# Khrushchev Calls

United Press Staff Correspondent MOSCOW, July 6 (UP)-Soviet Communist Party Chief Nikita S. Khrushchev today accused former Premier Georgi Malenkov of being a "chief organizer" of a 1954 criminal conspiracy and denounced all the ousted Stalin-

ists as "cunning schemers" opposed to Soviet progress. In his first public speech on the disgraced party and government officials, Khrushchev charged that they refused even to believe that Russia could overtake the United States in farm production.

It's no idle notion that the American taxpayer is supporting every bum and socialist in Europe and half the sultans of the East besides. Here's a true story to curl your hair and it happened to a man down in Browns-

He was attending a party on the French Riviera, the feature attraction of which was a tremendous display of fireworks. The Brownsville man said he, and the others at his table marvelled at the elaborate display which had the guests ohh-ing and ahh-ing.

Rhodesia and Nyasaland owe you 55 million. The "European Coal and Steel Community" owes

you 100 millions. And the United Nations owes us 56 million.

The United Kingdom is the principal beneficiary of our daffiness. She owes four billion, four-hundred and forty-five millions. A pittance.

The Frence owe a niggardly one billion, six-hundred

A debtor listed as "unspecified" owes nine million. (We don't even bother to get the names of guys in that

Mexico is into us for 112 million. She's reduced

her one-time debt of three times that amount. And so it goes, and so it goes. And everywhere people are muttering, "Yankee Go

Home." And the Yankees would love to go home, taking their dollars with them. Fat chance.

On the surface, it looks as if most of our debtors have been paying off. From June 30, 1940, through the end of 1956, we've authorized loans to foreign countries of \$18 billion. About one-fourth has been repaid.

But, some congressmen have pointed out, the only reason many of these countries have "paid back" the loans is because we have given them "grants" in addition. In other words, they have paid us back with our own

And, it might interest you to know that we "lend" money to foreigners at rates cheaper than the government pays on its own bonds!

So, the thing to do is set up shop in, say, Italy. Get a loan from the United States by saying that your workers are going to vote the communist ticket if Uncle Sam doesn't buy them off.

Then let the loan go delinquent and apply for an economic grant-in-aid. With this money, pay off the loans; and you are square with the government; you own your factory; your workers can vote Commie if they want to-and everybody is happy with the possible exception of the United States taxpayer.

Q-Night blindness is usually defined as the inability to see well in a dim light. In some instances this seems to be the result of a deficiency of Vitamin A in the diet and great improvement may take place if it is given in suitable quantities.

Q-A friend is having periods of ammesia lasting from a few minutes to an hour or so. The spells seem to be lasting lenger. This person was struck by lightning nearly 30 years ago and was ill for three weeks at that time. He was also a heavy drinker until several months ago.-Mrs. R.

A-It is extremely difficult even to guess at an explanation for these losses of memory without much more information. It is probable that they do reflect damage to some portion of the brain, however. The problem is to find whether this is an old damage or the effect of something new. such as a brain tumor or infection. It will perhaps take many tests and extreme skill to find out

hat is at fault. am writing to ask about the advisability of allowing food to remain overnight in little aluminum pots and pans .- Mrs. L. B. A-The subject of possible danor to health from cooking in alualnum containers has been extensively investigated. It is reliably reported that no harm is done. However, I should question the desirability of leaving food in aluminum pots or pans-or any other container-for too long. Q-What is the usual time that

one can become pregnant after the cessation of menstruation at the menopause?-Mrs. L. A-This question keeps coming

up time and time again. Physicians are reluctant to answer specifically since there have been many surprises. Nevertheless, it is said that pregnancy is unlikely after the age of 50 and more than one year after complete cessation of the menses.

Q-Is it true that rheumatic fever often follows infectious hepatitis?-Reader.

A-I don't think so. Rheumatic fever usually follows a streptococcus infection of the throat; infectious hepatitis is caused by a

Q-Can a person catch cancer when drinking hot water or eating hot foods? Will drinking water at 120 degrees cause cancer?-A-Hot water and hot foods are

not recognized as a cause of cancer. Of course too hot substances may injure the delicate tissues of the mouth or throat and indeed may cause burns.

### BETTER JOBS

America At The Crossroads

I want to quote for a day or so some gems from a book written by Francis H. Buffum under the heading of "America At The Crossroads," with a subhead "A Challenge To Action." It was published by the Caxton Printers, Ltd., Caldwell, Idaho. This publishing house usually publishes books that are worth reading for those people who want to know what causes goodwill and human well - being. The author writes, under the heading "America":

"No people were ever more fortunate in their choice of a laboratory for trying a full - scale experiment in self - government. A vast continent, fabulously rich in natural resources, lay before them. No titled landlords prevented their occupation of the soil or compelled them to pay rental as dependent tenant farmers. There was land and opportunity for all. There were no titles of nobility to perpetuate the class distinctions of the Old World. Each man was on his own and, with independence won, found here the opportunity of growing in freedom of mind to his full stature as a man - a self - governed individual with the right to the fruits of his own talents and labor.

