ham, and a cheese slice. Trim crusts; cut sandwiches in half, diagonally. To serve: Place 2 triangles, short sides back to back on a plate. Blend cream cheese with milk, put in pastry tube and garnish sandwiches. Makes 4.

Grilled Tomatoes Are Tasty Treat

Fried tomatoes can be a delicious treat when prepared on an electric grill.

The tomatoes should be cut to one-half-inch thickness, dipped in beaten egg, and then in fine crumbs. The electric grill should be well oiled and set at 350 degrees.

A variation suggested by Arvin Industries home economists is to fry the tomatoes on one side until they are brown, add a slice of cheese and a slice of bacon that already has been cooked on one side, close the grill, and cook until the bacon is brown and the cheese softened. This is especially good when served with a green salad.

LARD FOR DEEP-FAT FRYING
Sift together flour, sugar, salt and baking powder. Combine egg and milk and add gradually to dry ingredients. Stir until batter is smooth. Combine confectioners' sugar and 1-3 cup flour and coat orange sections with mixture. Dip in fritter batter. Fry in deep hot lard (380 degrees F.) until brown, 4 to 5 minutes. Drain on absorbent paper. Serve immediately. 28 to 32 small fritters.

NUTMEG SAUCE
½ cup sugar
1 tablespoon cornstarch
1 cup boiling water
2 tablespoons butter
1 tablespoon lemon juice
½ teaspoon nutmeg

Mix sugar and cornstarch and add boiling water. Cook, stirring constantly, until mixture boils. Boil 1 minute and add butter, lemon juice and nutmeg. Serve hot. Yield: 1 cup.

Toast Glamorized With Honey Sauce

Breakfast can be made as appetizing and interesting a meal as its companions, lunch and dinner, with a little forethought.

For instance have you ever made a breakfast sauce that can be served on the usual plain toast in the morning and which takes but a few minutes to prepare?

A Honey Sauce can add glamour to an otherwise stereotyped breakfast. This sauce can be put together quickly by combining ½ cup Honey, ¼ cup butter, and ½ cup cream or undiluted evaporated milk in a saucepan. Bring this to a boil and let it cook about 4 or 5 minutes until it is of good thick syrup consistency. Be sure to stir it every so often, then cool it slightly and stir in ½ cup of ground unblanched almonds. That is all there is to it. This amount will make 5 to 6 servings.

This wholesome coffee cake is simple to prepare. A quick stir in one bowl turns out a glamorous bread.

Serve it when there is time to savor it. Sprig it on "the girls" as a delightful surprise at an informal brunch, or at tea time. Have crunch-topped coffee cake at leisurely family breakfasts, fresh or toasted.

The lightness and flavor contributed by the corn meal in the coffee cake, and the inspired topping, using crumbs from last night's corn muffins or cornsticks, add up to a memorable bread.

CORN MEAL COFFEE CAKE

1 cup corn meal
1 cup flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
¼ cup brown sugar, firmly packed
¼ teaspoon allspice (optional)
¼ teaspoon nutmeg (optional)
¼ cup pineapple juice
1 egg
1-3 cup melted shortening
½ cup crushed pineapple
½ cup chopped dried apricots, or raisins
½ cup chopped nuts

Sift corn meal, flour, baking powder, salt, sugar and spices together. Add pineapple juice, whole egg and shortening. Stir lightly until just moist. Add fruits and nuts and mix all gently together. Pour into well-greased 9"x9"x2" cake pan (or individual muffin tins) which has been lightly dusted with corn meal. Cover with corn-crumbs topping and bake at 425 degrees

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Orange Fritters, Canadian-Style Bacon Ideal Plate-Mates For Brunch Or Lunch

Brunch is neither breakfast or lunch but a delightful combination of both. A smart hostess combines an appetizing brunch menu with plenty of piping hot coffee. It's little wonder that friendships are made and cemented during this type of entertaining.

Actually brunch menus should be something special, yet easy to serve.

Fritters are often served as a dessert. In this case, you'll like a nutmeg sauce as a topping for these orange fritters.

CANADIAN-STYLE BACON
12 to 16 slices Canadian-style bacon, cut ¼ inch thick

Place slices of bacon in frying-pan. Cook slowly, turning occasionally until bacon is lightly browned on both sides. Serve hot with Orange Fritters, 6 to 8 servings.

