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

CHRISTIAN LOVE AND MARRIAGE


Often unhappiness in marriage is caused by the fact that one or both of the partners is not getting out of the marriage those satisfactions that he or she had been led to expect. As lovers, each may have idealized the other into a perfect being, with whom union would assure perfect happiness. After a few years, or sometimes months, the perfect being turns out to be an illusion. The needs of each partner have not been met. They feel cheated. The marriage goes on the rocks. There often begins a search for another perfect being, a divorce, a re-marriage, and the cycle begins again.

What is wrong? The secret lies in the words "what he or she has been led to expect". The only hope of a way out of the serious condition into which the marriage has fallen lies in loving our neighbor (spouse) as our-

A marriage which is tottering often can be redeemed by putting it on a basis of Christian love rather than romantic love. Romantic love seeks self-gratification: Christian love seeks the good of the other. A marriage which is based on "my happiness" will always fail. One which is founded in a common purpose, the happiness of each other and of the children it produces, WILL SUCCEED.

In a Christian marriage based on Christian love, the man and wife become the neighbor whom each is to love as himself. In seeking the good of the other, it is God's will that is done, not the will of one partner which may be at cross purposes with the will of the other. It is the common good of the marriage that is foremost for consideration, how each daily decision made by the man and wife can best contribute to the working out of GOD PURPOSE for them and for the world about them.

In such a marriage there will be of course ups and downs because both partners are fallen human beings with all the sins that beset humans. But each difficulty looked at together in Christian love and prayer, will be overcome. The difficulties will not be a cause for more separatness, but more TOGETHERNESS. OVER HALF HOSPITAL BEDS OCCUPIED BY MENTAL CASES Some of the facts about mental illness are startling. Included in the information compiled by the National Health Education Committee is an estimate that 16 million people in the United States alone are suffering from some form of mental disorder.

Slightly more than one out of every two hospital beds is occupied by a mental patient. Thus about 54 out of 100 of the nearly 1,400,000 patients occupying hospital beds on any given average day were there for mental reasons. Altogether, during the past year. about 21/2 million men, women and children were treated for some form of mental disorder in a mental hospital.

All but a small proportion of mentally diseased patients are treated in public hospitals supported by a state, county, city, or the Veterans Administration. Only about two out of 100 are cared for in private institutions. Each year about 290,000 new patients are admitted to mental hospitals or psychiatric units of general hos-

THE COST OF mental illness is staggering. It is estimated that the direct cost of mental illness today is in the neighborhood of \$4,170,-000,000 a year. This is made up of expenditures for maintenance of hospitals, compensation and pension payments to veterans, construction of new mental hospital

About one-quarter of first admissions to public mental hospitals consist of patients with a disease known as schizophrenia and about the same number are patients with hardening of the arteries of the brain and related brain disorders. The former is more common in youth and the latter in the older

mental hospitals are over-crowded. There is a great need for more nurses and all the other requirements for the care of the mentally ill. We all have a responsibility to

this discussion by emphasizing the need for research which will help the mentally ill to recover more completely and more rapidly. Any thing which can be accomplished along these lines will reduce the need for beds, nedical care and of course, the cost.

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
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
