## Search Resumes For Pair Lost At Sea

TV Executive, His Pregnant Wife

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (UP)—The Coast Guard was to resume the search at dawn today for a Tampa television executive and his pregnant wife, last seen bobbing in life jackets in the choppy waters of the Gulf Wednesday. Officials held little hope that Ronald C. Stimpson, 29, and his young wife could survive the ordeal that claimed the life of a companion and nearly took the life of another. Stimpson is program director for television station WTVT. The Stimpsons and Dr. and Mrs. Hugh G. Steele, also of Tampa, jumped into the Gulf six miles from shore at noon Wednesday when their 26-foot cabin cruiser rammed a submerged object and quickly sank. First news of the tragedy came Thursday when a pilot boat captain sighted Steele clinging to a barnacle-crusted buoy near the main ship channel into Tampa Bay.

# Saud Seeks Western Ties

## Saudi Arabia 'Fed Up' With Egyptian Pact

Change In Arabia Politics Foreseen

King Saud of Saudi Arabia is "fed up" with his alliance with Egypt and anxious to forge closer ties with pro-Western Iraq and Jordan, Baghdad dispatches reported today. Saud arrives in Baghdad Saturday for a state visit with King Feisal. Persistent reports said they would be joined next week by Feisal's cousin, King Hussein of Jordan.

## Congressional Economy Axe For Farm Program

WASHINGTON (UP)—The House Appropriations Committee sank its economy ax into the usually immune farm program today, chopping \$272,556,860 from President Eisenhower's money requests. Most of the saving was achieved by reducing soil bank funds which farmers receive for cutting back plantings. The committee said city folks consider the program a scheme for "giving farmers something for nothing" and recommended that the soil bank fund be cut back further next year.

The action came as the economy drive already was rolling along so furiously as to raise considerable doubt whether Eisenhower's personal intervention would be enough to stop it. But Eisenhower was set to try. The White House was busy arranging for two nationwide TV radio speeches within the next two weeks for the President to defend his record peacetime spending budget in general and his foreign aid program in particular. Debate next week. The House committee voted to send to the floor for debate next week a \$3,692,889,787 money bill to operate the Agriculture Department and some of its programs in the 12 months starting July 1. Included was \$2,088,000,000 to pick up the tab for price support and other losses during the past year. The cut of more than 272 million in administration requests was in addition to a 254-million soil bank reduction the administration already had made. If the reductions win house and senate approval, it would be the first time since Eisenhower took office that his farm budget was cut. In the past four years, Congress has voted more farm funds than the administration requested. The formal committee report, drafted by a subcommittee headed by Rep. Jamie L. Whitten (D-Miss.), complained that department policymakers "have mounted a horse and are attempting to ride out in all directions at once."

The committee members, all local merchants, felt the observance was such a success they voted to stage another observance this fall. No date has been set for the event this fall, however. Plans indicate that the date will be set in the near future. The meeting of the committee was held this morning in the conference room of the chamber.

## Threat of Communism

MIAMI (UP)—A plot to assassinate a prominent Washington, D.C. attorney backfired here early today when the "hired gunman" helped police trap the schemers. State Atty. Richard Gerstein said detectives had the intended victim fake a near-fatal beating and then police arranged a pay-off meeting between the "killer" and the middleman. Target of the plot, Gerstein said, was attorney Raymond Dickey, who even went to the hospital as the "dying" victim of a beating.

## Pinilla Government Falls To Junta

BOGOTA, Colombia (UP)—The government of President Gustavo Rojas Pinilla fell to a military junta today. A broadcast over the official radio at 7 a.m. (6 a.m. est) said the junta is composed of Maj. Gen. Alfredo Duarte Blum, commander of the army; Brig. Gen. Deogracias Fonseca, director of the national police; and Maj. Gen. Gabriel Paris, minister of war. (Authoritative Colombian circles in New York said Rojas Pinilla and his family fled to Montego Bay, Jamaica, British West Indies. They said the deposed president and his party arrived there at 6 a.m. est aboard a Colombian air force plane.)

He was assisted in the telling of many interesting facts about Lionism in Pampa by presidents and other officers of the club during the 30 years since the club was formed on April 22, 1927.

## Hearing Today In Beating Case

Charges were being filed late this morning against the four Borger youths that were involved in the beating of Bobby Shoopman, local teenager, last week. Shoopman was hospitalized as a result of a beating he received from four Borger youths after he offered them a ride to the city limits on the Borger highway. The four youths reportedly beat Shoopman and took his car. Due to the injuries received by Shoopman he was unable to help the officers in identifying the youths but Sheriff Rufe Jordan and Hutchinson County Sheriff Hugh Anderson were able to locate the four youths last Friday from descriptions of the youths supplied by Shoopman. The four youths were brought to Pampa last Friday but due to Don Cain, county attorney, being out of town the hearing was postponed until today and the boys were released to appear this morning. Judge Bruce Parker reported this morning that the hearings were to begin as soon as the charges were filed. He reported that the youths under 17 would be tried in Juvenile Court and that those over 17 would be tried in County Court. Late this morning the hearing had not started.