AEC Conducts First Nuclear 'Safety' Test

MERCURY, Nev. (UP) — The Atomic Energy Commission early Wednesday conducted the first in 1957 series of nuclear "safety" tests—an explosion of a non-nuclear device near atomic weapons to see if concussion will trigger nuclear bombs.

The AEC's usual brief announcement said only that the 8:27 a.m. test was "successful."

In a similar test last year, the concussion set up a radiation reading among the weapons that indicated sharp blows on atomic weapons could stir radioactivity. There was no report of any explosion of a nuclear weapon during last year's safety test series.

The AEC is conducting these tests of storage and handling of nuclear weapons during the summer months at times when the test site on the Yucca Flats proving grounds is not being used for the regular nuclear experiments scheduled for this year.

The test came on the 14th day after it originally was scheduled. Delays were caused by adverse winds, rains, and snows.

Newsprint Demand To Increase

UP46 NEWSPRINT R-1947a 4-24
NEW YORK (UP) — The world demand for American and Canadian newsprint will increase 70 per cent by 1965, the American Newspaper Publishers Assn. reported Wednesday.

In a 40-page study distributed at the ANPA's 71st annual convention, the association said the demands on North American newsprint producers will reach an estimated 11,175,000 tons annually by 1965. The continental manufacturing capacity last year was 7,868,000 tons.

The study credited the growth of population and greater space demands by advertisers for the record demand for newsprint in this country. It said U.S. newspapers will need eight million tons of newsprint by 1965, compared to current consumption estimated at about 6,900,000 tons.

By 1965, the study said, daily newspaper circulation in the United States is expected to reach 65 million and Sunday circulation 54 million, an increase of about 14 per cent over 1956. Advertising is expected to increase 24 per cent.

Overseas exports by North American newsprint producers may jump to two million tons by 1965, compared to 875,000 tons in 1956, the report said.

CAR OF TOMORROW?

Sealed-In Motorist With Radar In Back

It's No Dream, Detroit Insists

DETROIT (NEA) — Here's a peek at some of this town's best kept secrets:

Auto engines will be so powerful only one forward speed is needed. Cars will be so low you'll have to enter partly through the roof. Passengers will be sealed in completely air-conditioned interiors. Seats will be ventilated. Radar warning devices will prevent rear-end collisions. Cars will look more and more like guided missiles. This is not "dream car" stuff, either.

These innovations will be showing up on new models within the next few years.

This information comes from Victor G. Raviolo, Ford's director of engineering research. Chrysler

and General Motors experts confirm most of these trends, Raviolo says:

"We can expect at least a 25 per cent and possibly as much as a 40 per cent increase in horsepower in the next few years. This will permit the use of a transmission of different character. Large engines with a hydro-dynamic torque converter and a reverse gear will replace today's complex assembly with a three speed and reverse gear box."

Deterioration of service available to car owners in the past few years will be reflected in the newer cars. "I expect sealed transmissions and axle, and lifetime lubricated chassis components that would not be serviced," he says.

If you think the '57 models are low — between 37 and 61 inches — drop your sights for the ones coming up. Manufacturers and customers alike desire this because of reduced wind resistance.

The minimum height of a car, theoretically, is about 51 inches, and within the next 10 years all models will be close to that, Raviolo claims. This provides seven inches for ground clearance, five inches for leg room, 36 inches for torso height and three inches for head clearance.

"With these lower heights, we can't get into the side too well, and we must develop access at least partially through the top," he explains.

"The solution is the auxiliary roof door," he insists, referring to a side door which includes part of the roof also opening up. The foreign-made Mercedes 300 SL has such a door.

Windows in the coming cars will be sealed but provided with an emergency release. They will be made flush with the skin of the car for better streamlining. This will also help reduce noise.

"Wind noises resulting from the

use of movable windows are a major nuisance at high speed," he explains. "Heat will be added or removed as required and clear filtered air will also be supplied mechanically."

Raviolo's men are now working on revolutionary changes in seats. Ventilation through the seat is at first only likely to show up on a few models. Seats will also be made more adjustable for individual needs. He does not think rearward facing passenger seats will ever be popular.

Accident reports from the expressways and turnpikes reveal the growth of the rear-end collision. "The answer to this is a warning device which will operate so as to allow for safe deceleration," he reports. "All the elements for such a system are known and in use."

Radar would be involved in such a system.

On improvements in steering he says:

"Today we balance rim pressures on the steering wheel against the varying side forces on the car and so trace the desired track. Tomorrow our steering wheel will truly indicate the desired track and automatic servo-mechanisms will compensate for the side forces."

