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Mayflower Lesson

The dramatic and historic re-enactment of the first voyage of the Mayflower has tocussed considerable attention upon the founding of Plymouth Colony. With much fanfare some of this nation's writers and com-

mentators are reminding us of the glories of the Mayflower Compact, a rather unique legal document drawn up and signed while the Plymouth colonists were yet out of sight of land.

It is being widely claimed that this Mayflower Compact was the forerunner of the Constitution; that in many ways it was similar to that immortal document which was to follow in a hundred and fifty more years.

Without in the least wishing to detract from the nobility and fearless spirit of those intrepid seekers after religious freedom, we think it advisable to point out that there is little if any actual resemblance between the fearsome and trembling Mayflower Compact, and the great and far-reaching Constitution of the United States.

In actual fact, the Mayflower Compact, while undoubtedly intended as a device to establish order and justice, went for beyond its supposed intentions. The colonists, fearful of the wilderness they had not as yet even seen, framed a communist doctrine, declaring that each person in the colony could be compelled by violence to work for the good of everyone in the colony instead of for his own individual good. This policy, which was put into force as soon as the landing was accomplished, came close to wrecking the colony.

Governor William Bradford in his memoirs gives a complete recitation of the facts of the case. From 1620 when the founding occurred, up until 1623, the Plymouth Colony was a commune in every sense of the word. All food and produce were taken into a public store house and then doled out on the basis of need. Compulsory labor was enforced. The result in the three years of experimentation was so devastating that Bradford himself was certain that the Plymouth Colony had failed.

Early in 1623 he declared that he could no longer take the responsibility of running the affairs of the colony along the lines set forth in the Mayflower Compact. He advised the cloonists to return to England by the next available ship that should arrive. Meanwhile, he told them they would have to fend for themselves, as provisions by now were in such short supply that famine appeared almost inevitable.

Of course, the minute Governor Bradford reduced the size of his government to this degree, a change came over the colony. When the men and women discovered that under the new arrangement whatever they produced was their own, they quickly went to work to produce an abundance. While before, all efforts had been reluctant and halting, now the colonists attacked the raw wilderness with energy and hope. The result, of course, was an immediate plenty including surplusses, which were so great that the first Thanksgiving became a reality.


The Plymouth settlers finding themselves strictly on their own, dug in with vigor and unremitting enthusiasm. The pending famine never occurred. And those who created surplusses in their own particular pursuit quickly found that they could trade their surplusses for the surplusses of others in other lines. Farmers traded with hunters. Builders traded with fishermen. Tool and gun makers traded with cloth makers. Thus all moved into an area of prosperity and the colony, about to fail, surged into a new day of happiness and abundance.

In a very real way, this is the true lesson of the Plymouth Colony and the voyage of the Mayflower. Men's good intentions are not enough. Men must also understand that human energy, unrestrained by excessive government, can and will produce more than when that same human energy is restrained and controlled "for the good of all."

Each one of the original colonists finally learned that lesson. The lesson is that if you would truly help others, begin first by helping yourself.

We greatly admire the courage of these pioneers, but we are not the least bit impressed by their original ignorance of politics. What we do admire was the fact that they did learn a lesson. Having learned it they abandoned the old and worthless commune for a free enterprise spirit of do and dare.

It would be magnificent if the descendants of these colonists would again learn the same lesson. Cooperation is an essential, but coercion is not cooperation. When men are free they will cooperate to the gain of all. When they are not free, they must be coerced. It is too bad that so many in this country seem to need to learn this lesson all over again.

I want to continue to quote and comment on Francis H. Buffum's book, "America At The Cross-

coads. The author devotes some 30 pages to "The Union of Soviet Socialist Republics." There is not much new, it seems to me, in this section of his book. He does, however, at the close of this section list the number of Communists in the various nations of the world. He says the figures were estimated from the Library of Congress through the courtesy of its Legislative Reference Section. This service says there are 25,000 Communists in the United States, some 13 million in Russia and its satellites and some 6 million in China. Adding all the Communists in the different nations, he has a total of Communists as 24,282,000. That is a little more than one Communist for every hundred persons in the world.

Under his chapter on "The United States of America," in comparing America with Russia, he says: "Under the Communist regime, the Russian people remain little more than children and slaves-denied both full maturity and the right as individuals to govern their

"There can be little doubt as to what would have happened to this country if it had been a Russian province. It would naturally be like its mother country - backward; and like her, it would probably now be Communist."

"Here in America the individual finds the fullest scope for his fac-

ulties. . . It seems to me he has somewhat overstated our position in America today. It certainly would have been more accurate if he had said, "We have, in the past, between 1866 and 1913, more nearly permitted the individual to use the fullest scope for his faculties." We are gradually limiting the individual's right to develop his faculties in the United States. He continues:

"Finally, the value of the American way of life must be judged by how well it fulfills Nature's purpose for man. In the words of Ralph Waldo Emerson, The truest test of civilization is not the census, nor the size of cities, nor the crops; no, but the kind of man the country turns

He observes that Edmund Burke, in his speech on conciliation with America in 1775 stated that no

other country in the world was so generally studied, and referred to the fact that as many copies of Blackstone's "Commentaries" had been sold in America as in England. He continues:

"These men were resolutely the words of Dean Russell:

without exception every government in recorded history had at one time or another turned its power-its coercive power as the police force-against its own citizens-confiscated their property, imprisoned them, enslaved them, and made a mockery of personal dignity.' "

He quotes a statement by Maurice Maeterlinck, the great Belgian dramatist and philosopher: " 'The destiny of the human race depends upon how men spend their leisure

If the above statement be true, the amount of time the American people put in looking at television does not indicate our destiny is too bright.

In his last chapter he observes: "Nature will not long tolerate those who persist in breaking her laws and who refuse to set themselves to the task of fulfilling her purpose for them. If she has decreed that men should climb, however slowly, from the cave toward the spiritual heights envisioned by seers and prophets, let them be assured that their success lies along that path and no other. But when men refuse to take the line of progress ordained for them, and turn from the Light that once shone from Sinai and later from one greater Mount, and again invoke the law of the jungle, let them beware; for Destiny will already have marked them for ob-

"But in common with the rest of the world, we have suffered from an intellectual, moral, and spiritual depression that no material success can offset. Crime and delinquency have flourished on our indifference. We have been intent on 'getting ours while the getting is good' and, in our shortsightednesc, have not hesitated to kill the economic goose that lays the golden egg. We are suffering from the delusion that we can get more and more by doing less and less."

"The generally high earnings of 1958 reflected benefits flowing from the record sums invested over the past five years for expansion and modernizing plant and equipment, lowering costs and improving efficiency.

But these vast sums, especially in view of higher interest rates, have not been available to small businessmen, farmers or ordinary borrowers.



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

PARTY LINE-The man in the moon will be a member of a 500,000-mile "party line" pretty The "line" takes in Ft. Monmouth, N.J., Urbana-Champaign, Ill.-and the moon. Scientists at the University of Illinois and the Army Signal Corps will transmit signals from the Evans Signal Laboratory near Ft. Monmouth and bounce them off the moon for reception at the university. The 21/2-second journey will end at the dish-shaped aluminum mesh reflector (insert), which is 28 feet in diameter. The experiments will be conducted in the daytime, as the moon is in the sky for many day hours. The experiments may pave the way for sending radio and television signals to half the earth at one time by bouncing them off the moon so the return impulses can be received in the Eastern hemisphere.