The presentation was made to Wedgeworth by Walter Humphreys, editor of the Fort Worth Press, at a dinner attended by approximately 400 persons connected with conservation work. The presentation was made as a result of Wedgeworth being selected as the business or professional man that has done more for soil conservation in Region I, composed of the 51 counties of the Panhandle and North Plains. He was nominated for the honor by the supervisors of the Gray County Soil Conservation District in a statewide contest sponsored by the Fort Worth Press.

## Nationalist Islands Hit By Artillery

TAIPEI, Formosa (UP)—Communist Chinese artillery units today launched one of their heaviest recent attacks on three Nationalist Chinese-held islands in the Formosa Strait. A correspondent of the official Nationalist Chinese Central News Agency reported tonight that Nationalist garrisons on the islands Little Quemoy, Tatung and Ertang were immediately alerted for a possible invasion following the two-hour shelling. Observers here speculated that the bombardment might be an answer to the recent announcement that U.S. guided missile units were being stationed on Formosa. The Defense Department announcement said Chinese Communist guns on the island of Amoy lobbed 600 shells onto the three islands. Most fell on Little Quemoy, just west of the larger island of Quemoy, also held by the Nationalists. No casualties were suffered by the dug-in Nationalist defenders, the announcement said. Nationalist guns on Quemoy returned the fire with heavy barrages, the Defense Department said.

## Two Cases Tried In County Court

Two cases were tried late yesterday in County Court resulting in fines of \$25 each plus costs. Leonard Felt of 801 S. Gray was fined \$25 plus costs after pleading guilty to a charge of aggravated assault on Josephine Powell. Orris L. Wedge of 725 N. Sumner pleaded guilty to a charge of driving while license suspended and was fined \$25 plus costs. He was arrested by city police on May 8.

