





Those who have watched with amazement how President Eisenhower squarely straddles every issue are getting quite a chuckle out of a piece of writing which has been circulating the country of late. The author is unknown but he appears to be quite familiar with the expressions used by Eisenhower to avoid making a definite stand on any issue.

The piece is entitled "The Gettysburg Address as It Would Have Been Written by President Eisenhower.' It reads:

"I haven't checked these figures, but 87 years years ago, I think it was, a number of individuals organized a governmental setup here in this country, I believe it covered certain Eastern areas, with this idea they were following up based on a sort of national independence arrangement and the program that every individual is just as good as every other individual.

"Well, now, of course, we are dealing with this big difference of opinion, civil disturbance you might say, although I don't like to appear to take sides or name any individuals, and the point is naturally to check up, by actual experience in the field, see whether any governmental setup with a basis like the one I was mentioning has any validity, whether that dedication you might say by those early individuals has any lasting values.

"Well, here we are, you might put it that way, all together at the scene where one of the disturbances between different sides got going. We want to pay our tribute to those loved ones, those departed individuals who made the supreme sacrifice here on the basis of their opinions about how this setup ought to be handled. It is absolutely in order and 100 per cent O. K. to do

"But if you look at the over-all picture of this, we can't pay any tribute—we can't sanctify this area—we can't hallow, according to whatever individual creeds or faiths or sort of religious outlooks are involved, like said about this particular area. It was those individuals themselves, including the enlisted men, very brave individuals, who have given this religious character to the area. The way I see it, the rest of the world will never forget how these men put their shoulders to the wheel and carried this idea down the fairway.

"Our job, the living individuals' job, here is to pick up the burden and sink the putt they made these big efforts here for. It is our job to get on with the assignment and from these deceased fine individuals to take extra inspiration you could call it, for the same theories about which they did such a lot.

"We have to make up our minds right here and now, as I see it, they didn't put out all that blood, perspiration and-well-that they didn't just make a dry run here, that all of us, under God that is, the God of our choice, shall beef up this idea about freedom and liberty and those kinds of arrangemeits and that government of all individuals, by all individuals and for the individuals shall not pass out of the world picture."

BETTER JOBS

Why Prices Go Up And Up It is hardly necessary to give figures and statistics to show the cost of living in dollars is constantly increasing, that prices are higher and higher, that people have to give more dollars to satisfy a want. Those people who are living on interest or long . time contracts well realize what increasing prices are doing to

They do not seem to realize that anything that reduces the purchasing power of another person eventually reduces their real wages and security.

The Causes

If we are to stop the constant depreciation of the dollar, we must know why prices are going up. There are two primary causes for prices continuing to increase. They are:

Wages established by strikes or threats of strikes where the emploves get an increase due to the threat of a strike on a non-democratic market. That arbitrary wage increase has to be added on to the cost of the product. It is a part of the cost and the product cannot continue to be produced unless all costs are paid by the consumer. And the consumer is largely the wage earner, present or past. If wages were set where there was no interference with the democratic market, then 'jobs would be interchangeable and no worker for long could get a wage that pushed up prices.

The other primary cause of prices going up and up is taxes. What most consumers fail to see is that their direct taxes are only a small part of their taxes. They think because they only pay direct - local, state and Federal so much - that that is the cost of their taxes. What they do not see is that property taxes on business are a part of the cost and are added to the price the consumer pays. The consumer pretty well understands that he pays the sales tax, but he loesn't seem to understand that the corporation tax, in reality, is nothing

When the government takes a little more than 50 per cent of the profits, before taxes, then the corporation has to figure its prices so that it will have a little over twice as much profits before taxes as it could get if there were no corporation tax. And this extra price can be added to the cost of goods because all corporations have to pay a corporation tax. And it is well that the corsumer has to pay this corporation tax, because that leaves the corporation that much more profit to put back into the business in order to reduce costs and give better service to customers, as well as better jobs.

