Seed Grass Is Booming As Top O' Texas Farm Product

The farm economy of Gray County has been given a boost during recent years by the growing of grass for the purpose of selling seed.

One of the pioneers in growing grass seed in Gray County is Quentin Williams of Pampa. In 1948 he was instrumental in the planting of about 50 acres of Weeping Lovegrass on the Peb Everett farm east of McLean. The following year additional acreage on the Everett farm was planted in Sand Lovegrass, Blue Panic, Indian Grass, Blackwell Switch, Canada Wild Rye and Crested Wheat.

This grass was planted on land that had not been producing paying crops. After the grass was established, the production of seed began, with the Weeping Lovegrass making the best production.

"On dry land farms the average yield of seed is around 135 pounds per acre," Williams said.

Since the first planting of grass for seed production, the McLean area is becoming widely known as the leading pasture grass seed producing area in this part of the county.

Other Gray county farmers who are producing seed in the McLean area are: Truitt Johnson, James Mazon and Leroy Williams.

At the present time, Williams is producing grass seed on approximately 480 acres in the McLean vicinity with Weeping Love, Sand Love, Indian and Blackwell Switch the best producing grasses.

During recent years, most of the grass seed producing land has been placed under irrigation with Weeping Love producing from 200 to 225 pounds of seed per acre. The larger amount of production is accomplished with the application of 200 pounds of 33 per cent

ammonium nitrate to the acre.

This year an experiment to determine whether or not grass would produce seed in the northern part of Gray County was made by Williams.

On May 31 of this year about 10 acres of certified El Reno Side-Oats Grama and 2 1/2 acres of registered Caddo Switch grass were planted by Williams on the Wood Osborne farm about nine miles northeast of Pampa. These two plots were fertilized with aqua ammonia on July 15.

Both plots have been irrigated, with some section receiving more water than others, and the grass is now ready for harvest. It is unusual for grass to produce enough seed for harvest during the first year, with most growers being contented with the establishing of the grass during the first year.

An additional nine acres of El Reno Side-Oats Grama were planted by Williams on the Bill Stockstill farm on July 10, but this planting was too late to make a seed crop.

In addition to receiving several hundred dollars per acre for the seed, the grass also provides pasture for cattle. This pasture is in addition to hay that is cut from the grass after the seed is harvested, Williams said.

The seed is used by ranchers to provide better pasture for cattle.

In sandy soil the longer grasses are very suitable but on the plains, where the soil is finer, the shorter types are the only ones that do well.

With the use of the grasses, produced from the seed, ranchers can average about 150 pounds of beef per acre in the McLean area, whereas the average in the remainder of the area should be about 100 pounds of beef to the acre, Williams said.

The increased production is more than twice the average production from native grasses.

With the use of irrigation, the production of seed is meaning money in the bank for farmers from land that normally would not produce other crops.

Where Will 'Sputnik' Fall? Right On Taxpayer's Pocket

WASHINGTON (UP)—Speculation may as well cease about where the Red Sputnik will fall, when it falls.

The Red Sputnik will fall upon and flatten the United States taxpayer's pocketbook, flatten that already-flat pocketbook even flatter.

No one in the administration is complacent about that, although, from President Eisenhower down, the evidence is in that the lid of government spending is likely to be blown off again. Blown off and away with the lid surely would be any chance of tax reductions soon or, maybe, ever in the lifetimes of the very young.

Likewise may be blown away such progress as has been made under the Republican Eisenhower administration toward continued sequence of balanced budgets. And, blown, too, will be such opportunity as may be offered to check

and control inflation by the reduction of government expenditures. Too Much Credit Given?

The foregoing seems to be about what may be expected as the political impact of Sputnik, which the Russians hoisted into the sky before the United States put its own little moon in orbit. It probably would give the Kremlin too much credit for craft and cunning to assume that the Communist high command planned it that way.

It is a fact, however, that an axiom of the Communist creed as stated by Lenin and some of his successors was that the democracies had a built-in, self-destroying weakness which was that democracies in a free society must spend themselves to death. True or not, that is what the Communists believe.

President Eisenhower, in his Oct. 9 news conference, told how the scientists had come to him for \$22 million, then \$66 million and,

finally, \$110 million for the U.S. satellite project—and that he always had provided what they asked.

"There never has been one nickel asked for speeding up the program," he said firmly when pressed for the reasons why the Russians got their satellite into orbit first, and, he added:

He Did All He Could

"I have provided to the limit of my ability the money that they (the scientists) asked for and that is all I can do."

The scientists took the hint. The United Press reported in midweek that the President conferred with his top financial adviser after hearing scientists plead for more missile money.