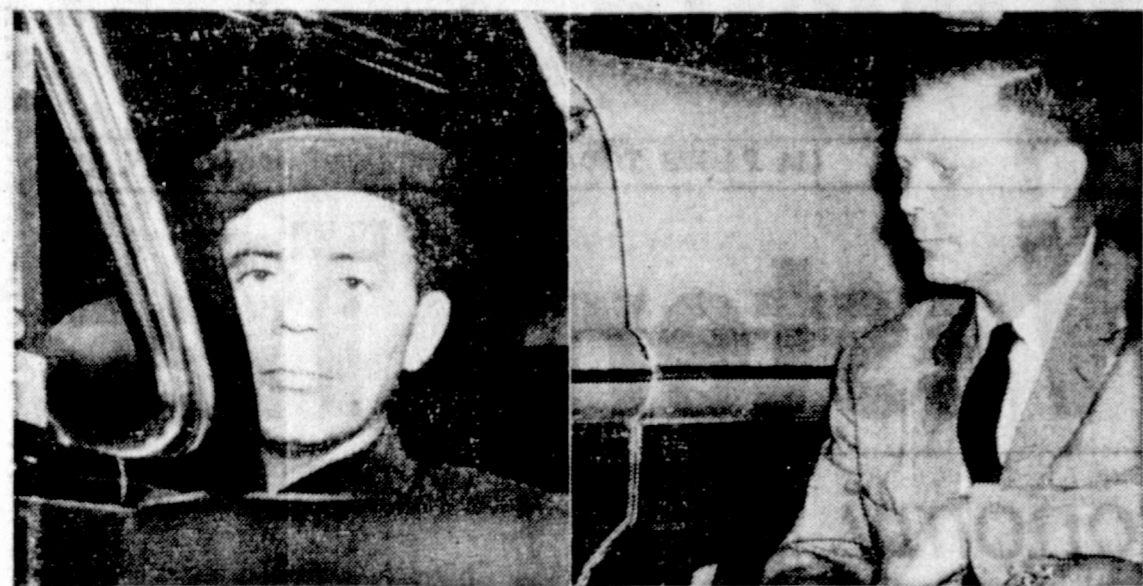

**Probe To Find Out If Mortgage Kickbacks Lined Beck's Pockets**

WASHINGTON (UP)—The Senate Rackets Committee set out today to find if kickbacks from millions of dollars in mortgages bought by the Teamsters Union lined the pockets of President Dave Beck.  
The committee called for testimony from Jesse Linton, a Seattle, Wash., contractor described as having business deals with Beck, his associates and a mortgage firm linked with them.  
The day's main witness was Donal Hedlund, president of National Mortgages, Inc., which handled several million dollars worth of Teamster investments. A witness testified Thursday that one third of the firm is owned by Joseph McEvoy, who bought in with money lent him by his uncle, Dave Beck.  
May Probe Big Loan  
The committee may also explore the Teamsters' \$1,500,000 loan to Fruehauf Trailer Corp. of Detroit.  
Committee counsel Robert F. Kennedy told newsmen the group would try to trace money which Hedlund allegedly received from union mortgage investments including some \$8,000 which he was reported to have received from a \$1,600,000 deal in Detroit.  
"It did not all remain with Mr. Hedlund," Kennedy said.  
Fred P. Loomis of Seattle testified Thursday that for several years he was investment counselor to both Beck and the union but quit in February, 1955, when he became convinced Beck was using his union power to enrich himself and his family.  
Loomis said his "blow-up" with Beck came because he treated the union president "like an ordinary mortal."  
Called "His Majesty"  
"He might have been a big wheel but to me he was just a hub cap," said the small, precise investment counselor. Other documents during the day referred to the portly Teamster boss as "His majesty, the wheel."  
Loomis said he heard Beck was to get a kickback of \$32,500 from a Teamster-financed apartment project in Honolulu. The deal later fell through, he added.

**North Woods Fires Rage Uncontrolled**

BOSTON (UP)—At least five major forest fires continued to rage uncontrolled through Massachusetts today, destroying private property and forcing the evacuation of more than 300 persons.  
Other serious forest and brush fires were reported raging in the dry timberlands of Maine, New Hampshire, Connecticut, and Vermont.  
The worst Massachusetts blaze, near Plymouth, was temporarily contained Thursday night, but sprang up again in a dozen places as fresh morning winds fanned the flames to life. About four homes were reported destroyed.  
Near Montague, to the west, more than 1,000 firefighters including some 200 University of Massachusetts students battled a roaring fire which caused the evacuation of 40 families in the Lake Pleasant area.  
Other fires which were reported still burning but under control were in Manchester, Amesbury, Milton, Dudley, Billerica and Boylston. At one time Thursday 19 major fires were out of control in Massachusetts.  
Gov. Foster Furcolo, on duty 48 straight hours, said Thursday night that the Massachusetts National Guard would be mobilized if the situation became any worse today. Nearly 7,000 firemen and volunteers, wearied by a week of constant battling, had to have some rest, the governor said. Ordering the guard to duty would put an additional 12,000 men at the disposal of civil defense headquarters, supervising the statewide operations.  
Arson has been reported in at least four instances and state police said Thursday night they planned to move in on one suspect.  
A fierce blaze near West Kennebunk, Me., seared some 4,000 acres of woodlands Thursday and forced the closing of the Maine Turnpike for several hours. The flames leveled about a dozen houses and other structures in the area. Another bad fire near Lu-

Neither of the drivers was injured in the accident which resulted when the bus hit the back of the Ford, investigating highway patrolmen reported.  
The driver of the bus was Sam A. Christy of White Deer and the Ford was driven by Glema Faye Hall of Skellytown.

**Ezio Pinza Rites Set**

NEW YORK (UP)—A funeral service will be held here Saturday for Ezio Pinza, operatic and musical comedy star, who died Thursday at the age of 64.  
Canon Edward N. West will officiate at the service at 11 a. m., e. d. t. at the Cathedral of St. John Metropolitan Opera Co. soprano and personal friend of Pinza, will sing "Ave Maria" from Verdi's "Otello," one of the famed basso's favorite selections. The Episcopal cathedral's full choir of 40 boys and 27 men also will participate in the service.  
Burial will be in Putnam Cemetery in Greenwich, Conn.

**Russian Nuclear Weapons Position To Be Reported**

MOSCOW (UP)—Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko and other Soviet leaders responsible for foreign affairs were expected today to report to the Supreme Soviet on Russia's position in regard to nuclear weapons.  
The statement would reply to a question submitted by a group of deputies Thursday asking what progress has been made on worldwide suspension of nuclear tests.  
Gromyko's reply may also touch on other aspects of international relations, particularly disarmament.  
The Supreme Soviet session has been noteworthy so far because of a conspicuous absence of discussions of foreign affairs and the almost total absence of the customary denunciations of capitalism.  
Deputies asking about the suspension of nuclear tests noted the at some Soviet session the last Supreme Soviet session 10 months ago. They said that since then "the attitude of Western powers" had blocked Russian efforts to end the tests.

**Search Continues For Plane Crew**

TOKYO (UP)—Ships and planes kept up their search today for survivors of a U.S. Air Force plane crash off Japan, but hopes dimmed for any of the five crewmen still missing.  
Three crewmen who bailed out of a stricken KB50 aerial tanker Wednesday morning were rescued.

**American Youths Return From Duty With Rebels**

GUANTANAMO NAVAL BASE, Cuba (UP)—Two American youths said today they had no regrets about their 10-week adventure with the rebel forces of Fidel Castro in the rugged Sierra Maestra Mountains.  
Michael Garvey, 15, of Brooklyn, N.Y., and Victor J. Buehler, 17, of Norfolk, Va., said they were glad to be home with their parents but would miss the mountains and their rebel friends.  
They said the third youth who went with them, Charles Ryan, 20, had no intention of returning. Fathers of the three are stationed with the U.S. Navy here.  
Garvey and Buehler apparently will face no official punishment, either from American or Cuban authorities, for their escape. They said they came back because of their ages and wanted to finish school.

