belief on Capitol Hill that the oil shortage is primarily the work of U.S. petroleum companies rather than the Arab embargo

As a result, Congress is likely to be in what one source describes as a "punitive mood" when it returns from recess in a week and a half, and the oil industry could be in for a very tough time in

Several new laws that would deal major regulatory blows to the industry are under active consideration. Already in preparation are measures to force oil companies to disclose actual supply data they now consider top secret. impose excess profit taxes, and even put an absolute limit on profits.

One proposal would go so far as to change the industry's entire status to that of a public utility like a railroad or a telephone company.

Hostility toward the so-called "oil majors" stems from at least three factors, congressional sources say:

-Indications that current retail shortages of gasoline and heating fuel stem from oil companies withholding their products rather than any actual decline in supplies.

-New "historical" evidence on the oil companies' role not only in the Arab embargo. but in moving a substantial share of the U.S. oil industry itself overseas during the past decade.

Much of the fresh material on oil company operations has been developed by staff members of the Senate Interior and Foreign Relations committees, working for Sens. Henry Jackson, D-Wash., and Frank Church, D-Idaho, respectively.

Jackson has scheduled hearings in early February on the supply disclosure legislation, and Church's Multinational Corporations companies' influence on U.S. and foreign governments, perhaps as early as the end of

Some sources say the Church hearings are likely to produce "spectacular revelations" of behind-the-scenes finagling by the major oil companies both in the current crisis that began with the October war, and in the recent past.

Feeling is Growing

The feeling is growing on Capitol Hill, as one staffer puts it, that "there is a serious question whether the United States is really facing a

shortage of crude. "Where the pinch comes is in the ability to fulfill the normal increases in demand for refined products. Last year demand was up 10. per cent because of bigger cars and the economic

"This year it was supposed to go up 8 per cent before restrictions were imposed. But demand is off now from what it was expected to be, and that

such serious shortages that people have to wait in line and pay exorbitant prices.

Actually overall gasoline demand is off almost two per cent from a year ago-despite the fact there are more cars on the road-and demand for heating oil and jet fuel are off by 12 per cent, according to the latest API figures.

Indeed, refineries in the United States now are running at only 91.6 per cent of capacity according to Interior Department estimates.

With demand down and refineries running at less than emergency rates it is difficult, congressional sources say, to understand why shortages should be so intense.

They suggest the reason lies in the oil companies' desire for the kind of profits that can be produced by an artificial shortage. It is the U.S. a'l interests' concentration

The star witness of these hearings is said to be Edward Carey Sr., president of New England Petroleum and owner of one of the big Carbibbean refineries

Carey and other officials of his company have already been heard in secret sessions by the subcommittee, and are said to have given some "startling" information about the behavior of the major oil companies before, during and after the October war.

There is some speculation among sources that the Church subcommittee has evidence of a conspiracy to drive world oil prices up.

"If that is true," says a source involved with the oil investigations but not connected with Church, "the companies have made a major mistake. They don't know what they're doing.

"They'll maximize profits in the short run, but they'll get hurt in the long run.'





# FBI Smashed Mobsters And Rackets Despite Watergate

WASHINGTON - It is fact that the FBI so mocked and derided by devotees of the cult of personality of ex-special prosecutor Archibald Cox, did more than 90 percent of his investigatory work. The diggings were delivered to him

It is fact that FBI teams still are probing scores of contributions to both major 1972 presidential candidates - with the objectivity of a surgeon's scalpel. Thousands of special agents, operating out of 56 FBI headquarters, worked round the proverbial clock in '73 on what professionally is called an Watergate.

Yet, at the same time the Bureau sent some 1,250 mobsters, most Mafiosi, to federal penitentiaries. Which are some 250 more hoodlums than the previous year. And there are some 2,900 organized crime hit men, swindlers. security - theft specialists, even dons and capos now awaiting trial as a result of FBI

investigations Looting of scores of unions has been prevented or punished as a result of FBI evidence Extortion of banks, construction contractors, businessmen and labor leaders were headed off. Headaches from skull crackers and heartaches of workers. indentured by Mafia loan sharks, have been averted or

eased So it isn't sentimentality on the part of those of us who respect the FBI and its oft threatened agents that moves us to applaud the words of the FBI's "new" Director Clarence Kelley, which he wrote in his

year - end report: I commend these pages to those who express concern that well - chronicled events related to the Watergate investigation and other adversities have diminished the FBI's effectiveness, cast doubt upon its integrity and devastated employe morale. Those who have such doubts underestimate the character of career FBI employes, for these are men and women who truly believe the FBI is the finest investigative agency in the

world, and daily strive to make Kelley says there were 'unprecedented challenges" in 1973. They were handled quite successfully. It wasn't eady. His two interim predecessors, I do believe, had a tin - plate badge, skilled intellectual view of law enforcement. As a result of their cliche pseudo - liberal bias, several score almost irreplaceable FBI executives

were forced to quit. Nonetheless, the Bureau's special "desks" rolled up quite a 1973 score in behalf of legitimate business, labor and the public

# Red Spies Infiltrating U.S. In Record Numbers

By ROBERT S. ALLEN WASHINGTON - A leopard never changes his spots - and neither does the Kremlin.

