## 6,000 Are Homeless In Floods

DALLAS (UP)—New thunderstorm activity was brewing today for the flood-plagued Dallas-Fort Worth area, where more than 6,000 persons were driven from their homes over the weekend by the rampaging Trinity River and its tributaries.

The river was falling steadily this morning, but even if the fresh rainstorms fail to materialize it will be another 24 to 36 hours before most of the evacuees will be able to get back inside their homes to start cleaning out the slimy mud left by the flood.

Thunderstorm activity, which dumped as much as five inches of rain in South Central Texas at Elgin near Austin Sunday, pushed northward into West Texas today and forecasters said the flood spawning rains would move eastward into the hard-hit Dallas-Fort Worth area tonight and Tuesday.

Flash flooding from up to 3.5 inches of rain hit the Sonora area on the Edwards Plateau 68 miles south of San Angelo Sunday night and a few families were evacuated there. Eldorado, a few miles to the north, recorded 1.70 inches in one hour, and a total of three inches.

Meanwhile, all 380 residents of the Oklahoma town of Moffett, just west of Fort Smith, Ark., were evacuated Sunday night as the Arkansas River surged into the town.

Sprawling Lake Texoma, with more than 1,300 miles of shoreline in Texas and Oklahoma, was within one foot of its spillway and water was due to start pouring through the gap this afternoon for the first time in the big lake's history. Flood gates will be kept closed at least another day, however, to prevent downstream flooding on the Red River.

The Trinity, in Dallas, stood at 39.5 feet this morning after a 7 p. m. Sunday crest of 41.7 feet and was still falling. Flood stage is 28 feet. However, water remained six to seven feet deep in some Dallas homes in the third major flood in the past month.

In Fort Worth water reached the eaves of homes in the Richardson Hills area, but it was receding rapidly.

Downpours of up to five inches created new flood threats in south Texas on the Colorado River watershed.

The 75 persons who comprise the community of Nugent in west Texas left their homes when the Clear fork of the Brazos River flowed into the streets. Deputy Sheriff Dave Reed said the water "possibly won't do much damage." It was not in buildings at Nugent.

### Charles Barnes Rites Set Today

Funeral services for Charles Barnes, father of Mrs. Opal Moore of Pampa, were to be held in Gage, Okla., today at 4 p. m.

Mr. Barnes died at 7:15 p. m. Friday in Worley Hospital. He had been here visiting his daughter.

The services were to be held in the First Methodist Church in Gage with the pastor of that church officiating. Burial also was to be in Gage.

# Disarmament Hopes Rise

## Fine Four After Saturday Fight

Four local youths, involved in the Saturday night brawl at Caldwell's Drive In, were fined \$15 each this morning in Corporation Court for their part in the gang-fight, which officers reported involved between 90 and 100 persons.

Gary Green was charged with assault and was fined by the court. He was accused of striking a boy, 15, in the mouth and the resulting injuries requiring five stitches.

Others fined this morning were Harold Malone, on a charge of disturbing the peace; Ronnie Martin and Cecil D. Sanders, on charges of affray.

The officers were unable to learn the reason for the fight but reported that as soon as they broke one fight up another one started.

According to one of the officers at the scene, when the officers asked the mob to disperse, most of them refused and some even tried to charge the officers.

After the four above named youths were taken to the police station, most of the other youths went to the station and hindered the officers by standing in front of the door and in front of the patrol cars.

The crowd was finally dispersed shortly after midnight and the four youths were later released on bond.

## Secret US Proposals Delivered By Stassen

LONDON (UP)—U. S. delegate Harold Stassen delivered secret American disarmament proposals to the Western Allies today before plunging into the most hopeful round of East-West arms cutting talks since World War II.

Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Valerian Zorin, fresh from 10 days of consultations in the Kremlin, had another plan of his own ready for the resuming London-disarmament conference.

Stassen flew here from Washington this morning bringing a blueprint for "small, measured steps" toward the disarmament.

He checked on the outcome of President Eisenhower's disarmament discussion with West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer at Gettysburg Sunday and then conferred with the British, French and Canadian delegates.

Western Huddle  
The Western huddle came just three and one-half hours before the conference resumed. Stassen met British Minister of State Alan Noble, France's Jules Moch and Canadian Ambassador David Johnson at the foreign office.

It became apparent during the morning there would be no sudden, dramatic plunge toward agreement. Stassen said on arriving the American proposals "will unfold in the succeeding days of the negotiations."

Zorin's intended strategy remained unknown. He had seen no one and said nothing since arriving from Moscow Saturday night.

