Runoff Election Set Tomorrow

Voters in Ward 4 will go to the polls tomorrow in the runoff election between Glenn Radcliff and Robert D. Olson to determine the City Commissioner for that Ward. In the regular city election held on April 2 the two men received the highest number of votes in Ward 4 but neither one received a majority of the votes cast for the four candidates for the office. W. D. Varnon, the former commissioner, has been held over with

the three new commissioners pending the election of a commissioner for Ward 4. Absentee voting in the runoff election has been light with only two votes cast prior to the deadline for absentee balloting. The voting place in tomorrow's election will be at the Monarch Lumber Company, at Gray and Brown, with H. H. Boynton as election judge. Polls will be open from 8 a. m. until 7 p. m.

Final Underpass Papers Presented

The final formal papers for the approval of the city's part in the construction of the Hobart Street underpass and street widening were presented to the city this morning by G. K. Reading, resident engineer of the Texas Highway Department.

The papers will be presented to the City Commission tomorrow for approval. The forms specify the city's part in the construction project and specify the cost of the city's portion of the construction.

Civil Strike In Colombia Is Finished

BOGOTA (UP)—Thousands of students and workers throughout Colombia resumed normal activities today, ending a "civil strike" which hastened the downfall of President Gustavo Rojas Pinilla last week. Parallel "back to class" and "back to work" movements followed 10 days of turmoil during which riots in various Colombian cities killed at least 123 persons and injured more than 500.

A spokesman for Rojas, who is seeking political asylum in Spain, said police gunfire killed 150 persons in Bogota alone on Friday, the day his resignation was announced. Police here say only four persons were killed that day.

The liberal newspaper Intermedio said today police and anxious parents in Cali, the mountain city first affected by the wave of violence, are seeking clues to the whereabouts of 11 students who disappeared during the riots.

Freedom of Press. The five-man military junta which succeeded Rojas has promised to restore freedom of the press. At least two newspapers suppressed by the Rojas regime already have resumed publication.

The "official daily" founded by the ex-president to air the views of his government ceased publication Sunday. The junta is said to have confiscated its final edition and fired its staff.

The official organ was put out by a specially-organized company which also controlled Colombia's newspaper imports. Opposition newspapers had to pay nearly 2½ times as much for newspaper.

Refugee in Spain. Ex-President Rojas flew to Madrid from Bermuda today to begin life as a political refugee in the country which traditionally harbors Colombia's cast-off politicians.

Ex-President Laureano Gomez, who has spent most of his time in Spain since Rojas ousted and exiled him in 1953, was reported packing his bags and preparing to return home.

Rojas arrived in Madrid in a chartered plane with 11 relatives and close associates. The party traveled with more than 200 pieces of luggage, including a dozen closely-guarded steamer trunks.

In Bermuda, the ex-president told newsmen that he left Colombia a bankrupt, with assets of only \$12,134 to meet debts totaling about \$142,500.

Raging Floods Strike Texas Again

10-Foot Wall of Water Smashes Lampasas

LAMPASAS, Tex. (UP)—A 10-foot wall of water from a broken levee burst through the unsuspecting Central Texas town of Lampasas Sunday night, destroying an estimated 90 per cent of it. Many persons were trapped in homes and stores. Warren Doolittle, 70, was swept away and drowned. A woman was reported to have been washed away. Search parties were looking for her and others reported missing. In the midst of the flood, a continuation of an unparalleled epidemic of tornadoes, cloudbursts and floods that began April 19, a gas main burst and caught fire in the business section of Lampasas. "Ninety per cent of our town is as near destroyed as could be," publisher Ward Lowe of the Lampasas Dispatch said. "The goods in the buildings are washed out and where there were basements, they are caved in, leaving a gaping hole in the floor. There isn't a piece of plate glass left in town. "Fifty to 100 homes were either swept from their foundations or washed away. The town square is pretty well covered with cars washed around like pins in a bowling alley. From a business standpoint, we're just about wiped out."

Students Tour Celanese Plant

Seventeen graduating seniors majoring in Petroleum Refining Engineering from the Colorado School of Mines, Golden, Colo., accompanied by their professor, George LeMaire and instructor, Glen Armstrong, toured the Celanese Plant here this morning. The tour, which began May 6 and will end May 16 after covering 1700 miles, is conducted annually to acquaint the students with industrial operations.

CoC Directors Are Outlined Rent Problems

The board of directors of the Pampa Chamber of Commerce met today at a luncheon meeting in the Palm Room of City Hall in what was one of their fullest meetings in months. The directors heard reports from chamber manager, E. O. Wedgeworth, who outlined the present situation in regard to rental-housing in the area which, Wedgeworth said, was fast becoming a serious problem in this city. "There is a great demand," he said, "which is expected to get increasingly worse within the next few months unless provisions are made for rental units for those people who are not in a position to buy a home immediately."