**Postal Cuts Virtually Assured**

WASHINGTON (UP)—New cuts in postal service appeared virtually certain today unless Congress restores reductions in the Post Office Department budget.  
Chances of Congress restoring the reduction seemed very slim. The Senate Appropriations Committee late Thursday ignored administration warnings of mail service cutbacks and approved a House cut of \$8 million dollars in the postal budget for fiscal 1958.  
The Senate was expected to approve the committee's action next week.  
The move for a cut possibly great trouble generally for President Eisenhower's record peace-time \$71,800,000,000 budget.  
In the past the Senate traditionally has restored a good part of House cuts in presidential budgets.  
The postal money bill was the first approved by the Senate Appropriations Committee this year giving the committee its first opportunity to show how economy-minded its members are.

**A Cure For Burglary**

SAN PEDRO, Calif. (UP)—A psychiatrist has solved a burglary case by discovering that one of his patients suffered from a guilty conscience, police said today.  
Dr. Kurt Fantl recently told officers that the patient admitted under treatment that he was worried because he had burglarized the home of Harlan Huff last Nov. 30 of 1946.  
The doctor recommended that the worried patient pay back the money and offered to act as intermediary. Fantl sent Huff a cashier's check for the amount and the patient immediately felt "like a million dollars."  
Fantl told police he couldn't disclose the patient's name because of ethical grounds. However, officers consulted Huff and he said he didn't want to prosecute because he got his money back.  
The doctor put his patient's case history in the "cured file" and police termed the burglary solved.

**Tonsillectomy Controversy**

LONDON (UP)—Eight-year-old Prince Charles licked happily at scoops of post-operative ice cream today unaware that having his tonsils and adenoids out may have started a national controversy.  
Thursday's operation confined Prince Charles to bed in Buckingham Palace and put him on an initial diet of ice cream.  
Outside the palace his tonsillectomy had another effect.  
Britain's press immediately raised the question: "Is this operation really necessary?"  
With medical opinion divided on the question, the answer given by Queen Elizabeth II and the Duke of Edinburgh may set the pattern for many more British mothers and fathers. For what the royal family does carries a great deal of weight with the average Briton.

**DA Cracks Down In Edinburg**

EDINBURG, Tex. (UP)—District Attorney Jim Bates is "fed up" with reports of minors gathering in pool halls and beer parlors and intends to crack down. He said Thursday "beer joint" operators are in for close scrutiny. His office has received many reports of school children spending off hours and lunch money in billiard parlors and bars, the official said.  
Twelve pool halls at Edinburg, Parr, Wealaco and Donna were ordered permanently closed after local police and District Attorney's Investigator Dick Bales raided them Wednesday night and found minors in each of them.  
Bates warned that these raids were only a start.  
He said if officers catch those places open again "we're going to confiscate their tables." He added, "That ought to make sure they stay closed."