Moscow dispatches reported cautious optimism in the Kremlin despite statements in the official Communist newspaper Pravda that U. S. Adm. Arthur Radford was a "sinister force" who tried to blacken the outlook by voicing distrust in any Soviet negotiations.

Making Progress  
Stassen told reporters today "we are making progress, but no one should imagine it is an easy thing to conclude an agreement."

He shied away from using the word "optimistic."

## Probations, Fine For Two Youths

One youth was fined \$50 plus costs and placed on 90 days probation in Justice of the Peace Court this morning and another was given an indefinite probation and released in the custody of his parents, with both cases arising out of drunkenness.

The boys, both fourteen, were arrested by officers of the State Highway Patrol as they were driving on the 800 Block of W. Foster at approximately 11:05 p. m. Saturday.

The driver of the car was tried this morning in Justice of the Peace Court by J. W. Graham on a charge of driving while intoxicated, and the second boy, who was a passenger in the car was tried by County Judge Bruce Parker this morning on a charge of drunkenness.

Parker said that he had tried to find out where the boys had purchased the liquor, but was told that "a drunk" had given it to them.

Both boys were released in the custody of their parents, and the driver of the car had his license suspended for a period of six months.

## Poppy Sale Nets Total of \$502.85

A total of \$502.85 was collected by the American Legion Auxiliary in the poppy sale conducted in the downtown business district of Pampa Saturday, Mrs. Libby Shotwell, poppy chairman reported.

Mrs. J. M. Foster, chairman of the Auxiliary, thanked all the workers this morning for their part in the success of the drive. High in her praise was the art class of the Junior High School, which contributed much of their time in making posters which were used to advertise the sale.

Mrs. Foster said that the money will be used for the rehabilitation of veterans and their families throughout the coming year.

## Witnesses Sought In 2nd Worst US Traffic Wreck

BENSON, Ill. (UP)—Authorities today sought witnesses to the second worst traffic wreck in U. S. history which claimed 11 lives and wiped out two families.

Killed in the flaming crash Saturday night were the six-member James Block family of Streator, Ill., and the five-member Dr. George Van Steenberg family of Bloomington. Seven of the victims were children.

State police said the cause of the high speed accident had not yet been determined.

One witness, Mrs. John Wagner, wife of a nearby farm owner, said the Block car swerved into a culvert then exploded in flames when it hit a tree, wrapping two adults and four children in red hot steel.

The Van Steenberg car ripped into a utility pole and was demolished.

Mrs. Wagner said she saw the crash as she turned into the farm drive, but was too far away to see what caused it.

Dead were James Block, 28; his wife, Verma Mae, 24; their children, Peggy, 4; Gloria, 3; Debra, 2; and James Jr., 3 months; Dr. George Van Steenberg, 37, a dentist; his wife, Helen Nancy, 33; and their children, George Dennis, 11; Janice, 4, and Julia, 3.

The National Safety Council said its records indicated the accident was the second worst in the nation in the number of victims in a two-car crash. The council said the worst such collision was one at Slayton, Minn., in 1940 in which 13 persons were killed.

State patrolman Francis Garrett, investigating the accident, said both cars apparently were going in the same direction at high speed. He said it was possible a third car might have been involved which forced the wrecked autos into each other.

## Stiff New Legislation On Using Union Funds Asked

WASHINGTON (UP)—Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell called today for stiff new legislation to curb mishandling of labor welfare and pension funds including criminal prosecution for embezzlement or misappropriation of fund monies.

Mitchell also urged Congress to grant the Labor Department sweeping powers to investigate fund records and to ask criminal prosecutions for their falsification or destruction.

Under his proposals fund managers would be required to register their funds with the Labor Department and to file annual financial reports. The department then would make the information public as well as report to Congress on any recommendations.

Mitchell laid his proposals before the special Senate subcommittee on welfare and pension fund legislation. He recommended 10 amendments to a bill introduced last year by Sens. Irving M. Ives (R-N. Y.) and Gordon Allott (R-Colo.) and H. Alexander Smith (R-N. J.).

The secretary said developments brought out at hearings of the Senate Rackets Committee "have reinforced our earlier conclusion" that such legislation is needed.

He said almost 7 billion dollars annually goes into the funds, and estimates indicate that about 29 million employees are covered by life insurance plans and 13 million by retirement funds.

"These plans in their totality have such importance for the security of the American people," he said, "that the public interest justifies at this time registration and annual reporting of all of the unions."