Of course, the government, when It gets in a position that it cannot directly tax enough to satisfy the majority of voters, has to print bonds and stuff them in the banks to increase bank deposits in order to give them more money to hand out. But this process of inflation - increasing the quantity of the medium of exchange - is just another form of taxation. It is especially a tax on the man who has a savings in the form of cred-

Of course any law, like a protective tariff, that gives any group a monopoly also causes prices to go up. But profits or wages secured on a pure democratic market cannot cause prices to go up. They tend, instead, to reduce real

prices If we could get more people to understand why prices continue to go up, then we might be able to

stop increases. To repeat, the primary cause of prices going up and up is wages set by threats of strikes or strikes and by taxation. And too few people see that such wages and spe cial taxes are ultimately paid by the consumer. What we need is education on these lines, and this newspaper would be glad to have its readers help throw light on

The Doctor Says By Edwin J. Jordan, M. D. RELIEF USUALLY AVAILABLE

TO VICTIMS OF HAY FEVER One of the most important of the allergies is hay fever result-

ing from the pollen of the rag-For a person susceptible to this

disorder, the best treatment is still attempted desensitization by injections of extract of the pollen. For those who have not had this treatment, or who obtain incomplete relief, other measures have to be considered. One such measure is to plan

a vacation for the worst part of the season in a place in which the ragweed pollen is absent, for several places in North America are available. There is practically no ragweed in the Pacific Northwest and northern California, and very little in southern California, Arizona and New Mexico. The Rocky Mountains have little ragweed, though ragweed grows in the plains just east of the mountains. Ragweed is scarce in parts of Florida, and there is a strip of territory in western and northern Maine away from the seaccast which is claimed to be free of this

For a list of communities and their ragweed pollen counts, I would refer readers to a pamphlet entitled "Hay fever and what you can do about it," published by the American Foundation for Allergic Diseases, Inc., 274 Madison Avenue, New York 16, N.Y. (price 10 cents).

For the person who stays at home, there are other measures to consider. One of these is airconditioning. particularly if the process includes washing or filtering the air as well as cooling it.

There also are drugs which help to relieve the worst symptoms. Those which have the most dramatic effects are the antihistamines which have been available for several years. These are taken by mouth.

They do not in any sense constitute a permanent cure but often bring striking relief of symptoms

for several hours at a time. It isn't entirely safe to take these antihistamines without direction. Unpleasant side effects have been found. Some people are made sleepy by some of the preparations and this can be dangerous in driving. Nevertheless, a great many people are tremendously helped by drugs and air conditioning and these measures have aided many thousands to survive the ragweed hay fever season much more comfortably than in the past.

Many people also get considerable relief by taking weak doses of pollen extract every day or so during the season. There are also drugs of the steroid class which are used with considerable benefit during the season.

HOW TO HELP FOREIGN NATIONS By GEORGE PECK

U. S. businessmen have been and are showing our give-away Federal Government just how America can really help the less fortunate and tavored nations of the world. Surely, by this time, it must be beginning to dawn on our generous legislators and bureaucrats that giving the hard-earned money of the American taxpayer to underprivileged nations has won us no friends-that, as a matter of fact, the reverse unfortunately has been true in all too many cases- America has lost friends, if not having sowed the seeds for outright enemies. In a sense, America has a bull

by the tail and is afraid to let go. As with an individual, so it is with a nation. Just let the donor discontinue dishing out and in the eyes of the former recipient, the former donor becomes the biggest "heel" in recorded history.

But while Federal Government has been messing up our relations with foreign nations by its mistaken policy of handouts, American businessmen have been making friends for us.

In 1946, the year following World War II, \$7.2 billion of U. S. investors' money was invested over the globe - just nine years later, at the end of 1955, this had grown to the almost unbelievable sum of \$19.2 billion.