There is congressional clamor for missile-satellite speed-up. The cost will be very great. It will be piled on top of the 5 billion dollars already being spent annually for military research and development.

There is evidence of political and public pressure on the administration to get into an all-out scientific achievement race with the Soviet Union, however great the cost.

Sputnik gave U.S. national defense a mighty booster shot.

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Truman Hits GOP Policies

KANSAS CITY, Kan. (UP)—Former President Harry S. Truman Friday rapped Republican budget, farm, and foreign policies.

Speaking to Democratic leaders from 13 Midwestern states, the former Chief Executive sounded the battle cry, calling for a Democratic crusade to "put the country back where it belongs" in 1960.

The delegates would up the two day conference by adopting a resolution condemning the action of Arkansas Gov. Orval Faubus in calling out the National Guard, and the failure of President Eisenhower to "use the full prestige of his office to support the decision of the Supreme Court prior to the Little Rock crisis."

Two other resolutions condemned the Eisenhower-Benson farm program for what it called a decrease in farm income and Mr.

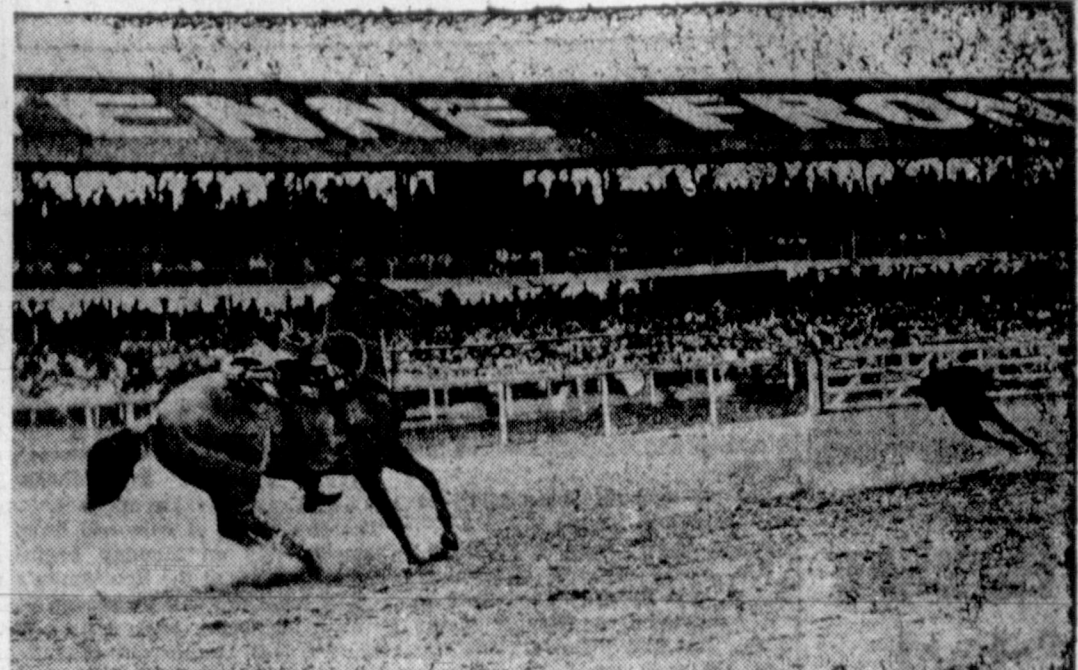

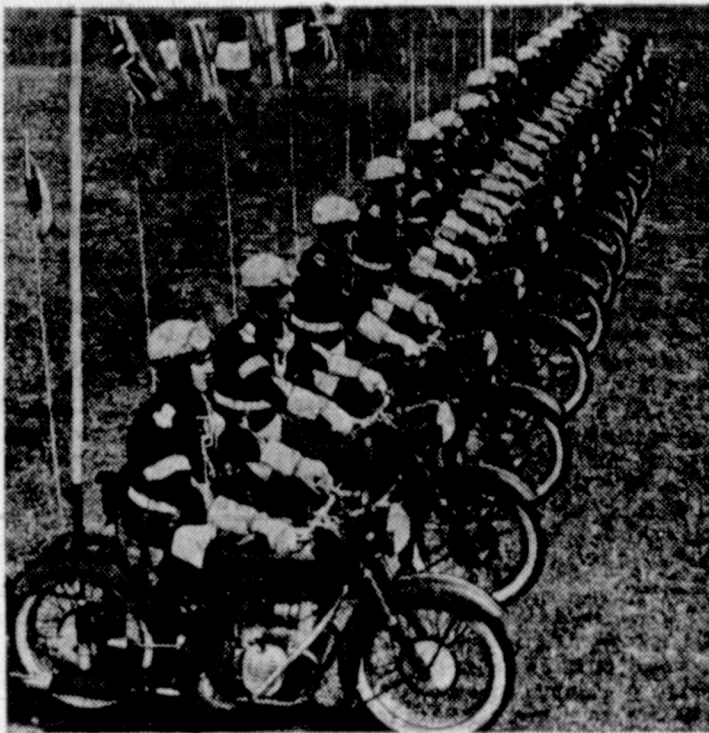

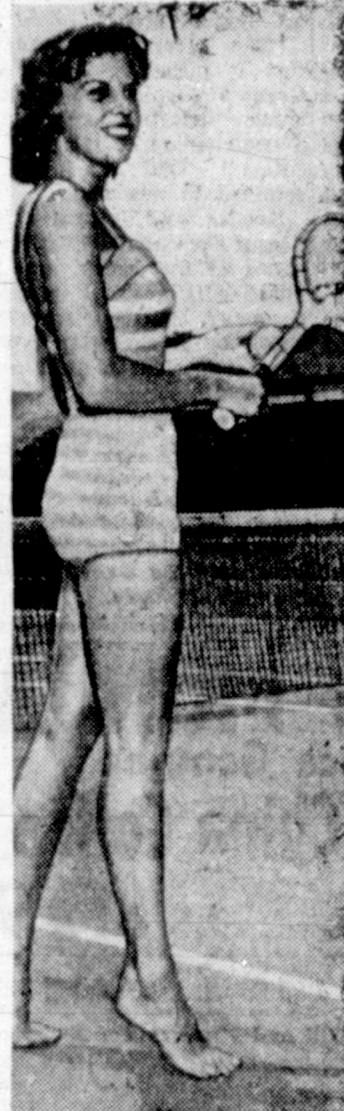

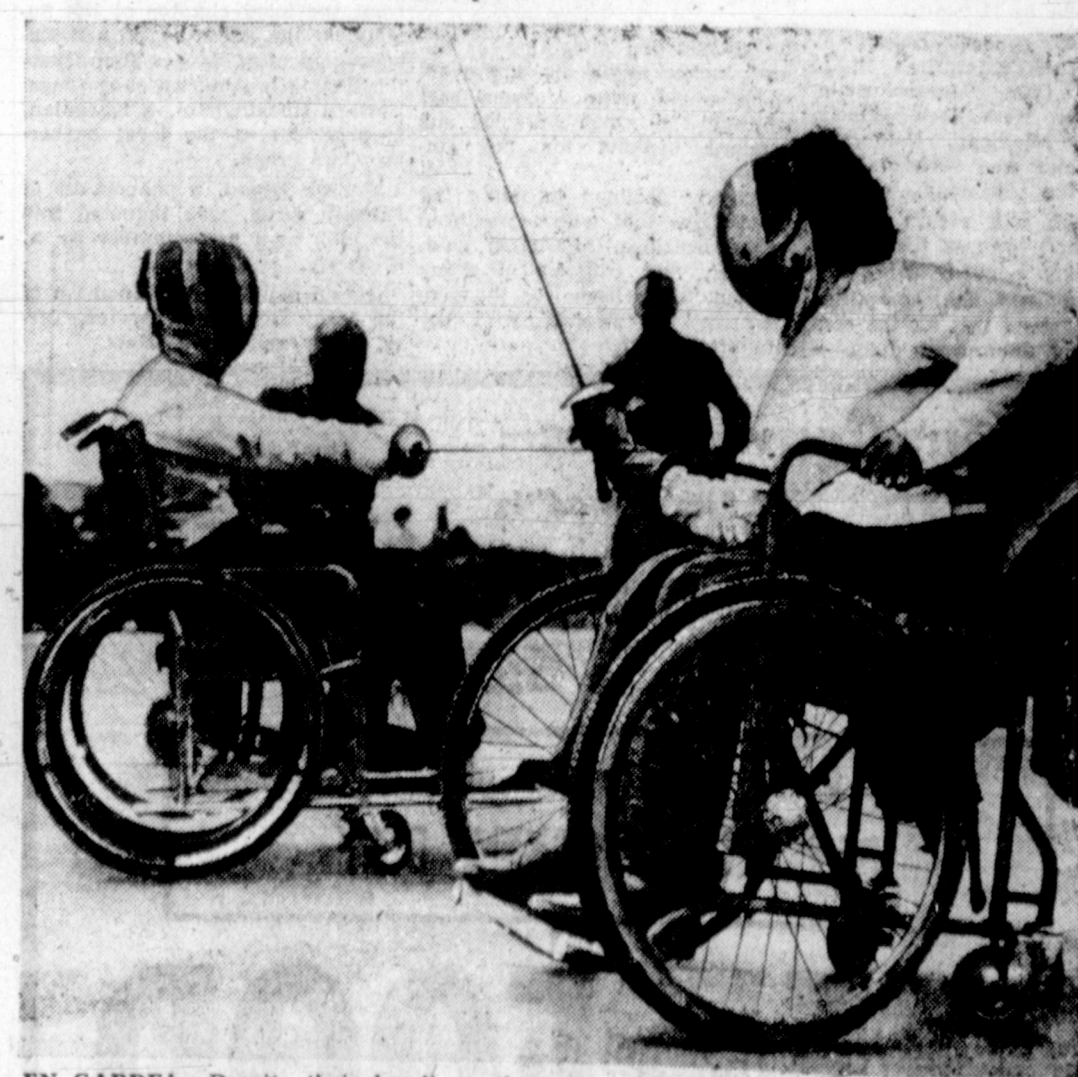

Pair Say Revivals Are 'Fad'

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (UP) — A Roman Catholic priest and a Jewish scholar have agreed that the current "religious revival" in America is more a fad than a faith.