The Senate Rackets Committee has accused Teamsters President Dave Beck of stealing funds from his union to enrich himself and his family. Testimony at the hearings also showed that a number of records were "lost" or destroyed.

## Man Is Held After Attack On Officer

Lovie Carter Jr., 547 Oklahoma, was being held in the county jail today following his plea of not guilty in County Court this morning to a charge of aggravated assault.

He was being held in lieu of a \$1,000 bond set by the court following the entering of his plea.

Carter was charged with drawing a knife on Dan Lewis, city patrolman, at 12:35 a. m. Sunday in the 800 block of Octavious. The incident occurred as the officer was attempting to move a crowd so that a utility truck could approach to cut a set of wires leading to the burning house.

According to another officer, with Lewis at the time, Carter pulled the knife after Lewis had made him move for the truck. The officer reported that when Lewis turned his back to check on other persons in the crowd, the knife appeared and that he warned Lewis.

The two officers, aided by a deputy from the Liquor Control Board, took the knife from Carter and he was taken to the police station.

## Chinese Foreign Minister Denies Riot Responsibility

TAIPEI, Formosa (UP)—Foreign Minister George Yeh denied today that any "government agency or political organization" had directed or instigated the anti-American riots which swept Taipei last week.

He told a news conference the riots were "not an expression of general anti-American feeling" and said the government was not considering withdrawal of the diplomatic immunity now granted U. S. military personnel here.

BULLETIN  
TAIPEI, Formosa (UP)—U. S. officials said today the anti-American riots in Taipei were "definitely organized," possibly by political forces anxious to make a deal with the Chinese Communists.

Yeh also denied any "intentional delay" in sending policemen to protect the U. S. embassy which was wrecked by rioters and said the police force in Taipei was small and that all reserves were dispatched to the scene as quickly as possible. News dispatches at the time said police took no action when the rioters were destroying the American property.

City Under Curfew  
U. S. military activities were returning to normal, and Americans circulated through the streets without incident. The city was still under a strict curfew and the Chinese army posted armored halftracks at strategic places in the city.

There were no further signs of anti-American feeling after President Chiang Kai-shek expressed "profound regret" to Ambassador Karl Rankin for the riots last week which wrecked the embassy and other buildings.

## Commission To Open Paving Program Bids

Bids on the 1957 paving program of the city of Pampa will be opened at 10 a. m. tomorrow by the City Commission.

The specifications on the paving call for the placing of curbs, gutters, sub-base and paving on 29 1/2 blocks of unpaved streets within the city limits.

This is the second year that the city has let contractors pave the streets. The cost is shared by the property owners and the city with the property owners paying their share directly to the contractor.

Other action scheduled for action by the commission tomorrow includes the first reading of an ordinance closing an alley running through the property of the new junior high school and a report by the insurance committee on new insurance policies on city owned buildings and motor vehicles.

The alley to be closed was provided for in the plans for the area of town in which the new junior high school is located. House calls were to be placed on the east side of the alley, but the school system purchased the half-block to add to the school property, thus causing the need to close the alley.

## Demonstration Is Being Held Here

Pampa was the scene today of a sanitary land fill demonstration sponsored by the State Health Department.

The meeting was attended by health department, sanitation and other city employees from cities throughout the Panhandle.

The morning was devoted to a series of lectures on the method of disposing of trash and refuse by the land fill method. In this method the trash and other material is baled and buried.

A luncheon for those attending the meeting was held in Central Park and the afternoon session was devoted to a demonstration of the proper methods of land filling for the disposal of trash.

## Citizenship Class Holds Meet Here

Nine of the ten members of the Citizenship Class were present at the regular session held in the office of John Evans, principal of Baker School, Sunday at 2 p. m. The topic for study, "Putting the New Government to Work," was presented by L. C. Davis, teacher at Cabot School.

After a discussion period, two of the members, Mrs. Aileen Boyd and Mrs. Centa Boyd, were presented gifts for their new babies, born since the class was organized.

Refreshments of cookies, coffee and an imported dish from China Town in San Francisco were served by Mrs. Hom and Mrs. Brewer.

The class voted to hold only three class periods during the summer months with the first session to be June 23. Time for the other two meetings will be announced at that time.

The Citizenship Class is being sponsored by the Pampa Lions Club for the purpose of helping naturalize those aliens who wish to become citizens. John Evans is the citizenship chairman who is directing the class. Any person who is not a citizen but has a fair speaking and writing knowledge of the English language is eligible to join the class at any time.

## Anti-American Rioting Is Reported Due In Philippines

MANILA (UP)—The U. S. Embassy today took precautions against mob violence when it received reports that Manila's big Chinese population planned to stage anti-American demonstrations against the embassy.