Russia and its satellites are now engaged in more "intelligence collecting" in the U.S. than ever before.

That's the unqualified finding of the FBI - which has the statury responsibility of protecting the nation's internal security against espionage, treason, sedition, insurrection, rebellion and sabotage.

Says the FBI in a summary of liaison office opened in "Soviet Blec Intelligence" in

"Despite the bridge - building on diplomatic fronts, and publicized easing of tensions between the United States and Communist nations, FBI investigation showed no sign of any reduction in the combined intelligence effort being United States. conducted against the United States by Soviet bloc nations."

Key factor responsible for this menacing situation is the extraordinary increase in the number of Soviet - bloc personnel holding "official" positions in the U.S.

In the past five years, they have multiplied 44 percent. As of July 1, 1973, they numbered 1,296 - an increase

In addition, there were 1,390 dependents for an overall total of 2,686 Soviet - bloc personnel in the U.S. Asserts the FBI

"These individuals represent a tremendous reservoir of potential intelligence operatives for the Soviet - bloc intelligence services in the United States. Additional potential intelligence operatives may be found among the many Soviet - bloc official and unofficial visitors in the United States whose number is growing each year."

In addition to Russia, the Soviet bloc consists of Bulgaria. Czechoslovakia, East Germany, Hungary, Mongolia, Poland and Rumania. All are represented at the United Nations. Also, with the exception of East Germany and Mongolia, not yet recognized by the U.S., they have embassies in Washington and various other offices in this country. Official Spies

A considerable percentage of Soviet . bloc personnel in the U.S. are engaged, to put it baldly, in espionage

Officially, this activity is termed "intelligency collection." But actually, it amounts to spying and the FBI bluntly makes no bones about it. as follows:

FBI counterintelligence operations continue to identify a high and faily consistent percentage of Soviet - bloc personnel in the U.S. as intelligence officers or agents. Accordingly, the threat to the

Communist movement dominated by the Soviet Union As long as CPUSA is

subservient to the Soviet Union and supports its policies, it will constitute a threat to the security of the United States."

In the past several years, CPUSA has made strenuous efforts to improve its public image. But the indisputable fact remains, it is completely beholden to the Kremlin and its polities. Illustrative:

"CPUSA leaders frequently confer with Soviet leaders to receive policy guidance and CPUSA delegations travel to the Soviet to lend support to Soviet policies. For example: Gus Hall, CPUSA general secretary, accompanied by other party leaders, attended the 50th anniversary of the founding of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics in Moscow. While there. Hall met with leaders and representatives of the Communist parties of the Soviet Union and other countries.

As part of CPUSA's maneuvers to "gain respectability as a legitimate political party," it ran national and local candidates in the 1972 elections. Although Hall, the presidential candidate, got only around 25,000 votes (77 million were cast), he bombastically hailed the CPUSA campaign as "an historic achievement which will harvest political benefits for years to come.'



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

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

# Sunburn Leaves A Round

By G.C. THOSTESON, M.D. Dear Dr. Thosteson: My son, M, had a bad sunburn five years ago. It left him with a round mark the size of a quarter; and just as round, on his shoulder near the middle of his back.

This mark turns very white in inter, and in summer when he ets sun on it it turns very red and gets sore. Have you any what this could be?

-Mrs. O.L. I could guess, having seen ases quite similar. Let's start with what happens when you get a tan. The sun's rays incite cells in the skin to produce brown pigment (the tan) which is rotective.

But with a severe burn, these tan - producing cells can be destroyed. It is quite possible your son had had a blister at that spot where the skin stays white in winter.

Such a damaged area no longer has the ability to produce brown pigment, accounting for the whiteness in winter. But without this protective mechanism, the spot can burn in summer, turning red and getting pretty sore but not

The simplest solution, and

perhaps the only one, is to keep that spot covered when exponen to the sun in summer. One of the sun lotions containing a "sun screen" ingredient, to filter out most of the burning rays may be

odequate. Otherwise a small dressing to cover the spot could be used. Fastened with a flesh-colored adhesive patch, it wouldn't be

I know of no way of undoing that type of skin damage.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I had an abortion and had intercourse within the first six weeks, although my doctor advised me

my period no later than six weeks. It has been about ten weeks and I still have not started my period.

\* What are my chances of be pregnant again, and why are patients advised not to have intercourse during the six week period?

It is always possible that you ovulated within the six weeks period, and pregnancy could have occurred. I suggest you

check out this possibility.

The reason for the advice not to have intercourse within the six weeks period is to avoid possible infection. Also, the uterus may take six weeks to revert to normal after any pregnancy. Sometimes, the waiting period is less, but six weeks is the usual suggested period of abstinence.
