





(1) Mother, using middle finger of one hand, clears child's

mouth of any foreign matter. With same finger, she holds the tongue Worward.
(2) Mother places child in face-down, head-down, position, and pats him firmly on the back with the free hand, to help dis-lodge any foreign object in the air

passage.
(3) The child is placed on his back, and the mother, using mid-dle fingers of both hands, lifts the lower jaw from beneath and behind so that it "juts out." With one hand only, the law is held in this jutting-out posi-

(5) The mother, covering the child's mouth and nose with her mouth, breathes into the child with a smooth, steady action. The free hand applies continuous moderate pressure to the child's abdomen, between navel and ribs, to prevent the stomach from being filled with air.



Competition Abridged

The Supreme Court, after many years of harassing and sniping at big business, has finally come up with a ruling which may have a profound effect upon the business community generally.

The target of the court in this case was the Du-Pont Co. and General Motors. DuPont, as most persons familiar with the matter know, has for many years owned a good deal of stock in General Motors. It was the claim of the prosecution that by this process DuPont exercised an unfair degree of influence on General Motors and that such influence was in restraint of trade, constituted a trust, created a potential monopoly and was harmful to many businesses which were frozen out of competition by the power of the combine.

The court has favored the prosecution in its ruling and DuPont will now be compelled to sell some of its

We consider the ruling to be both unfair and unwise. In essence the decision provides a precedent which will enable the government to peek into every stock transaction wherever it occurs and at its own discretion prevent free Americans in business from buying stock in companies which are in similar or related lines. The effect is apt to be profound and will unquestionably serve as a further curtailment of the general business activity of the nation.

It should be understood, however, that the court took its position, not because of the size of the companies involved, per se. It was the nature; not the size of the apparent unification of interest which received support by the nine supposedly infallible judges. Yet, even though the court has attempted to make this matter clear it remains an open question if two much smaller companies would have gotten into this difficulty. Without a doubt it was the size of the firms involved which instigated the

Growth, of course, has been the aim of most businesses. And now, with the graduated income tax biting into business initiative on the one hand, and government control as to what stock can be purchased on the other hand, a general lessening of corporate vigor will probably

This is simply a further inroad against the basic American right of individual liberty. Instead of stimulating competition, which is the purported intent, it is probable that the result will find a diminution of competition prevailing

Undoubtedly there are many corporations right at this moment casting anxious eyes into the stock portfolios in an effort to discover whether they have been sinning according to the Supreme Court ruling. It is entirely possible that a great wave of stocks may thus be placed upon the market. If this occurs, it may depress the market, and create an additional scarcity of working capital, from which scarcity the market is already suffering to a degree.

The Supreme Court ruling is not only inimical to free enterprise, it is badly timed. Right now we need all the capital we can find to aid in the bringing about of considerable automation which is available but costly.

Firms finding their stocks being dumped as their stock holders face prosecution, will have a hard time of it to maintain their present pace of either production or expansion. If production or expansion are curtailed, the result will be a lessening of competition rather than a stimulation to competition.

From principle, relating to the matter of individual initiative and liberty, the affair is grievous. No government should ever be in a position to control either the purchase or sales of private persons in or out of business. Freedom of choic is intrinsically a part of freedom. If freedom of choice vanishes in any particular, then it has vanished. And it is of paramount importance that every person is granted the full power to choose what he wishes to purchase of what he wishes to sell on the basis

of his own wisdom and conscience and on no other basis. It is the mark of any totalitarian state that choices are reduced or eliminated by the men in power. It is the mark of any free nation that choices shall be as wide and as open as competition can provide.

In essence, the elimination or the curtailment of choices is the abridgement of competition. Thus we observe the Supreme Court embarking on a program of eliminating competition even as it professes to be con-

Rocky Mountain spotted fever is by no means confined to the Rocky Mountain states. It is a disease caused by a tiny living organism known as a Rickettsia. During the past 10 years hundreds of cases have been reported from almost all portions of

the United States. Since the disease is sometimes mild and not diagnosed, there are good reasons for believing that it may be considerably more frequent than figures show.

A recent report in The Journal of the American Medical Assn. is b-sed in large part on the 74 cases of the disease diagnosed at the University of Virginia Hospital from 1945-54.

Rocky Mountain spotted fever may be mild or severe enough to cause death. It usually begins 'ienly with headache, chills and aches and pains, together w the rapid onset of fever. Within about two to four days, the typical rash generally appenrs. First, # usually affects the wrists and ankles and later soreads to the rest of the body

In addition to these clinical

symptoms there are some diagnostic laboratory tests which are useful, though none yet devised is perfect. Nevertheless, symptoms should be suspected and diagnosis made as early as possible because treatment with some of the antibiotics, especially if begun early, is exceedingly useful.

How does one acquire this sometimes dangerous disease? The organism lives in wood ticks and dog ticks, though only a small proportion of these appear to be infected. However, during the tick season any person who might be exposed should search his body carefully for ticks before they become attached. In children this search should be done by the parents with special emphasis on the scalp, which is often overlooked.

I believe the Declaration of Independence means exactly what it says when it says governments derive their just power from the consent of the governed. The word 'just' is an important word, and "consent" is an important word in this Declaration.

I know of no government down through the ages that ever limited its powers to "just" powers, and when the powers are not just, they, of course, cannot get the consent of those governed. That statement certainly does not mean the consent of the majority or the minority for the simple reason that only the individual can give his own consent.

When our forefathers adopted the Constitution they, of course, departed far from the ideologies of the Declaration. They violated the statement that all men are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable Rights - Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. They did this by admitting that one man had a right to own another. And they also violated this ideology when they gave the government the power to tax. A man is not free when he is compelled to pay for something he does not want.

In answer to question number 2, I certainly would expect all those who believe that no man should steal or no man should murder to agree on a compact to attempt to prevent men from murdering and stealing. If an individual 'did not want everybody's life and propprotected, the compact should not include that individual in the government. THE SUPREME COURT JUMPS THE TRACK

In a mess of decisions Monday, the Supreme court managed to perform major services for Communists and loyalty risks on the federal payroll and at the same time to diminish substantially the power of Congress to deal effectively with any of them. Friends of the court say that these decisions fortify the defense of individual rights. Others will be inclined to agree with Sen. McClellan's judgment that the decisions demonstrate that what the country sadly lacks is a Supreme court of lawyers with a reasonable amount of common sense.

In ordering that five California leaders of the Communist party be freed from conviction under the Smith act, and in directing new trials for nine others, the court managed to reverse its own interpretation of the Smith act, handed down by a 6 to 2 majority only six years ago.

Non-Profit Operation

The festival is run by a nonprofit corporation, of which her husband is president. And Wein is vice - president. Any money made on the event is spent on "furthering jazz," said Mrs. Lorillard who dreams of seeing a school for jazz established at Newport.



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