Several Americans were injured in the demonstration which the Chinese Communists and Soviet Russia promptly seized upon for propaganda material in Southeast Asia.

Routine Precautions  
Smith told the United Press of the precautions after learning of plans for Chinese demonstrations against the embassy and other American buildings. He described the precautions as "routine."

The Chinese Embassy said demonstrations had been urged by some sectors of the local Chinese community but said Ambassador Chen Chi-Mai had urged them to call them off. The demonstrations were first planned on Saturday.

## Package Designers Must Become 'Kitchen-Practical'

NEW YORK (UP)—One industrial designer has decided we women open packages the way we want—no matter what the directions on the box, can, jar or plastic container say.

As a result, said Saul Nesbitt, of Nesbitt Associates, it is time manufacturers and package designers became a little more kitchen-practical.

"Women just don't follow directions," said Nesbitt. "They open a package their own way... seems to me it's time we experts realized this and developed ideas along that line."

**Gripe Study**

Nesbitt made a "gripe" study of 306 young and middle-aged home-makers in three suburban New York communities. He found most of them ignore the "press here" or "cut along dotted line" instructions. They chop into package with knife, scissors, teeth or what have you.

He also found the greatest complaint is against the pry-up lid on glass jars, because they're hard to remove. Once off, they're hard to replace snugly.

Nesbitt's study started me thinking of my complaints and those I have heard from other women.

We non-mechanical females are thrown for a loss with those sardine, anchovy and pate tins in which the key always seems to be too short, and the shape of the container difficult to follow in cutting. Or, how about those circular oatmeal boxes, too large for convenient pouring, too small for easy dipping.

**Burned Fingers**

And think of the fingers we've burned following instructions on screw-type glass jar tops. Just "hold under the hot water faucet to loosen..."

Or, how about frozen orange juice cans too small for the wall can opener, and space consuming

## Differences Important

The ability to discriminate is one of the more important attributes of the human mind. With the present promotional programs extant, aimed at bringing about uniformity, brotherly love, one world government and a general universality in everything from religion to the food we eat, it appears important that we consider this matter of discrimination on a priority basis.

In order to understand where we are, who we are, what we are and where we are going, it is important for us to be able to discern opposites, differences, similarities and identicals. And as we study the matter it becomes clearly apparent that in this world, identicals from an absolute sense are impossible; that true similarities are rare, that differences abound and that there are plenty of opposites. In other words, the more discerning we become, the more we become aware of differences and the less we are impressed with similarities.

Uniformity, one of the stylized ideals of today's mad world, is a shoddy pretense so far as people are concerned. Our progress and our continued ability to learn is related more to the differences we can note than they are to any fancied oneness.

Brotherhood is not some misty ideal to be achieved, it is a brutal fact more observable in the differences among the brothers than in any consistent identity.

If all peoples are to be placed under precisely the same kind and shape of government, presumably under one big government, then the plight of all peoples will have brought a general eclipse to freedom.

And as far as universality in anything is concerned, it is more to be avoided than courted. What is desperately needed in this world is individuality and the ability to tell when people and things are not the same.

Those among us noted for their genius and ability are inevitably people who have learned how to note differences down to a fine point. They are never satisfied with something that is "just as good," the reason being that in fact there is no prior evidence that a substitute is ever as good as an original. And if it becomes "as good" as an original it is because it differs from the original in such important ways that it becomes in itself an original in its own right.

Today, one of our most important challenges is related to the subject of freedom itself. And we hold that one of the reasons why freedom is often eroded away is because so many persons have failed to detect a difference between total freedom and partial slavery. There are many who seem to feel that a little freedom should be lost willingly if only some immediate financial gain is forthcoming. These persons seem to believe that the predation manifested by taxation is not really harmful, since a small part of the taxes are spent for items which they themselves might wish to purchase. They fail to glimpse the underlying wrong which occurs in the abrogation of their right to do as they please with what they themselves earn in toto. Rather, they seem to feel that since they themselves, as individuals, could not afford to purchase the grand schemes and accoutrements envisioned for them by their government, that it is entirely proper to rob everyone of a small portion so that these schemes will flourish and these accoutrements be purchased. They confuse ends with means and adopt the most scurvy of methods to attain what they imagine will be a desirable end.