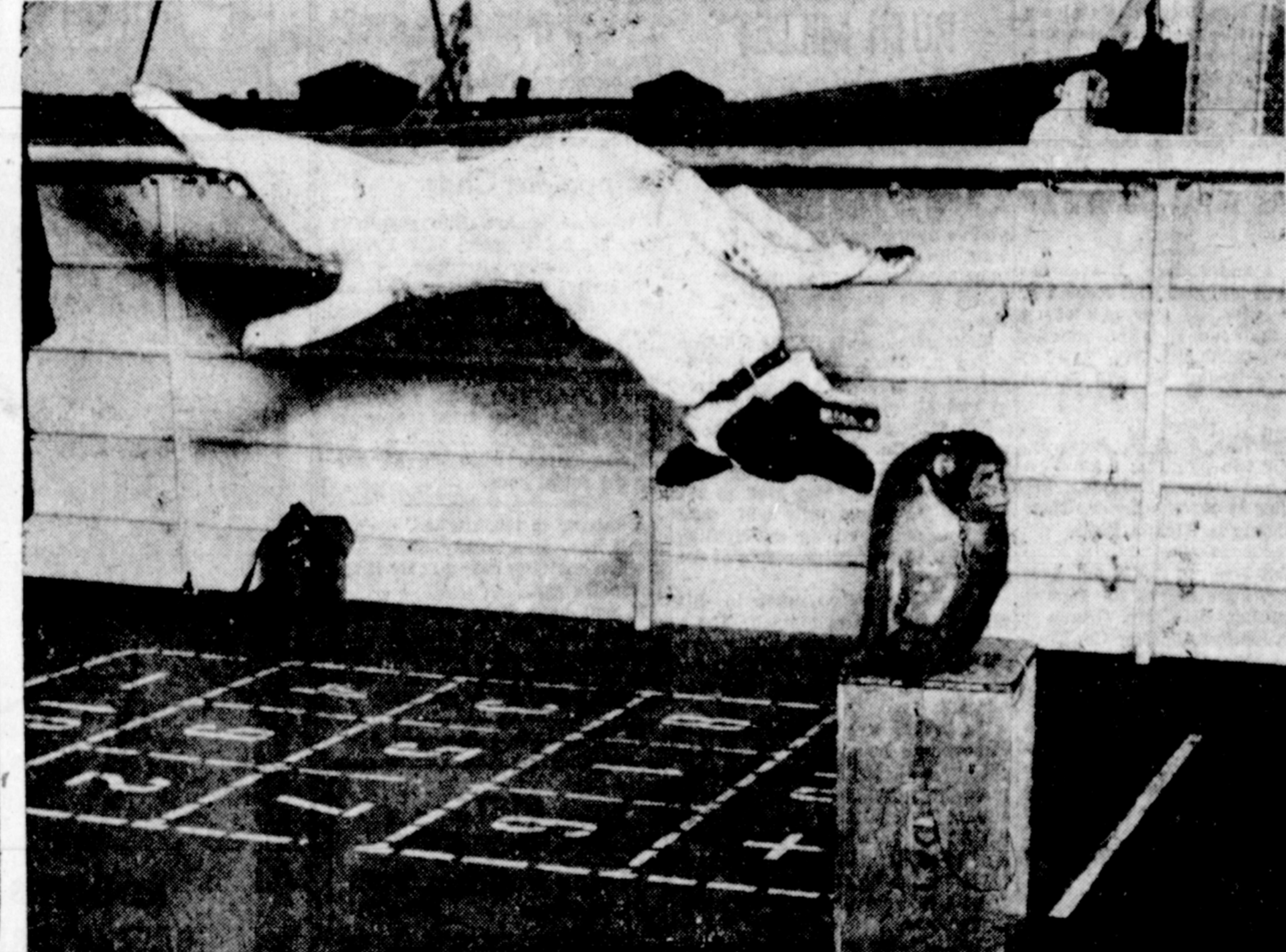

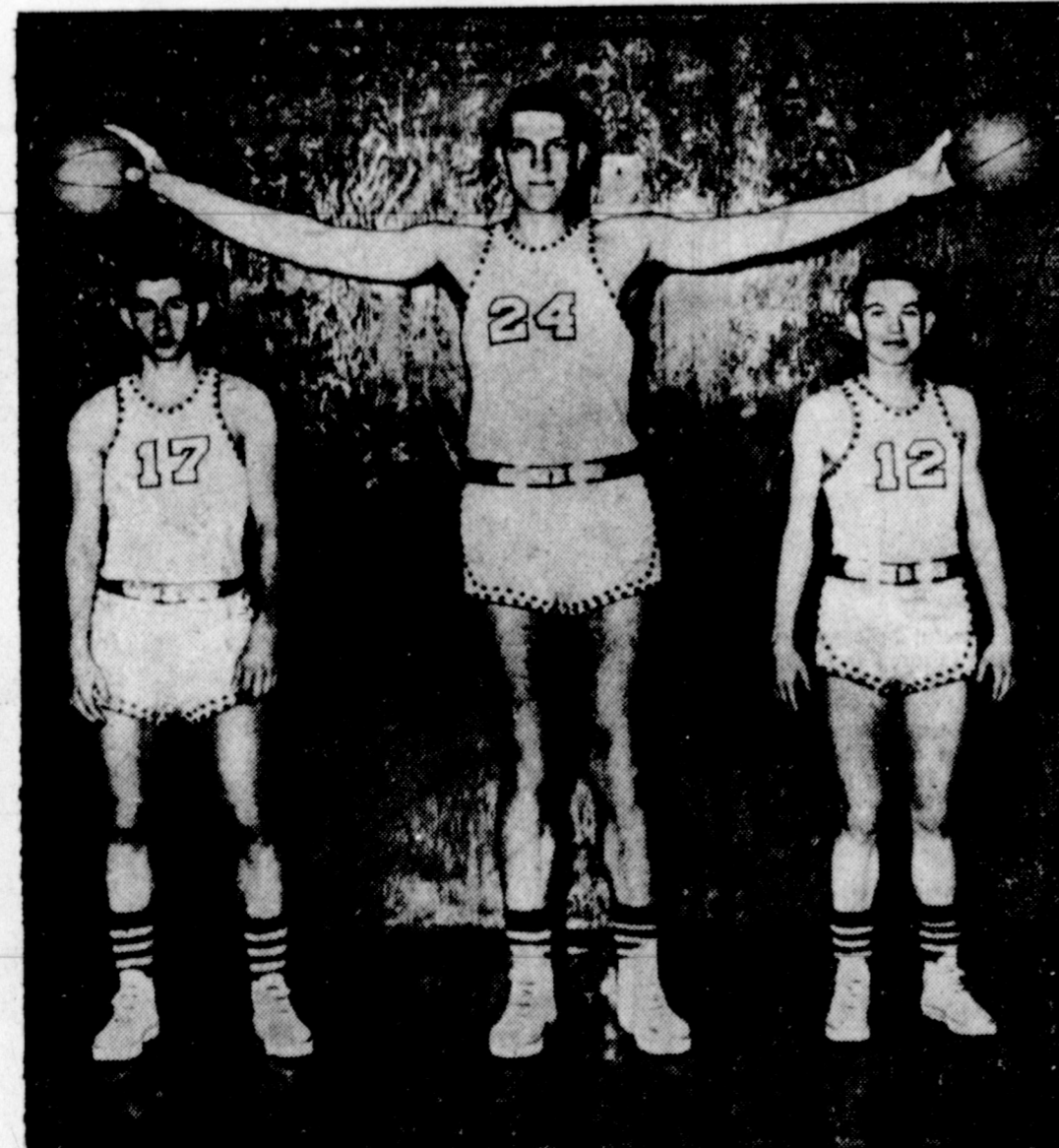

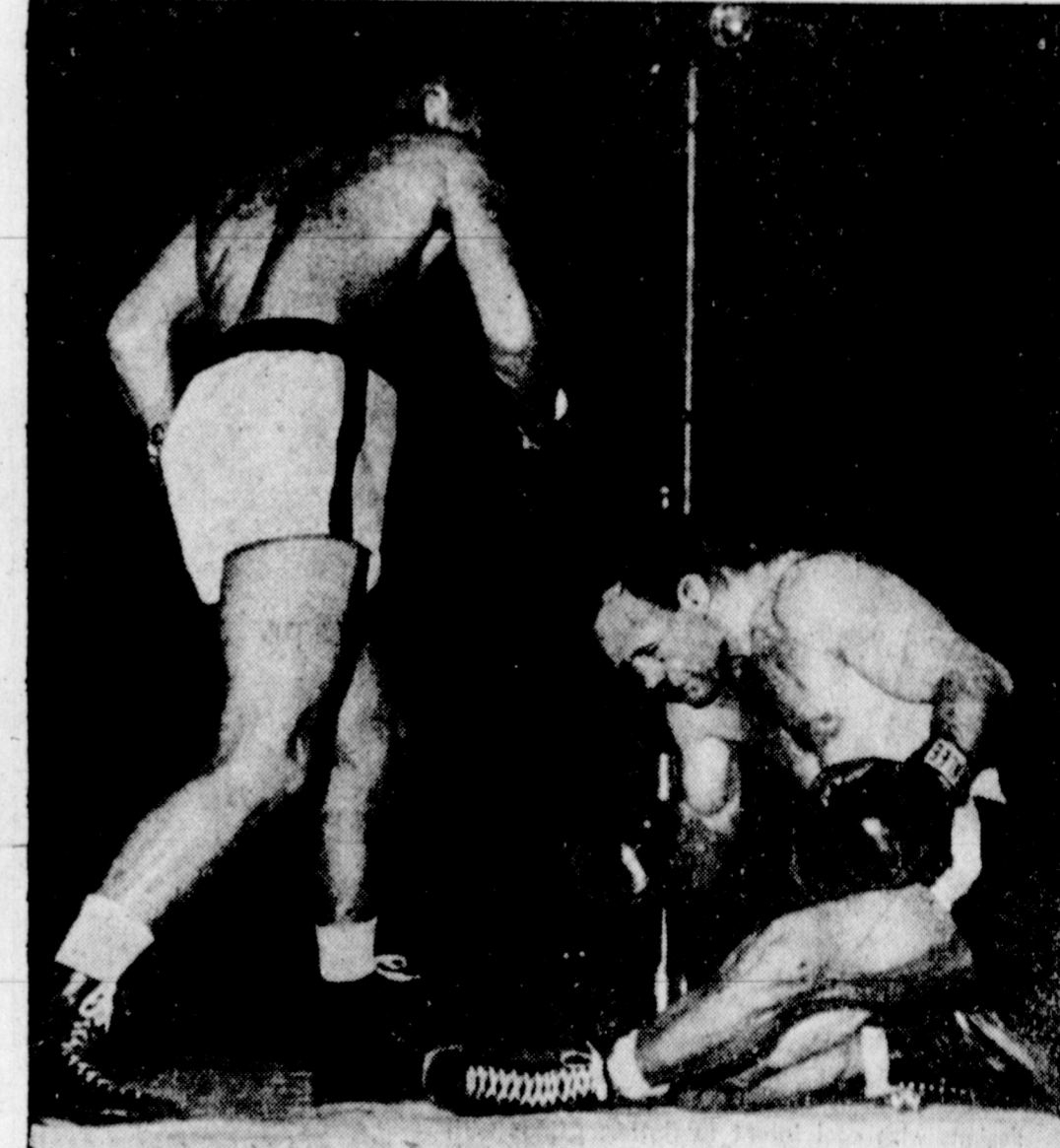

### Dynamite Blasting Near The President's Hideaway

WASHINGTON (UP) — Backstairs at the White House: Recently there has been heavy dynamite blasting in the area near Camp David, the presidential hideaway in the Catoctin Mountains of western Maryland. Some of the residents of the area have been asking each other whether the government might be building some bomb shelters near the camp which President Eisenhower still uses occasionally for meetings of large groups, although his Gettysburg, Pa., farm is only about 20 miles away.

