10-Foot Wall of Water Smashes Lampasas

LAMPASAS, Tex. (UP)-A 10-foot wall of water from a broken levee burst through the unsuspecting Central Texas town of Lampasas Sunday night, destroying an estimated 90 per cent of it.

Many persons were trapped in homes and stores. Warren Doolittle, 70, was swept away and drowned. A woman was reported to have been washed away. Search parties were looking for her and others reported missing. In the midst of the flood, a continuation of an unpar-

Some Figures The annual report of the FBI shows major crimes in the U.S. in 1956 to be 2,563,150 or a 13.3

per cent gain over 1955. Last year 12,620 people were murdered, 20,300 women were raped and 96,000 people wounded or maimed by deadly weapons. Crimes in cities increased 12.7 per cent, in rural areas 15.5.

The report shows that for every 100 city crimes just before World War II we now have 162. At the present rate, the pre-World War II crimes will have doubled in 1958. Murders and assaults, the report shows, are near the doubling point.

World War II brought no substantial increase in crime, but the gain since the Japanese surrender has averaged 30 per cent over prewar levels.

The FBI report shows crime has gone up four times as fast as the population since 1950; this, in spite of general increases in police staffs, courts and other facilities for detection and prosecu-

The report shows crimes are compounded by a relatively new and serious factor-juveniles. Last year the arrests of persons under 18 increased 17.3 per cent, and the population gain in that bracket was only 3 per cent. Youngsters under 18 accounted for 46 per cent of all arrests for major crimes - like murder and rape. They are responsible for nearly 67 per cent of all auto thefts.

If that is not a crime, then slavery is not a crime. But why do peple so believe in government schools and labor unions that are based on the fallacy that might is right?

Way back in 1907 or '08 the Methodist Church adopted a social creed that indorsed collective bargaining, and then a year later the former organization of the National Council of Churches of Christ. in America adopted a similar policy. These modernist churches in the United States are guilty more so than in any other mation in the world of repudiating the obligations of the parents to educate their children. They have advocated the erime of forcing other people to help pay for the "education" of their children. This, of course, has had a very serious and bad effect on the integrity and self-reliance of many, many people. And anything that tends to reduce the self-reliance of an individual is bound to result in increased crimes.

Remember, St. Paul said, "Be not deceived; God is not mocked: for whatsoever a man soweth. that shall he also reap.'

When the churches and the state schools and the labor unions adopt a policy of might-makes-right. we are bound to have an increase in crime. The increase will not stop until the hearts of men are changed. That is a responsibility of each and every individual.

The basic reason for the failure of every attempt to equalize incomes is because there never has been on this earth a civilization in which each individual has made an equal contribution to the needs of society. And as long as humans are human, there never will be such a civilization. Faced with this fact, it becomes apparent that rewards cannot be equal and that, therefore, there must always be disparity of incomes.


Under our American Capitalistic System of Free Enterprise, this nation has come closer to equality of incomes than has any other nation in all history. This is because that System which the Commies so despise, operates on the sound theory that a greater reward shall be given for a job better done. If it were possible for nature to produce men of equal intelligence, equal ambition, equal skill and equal energy, all could be paid equal rewards. But nature has given no indication that such production will ever come to pass.

Catalogue and index the members of your own family and your circle of friends and acquaintances. You will find a great disparity of virtues, or talents, or whatever you may care to call them, existing among them. You will find that some are contributing much, others not so much, while still others are contributing little or nothing to the general welfare of society. What sane, right-thinking person would prescribe equalof rewards for his relatives and friends who make such une qual donations to the public weal? It would be the height of absurdity to cut the reward of the biggest contributor down to the level of that going to the smallest. Not only would it be absurd, it would

would adversely affect every in dividual because the aggregate contribution to society would be smaller. All would be the losers thereby.

This columnist does not maintain that under "The American Way" rewards always are fair and equitable. Some Americans have made contributions to science, technology, medicine, art, literature, etc., and have not received commensurate financial compensation. He does maintain, however, that such cases have been the exceptions, not the rule, and that in the vast majority of cases, rewards have been meted out in keeping with the service ren-

dered to society. Every decent American (and most Americans are decent) has an underlying desire not only to improve his own condition, but of others as well. But by the same token, he knows that society as a whole cannot be improved, except for a transitory period, by arbitrarily redistributing wealth as we are doing now through the medium of our sliding-scale income-