On future design he predicts:

"The customer is becoming more sophisticated about innovations of form such as the guided missile and as a result more ready to accept a functional design if finished and trimmed attractively."

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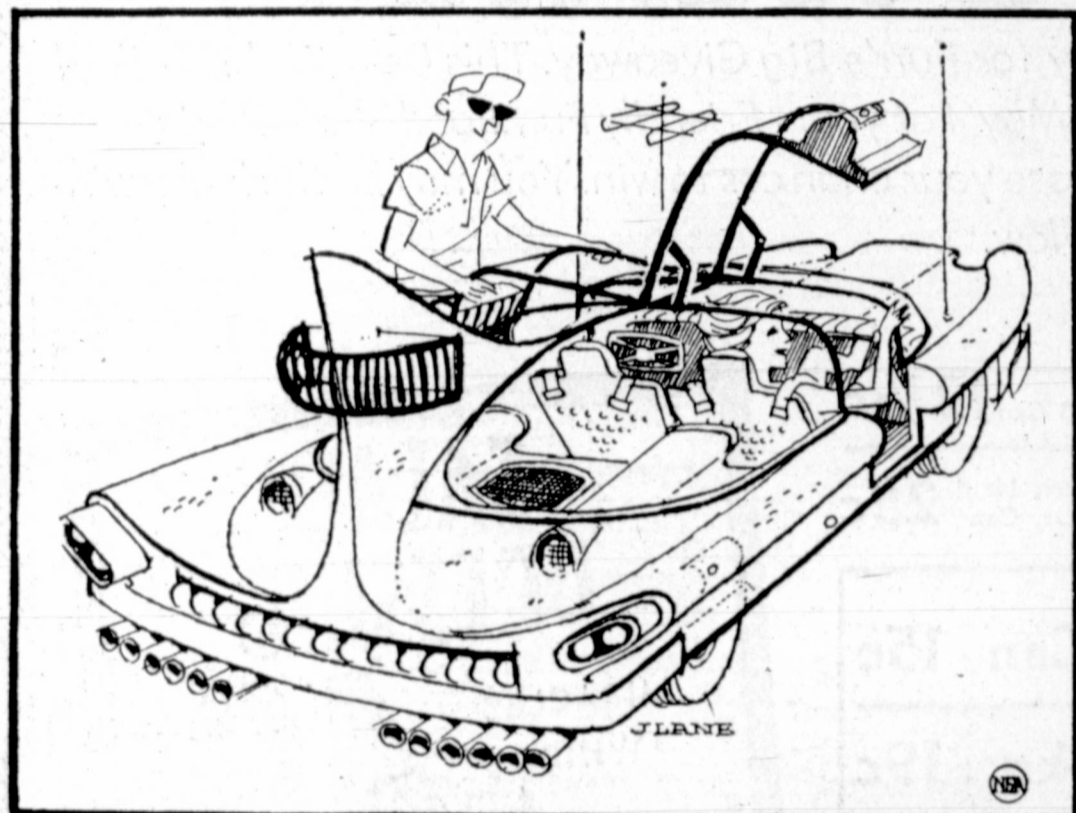

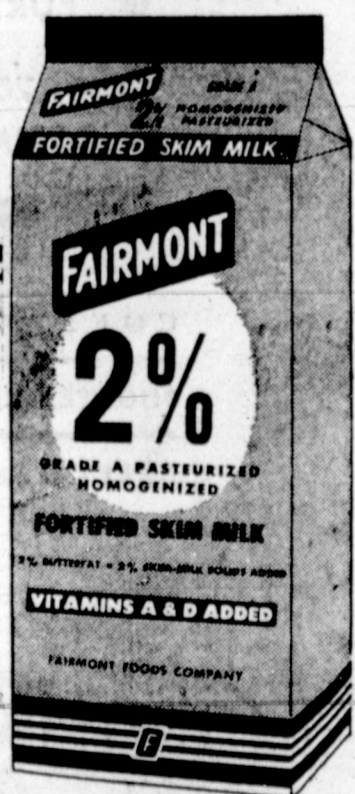

Liberal Demos Set Meeting Next Month

Austin (UP) — Liberal Texas Democrats have announced plans for a state-wide meeting aimed at wresting control of the party machinery from a "Dixiecrat-Republican coalition."

Members of "The Democrats of Texas" (DOT) called for a state convention in Austin May 18, preceded by county meetings May 4, and precinct conventions this week.