W. H. Hawkins, 77, a resident of Pampa for 31 years, died about 2:30 this morning at his home, 1309 Rham.

Mr. Hawkins, born May 12, 1880 in Denton County, moved here in 1926 from Denton. He was a retired carpenter and a member of the First Baptist Church. Mr. Hawkins married Jessie Green Stephens on Aug. 12, 1906, in Denton. He is survived by his wife, two daughters, Mrs. Ebb Riley of Pampa and Mrs. Paul Crossman of Pampa; four sons, S. J. Hawkins of Amarillo, O. W. of Amarillo, Joe of Pampa and Harris of Onesto, N.Y.; two brothers, Epps and the late Stanford; one sister, Mrs. Della Stanford of Fort Worth; 13 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held Tuesday at 2 p. m. at the First Baptist Church with the Rev. E. Douglas Carver officiating. Burial will be in Fairview Cemetery. Pallbearers will be Paul Crossman Jr., David Crossman, Richard Crossman, Herman Hawkins, Mike Hawkins and Pat Hawkins.

New Syrian Coup Seen

By WALTER LOGAN United Press Staff Correspondent Israeli sources predicted today in Jerusalem the Baghdad talks between King Saud and King Feisal and Jordan's move toward the West might lead to a new coup by anti-Communist political leaders in Syria.

The sources said increased activities of the Russians in Syria could be expected to show the rightist groups the "suicidal tendency" of the present regime and produce another coup—and another about-face in Syrian foreign policy.

Reports reaching Jerusalem strongly indicated the left-wing Syrian leadership was badly shaken by Jordan's decision to accept 10 million dollars in U.S. aid even if it did not accept the Eisenhower Doctrine as such. Syria was stepping up its propaganda attacks against Israel to cover up its growing internal crisis. The attacks were reportedly designed to show the other Arab nations that Syria was the most anti-Israeli.

Indications increased that the Baghdad talks between King Saud of Saudi Arabia and King Feisal of Iraq were isolating the Syrian-Egyptian axis more and more. Israeli sources hoped frankly a Syrian coup would leave Egypt on a limb by itself. The Iraqi Foreign Ministry today confirmed reports that King Hussein of Jordan would fly to Baghdad Thursday for talks with Saud and Feisal.

Egypt moved today to try to strengthen the neutralist bloc. President Gamal Abdel Nasser was receiving Premier Lemar E. All Mohammed Daud of Afghanistan, a strong neutralist who offered Afghan "volunteers" to Egypt during the Suez invasion. In Baghdad, Feisal had hoped to show Saud the Western-supplied military might he recently placed at the disposal of Jordan's Hussein, but rain caused cancellation of the parade.

Egyptian Press. Jordan accused Egypt last night of plotting against the royal regimes of Jordan, Iraq, Libya and Saudi Arabia with the

aid of the Soviet Union and international communism. The radio said the plot was aimed at overthrowing the rulers and establishing "republican" regimes in all four countries, and that Syria was ready to intervene militarily in Jordan if necessary.

U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold returned to New York Sunday from his talks in Jerusalem with Premier David Ben-Gurion and said he was "very satisfied" with his efforts to ease tension between Israel and the U.N.

Shortly after his arrival, Israeli Foreign Minister Golda Meir was quoted in Jerusalem as accusing him of "letting down" Israel over the Gaza Strip issue.

Spring Festival Planned Friday

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U.S. Coast Guard. The National Guard Ordnance trucks from Gatesville, Texas, rushed in with drinking water. Emergency supplies of food, clothing, bedding and typhoid vaccine were rushed in.

Firemen formed a chain in breast-deep water to snuff out the gas fire in Lampasas. Although the situation eased temporarily and at other points hit again by floods in Central Texas, the situation looked ominous.

At 8 a. m., it was almost as dark as at midnight in Waco, the largest city in Central Texas, because of black thunderclouds.

Dallas Gets Deluge. It was so dark that motorists had to drive with lights on. Other thunderstorm with torrents of rain, lightning and rolling thunder hit Dallas after daybreak.

Up to five inches of rain in Dallas late Sunday brought the city its third flood in less than three weeks. Two hundred and fifty persons fled their homes; more than 100 streets were closed by water pouring across them. Tons of water on its roof caused the walls of an old two-story building in the Dallas business district to bulge. It was leaning over the sidewalk and police pulled it down. The debris crashed across a main street.

Pampa Air Base For Sale

The old Pampa Army Air Base, 12 miles east of Pampa, is going on the sale block June 11. The General Services Administration is offering the property at public auction as government-owned surplus property.

