

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

Answer To Sputnik

We have recently enjoyed reading a book which is

It is called "Science and the Planned State" from the pen of John R. Baker, a British subject. The book is distributed in this country by Messrs. Macmillan and was published in London in 1945.

The book, not a large one, and easily read, sheds the Kremlin's minor moon.

There is at the moment a general tendency in this some most timely light on the current lunacy respecting country to conclude that all Russians are super-scientists; that we must ourselves immediately triple the income taxes in order to make ourselves more scientific; and that generally we must embrace the planned state since the Russians clearly have done so well with theirs.

This hobgoblin of fantasy is easily chased up a tree by Mr. Baker, who holds an M. A., D. Phil., and D. Sc., and has been a lecturer in Zoology at Oxford

We heartily recommend his thought-provoking analysis of what is wrong with science when it joins in wedlock with totalitarianism.

There are three major points to Mr. Baker's argument against this marriage. He begins by listing them as virtually assured tenets of collectivist philosophy.

They are: 1. The fallacy that science exists to serve the material wants of man. 2. The fallacy that central planning makes for efficiency, and that scientists have a duty to press for scientific centralization. 3. The fallacy that scientists must become politically activated and endeavor to follow a party line in their research

He begins his refutation by showing that there is a profound difference between a scientist and a technician. The scientist is the man with the idea. He works to discover truth, not because the truth when discovered will necessarily be useful, but rather because the true scientist is motivated to find truth for its own sake. The technician, on the other hand, is a secondary

functionary, who takes the ideas discovered and developed by the scientist and seeks to apply them in some practical manner, if they can be so applied. The one is a savant, a way-shower, a pioneer. The other is a factory worker, a piecemeal manipulator who has the same relation to scientific discovery that an intern has to a skilltul surgeon

Having thus divided the general lexicon of the lay person into a pair of segments, he demonstrates with a most learned and documented dissertation the fact that science does not bloom or flourish under technological controls. It is utterly foolish to presume that the scientist can have his work planned for him by an autocracy. The scientist, he shows, must have total freedom of inquiry. The scientist truly does not know where the path he is following may lead. He only knows that he must follow it to the end that truth may be learned, whether anything useful or pragmatic can result or no.

And as we think of the Russian Sputnik and the consternation its advent has had upon the American mind, against the background of his argument, then we can truly assess the value of the whirling sphere and seek to understand whether or not it was a scientific achievement, or a technological development.

What have the Russians discovered scientifically respecting an artificial moon? Our answer is nothing. The original idea of rocket flight was born in the mind of the great English scientist, Sir Isaac Newton, who stated the basic law: 'For every action, there is an equal and opposite reaction."

For the application of this law to rocket flight, we turn to the German development of the V-2 during the closing days of World War II. For the idea of a series of rockets riding tandum and firing in turn, we look to American science which used originally one of the captured V-2's as the first stage booster for a WAC Corporal rocket developed by the U. S. Army.

Technically, the Russians may have put up the first moon. But the science on which it rides was worked out, in all cases, by scientists from other countries, free to a large measure from the totalitarian controls of the Krem-

And as for Sputnik, itself, scientifically it is more a curiosity than a working model. First of all, it failed to achieve the height the Russians hoped for. Secondly, it failed to provide any details as it hurtled about the earth. Third, it failed to establish an orbit and has continued to toss itself about this old globe like a piece of yarn in a completely haphazard and undignified manner. We'll take our stand right alongside of John Baker.

We don't think the Russians have done much of anything, except from a propaganda standpoint. And so long as Russian remains a totalitarian country, we don't think it will accomplish much of anything.