Security is not "just as good" as freedom. A person who by the force and violence of government, has all his wants provided, may think that in a sense he has gained a new freedom. He should be able to discover by the application of his own senses and the development of his own logic that a lack of responsibility concerning his own wherewithal is not the same as freedom. It is not the appearance of similarity to freedom that matters. Rather it is this appearance of similarity which traps the unwary and the non-discriminating. The man who truly knows the nature of freedom will not be gulled into accepting false substitutes which in fact have no relation to freedom.

While we may find a sort of mob comfort in knowing that others suffer from the same maladies that beset us, there is more to be gained in discovering in what way we do not have to suffer from mob action, than to find ways and means of compelling ourselves to emulate the many.

Our hope of a better world is harnessed to our ability to locate differences and to act upon those differences. Only thus can individuality and truth be discovered and nurtured.

Mr. Miller is the only board member I have ever found who is willing to think out loud and answer questions about what he is trying to do for education. I think he has performed a public service by so doing.

I cannot, as Mr. Miller says, see why any man should refuse to talk about such an important thing as the education of our children. I presume most of them refuse to talk because they do not want to admit that government schools violate the Golden Rule and the Coveting Commandment, because if they do, admitted, they would be in an embarrassing position in attempting to manage something that was so wicked and harmful as any act that violates these moral laws.

In the interview Mr. Miller repeatedly asked: "What are you going to do? Are you going to let the collectivists take over our schools?" He implies that they have not already taken over tax-supported schools. He seems to think they can be managed on a non-collectivist basis by people who believe in Americanism. But public schools, as Mr. Miller admits, are not based on the principles of the Golden Rule and the Coveting Commandment.

### My Answer

I think the best way to handle anything that is wicked is to attempt to do what Jesus advocated, Matt. 5:5 - "first cast out the beam out of thine own eye; and then shalt thou see clearly to cast out the mote out of thy brother's eye." And pulling the beam out of one's own eye is a full-time job for anyone. Then to the degree he is successful he can have an influence that will promote belief in the Golden Rule and the Coveting Commandment.

Along the same line, I want to follow the advice of Ezekiel, member, Ezekiel advises that if you see a wicked man doing things that will destroy him and others and if you do not warn him and he destroys himself and others, that he will hold the person responsible for his death who did not warn the individual of his wickedness; that if you do warn the wicked and if he will not give up his wickedness and wicked course, he shall die for his iniquity. You can then have a clear conscience and your own self-respect.

Everyone who has read my column knows I cannot be accused of not warning of the wickedness of parents shirking their responsibility of selecting the books, the teachers and the associates their children are to have in getting their education and turning this sacred responsibility over to a group of collectivist politicians. It is hard to conceive of anything more wicked than people sinfully consenting to the agents of the majority taking from the parents their responsibility in educating their children.

And these state-centralized bureaucrats who have grabbed control of "educating" the youth of the land have succeeded in fooling the parents into believing that their local board of education is responsible for the education their children are receiving. They are clever enough always to try to get men as local board members who stand well in the community. Usually these men are busy men and have not had time to realize how helpless they are in the position of members of the board of education. They can only select books that the state intelligentsia bureaucrats authorize, only teachers that they okay and only associates that the state bureaucrats okay. As one student of education remarked: "About all the local board of education can do is to buy the tires."

The high-pressure teachers' lobby has been successful in largely establishing tenure so the board cannot even discharge a teacher with tenure unless they can almost get him in jail. Their wages are largely set by law and everything done by the state planners of "education" to keep the parents from having the right to direct the most sacred thing in their lives - the education of their children.

And all this is done by the use of aggressive force rather than by love. And any act that is based on aggressive force violates all moral law. Thus, it is a bad example for any person to attempt to make just and right and ethical and moral an act that violates the Golden Rule and the Coveting Commandment. It simply cannot be done. Jesus recognized this when he remarked that you cannot pick figs from thistles nor grapes from thorns. And St. Paul emphasized this when he said: "Be not deceived; God is not mocked; whatsoever a man sows, that he shall also reap." And when board members are sowing and letting the wicked propagandists, calling themselves educators, use their good names to help fool the public, they are not influencing or teaching the youth of the land by example to live in harmony with the great moral laws of the Golden Rule and the Decalogue.

I do not believe Jesus or Socrates or Confucius or any great moral leader ever attempted to correct a wicked act by being a

party to it, as are members of boards of education. I am still trying to pull the beam out of my eye. All the help I can get I'll appreciate.

### Why Shouldn't British Worry About Popularity With Us?

**LONDON** — One of these mornings, when my best suit is freshly pressed and I've just had a haircut, I am going to catch a bus and ride around to No. 10 Downing Street.