The organization is headed by Mrs. R. D. (Frankie) Randolph of Houston, national Democratic committeewoman from Texas.

An announcement of the state-wide meeting indicated the group is leveling accusations at Gov. Price Daniel identical to those with which they assailed former Gov. Allan Shivers.

"We believe the official Democratic party machinery must be representative of all Democrats and not composed of hand-picked nominees of a single politician interested only in his own political

future," a brochure distributed by DOT said.

The group, without naming Austin attorney Ralph Yarborough, pointed to the recent U.S. Senate election as a demonstration of victory through organization.

"Democrats had remained loyal to their man, their party and their ideals. A continued program of political education can mean further victories, if we take our program to the voters through organization," the announcement said.

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Fort Bliss, Texas, Is Shrine Of Oozlefinch

 FORT BLISS, Tex. (UP)—This West Texas military post is the Army's anti-aircraft artillery and guided missile center. It is also the shrine of the Oozlefinch, guardian angel of all Army missilemen.

Here, on a pedestal of honor, sits what is probably the world's most improbable bird.
 Some six feet tall, the Oozlefinch has an unfeathered body shaped like a sweet potato, the neck of an ostrich and the knowing, vacuous smile of a toothless idiot.
 It carries a Nike missile tucked in the crook of a naked left leg. And, since it flies backward "to keep dust, trivia and other inconsequential out of its eyes," the Nike is always positioned in the correct attitude.
 Its protruding, knob-like eyes are all-seeing, since they are unshaded by eyelids or brows. They are also rather seriously blood-shot.

No 90-Day Wonder
 Chief Oozlefinching of the Ancient and Honorable Order of Oozlefinchings is Maj. Gen. Robert J. Wood, commanding officer of Fort Bliss, who was the man responsible for bringing the creature out of retirement to preside over the cannon-less artillerymen of the missile age.
 The Oozlefinch is no 90-day wonder. His history dates back to shortly after the turn of the century when he first assumed the stature of patron of the coast artillery at Fort Monroe, Va.
 Gen. Wood pointed to the eyes as the outstanding feature of the legendary bird.
 "Look at those eyes," he said. "Just why they are so prominent and red, no one seems to know. But being all-seeing, the bird can gather more information in a shorter period of time than mere mortals who have conventional sight. Because its eyes are unshaded, the bird is forced to fly tail-foremost to protect its power of observation. Also, he can turn them 180 degrees to gaze inwardly when he desires the maximum value from self-contemplation."
Guided Success
 The Oozlefinch presided at Fort Monroe for nearly 40 years, during which time his spirit guided

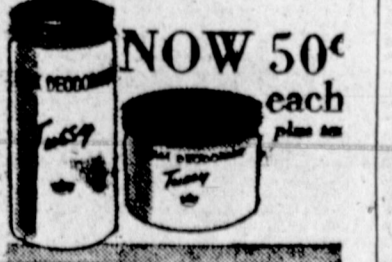

Should we at any time, be inconsistent with these truths, we would appreciate anyone pointing out to us how we are inconsistent with these moral guides.

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What Next For Beck?

Dave Beck, the mighty mogul of the movers, has had it.

The head of the Teamsters Union, who with his ability to spend funds collected under duress from his membership is sort of a labor boss King Farouk, has run his course.

Beck may go to jail. His first lieutenant, James Hoffa, is under indictment and may also serve time. The whole union movement has now been glimpsed under the unwinking gaze of a senatorial committee. The public has been educated, at least to a degree.

It was probably just a matter of bad luck, so far as Beck is concerned, that he got the leading role in the investigation. There is a whole stable full of equally guilty cronies in the AFL-CIO who could have felt the heat rather than Beck. So we hope and trust that the committee isn't through, but will now continue its educational efforts by revealing the facts concerning such men as Walter Reuther, Parnes Petrillo, Harry Bridges, Dave Dubinsky, James B. Carey, Woodruff Randolph, George Meany and others.

Of course, the problem raised by such an investigation is that this sort of pry is never aimed at the basic philosophy. Instead, certain men are picked out, their misdeeds recounted, their sins publicized, and then the entire union movement is theoretically spanked and put to bed. Presumably, it will wake up in the morning chastened and contrite.

If the committee were to guide itself by the basic American philosophy of individual freedom and point out the innumerable places in which union collectivism was at variance with the Golden Rule, the Ten Commandments and the Declaration of Independence, then it could do a superb job in educating the American public.

