(Continued From Page One) [a] of the revolt but lost contact six miles to the northwest. Field dispatches reported 12 to 15 rebels killed near Firq.

The stronghold of Nizwa, some 80 miles inland from the capital of Muscat, fell to British and Muscat troops who had broken the back of the resistance in a skirmish at Firq.

In Cairo Sheikh Mohammed El-Harithy, representative of the rebel Imam, predicted continuous guerrilla warfare in the mountains. He said the war would continue despite the fall of Nizwa.

The Arab League political committee called a meeting in Cairo today to take action on a proposal to raise the Oman issue before the United Nations Security Council.

Some Arab states have accused Britain of "aggression" in heeding the Sultan's appeal for aid.

Reports from the front said the rebel leaders fled their capital Akhdar (Green Mountain) and Tanuf, headquarters of the dissident Sheikh Suleiman Bin Himyar. They were reported at Birkat Al Mauz, a village 10 miles to the west.

Also the Travis county grand jury at Austin, which took up the investigations where the legislative committees left off, will undoubtedly call Cagle in for a chat. No indictments in the ICT case have been returned yet by the Austin grand jury, which is still in session.

Criminal Charges There are also charges of embezzlement and theft and embezzlement against Cagle. One charges he used \$500,000 of ICT money to buy insurance stock without company authority and the other charges him with theft and embezzlement of \$100,000.

Two federal tax liens also await him in Dallas. One charges he and his wife, Dorcas, owe the government nearly \$125,000 in back taxes, and another, against Jack Cagle and Co., the control center for his empire, lists a debt of \$145,000 to the government.

Cagle gave Wade a pair of statements Saturday, which were believed to have direct bearing on the ICT case. Wade would not discuss them.

Civil Rights Groups Try "Selling" Bill

By LEE NICHOLS United Press Staff Correspondent WASHINGTON (UP) — Civil rights organizations are waging a grass roots campaign to "sell" GOP House members the Senate civil rights bill or something like it if it was learned today. They feel it is better than to risk no bill at all.

Reliable sources said leaders of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People labor groups and others are seeking to convince their local branches the Senate bill is a "pretty good bill" and in any case about the best that can get through Congress.

These sources said one reason the Senate bill is marking time in the House is to give this campaign a chance to take hold and translate itself into pressure on Republican House members who will play a key role in the fate of the rights fight.

They said efforts are being concentrated on selling the bill to Republicans from states like New York, New Jersey and Connecticut, where members up for election next year may face close fights and need Negro, liberal and labor votes to win.

Because of the stand of the civil rights groups the sources which are close to the congressional civil rights battle voiced guarded optimism Congress will pass its first rights measure in 87 years and send it to the White House. They were similarly hopeful President Eisenhower will sign it.

They did not think even sending the measure to a Senate-House conference committee will mean its doom, though conceding this might require more time for final action and subject the measure to the added hazard of Congress annual "urge to adjourn."

It was understood that polls have shown that any House vote on the bill would be close. Many members declined, in secret polls, to commit themselves for or against the legislation.

Sam Holds News Conference Rayburn made his statement to reporters at a news conference in his Capitol office.

He emphasized that the gas bill is "highly controversial."

"It has been decided," he said, "that it is not going to come up at this session of Congress."

To take it up this late in the session, he said, would be "unwise."

Rayburn declined to predict when Congress would adjourn. Aug. 24 has been set as a target date for the adjournment until January, but Rayburn told reporters that he has not settled on any precise date.

PM Quits In New Zealand

WELLINGTON, New Zealand (UP) — Prime Minister Sidney G. Holland resigned today because of ill health. He will be succeeded by Keith J. Holyoake, deputy prime minister and minister of agriculture.

Holland, 64, made the announcement at the annual conference of his Free Enterprise National Party, which has ruled New Zealand since 1949. The party is preparing for a tough general election campaign against the Labor Party.

Holland said his retirement will take effect at the end of the present campaign, probably in October. He said he will nominate Holyoake as head of the National Party Tuesday at a special caucus of the party's members of Parliament.

Party sources said Holyoake would take over the prime minister's duties Tuesday.