There, if they'll let me in, I'll try to see Prime Minister Harold Macmillan. After being in Europe going on a year, I have quite a few questions I'd like to ask the heads of State in this section of the world.

Almost any head of state over here would do, but I have chosen Mr. Macmillan because he speaks English, and at the moment that is my only tongue.

The first question I'd pop to Britain's chief would be something like this:

Why does your country, and almost all of the other countries of the Free World, keep such close tabs on how popular and unpopular the United States is with you at the moment, without apparently paying too much attention to how popular you are with the United States?

That being a long question, and probably not too well put, I'd break it down a bit.

Isn't it just as important — or more so, the way the world stands today — for England, France, Germany, and the rest to be as popular with Americans as it is for Americans to be popular with them?

One wouldn't think so, I would tell Mr. Macmillan (if he were still there) read the newspapers, listen to the commentators on the air, and interpret the speeches of statesmen.

"America's Popularity Never At Such A Low Ebb," one reads, or, "America Losing Favor In Our Eyes."

That's to be regretted, to be sure, but with so many countries of the world dependent, let us say, on America, for such vital necessities as money and protection, wouldn't it make sense for these countries to work a little at ingratiating themselves with Uncle Sam?

America never will say it, but suppose she did say, "Okay, fellows. I am in such a disfavor in your eyes, and you think our policies are leading you to ruin, so maybe we'd better just quit seeing one another."

Certainly this eternal harping on how Americans are disliked isn't doing much for Free World accord. Speaking as only one American I know that I get weary, not to mention fed up, with reading and hearing on all sides that my country is dead wrong ninety per cent of the time.

It's surprising how many American foreign correspondents write along these lines, too.

"Is France Our Friend?" they write. "How Do We Stand With Greece?"

The tenor of these articles is that America had better improve its ways, else those who rely on us are going to cut us dead.

paign against malaria — carrying mosquitoes has been pressed, the frequency of the disease has been lessened and the death toll reduced.

**FOR EXAMPLE**, in 1946 malaria ravaged 125 million people in North and South America. Today, 105 million of these are protected by the virtual elimination of the Anopheles mosquito, so that the disease is now confined to areas in Central and South America inhabited by 35 million persons.

But there is no real safety today. The special newsletter pointed out that the woodlands of England and other malaria-free countries, including our own, also have mosquitoes and surely some Anopheles among them. Consequently, if any considerable number of people return to these areas from abroad infected with malaria, and are bitten by Anopheles mosquitoes, the risk of acquiring the disease by others will be greatly increased.

Indeed, in France during World War II a small epidemic of malaria was observed at the very gates of Paris itself.

**IT IS OBVIOUS** that the attack against malaria should be aimed at the malaria-carrying mosquito. It is not enough to treat the disease after one has acquired it, though treatment with quinine, salubrine and other preparations is useful and often life saving.

Nevertheless, malaria at best is not a disease which anyone wishes to acquire and at worst it may cause death.

One does not need to be an alarmist to consider malaria with the utmost seriousness. The efforts of human beings to conquer this age-old disease are bearing fruit. It is true, but we cannot afford to relax.

It has been responsible for the decline of empires and the fall of tyrants. To date vast schemes of malaria control have protected 230 million of the world's population, but there are still 370 million who remain unprotected.

**SPEEDUP OF THE** campaigns against malaria is highly important. The disease is transmitted by a particular variety of mosquito known as Anopheles. These insects are already beginning to develop resistance against the new insecticides, such as DDT. Therefore, the mosquitoes must be hit a massive blow before too many of them become impervious to this chemical attack.

### General Douglas MacArthur Was Ablest General Of WW2

**WASHINGTON** — General Douglas MacArthur was "the ablest general of the last war." The head of Britain's military effort once wished that the man ousted by Truman had been chosen as our top commander instead of General George C. Marshall or Dwight D. Eisenhower.

The frank estimate of America's fighters appears in a book entitled "The Turn of the Tide," published May 30, by Doubleday, and described by high officials here as "the finest, first-hand account of World War II" they have read. It consists of wartime letters written nightly to his wife by Field Marshal Lord Alanbrooke, who was Chief of the Imperial General Staff and Churchill's personal military adviser. They are not after-the-event memoirs.

Alanbrooke has been characterized by Marshall Montgomery, who would have "sacked" General Lee and Meade after Gettysburg, as "the greatest soldier — soldier, sailor, airman — produced by any country taking part in the last war." He has been decorated with more honors than any British military figure except Marlborough, Wellington and Roberts.

He masterminded the retreat which led to the successful evacuation of such a large Allied force at Dunkirk. He was to have commanded the 1944 invasion of France, but he stepped aside in favor of Ike.