Unfortunately, the committee will not do this. Instead it will concentrate on revealing the graft and corruption perpetuated by some of the bigwigs of the movement, and will leave the impression that if only men of this calibre were not in the union movement, the whole program of extortion it furthers would be sweetness and light.

Meanwhile, we notice that Dave Beck, abandoned by his buddies and now abused by some of the rank and file, plans to run for election again. He wants to be president of the Teamsters once more. And, despite all that has been said against him, it wouldn't surprise us if he would be successful in his political aim and purpose within the Teamsters. The political mechanism which Beck controls is so effective that it is doubtful if the honest and law-abiding Teamsters themselves can get rid of either Beck or the mechanism.

But if Beck is re-elected, that fact alone should serve a further educational purpose. If only the members of the union, who know full well how they are compelled, controlled and coerced, had the moral courage to speak out against the outrages and abuses with which unions abound, then there might be some hope of discouraging this type of thing in American life. And the re-election of Beck at this juncture might seriously encourage some of that moral strength so long notable by its absence among the dues-paying serfs of the union monopoly.

Perhaps, if the Teamsters themselves discover that the whole political structure of their union is rigged in favor of perpetual rule by a pair of gangsters, they will become disenchanted with their union to the point that they will find the courage to abandon it in wholesale lots. This is devoutly to be wished.

In any case, it is heartening to know that Beck's misdemeanors have earned him national publicity. No wonder the other scoundrels of the tribe are shivering in their boots and reviling Beck. They hope, by this means, to win the favor of the investigators and keep the glare of publicity from the skeletons in their own closets.

BETTER JOBS

"If I Should Die Before—"

I want to answer a question one union man asked another person and the other person said he could not answer.

The question was: "If I should die before I spend what I have saved, what good would it be to save?"

Of course, men who believe in labor unions would have a little difficulty answering that question. The answer is, of course, that his savings would benefit others after he is gone. If he has children and a wife, it would not only benefit them, but benefit everybody in the world.

Any man who produces wealth and does not consume it and puts it into tools or lends it is making it easier for other people to get better wages. This is because it furnishes them tools with which they can produce more. And since every person should get all he produces, if he produces more under a free market, he will get more. If every person in the past had the attitude of not saving because he was afraid he would die before he spent it, most of us would not be here today.

If it were not for tools, only a very, very few people could survive. If people stopped producing wealth because they thought they had produced all they would consume during their lifetime, we would not make much progress. If the man with creative talents only used them enough to satisfy his own material wants, there would not be very much wealth—that is, very much capital.

If a man has a little ability to understand the laws of nature and the laws of God that others have perceived and cannot himself help explain these great moral laws, then the best thing he can do to help his fellowman is to put more into the world materially than he takes out. The above is pretty well sustained by the parable used by Jesus, (Luke 12: 16: 17: 18: 19: 20) "The ground of a certain rich man brought forth plentifully: And he thought within himself, saying, What shall I do, because I have no room where to bestow my fruits? And he said, This will I do: I will pull down my barns, and build greater; and there will I bestow all my fruits and my goods. And I will say to my soul, Soul, thou hast much goods laid up for many years; take thine ease, eat, drink, and be merry. But God said unto him, Thou fool, this night thy soul shall be required of thee: then whose shall those things be, which thou hast provided?"

Of course, the man who takes the attitude that he doesn't want to produce more than he is going to consume himself has never been born again. In fact, his soul has never emerged. "Too many unions are dominated by arrogant minorities. Too many owe their large membership lists primarily to tactics of coercion or intimidation.

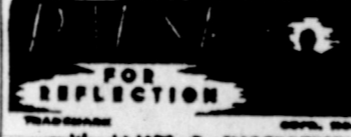

Prodded by the painfully holler-than-thou lectures of Walter Reuther, the AFL-CIO Executive Council seems about to consign Brother Beck to the doghouse.

But is this situation really as much of a hero-villain affair as it might appear on the surface? It is only comparatively recently that the possibilities of making really big money out of the labor union movement have begun to be explored in any systematic fashion. But the opportunities offered by the labor union movement for the exercise of almost unlimited control over other people's lives has long been exploited.

Beck's union is charged with diverting hundreds of thousands of dollars to the personal aggrandizement of its officers. Reuther's union is charged in Michigan with using as much or more for illegal political action programs.