The sale will be conducted in the show arena of the Top 'O' Texas rodeo grounds. The property for sale consists of four sections of land including 8.3 mineral estate totalling approximately 2,544.71 acres and water, gas and cast iron sewer pressure lines for the entire tract.

The land will be sold in eight tracts, the same sizes as those purchased by the government shortly after the beginning of World War II. The tracts to be sold will be: one tract of 640 acres, three of 320 acres and four ranging from 160 to 312.71 acres.

The property offered is subject to inspection by prospective purchasers during the period May 19 until June 10. Prospective purchasers will be admitted to the site for inspection purposes between 8 a. m. and 4 p. m. Monday through Friday, exclusive of holidays.

The bids to purchase may be for cash or credit per regulations established by the General Services Administration. All sales will be subject to confirmation of the administration. A brochure containing a map of the tracts to be offered, with legal description, is available from the auctioneer, Wayne Cook Associates, Inc., Dallas. Their address is 5523 Dyer Street, Travis Somerville is general manager of the Dallas office.

Von Stroheim, who had been bedridden for nine months, died at 9 p. m. in Mautepes. His first wife, Denise Vernac, was at his bedside when the end came.

Missiles For India, Others?

United Press Staff Correspondent TOKYO (UP)—Rep. Sterling Cole said today the United States should offer guided missiles equipped with atomic warheads to neutralist countries such as India, Burma and Indonesia.

The New York Republican, a member of the Joint Congressional Committee on Atomic Energy, is in Japan attending a Far Eastern atomic conference. Cole said during an interview that the United States is already pledged to defend the free world from acts of aggression, and that pledge includes the use of nuclear weapons.

"If any allied country, or neutralist country such as India, Burma, or Indonesia should ask for guided missiles with atomic warheads for defense purposes, we should give such defense weapons to them," he said.

He added that many countries do not now have the trained personnel to operate such highly technical weapons, but he said the United States should make it clear that it is committed to the defense of the free world... and that includes use of "all weapons."

Cole said the two countries in the Far East who have the technical skill to operate such weapons at the moment would be India and Japan.

Americanism Class Meets Here Sunday

The Citizenship Class met in regular session Sunday afternoon at 2 p.m. in the office of the principal at Baker School. Six of the nine members enrolled were present. The lesson "How Our Nation Was Started" was presented by John Evans, chairman of the Citizenship Committee. After the regular lesson, the class was given a quiz on the early history of our country.

The class held an election and elected the following to serve as officers: Renata Flemish, president; Rosa Brewer, vice president; and Patricia Shaw, secretary. A resolution was passed by the class to contact all those persons in and around Pampa who have not been naturalized and try to get them to enroll in the class as soon as possible.

The next class will be held May 19 at 2 p.m. in the regular meeting place at Baker School. The lesson to be studied is, "The Making Of Our Constitution." Sam Begert, principal of Horace Mann School, will be the instructor for the day.

The Americanism Class is being sponsored by the Pampa Lions Club for the purpose of helping all aliens who wish to become citizens of the United States. Any foreigner who has a fair knowledge of speaking and writing English is eligible for the class. There are no dues and no by-laws. All that is required is to be present for as many of the class periods as possible. The class meets every Sunday at 2:00 p.m. in the principal's office at Baker School during the regular school term. It plans to meet only once a month during the summer months. In September the regular once a week class will be resumed.

Billy Mitchell Court Martial To Be Opened

WASHINGTON (UP)—The Air Force has agreed to reopen this week the sensational 31-year-old court martial case of the late Gen. William L. (Billy) Mitchell, called by many of his admirers the "father of the U.S. Air Force."

A spokesman said the Air Force Corrections and Review Board will begin reviewing the case Tuesday.

Mitchell was court-martialed in 1926 by a board of nine Army generals following his vigorous fight in support of his view that air power should be the first line of America's defense.

He was charged with insubordination after he had accused the Army of incompetency and inefficiency and urged creation of a separate air arm. Mitchell, who at the time of the case held the permanent rank of colonel, was suspended from his rank, command and duty and deprived of pay and allowances. President Coolidge modified the sentence to allow Mitchell half-pay.

Commissioners OK Only Bid

The Gray County Commissioners Court met this morning in the County Courtroom and approved a bid from the Caprock Machinery Company of Amarillo for a road grader for precinct 1 costing a total of \$20,325.

The bid was the only one received by the commissioners who had advertised several weeks in advance of the opening of bids to be done this morning.

In the only other business undertaken this morning by the commissioners, the treasurer's monthly report was read and approved and all county bills paid.

Dave Beck To Face More Trial Rounds

WASHINGTON (UP)—Dave Beck undergoes another round of his "trial by exposure" today that already has led to predictions he is through as head of the nation's largest union.