Alanbrooke had great admiration for F.D.R.'s courage and vision. He found Eisenhower long on "selflessness," "charm" and "diplomacy," but short on military strategy and experience. He says that Churchill was an "exceedingly difficult person" because of his impetuosity and his too vivid imagination, but he "thanked God for the chance to work with such a genius."

He considered the late Admiral Ernest King to be the ablest member of the American Chiefs of Staff at Washington. But Marshall and King, he adds, were too insistent on concentrating against the Japanese instead of the Germans, whom Roosevelt and Churchill had selected as the primary objectives of defeat.

The author regarded Stalin as a tough but boorish "realist," constantly demanding a second European front and even taunting the embattled British as "cowards" on one occasion. The Russians never co-operated, never gave information on their strategy or tactics, and behaved as if the war were not an Allied affair, he says.

Alanbrooke's comparison of Marshall and MacArthur (and note) reads as follows: "Ed never got him to appreciate the very close connection that existed between the various German fronts. For him they might have been separate wars, a Russian war on one side, a Mediterranean war

on another, and a cross-Channel one to be started as soon as possible.

"I have often wondered since the war how different matters might have been, if I had had MacArthur to deal with. From everything I saw of him, I put him down as the ablest general of the last war.

"He certainly showed a far greater strategic grasp than Marshall. I must confess, however, that Winston was no great help in handling Marshall — in fact, the reverse. Marshall had a holy fear of Winston's Balkan and Dardanelles adventures (Churchill's alternative invasion routes — Ed. note), and was always guarding against these dangers, even when they did not exist."

Alanbrooke, in praising Admiral King, said that he did not possess "the statesmanship and grandeur of character of the great Virginian." He also testifies to Marshall's magnificent work as organizer of the American Army in such a short time. It may surprise military men to learn that Marshall advocated an invasion of France as early as September, 1942.

According to Alanbrooke, Marshall did not appreciate the difficulties of landing on the enemy's fortified shores, or the preliminary buildup that was necessary. The attacks on North Africa, Sicily and Italy, the British insisted, were essential in order to force Hitler to divert troops, planes and tanks from France to those further distant fronts.

Secretary Stimson agreed with Marshall. He never approved the Mediterranean strategy, regarding it as wasteful "diversion" where, as Churchill and Alanbrooke maintained, the proper strategy was to strike first at this "soft under belly of Europe."

Alanbrooke says that he felt "uneasy" about Ike's operations in North Africa because of his apparent lack of aggressiveness. He adds:

"It must be remembered that Eisenhower had never even commanded a battalion in action when he found himself commanding a group of Armies in North Africa. No wonder he was at a loss as to what to do and allowed himself to be absorbed in the political situation at the expense of the tactical. "I had little confidence in his having the ability to handle the military situation confronting him, and he caused me great anxiety. He learnt a lot during the war, but tactics, strategy and command were never his strong points.

## Finance Groups Probe Two Haystacks For Same Needle

**WASHINGTON Correspondent** (NEA) — President Eisenhower's State of the Union message asked Congress for a 10-man commission to make a two-year study of the U.S. financial system.

What he is getting instead is a critical, double-barreled congressional investigation of his own administration's tight-money and budget policies.

On the one hand, the Senate Finance Committee under Sen. Harry F. Byrd (D-Va.) will probe monetary policy. It will have a look at government revenues, management of the national debt, interest rates and their effect on private business credit.

The Byrd Committee hasn't even named its chief counsel as yet. Hearing dates won't be set until after a staff has been assembled and a program laid out. But the committee hopes to report on the one-shot investigation in January.

On the other hand, a joint Senate-House economic subcommittee under Rep. Wilbur D. Mills (D-Ark.) will make a study of government fiscal policies as they relate to U.S. budget developments and the general economic outlook.

It has scheduled five days of expert testimony in panel hearings June 3-7. There will be two days for Budget Director Percival F. Brundage. Treasury Secretary George M. Humphrey and Federal Reserve Board Chairman William McCh. Martin, June 13-14.

Banking and Currency. This group handles credit and interest rate matters.

Most of the testimony before the Byrd and Mills committees will be over the heads of people to whom high finance is Greek. Economic, monetary and fiscal experts have always differed on what policies to follow. There are no sure answers.

The results affect the pocketbooks of all who pay taxes, borrow money or crab about the government. Nobody is without interest in the subject.

The Mills Committee probe will be the latest chapter in a study of monetary, credit and fiscal policies that has been going on for 10 years.