The Rev. Francis X. Curran of Loyola Seminary at Shrub Oak, N. Y., and Dr. Will Herberg of Drew University, Madison, N. J., spoke Friday at a symposium at Notre Dam University on "Roman Catholicism and the American way of life."

Father Curran said religion is "more popular than it has been for a generation . . . but the revival has little to do with religion. There is little indication that the revival of religion has had any important effect upon membership in the Catholic church."

"The 1,750,000 American converts to Catholicism since 1940 can be attributed, not to a religious revival, but to the lessening of anti-Catholic prejudice and the greater presence and prestige of Catholicism," he said.

Herberg said the U.S. is "in the

grip of a great religious boom without precedent in modern times."

But he added that "the very same people who are so unanimous in identifying themselves religiously do not hesitate to acknowledge that religion is quite peripheral to their everyday lives."

Russia Built Propaganda Offensive During Last Week

The week's good and bad news on the international balance sheet:

Soviet Russia built up a violent and dangerous propaganda offensive this week against the United States and its ally Turkey. The campaign was based on the allegation that the United States and Turkey were plotting an attack on Syria. Syria, now being armed by Russia and controlled by pro-Russian elements, lent its

support. Russia invoked every medium of publicity to air its charges. Nikita S. Khrushchev, acting in his capacity of first secretary of the Central Committee of the Russian Communist Party, addressed a letter to the socialist parties of seven West European countries asking them to help "prevent aggression and preserve peace in the near and Middle East." Secretary of State John Foster Dulles warned in turn that if Russia attacked Turkey, the United States would retaliate against

Russian territory. The generally grim international picture was lightened by the arrival of Queen Elizabeth II of Great Britain and her husband Prince Philip on a visit to Canada and the United States. From Canada, the Queen and the prince flew to Virginia to attend a festival commemorating the 350th anniversary of the founding of Jamestown in 1607 of the first permanent English settlement in America. They then flew to Washington, and a triumphal reception, to be guests of President and Mrs. Eisenhower. France's cabinet crisis, still unresolved after nearly three weeks, was complicated by a surge of labor unrest. Electricity and gas workers

struck for 12 hours throughout the country and nearly paralyzed it. Homes, office buildings, factories were without light, heat or machine power. All electrically-driven transport was idle, including the Paris subways. President Tito of Yugoslavia shocked and angered the West German government by recognizing the East German Communist puppet regime. West Germany had threatened to break relations with any country which recognized East Germany. It now was considering whether to make good the threat by breaking relations with Yugoslavia. 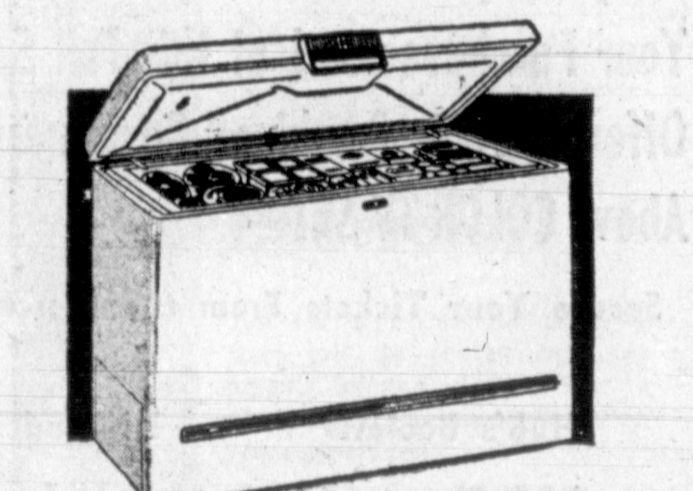