American investors now have investments abroad as follows: Canada-\$6.5 billion, Latin America-\$6.7 billion, Western Europe -\$3.0 billion, Africa-\$774 million, India-\$96 million, Middle East-31 billion, Japan-\$126 million, tralia and New Zealand-\$536 mil-

lion and other areas-\$240 million. These investments abroad by American businessmen are not induced by hearts bleeding for the poor peoples of the world-they are made in the hope of making a profit. So far that hope is being realized - last year they earned a record \$2.8 billion, almost 15 percent on their direct foreign investments. This compares with 12.6 percent on their investments in

this country. Now, of course, there has been some slight grumbling in some of these countries where American industries have built plants, the usual charge of Yankee imperialism, but for the most part the American dollar has been welcomed with open arms and profits thereon have not been begrudged. As a matter of fact, a number of foreign countries have even set up organizations whose one purpose is to persuade American

business to build additional plants in their countries. The benefits of American dollars to these countries go far beyond the immediate employment of their citizens. A considerable portion of raw materials and supplies is purchased within these countries, thus helping to further

increase employment and payrolls.

Then, also, in addition to creating employment, American investments provide vital foreign exchange to these dollar-hungry nations. Many of them sell in the U. S., the goods produced with these funds. In 1955, for instance. nearly 25 per cent of this nation's \$11.5 billion in imports was for things produced in foreign plants built by American capital. Of course, there are haz-ards connected with investments

abroad which do not pertain to investments here at home. Chief of these are: threat of expropriation, unstable governments, currency problems, export-import restrictions and shortage of skilled labor. Stanley C. In 1934, the early phase of the new deal, Irving Brown had an article in Lovestone's political The American Way journal called the Revolutionary Socialist Review, "A Quarterly Devoted to Marxiam Socialism.

Brown wrote: "We reaffirm that the task of Marxian socialism is to establish the idea of the dictatorial essences within class society and to estimate the objectives of socialism on the basis of the clss oppositions involved."

This gibberish is typical of Dubinsky's chief henchman for the overseas jurisdiction. However, it shows, if nothing else, that this quavering fourflusher, brandishing gingerbread sword on a candy orse, is a disciple of Marx, an alien Communist force opposed to the American method and principle. I so describe Brown because his poor, tremulous hulk almost fell out of his chair when I walked into a conference room at the Wendell Willkie Memorial dump on West 40th Street a couple of years ago, and asked "Which one of you is Brown?" He had about 25 European union stiffs arrayed around him and I gathered that his conduct made a poor impression on them,

His press agents had been holering up his battles on the ramparts in the ports of France, but he cast his gaze down at the floor and wouldn't open his big mouth on this occasion. His chief organ of ballyhoo is the Reader's Digest, but the Digest puts him over in vague general terms, never stooping to convincing particulars about his fights with the Reds of Europe.

Although Brown's bloviation in the revolutionary socialist review can on and on, that one excerpt is the only intelligible blurt in the whole mess. However, the surrounding stuff contains some damning expressions as follows:

"Permanent peace can com . for the workers only after capitalagainst imperialist wars through propaganda, demonstrations, organizations and strikes in key war industries, including forcible stoppage of munition shipments by workers and united fronts with all anti-war groups regardless of political beliefs.

The Lovestone program, explained by his own revolutionary policy committee, contained this: 'We are glad to claim to be as Communistic as the Communist manifesto, the great heritage of the Communist and genuine socialist movements. The committee differs from the Communist party of the USA on four major points."

Three of those "points" were aw-breaking jargon signifying nothing. The fourth point was that Lovestone wanted to run his own insurrection against the American nation, subject to no interference from Moscow.

Brown at that time was described in the prefatory rubbish of Lovestone's "Revolutionary Socialist Review" as "instructor in workers' education classes of the International Ladies Garment Workers Union.

But the Reader's Digest and other eager believers in the apostasy of Lovestone and Brown have insisted that Dubinsky's political stuff is unerringly anti-communist. am too dumb to understand how Dubinsky could employ as a political educator for his subjects a savant belonging to a party claiming to be "as Communistic as the Communist manifesto."

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