"Men gained a higher degree of independence here than was possible in almost any other country on earth. They established 'a new nation, conceived in liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal' - the end and aim of which was a political brotherhood of individuals as independent as man may be in an efficiently organized society."

Under the heading of "Two Principles of Government" and the subhead of "The Individual," he writes: "The individualist believes that

he has been endowed by his Creator with certain inallenable rights - rights which may be summed up in the term 'self government.' He believes that no other man or group of men has any right, divine or otherwise, to claim his involuntary allegiance. He has seen that men the world over, from time immemorial and almost without exception, have governed in their own interest rather than in the interest of their subjects: and he is thereby confirmed in the determination to govern himself. He looks upon government as his servant, not his master, and joins with other men, equally free, in establishing where possible such a form of government as is necessary to preserve the rights which are naturally his. and to obtain mutual services that can better be obtained by collective action than by individual effort. Believing that he can grow to full mental, moral, and spiritual maturity as a man only by exercise of his powers in every field of human endeavor, he strives in this sense to remain 'the master of his fate, the cap-

tain of his soul." "In the assertion of his personal rights as prior to the rights of government over him, he agrees with Thomas Paine who, in writing on the subject, said:

"'It has been thought a considerable advance toward establishing the principles of freedom, to say, that government is a compact between those who govern and those who are governed: but this cannot be true, because it is putting the effect before the cause: for as a man must have existed before governments existed, there necessarily was a time | are. when governments did not exist, and consequently there could originally have been no governors to form such a compact with.

" 'The fact, therefore, must be, that the individuals themselves, each in his own personal and sovereign right, entered into a compact with each other to produce a government: and this is the only mode in which governments have a right to arise, the only principle on which they have a right to

Surely any school child can see that this kind of argument is in utter denial of the whole tradition of American liberty. Our nation has always prided itself on the rights of the individual against the state, and on the concept that ours is "a government of law" and not "of men". Yet now a Repub-

lican Attorney General of the United States declares that a mere "Executive Agreement" with a foreign nation can nullify the constitutional rights of an American citizen, and that such Executive Agreements are no business of our Courts. Under any such concept, it is not just Mr. Girard's rights which are in jeopardy, it is everybody's rights. The rest of the Administration's

arguments are just as tortured and frightening. For example, its spokesmen all concede that Girard was in uniform and on duty on a U.S. firing range when the unfortunate accident occurred. The Executive Agreement with Japan clearly states that a soldier on duty is to be subject only to U.S. military jurisdiction. Yet, Robert Dechert, Defense Department counsel, argues that: "Girard's action was such a complete de parture from his duty ..... that he could not have been considered on duty." If this isn't "double-talk"-what

is it? Either Girard was on duty or he wasn't, and Dechert concedes that he was! There is even a sign at the firing range which reads: "Stop. You are" violating the joint administrative agreement between the U.S. and Japan by entering this area. Offenders will be apprehended and taken to the Japanese police for prosecution in accordance with this agreement." The Japanese woman whom Girare accidentally killed was therefor violating the agreement by trespassing in the first place. Girard was on guard duty against trespassers. Perhaps he should not have fired a blank cartridge to scare the violators away, but if so, surely this is a matter for his own military superiors to deter-

GRAY COUNTY Soil Conservation **District News** 

By JIM SMATHERS

Work Unit Conservationist During the past few years farmers in the Gray County SCD have been experiencing some drouth years in which very few crops have been made. Wind and water erosion has made itself known due to the lack of crop residues necessary for control of wind and water erosion. A number of farmers have made the remark that their fields did not have any gullies in them as long as they could grow good wheat, but with the dry years, and poor wheat crops, gullies have begun to show up. With the spring rains many bare fields were severly eroded,

Due to the spring rains that fell, a heavy crop of residue has been made with wheat, oats and barley. Harvesting of these crops is in full swing now and the task of plowing the stubble is beginning. Now is the time to save that stubble and to save the soil and any moisture that falls by practicing stubble mulch tillage.

Stubble mulching provides a cover to the land for protection against wind and water erosion, to conserve moisture, to intercept and reduce the impact of raindrops and break up the surface water film. permitting greater penetration, re duce pulverizd condition of the soil, permit surface decay of organic matter and reduce runoff, Also there is an increase in pro duction

The possible increase in insect infestion may be brought to the minds of some people. Work at experiment stations tells us that there is no significant increase in insects due to stubble mulch till-

Several types of equipment may be used for stubble mulch tillage but the subsurface sweep type equipment does the most efficient

job of stuble mulching. Save your stubble and save your

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