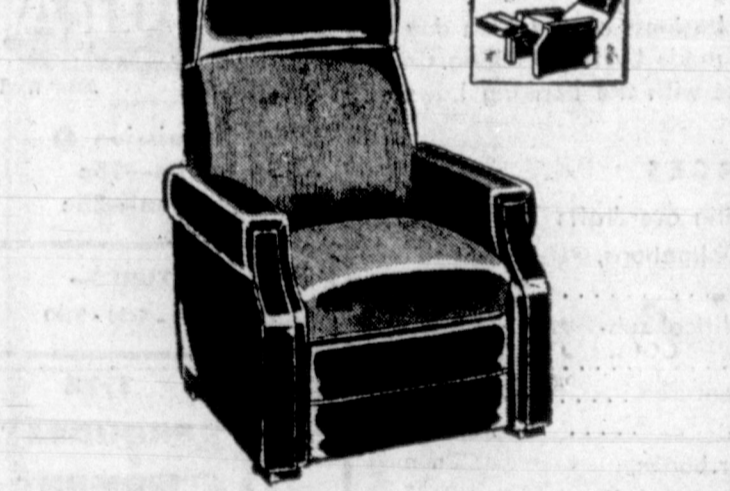

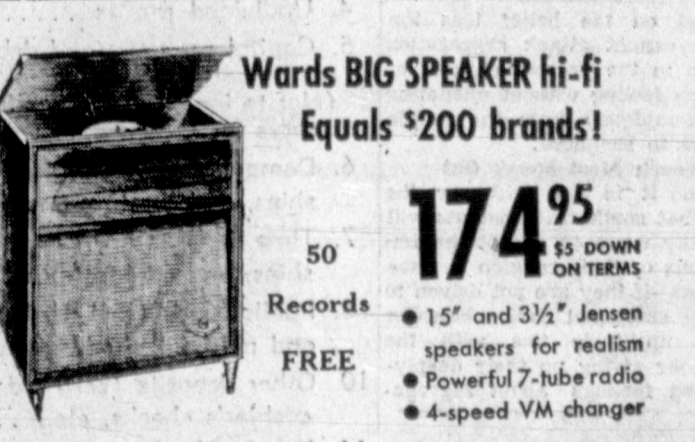

Racial Problems Test For Churches

WASHINGTON (UP) — "The churches of America are being weighed and tested by their response to racial segregation. If they remain in the rear in the struggle for justice, they may cease to be the living church of Christ through which God speaks and acts."
 These are the words of the Rev. Dr. Clifford J. Earle of Philadelphia, executive secretary of the Social Action Department of the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. He must believe them strongly, for he said them at a place and time where they were not easy to say—in the pulpit of a Presbyterian church at Little Rock, Ark., early this month.

Advocates of the prophetic approach believe that the church must speak out on segregation today in the same bold, uncompromising voice that the prophets of ancient Israel used in denouncing the social evils of their day.
 To count the cost of such a stand, they say, is unworthy of a body whose founder followed his own convictions to a cross.
 This viewpoint is more common—and easier to expound—in northern pulpits. But it has also been eloquently expressed by a southern minister.
 "Churches must recognize the urgent necessity of taking a forthright stand on this crucial issue," he said. "Christians must decide whether they will obey the eternal demands of the almighty God, or whether they will capitulate to the transitory demands of the defendants of segregation."
 The author of that statement, Dr. Martin Luther King, knows how much it will cost any southern clergyman who takes his advice. His own home was bombed last year when he led the Negroes

H.L. Case First White Child Born In Pampa

Harland L. Case is perhaps the only true native in Pampa today. He was the first white child born in this city in what was the Old Schneider Hotel. At that time it was a boarding house known as the Holland House and was located where the Pampa Motel is now.