The Senate Rackets Committee called two business executives to state whether doing business with Beck's Teamster Union had meant giving special favors to Beck.

The witnesses were Roy Fruehauf, president of the Fruehauf Trailer Co., and A. M. Burke, head of the mortgage loan department of the Occidental Insurance Co.

No Charges Against Them. Committee counsel Robert F. Kennedy said their appearance did not necessarily mean the committee had evidence of wrongdoing by their firms. He said the group wanted to ask them whether Beck asked for favors as a follow-up to his business deals with their companies.

Teamster Union sources told the United Press during the week end they believe Beck now "is through" as head of the 1,500,000-man Teamsters Union. They predicted committee testimony that Beck profited from a "charity" fund collected for the widow of his best friend would anger rank-and-file Teamsters and prove Beck's undoing.

Sources in both the Teamsters Union and its parent AFL-CIO said it is now conceivable Beck will either resign or "retire" as Teamster president by Aug. 1. Teamster leaders were said to be pressing Beck to leave his \$50,000-a-year-plus-expense post.

The Aug. 1 date was cited because that is the deadline for the union to start electing local delegates to its Sept. 30 convention for the purpose of electing a new officer.

In other developments connected with the rackets inquiry today:—Sen. Carl T. Curtis (R-Neb.), newest member on the Rackets Committee, said in an interview the group should investigate secondary boycotts by labor unions. These are instances in which unions seek to halt work in a firm doing business with a concern against which they are on strike.

The Pampa Oilers hope to take advantage of a good thing when they see it and tonight they will be trying for their third straight victory over the Plainview Ponies in Oiler Park at 7:45.

Pampa won its first series of the season at Plainview yesterday by using a pair of grand-slam home runs and some splendid double plays to cut the Ponies 10-8 in the first game and by an 8-1 count in the nightcap of their Sunday afternoon doubleheader.

The Plainview meeting yesterday was probably the Oilers' final road tour of the year and their three-game series with the Ponies beginning tonight and ending Wednesday will probably be the final home meetings.

The Oilers will give up the ship after Wednesday's game unless attendance is above average or someone agrees to take over the club. Small attendance in home games this season has left Pampa in financial difficulty and unable to continue meeting the payroll and costs of road trips.

Manager Allan Cross plans to pitch righthander Roy Sorenson against the Ponies tonight. Sorenson made one start this season, that against Ballinger last week. He was relieved by Tommy Harrison.

Grand slammers by Chico Valdez and Scooter Hughes gave the Oilers the necessary cushions in their games yesterday and four plays involving Pat Platt, Valdez, Juan Izaguirre and Scooter Hughes in the second game helped the victories. All five double plays came in the second game. Valdez and Izaguirre were in on all four and Hughes was in on three of them.

Veteran Gene Summerlin took the Oiler pitching victory in the first game and Joe Lowery, making his first appearance in an Oiler uniform, grabbed the nightcap pitching win. Summerlin gave up eight hits, walked eight and struck out three while Lowery went all the way in the nightcap in giving up 11 hits, walking eight and striking out one. Both pitchers got out of trouble several times on the home runs and double plays.

Shutout For Podres — Johnny Podres turned in his second shutout of the season and Duke Snider homered to help the Dodgers snap a four-game losing streak.

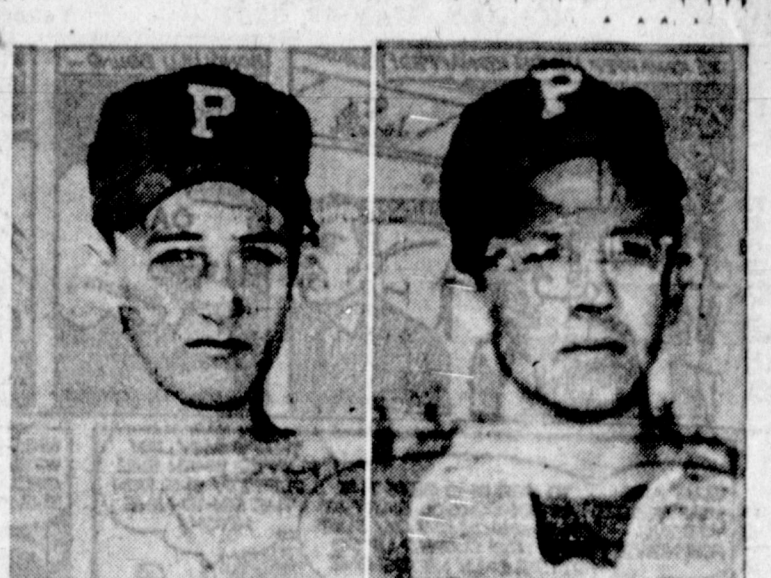