Beck has his palatial home; but Reuther apparently dreams of someday living in the White House. And both these men are charged with building their "dream castles" out of dues and assessments levied on their underlings. Recalling the terror and violence used at Kohler and elsewhere by Reuther's henchmen to bring unwilling men to submit to union control, it seems fair to ask whether the gulf between Reuther and Beck is quite as great as Reuther would have us believe.

How easy it would make the coaches' jobs!



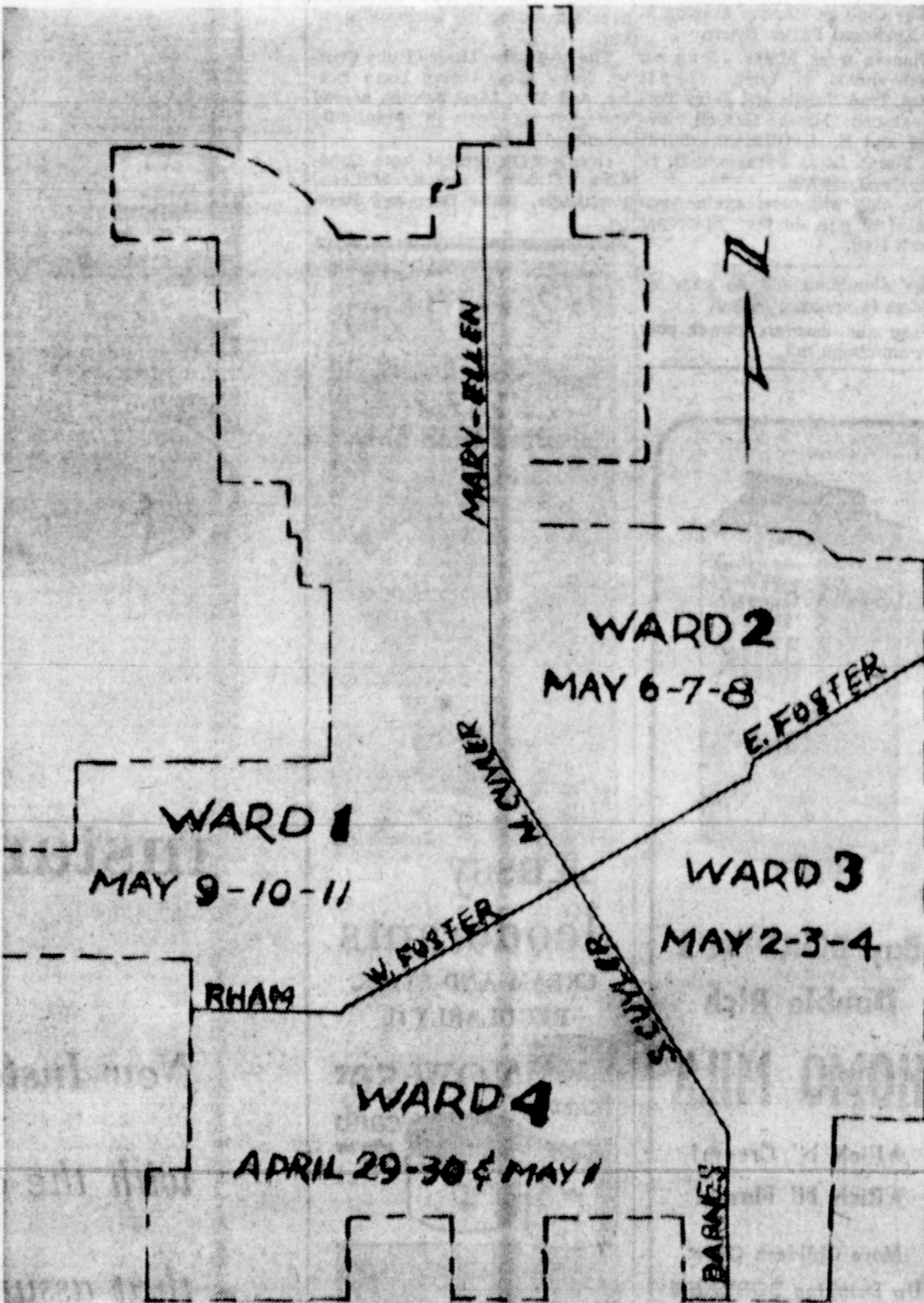

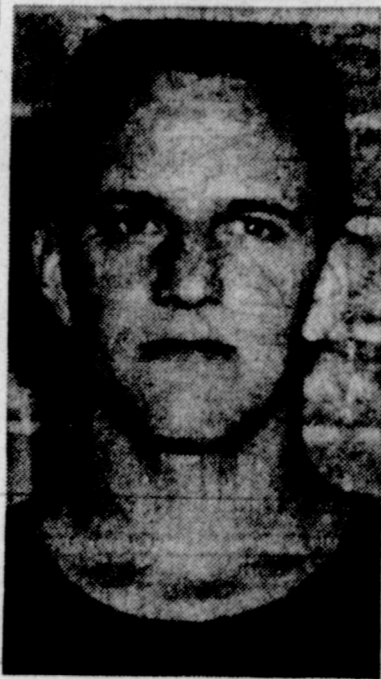

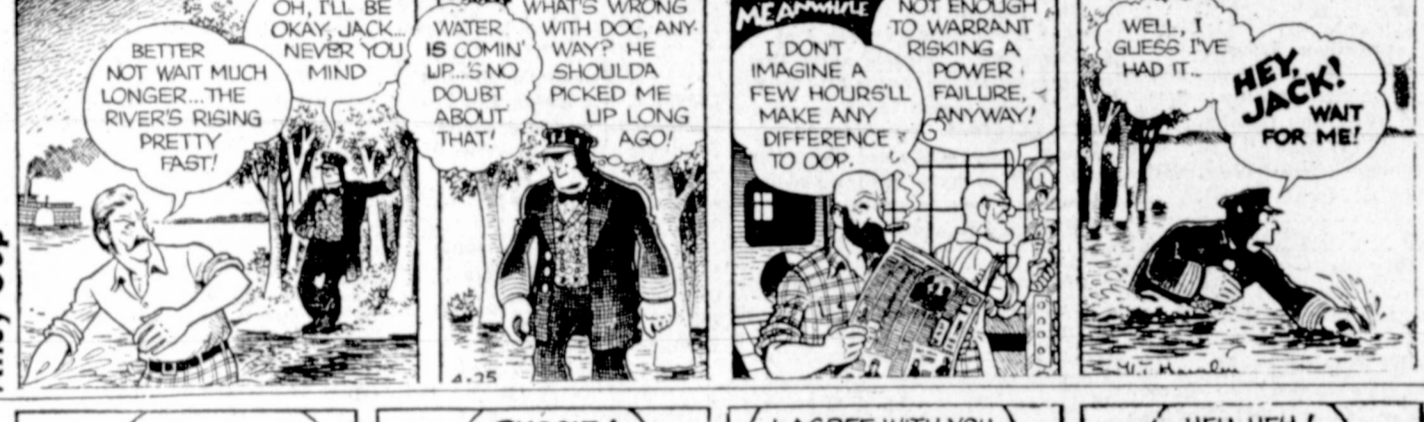

Farmers Could Use Sunshine

AUSTIN (UP)—Farmers in parts of East, Central and South Texas could use "just a little bit of sunshine," according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White. "The rains have been wonderful, bringing with them excellent prospects of a bumper crop year. All we need now is a little sunshine to really bring the crops out, especially corn and small grains," White said Tuesday.

"Some" crop damage is expected in areas hit by violent storms but the season is "still comparatively young," White said. White said small grains got "just the boost they needed" from the South and Central Texas rains, but some of the fields would have sun to keep plants from rotting in standing water.

Corn prospects are "unusually good," he said, "but more rain will be needed later" to keep them from burning later. "Cotton farmers in San Patricio, Nueces, and possibly others will have to replant some of their fields. Hard rains have washed out early plantings but there will be time to make a crop if the fields dry out soon."

"Field moisture conditions vary from 'just enough rain' to 'a little too much, too quick' in the eastern and southern sections. Most farmers agree that a few days of sunshine with more rain to follow later would make crop conditions ideal," White said.

more women are going to work to help their husbands meet the increased cost of living—that the number of working wives increased by five million between April 1947 and March, 1956, to a record 12 million, 300 thousand.

Hard on Heels
Hard on the heels of the government report comes one today from the Young Women's Christian Association, showing that marriage and family is the status most American women prefer.

This was the majority answer from 8,000 women, 12 years of age and older, to a questionnaire the YWCA sent its members as part of its 102nd anniversary celebration.

The organization asked opinion on jobs, marriage, children, whether the women were happy "as is," and what preparation they might have had for a fuller life.

Of the answers which came in from 29 states, 3,238 homemakers said they did not hold outside jobs. Some 2,500 did. And, another 1,655—most of them single and in the 12 to 18-year-old group—were still in school. More than half the 8,000 were married, and most of them had children.