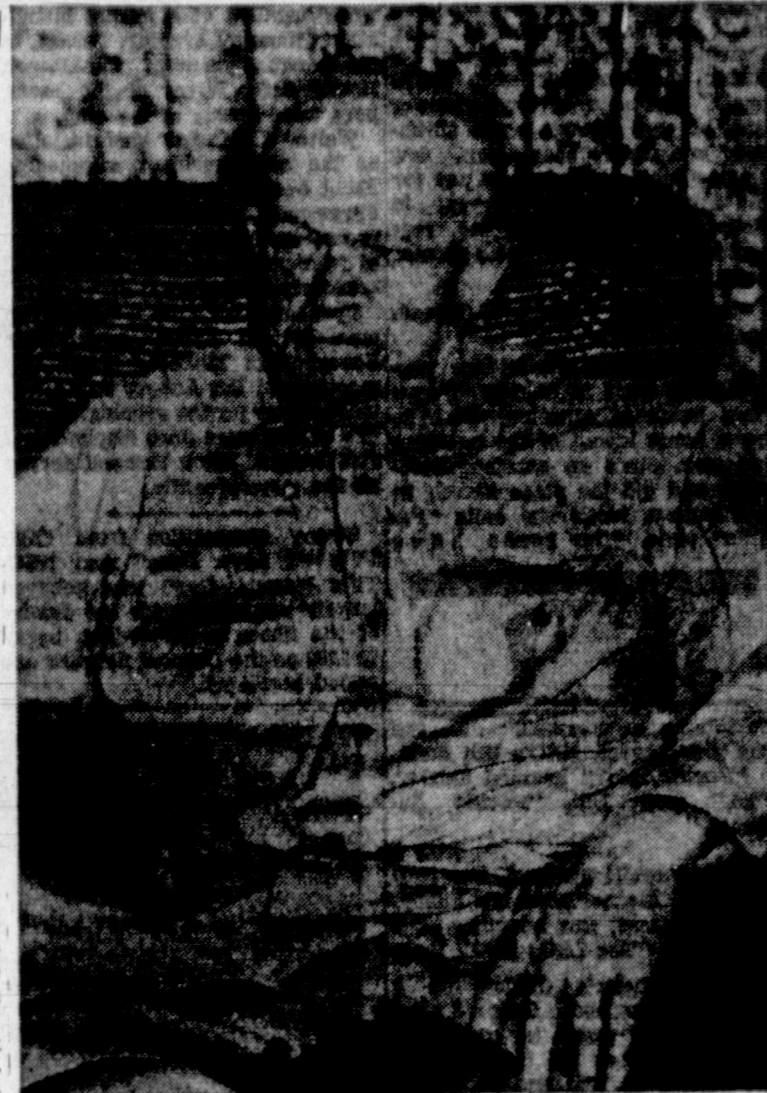
Harland's father, S. C. Case, and his brother-in-law, T. V. Lane, came to Pampa in 1888 and '89 when the railroad came through this territory. Lane was section foreman over the "east end" and Case was in charge of the "west end" of the line.

In 1889, Case sent for his wife and daughter and when they arrived in Pampa it was after dark. Mrs. A. A. Tiemann, Harland Case's sister, who was a small child when she arrived in Pampa, stated that she has heard her mother say that when they got off the train, there was no light to be seen anywhere. Finally, a small light was sighted by Mrs. Case and it was her husband holding a kerosene lantern to light their way to the dugout that served as a home for the Lanes. No other persons resided in Pampa at that time.

When the White Deer Land Company came into Pampa, it built offices, and a section house for the railroad and Pampa began to grow.

In 1898, a ranch house was built where the Pampa Hotel is now located, and the Cases lived there for a time.

Harland and his sister went to school in Canadian until 1903 when the first school house in Pampa was built. The Central Baptist Church is now located on the site

of the old one room school which served until the Red School House that is still standing on the yard of the Jr. High School grounds was built. It was necessary for the family to live in Canadian in the winter months in order for the children to go to school before the first school here was built.

Harland's aunt came from Wichita, Kans. to teach in that first school. Mrs. Edith Townsend was teaching school in Pampa before the school became a recognized school in the state of Texas.

In 1902 the White Deer Land Company opened the lands for sale and Case says he remembers when the first store was built in Pampa that year. J. F. Johnson of Canadian built a business es-

tablishment where the M. E. Moses store is now located.

In 1908 the first Methodist Church was built at the end of Foster St. (now the corner of Foster and Starkweather).

The Cases had built a home in 1903 and bought 60 acres where the Magnolia yards are now situated and Harland continued through school in Pampa, and graduated in 1914.

Mrs. L. L. Allarr backed J. M. Smith and put in the first newspaper, known as the "Pampa County Court House, Junior High School building, the American Legion Hall and several other establishments in Pampa.

Case is now doing finishing work in homes and resides with his wife, Corinna at 2210 Williston.

Case and his sister, Mrs. Tiemann, have truly seen Pampa grow from a railroad camp to a ranching center, and finally into one of the larger oil centers of the Southwest.

"It is truly amazing," states Case, "to watch the growth of a city like Pampa from its very beginning."

Several buildings in Pampa are standing evidence of the things he has offered to this city. Case directed the construction of the County Court House, Junior High School building, the American Legion Hall and several other establishments in Pampa.