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposes an amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a section to be known as Section 49c of Article III, providing for the creation and sale of bonds of the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State; providing for the payment of such bonds; creating an agency to administer said fund and to perform other duties prescribed by law; limiting the period during which financial assistance may be granted; and providing for the selling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49c, as follows: "Section 49c. There is hereby created an agency of the State of Texas the Texas Water Development Board to exercise such powers as necessary under this provision together with such other duties and restrictions as may be prescribed by law. The qualifications, compensation, and number of members of said Board shall be determined by law. The board shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate in the manner and for such terms as may be prescribed by law.

The Texas Water Development Board shall have the authority to provide for issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The Legislature of Texas upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected Members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue additional bonds in an amount not exceeding One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The bonds hereinafter herein or permitted to be authorized by the Legislature shall be called "Texas Water Development Bonds" and shall be executed in such form, denominations and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as the Board finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

available upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe, to the various political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas including river authority, conservation and reclamation districts and district courts, or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 49 or Article III, Section 51, of this Constitution, interstate compact or commission, in which the State of Texas is a party and municipal corporations, in the conservation and development of the water resources of this State, including the control, storage and preservation of its streams and flood waters, and the waters of rivers and streams, for all useful and beneficial purposes, including improvement, extension, or construction of dams, reservoirs and other water storage projects, including any necessary for the transportation of water from storage to points of treatment and distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods.

"Any or all financial assistance provided herein shall be repaid with interest upon such term, conditions and manner of repayment as may be provided by law.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision or while any of the bonds that may be authorized by the Legislature under this provision, or any interest on any of such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, and otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Water Development Fund, and the interest and sinking funds established for the payment of bonds issued by the Texas Water Development Board, income from such investment shall be used for the purposes provided in this section by the Legislature. The Legislature may also make appropriations from the General Revenue Fund for the necessary administrative expenses of the Board.

"From the moneys received by the Texas Water Development Board, the principal of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this section sufficient moneys to pay the interest and principal to become due during the ensuing year and sufficient to establish and maintain a reserve in said fund equal to the average annual principal and interest requirements on all outstanding bonds issued under this Section. If any year prior to December 31, 1962 moneys are received in excess of the foregoing requirements then such excess shall be deposited to the Texas Water De-

velopment Fund, and may be used for administrative expenses of the Board and for the same purposes and upon the same terms and conditions prescribed for the proceeds derived from the sale of such State bonds. No grant of financial assistance shall be made under the provisions of this Section after December 31, 1962, and all moneys therefor received, as repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon, shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the State bonds, except that such moneys as may be required to meet the administrative expenses of the Board may be annually set aside and provided that after all State bonds have been fully paid with interest, as far there as on the date of the interest and sinking fund additional moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest on State bonds as received shall be deposited to the General Revenue Fund.

"All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"Should the Legislature enact existing laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature.

"The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, 1957, same being the 1st Tuesday after the 1st Monday in said November, 1957, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following words: "FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49c of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49c of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State."

"Sec. 2. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of the proper appropriation made by law.

Minister Preaches Despite Thug

MICHIGAN CITY, Ind. (UP) — A Methodist minister refused an armed ex-convict's demand for safe conduct to Michigan Sunday. The fugitive stole the minister's car and fled alone.

The Rev. Christian Kocher, 45, pastor of the First Methodist Church here, said a young man with black hair entered the parsonage through an open back door at 6:30 a.m. while the minister prepared his Sunday sermon. "The young man, Rev. Kocher said, was very nervous and demanded that the minister drive him to Michigan."

He told Rev. Kocher he was "so deeply involved" in crime that he was going to "shoot his way" to freedom. When Rev. Kocher refused to accompany him, the convict pulled a revolver from his jacket. "I told him I was going to deliver my sermon on time," Rev. Kocher told the United Press. "and that if he took a delight in shooting to go ahead."

The ex-convict, unidentified but known to Indiana police, took the keys to Kocher's 1954 automobile and drove off after an hour of pleas and threats. He said he would leave the car at Chicago. The minister delivered his sermon on schedule.

CHICAGO (UP) — Nathan Leopold, a partner in the "crime of the century" slaying of Bobby Frank in 1924, today pinned his hopes for freedom on a parole petition said to contain 16 new items of evidence.

Leopold has said in previous applications for freedom that Loeb was the leader in the crime. The new petition said that the trial judge, John R. Caverly, expressed the same view in a conversation with a Roman Catholic nun.