In 1946, the so-called Full Employment Act gave the Joint Congressional Economic Committee a continuing responsibility to advise on policies to promote steady economic growth and in 1949 a joint subcommittee under Sen. Paul H. Douglas (D-Ill.) made an exhaustive study of "Monetary, Credit and Fiscal Policies."

In 1952 another Joint Economic subcommittee under Rep. Wright Patman (D-Tex.) made a study of "Monetary Policy and the Management of the Public Debt."

In 1955, still another Joint Economic subcommittee under Representative Mills made two studies of government tax policies. At the end of 1955 and in early 1956 a Joint Economic subcommittee under Patman took a look at differences between Secretary Humphrey and Chairman Martin over the Federal Reserve Board's increase of discount rates charged to its member banks.

In a sense, the Byrd and Mills investigations will be going over the same old ground. But economists point out that business conditions are constantly changing and that they require continuous study.

## Will Harridge, A. L. Prexy, Will Retire

NEW YORK (UP) - American League President Will Harridge will retire when his contract expires in December, informed sources disclosed today, and will be succeeded by General Manager Joe Cronin of the Boston Red Sox.

A quorum of American League owners already has decided on the affable Cronin, it was said, and his post will be taken over by Asst. General Manager Stanley (Bucky) Harris.

"This will be denied all over the place but wait until December and see what happens," the spokesman asserted.

Supporting the revelation is the fact that the 72-year-old Harridge, president of the league for 26 years, has not been robust and previously has contemplated retirement. Cronin, elected to baseball's Hall of Fame in January, 1956, is 50.

## Bethea, Andrews In TV Fight

NEW YORK (UP) - Heavyweight Wayne Bethea, a rugged but light hitting mauler, meets fragile but explosive Paul Andrews tonight in a 10-rounder at St. Nicholas Arena.

E. S. Barnard succeeded Johnson and, on his death in 1931, Harridge was elected to the presidency, which he has held without interruption.

For Cronin and Harris it will be a case of turn about being long-delayed fair play.

Cronin had been up twice with Pittsburgh but it was Harris who made a regular out of Cronin at Washington in 1932. When Harris stepped down, the 28-year-old Cronin was named to succeed him at the Senator helm - and the freshman pilot won the American League pennant.

Medical Lowdown on the Upsweep

Certain forms of falling hair can be caused by improper diet (malnutrition) and anyone losing their hair should see a good diet doctor and find this out. "As for you," he snapped, "you've enough minerals and vitamins cached away in that pot belly to nourish six men." I told him o.k. — no need for more sarcasm. That since I was not losing my hair from lack of minerals and vitamins, then what was the next step to take? Was it heredity? And how come a guy just entering college often loses his hair before he makes the football team? How come? Inheritance? He then told me people have no control over their heredity. "You can't pick out your parents," he said. He told me that if pa and grandpa had no hair, that the chances of you having none are good, although no positive guarantee could be given. He told me that this didn't always work out, but research indicated it might. I told him my grandpa had a real Daniel Boone head of hair at his death, that my pa also had lots at 72. "Then you aren't inheriting it," he said, "unless back farther in

your life there was a string of bald boys and the strain is catching up to you." "Then mine may be due to some neglect, need, or ailment?" I asked. "That was some hope." "Quit diagnosing yourself," he suggested. "Remember a guy who diagnoses his own ailment has a fool for a doctor." He went on. He told me many interesting things, such as: the scalps of red-heads had about 90,000 hairs, brunettes about 100,000 and blondes 140,000. That hair grows about half an inch a month and is only alive a short distance beyond the bulb or papilla where it starts from. That contrary to popular belief, the cutting of the hair does not have any effect on its rapid growth, such as when you cut the lawn. He told me that deep in the scalp is a bulb like a tiny growth called the papilla. Surrounding the upper part of this bulb or papilla are cells which multiply and form hair. Blood and oxygen carried by blood vessels in the papilla feed these cells from which hair forms. As the cells continue to multiply and hair grows, it literally pushes itself out of the skin through a

shaft or tunnel in the skin called the follicle. On the way up the hair passes a lubricating sac known as the sebaceous gland and comes bursting out into the world with a natural sheen. That is, he advised me, if there are no disorders of the sebaceous gland. "And thus we come to something that may stop your hair from falling." I tried to pin him down but he stood up and said my five bucks was up for the day, and to come back later on. That I had enough information for the time being. If I'd come back again he'd go into such curable causes of falling hair as a disturbed sebaceous gland, emotions, disorders of the system and just plain "worry." I left.