Walter Rogers Reports:

Lot Of Research Is Being Done On Automobile Safety

TRAFFIC SAFETY

Much information is being gathered together at the present time by a Congressional Committee in the hope that some solution may be found to the tragic traffic problem that confronts this nation. This problem is one that takes approximately 43 thousand lives each year and leaves between a million and a million and a half citizens of this country maimed or injured.

Research has commenced on several fronts. The automobile manufacturers are doing much of it themselves in an effort to provide a safer package within which the occupant is conveyed from one point to another. This includes the new safety steering wheel, sometimes called the deep dish wheel. This is intended to provide a cushioning effect on the chest in the event of collision so that the body may be stopped before it is punctured by the steering post.

Another safety feature is new type door latches which will prevent the door from opening on impact. This feature was installed because statistics reveal that your chances for survival, if you remain in the car, were more than 5 to 1 and your chances of escaping a moderate fatal grade injury were more than 2 to 1. Another safety feature is the padded dash board or instrument panel and padded sun visors. It is estimated that about 38 per cent of passenger injuries in the right or center front seat position result from striking the rear view mirror.

The proposed safety device which has probably received more attention and research than any of the others is the seat belt. This device has been the subject of quite

a bit of controversy. The extensive tests which have been conducted reveal that the chances of escaping injury in an accident are improved about 60 per cent if you are wearing a seat belt. However, none of the automobile manufacturers have made seat belts standard equipment on their cars.

During the hearings held in the vicinity of the automobile manufacturing plants I noticed that not many of the cars, personal and otherwise, used in and around these plants were equipped with safety belts. Those who have engaged in the safety belt research feel that it is most important that all cars be so equipped. Whether or not this will be done I do not know, but I do know that the present estimate of the cost of installing seat belts in the front seat of automobiles at the factory is approximately \$13.00.

This means that if 6 million cars are manufactured next year and seat belts are installed in the front seats, the total cost of these cars will be increased 78 million dol-

ars. Whether or not these safety devices and others will solve the problem is conjectural but one thing is sure. According to past statistics some 43 thousand people will lose their lives on the highways of this nation in 1957.

There will be over 1 1/2 million people injured, over 100 thousand of them permanently. There will be over 10 million motor accidents. And the monetary cost will approximate 5 billions of dollars. Some years ago a wit made the statement that the most dangerous thing about an automobile was the "nut that held the steering wheel". Statistics will prove this remains as true today as when it was said. Reduction of speed and constant attention and alertness would do more to solve this traffic problem than all of the safety devices put together.

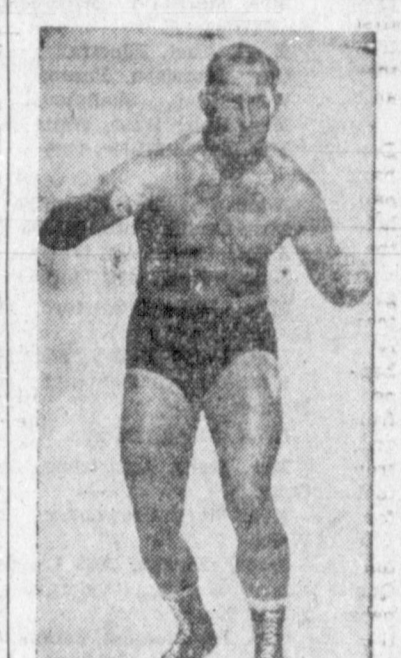

Amendments Discussed At Altrusa Club By League Of Women Voter's Members

Mrs. W. A. Breining and Mrs. C. E. Axelson, organizational chairman for the League of Women Voters, were guest speakers at the Monday luncheon of the Altrusa Club in the Pampa Hotel. The topics for discussion were the three amendments, which will be voted upon at the Texas Special election to be held on Nov. 5.

The policy of the League of Women Voters, a non-partisan organization, founded in 1920, does not support or oppose any political party or candidate. Its purpose is to promote political responsibility through informed and active participation of citizens in government.

Copies of the Voter's Guide, which gives in detail the stated amendments and the arguments for and against, may be secured from members of the League. In brief, here is the resume of Mrs. Breining and Axelson's presenting the arguments against.

Amendment one relates to the State Employees Retirement System. Mrs. Breining (pro): "No present taxes would be required. A better retirement system is needed to secure and retain well-qualified personnel for the State. An inadequate retirement plan handicaps efficient operation of the government."

"This will be a more nearly adequate retirement plan based on the employee's most productive years. Benefits based on the best 5 years of an employee's last ten years takes into consideration all of the promotions that the employee has received in his years of service."