Another local theory is that the government may be putting in some small dams in the streams running through the federally owned Catoctin recreational area to help improve the fishing. Some of the president's staff, including Wilton B. (Jerry) Persons, deputy assistant to the president, and Earl Chesney, administrative assistant, have been fishing in the Catoctin Mountain area recently, but not up near Camp David itself where the fishing generally is poor.

From now until about the end of June is the best time to do any sort of fishing in the Turnmont, Md.-Gettysburg area, particularly in the hilly sections, because when hot weather comes, the streams lower a bit and the water becomes so bright that the fish, mostly trout, remain hidden in the shadows. Another factor causes a relatively sudden fall-off in trout fishing in the President's neck of the woods. With warm weather, the flies begin to hatch, and the fish, with such an ample supply of natural food on hand, become finicky about going for artificial flies and other lures.

Gettysburg will be in the news this weekend when the President's house guest will be Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery, deputy commander of NATO forces in Europe and a World War II combat-in-arms of the Chief Executive.

Montgomery and Eisenhower are old friends and probably will devote their weekend to old soldier bull sessions and a tour of the famous Civil War battlefield which Eisenhower, promised the famous British General some years ago.

Gettysburg is a delightful place this time of year, but even her most loyal citizens admit that the historic town can get "rightfully hot in July and August, even into September.

This is why some members of the White House staff groan at a rumor, possibly started as a gag, that instead of going to Colorado for his late summer vacation, Eisenhower will spend most of his time on his Pennsylvania farm where the house is delightfully air-conditioned.

### Asian Church Leader Hits Christian 'Sense Of Urgency'

BUCK HILL FALLS, Pa. (UP)—An Asian church leader said Thursday Christians have lost their "sense of urgency" about the "unfinished task" of winning the world to Christ.

Dr. D. T. Niles of Ceylon, head of the Evangelism Department of the World Council of Churches, warned U.S. protestant leaders that this is no time for resting on their oars.

"The events of the world are moving at a terrific pace," he said, "and we are already seeing the calamities that are in store for us if the obedience of the church does not keep pace with the events of history."

Niles spoke before the annual meeting of the U.S. Conference for the World Council of Churches.

### Jacoby On Bridge

In a recent Pittsburgh duplicate game practically all pairs landed at four spades with today's hand. North would count 24 points in high cards plus one for the fifth diamond and open three no-trump. South would go to four spades and North would pass.

At most tables West opened the ten of diamonds. East ruffed and led back a heart to dummy's ace. Declarer would lead the ace of spades from dummy and run dummy's diamonds. West would have to follow on all but the last so declarer could discard one loser and make his contract.

At one table the four of hearts was opened. Declarer took the ace and tried to get to his own hand with the ace of diamonds.

East ruffed; led a low heart to his partner; ruffed another diamond and cashed the ace of clubs. Now the poor declarer laid down the spade ace and when the king failed to drop found himself down one for a real bottom score.

One North player who obviously was feeling no pain decided that his partner would hold six spades to the king. Then if the diamond suit ran he would make 12 tricks at no - trump. Hence this particular North leaped to six no-trump.

I wish I could report that justice triumphed but as the reader can see the no - trump slam was a lay-down. The jack of diamonds served as an entry to dummy. A low spade was led and when the jack came up declarer finessed the queen. The ace of spades dropped the king and six spades plus five diamonds plus the ace of hearts made the necessary 12 tricks.

### Italy Embroiled In Political Confusion

Italy's leaders seem likely to set a new record for complete political confusion.

Premier Antonio Segni has resigned after months of feuding which involves not only his own Christian Democratic Party but every other political faction.

The feuding has been conducted not only between the various parties but inside the individual parties themselves.

And President Giovanni Gronchi, himself a Christian Democrat, is doing some feuding of his own.

At the moment, it seems unlikely that anybody can form a stable government before the next national parliamentary election is held. It may be necessary to advance the date of the election now scheduled for June, 1958.

**Why Segni Resigned**  
Segni's resignation was forced when Vice Premier Giuseppe Saragat, leader of the right wing Socialist Party, pulled out of the

coalition cabinet on the ground the government was no longer strong enough to carry out promised land reform and other programs. The real reason appeared to be that Saragat's leadership of his own party was threatened.