Happy Ones
Sixty eight per cent of the total said "yes" to the basic question: "Are you satisfied with your present role as a woman in today's world?"

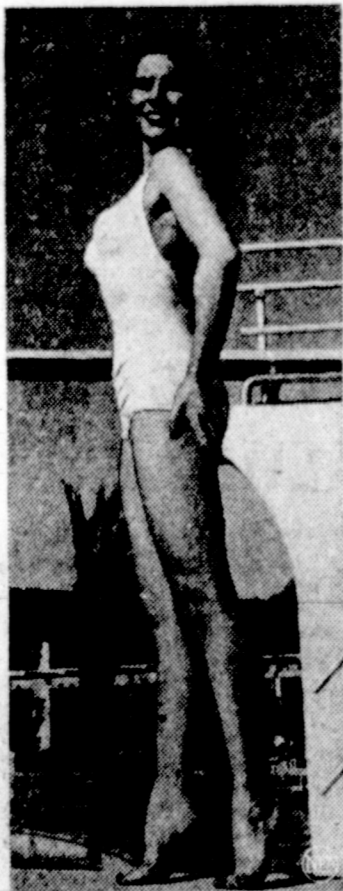
But when the questionnaire gave the unhappy ones a chance to list their preferences, that reluctance to work showed.

In the 12 to 18 group, 248 said they wanted marriage, family and no outside job. Only 81 wanted work as part of their future.

"I am a woman and feel that is my vocation," said one teenager.

Said another: "I'd like to be married to a millionaire."

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US, Germany And Japan Relations Up For Review

Relations between the United States and its two chief World War II enemies are coming up for review within the next two months.

Chancellor Konrad Adenauer of West Germany is to visit Washington on May 27.

Premier Nobusuke Kishi of Japan will follow him on June 19.

The visits will come at a time when important developments are taking place in both the European and Far Eastern situations.

Three Points Each
Adenauer will discuss with President Eisenhower and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles the defense of Western Europe. The reunification of Germany and rela-

tions with Soviet Russia. Kishi will discuss Japanese rearmament, the Japanese-American security treaty, the future of the island of Okinawa and Japan's relations with Communist China.

Adenauer is still worried over the prospect that Britain, France and also the United States may withdraw a substantial part of the troops they now maintain in Germany as part of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization forces.

As part of the question of Japanese rearmament, Kishi wants to revise the Japanese-American security treaty. Part of this picture is the fact that the United States still maintains about 100,000 troops in Japan. Another part is that Okinawa, 325 miles south of the Japanese home islands,

now is one of the most important American military bases in the world. Japan is looking forward to the day when it may regain sovereignty over the island.

Increased Trade Conceded
The most important immediate question in Kishi's mind will be Japanese trade with Communist China. The United States has reluctantly agreed that demands by Britain and Japan for increased trade with Red China must be conceded.

An interesting part of the German and Japanese situations is that these countries, the two chief enemies of the United States in the last great war, are actively rearming not only by the consent but by the urgent request of the Western Allies.

The rearmament of Germany and Japan is especially interesting when it is remembered that they, above all other countries, have a long history of militarism.

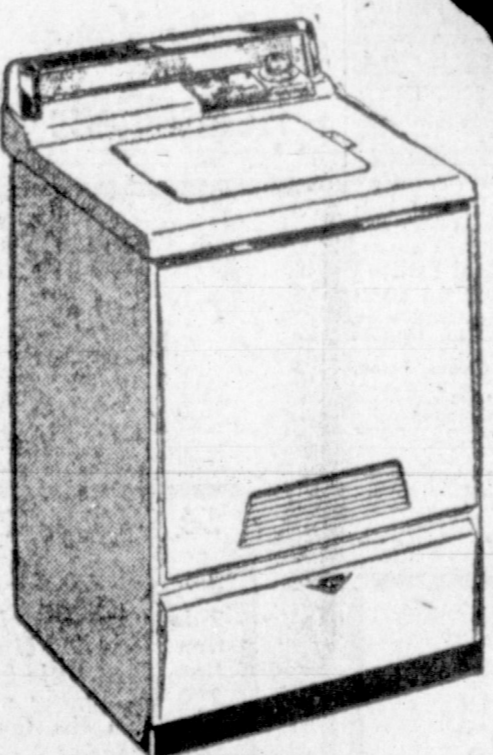


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