Mrs. Axelson (giving the other side): "Removing the limit on annual employee contributions would work a hardship on those employees already having a difficult time making ends meet. The young family man, particularly, needs a few more dollars and this plan would tie up too much of his pay in a retirement system. Not every employee is at his best during his last ten years of service. His retirement pay should not be based on the job he holds at the end of his service."

"Many employees who would be contributing more to the retirement system with the removal of this additional amount for their own private investments." Amendment II relates to the State Welfare Program. This amendment would change the present state welfare program in two ways: 1) the ceiling on the maximum monthly assistance payment from state funds to needy citizens over 65 raised from \$20 to \$25 provided that no payments over \$21 would be made from state funds unless the additional amount is matched by the Federal Government; and 2) the total amount of state funds available for assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children would be increased from \$42 million to \$47 million per year.

Mrs. Breining (pro): "We have a moral obligation to care for the less fortunate. This increase will help these three needy groups to cope with the problem of trying to stretch a too small pension to cover the constantly rising cost of living."

"Texas ranks 38th in the average amount of its old age assistance payments. The payments range from \$5 monthly to \$58 with an average of slightly more than \$45. As small an increase as \$2 is certainly justified." The additional \$4 authorized for State payments if the Federal Government increases its participation will permit a future raise in old age pension checks without burdening the taxpayer with another costly general election to amend this section of the Constitution again." Mrs. Axelson, presenting the side who op-

pose this amendment said: "Texas is one of the top five among the states in total appropriation for old age assistance, a very commendable standing."

"A state with as many resources and as much pride in its accomplishments as Texas should be able and willing to give its needy citizens adequate pensions without looking to the Federal Government for any assistance. State payments should not depend on the availability of Federal Aid." "The State should only provide funds for needy aged, needy blind, and needy children when it is shown that their next of kin are not capable of caring for them. Some financial responsibility should be placed on the next of kin under our pension plans as is the case under the laws of many of our sister states."

Amendment III on Water Development: Mrs. Breining (pro): "Future growth and progress of this State is dependent on the conservation and development of our water resources. This plan to assist communities and districts which otherwise would not be able to finance conservation and development projects is a step in the right direction toward solving our acute water problem. It opens the door for state wide water planning and conservation."

"The enabling Act contains proper safeguards to prevent misuse of State assistance. Subdivisions receiving assistance from the Funds would be required to pay for construction in partial payments as the work on the project progresses, with the final 10 per cent to be paid on after the board of Water Engineers has certified that the work done under the contract has been completed and performed in a satisfactory manner and according to sound engineering principles and practices."

Mrs. Axelson (con): "Since funds from the State would be available only if the project cannot be financed without State assistance, this Act would drive agencies to the Federal Government for aid which is easier to get. Such increased dependency on Federal aid encourages further Federal encroachment upon our States' rights."

"If a subdivision could not finance a project through private sources, or the Federal Government then the question arises as to the soundness and feasibility of the project. Restricting State Assistance to projects which cannot be fully financed any other way would seem to limit the number of projects, too greatly for this amendment to accomplish enough in the way of water conservation and development to make it worthwhile."

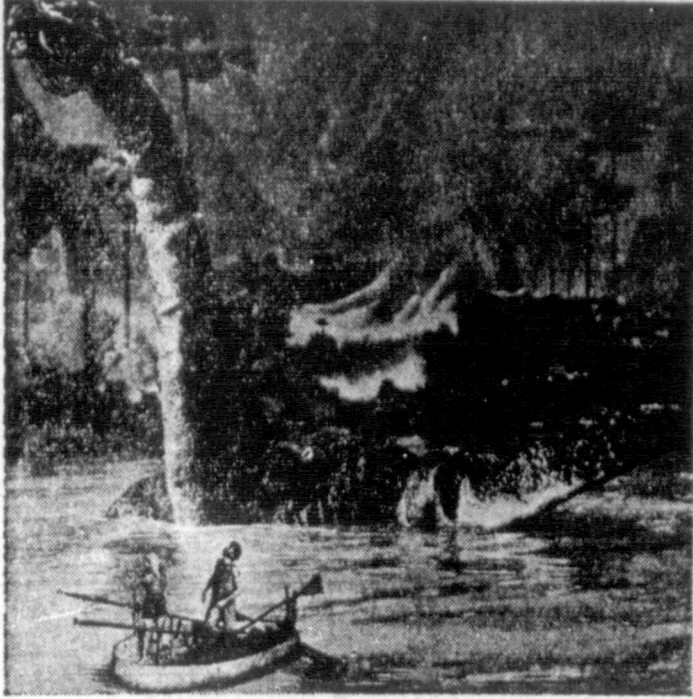