Involved in the tangle are Italy's foreign policies including its role in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, the proposed merger of the right and left wings of the Socialist Party, and the extent to which President Gronchi is entitled to act as a policy maker. Premier Segni took office 22 months ago as leader of a coalition which included his Christian Democrats, with 261 seats in the 590-seat Chamber of Deputies, the right wing Socialists with 19 seats, the Liberals with 13, the Republicans with 5 and two splinter parties with 4.

Leading the opposition were the Communist Party with 143 seats and the left wing Socialists with 75.

Things started cooking last year after Soviet Russian Communist leader Nikita S. Khrushchev

rocked the Communist world by his repudiation of the policies of Josef Stalin.

A new complication arose because of criticism of Foreign Minister Gaetano Martino, who is a Liberal.

Ever since his election two years ago, President Gronchi has sought to make himself a power in politics. Actually the President of Italy is supposed to act as a non-party official.

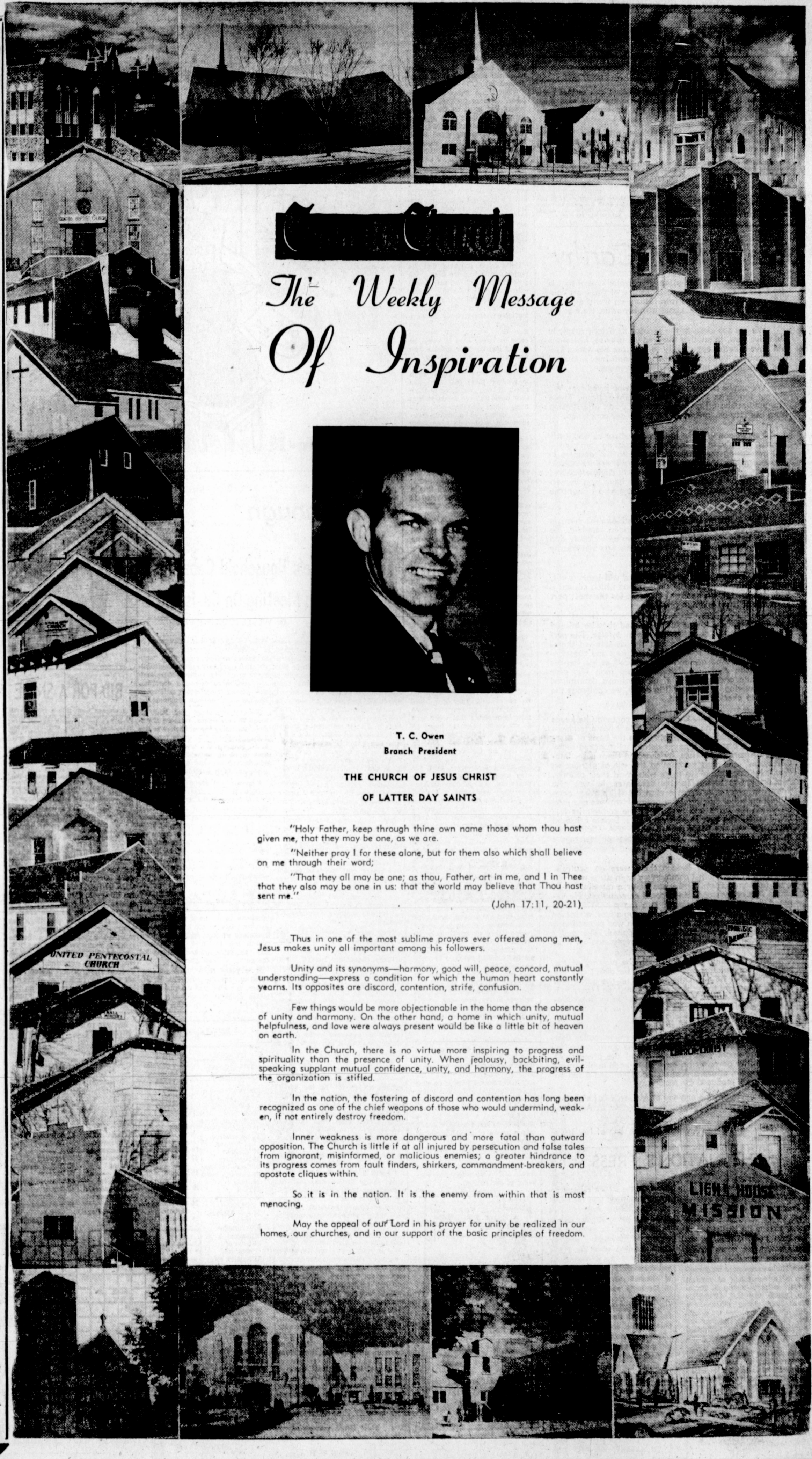

So it is in the nation. It is the enemy from within that is most menacing.
